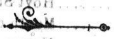

Rev. J. McLeod, D. D., Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following report:—

BROTHER MODERATOR AND BRETHREN:—The report your Corresponding Secretary now presents is chiefly statistical, with a few deductions and suggestions.

CHURCHES.—The enrollment of churches last year was one hundred and fifty-five (155). Nothing in the District reports shows any change in the number.

The number of churches reported to their respective District meetings this year is one hundred and twenty (120), being two more than reported last year.

The churches reported are by Districts, as follows: (1st Dist.) 9; (2nd) 25; (3rd) 16; (4th) 15; (5th) 15; (6th) 28; (7th) 12. In the 1st and 6th Districts, each two churches more than last year reported; in the 3rd District two churches less reported.

Last year one hundred and eighteen (118) churches reported 9169 members; this year one hundred and twenty (120) churches report 9504 members. The estimated unreported membership last year was 2700; giving a total membership of 11,959. The estimated unreported mem-

berhip this year is 2639, making a total membership now of 12,143. Of the 9504 members reported, 6744 are residents, and 2760 are non-residents.

PASTORS.—Of the one hundred and twenty (120) reported churches, one hundred and ten (110) had pastoral care during the year. They were distributed amongst the Districts thus.—(1st Dist) 8; (2nd) 20; (3rd) 16; (4th) 14; (5th) 13; (6th) 23; (7th) 11. The pastors were as follows:—

Fourth District—Revs T O Dewitt, O N Mott, J A Robertson, and E B Gray (partial) and Licen. L A Fenwick (partial).

Fifth District—Revs G W Foster, H A Bonnell and O B Lewis.

Sixth District—Revs B H Nobles, G F Currie, G Swim, A Perry, E S Parker and F G Frances, and Licen. A J Prosser.

Seventh District—Revs G A Hartley, D D, J W Clarke, W H Perry, D Long, I D Harvey and D Patterson, and Licen. M L Gregg.

REVIVALS.—Twenty-six churches report revivals. The number added to them is—by baptism 261, by letter 65, the net increase being 91.

PRAYER AND CONFERENCE MEETINGS &c.—Eighty-eight (88) churches report regular prayer meeting; and one hundred and one (101) churches report the monthly conference regularly held.

Sixty-seven (67) churches report the Lord's Supper administered during the year.

Forty-one (41) churches report that missionary sermons were preached and ten churches have, each, a regular missionary prayer meeting.

Thirty-nine (39) churches report gain in spiritual life and christian activities; twenty-eight (28) churches report loss in these respects; and fifty three (53) either say nothing about their condition, or report "no change."

Forty-five (45) churches report activity in moral reform.

Twenty seven churches report Young Peoples Societies; twenty of the reports say the effect of the societies on the church is good.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS.—During the year four new church buildings have been completed and dedicated—one at Kingsley, York Co., dedicated Oct. 17th 1897; one at Bloomfield, York Co., dedicated June 12th, 1898; one at Victoria, C C, dedicated June 26th, 1898; and one

at Waasis, dedicated Sept 18th, 1893. These are all well built and suitably furnished churches, the erection of which is highly creditable to the communities in which they are.

PARSONAGES—Two new parsonages have been added to the list of homes for pastors, one at Sussex, and one at Blissville. The number of parsonages in the Conference is now fourteen.

Of the several items in the foregoing table, the salaries to ministers were paid by 113 churches; the current expenses by 87; the expenditure for building and improvements by 39; the Home Mission contributions by 45; the Foreign Mission contributions by 50; the Sabbath School money by 14; and the Conference Fund by 84.

The Sabbath Schools item is, certainly, incomplete, for in many Districts the Sabbath Schools have, doubtless, been well supported financially. The Y P Societies item, also, is evidently only a part—and perhaps a small part—of what they have contributed. There is little doubt that other items are more or less inaccurate. Incomplete returns are responsible for the smallness of some of the items, and for whatever inaccuracy there may be in any of them. The reports are much better and more reliable than they were a few years ago, but there is still room for improvement.

The total contributions reported are \$2,770.83 less than last year. The chief falling is in the amount paid for church building and improvements—the decrease in this item being \$3,449.97.

There is a slight increase (\$236.43) in the salaries paid; a small increase, also, in the contributions to Home and Foreign Missions; and a slight falling off in the Conference Fund.

The average contribution, for all purposes, per resident member of reported churches, is \$3.83, which is 73 cts. less than last year. The contribution per resident member for pastors' salaries is \$1.95—a decrease of 11 cts.; for Home Missions 4 cts., and for Foreign Missions 6 cts.,—both the same as last year.

Forty-three (43) churches report all their resident members contributing to the support of church work; and twenty-eight (28) churches are reported as increasing in their support; the other churches report a considerable percentage of their members not contributing—the percentage varying from 10 per cent to 75 per cent.

MINISTERS.—The number of ordained ministers on the Conference roll is the same as last year—43. Of these, thirty-two (32), as set forth above, have been engaged in pastoral work during this year. Of those not engaged in pastoral work, five (Revs J H Erb, A H McLeod, W R Reud, C F Rideout and F A Carrier) are out of the Province; four (Revs T Connor, T W Carpenter, J S Jones and L A Cosman) are prevented by age or ill-health from engaging in active work; one is the editor of the denominational paper; and one, Rev J Noble—our senior minister, has been a general missionary, independent of appointment or salary, and has during the year visited a large number of churches in various parts of our field, and has, also, attended all the District Meetings of the year.

At the beginning of the year there were five Conference and three District Meeting Licentiate. Three have been added to the latter class

during the year—one (W Kirkpatrick) by the Fourth District, and two (T Patterson and M L Gregg) by the Sixth District. The Conference Licentiates not mentioned above as pastors are S J Case, who is still teaching in a Free Baptist School at New Hampton, N H., and F S Hartley, who, having been called to the Yarmouth, N S church, was dismissed by the Conference Executive, and was ordained by the Nova Scotia Conference in September. The District Meeting Licentiates not mentioned as pastors are A D Paul, who has been in Maine, but will take up work in the home field this month, and T Patterson and W Kirkpatrick, who are at school.

The resolution of Conference (see Year Book 1896), requiring each minister to make a report to the Corresponding Secretary has been respected by twenty-three (23) ordained ministers and four (4) licentiates. Following are summaries of their reports:

Rev John Perry reports that he has "been busy all the year. Preached every other Sunday at Wicklow. The cause is low there. Have preached twenty times at Victoria Corner. Helped to hold a series of meetings at Clearview, and have preached some in other places." He thinks "the cause is quite low."

Rev G A Hartley, D D has spent the year with his old charge. His health has been good enough to enable him to preach every Sunday in the year. In July celebrated the fortieth anniversary of his pastorate, the church marking the event by paying off the balance of its mortgage liability. Church "is in a fairly good spiritual condition." "Two have been baptized and four added to the church. Sunday congregations large. Sabbath School large, and doing excellent work.....C E Society is helpful to the church in all its work. Something has been done for Home and Foreign Missions." The outlook is rather encouraging."

Rev J N Barnes has charge of the Stanley Bloomfield field. He is able to report that "the condition of the churches is much improved." Special meetings at Bloomfield "helped the people much; five were converted, three of whom were baptized, and the others will be." "The congregations are good, and the outlook is quite encouraging." At Cross Creek three weeks meetings were held, which were greatly blessed to the help of the church. Bro Barnes will remain another year.

Rev T S VanWart has, as last year, had the pastoral care of Millville Upper Hainesville and Staples Settlement churches. The interest in the field is "much as it was last year."

Rev T O DeWitt has had the care of Rusiagornis, Waasis, Lincoln, Oromocto, French Lake, Waterville, Victoria and Geary. The last mentioned three do not belong to the pastorate, but were looked after by Bro DeWitt because no other care was provided for them. He held special meetings at Waterville and Victoria, and "seven were baptized, and eight received into the church."

Rev E B Gray spent some time in Upper Gagetown last winter. Since Spring he has been with the churches at Knowlesville and Windsor. He reports "the cause low generally; yet they have some good meetings."

Rev C T Phillips continues pastor at Woodstock. "The year has been an ordinary one. The prayer meetings, especially the Sabbath morning ones, are helpful and well attended." The "congregations are good, the Sunday evening service being attended by a large number of young people. The C E Society and the Sabbath School are doing good work. Four were baptized, and six were added to the church this year."

Rev J W Clarke is "nearing the close of his seventh year as pastor of the Waterlog St. church, St John." ... The Sabbath congregations have been larger this year than in any year of his pastorate. While only four have professed conversion and been received into the church this year, there has been progress in nearly all branches of the church's work. In matters spiritual, financial and congregational there has been improvement. The young people are doing well."

Rev J J Barnes has been pastor of Coldstream, Gordonsville and Mount Pleasant churches. "Considerable special work has been done. Seventeen were baptized and added to the churches. The Sabbath Schools and prayer meetings are very well attended, as are the Sabbath preaching services." Bro Barnes retires from the field, and will take charge of Waterville pastorate after conference.

Rev J H Erb writes from Texas that he had hoped to be able to attend Conference this year, but has had, much to his regret, to give it up. He has lately been suffering from malarial fever. He has one regular fortnightly appointment, twelve miles from San Antonio, he also supplies for pastors frequently, and enjoys the privilege of preaching the word, though so far from home.

Rev G W Foster has been pastor of "Central Hampstead, Hibernia and Jerusalem churches, with a service every other Sabbath at Hampstead Village Hall and at Otnabog school house. The meetings in every part of the field have been well attended, and have been seasons of blessing. The churches are in a fairly good spiritual condition, with the exception of one." ... Some "special meetings at Otnabog were fairly fruitful of good. Three were baptized." He had "special meetings at Jerusalem; three were baptized." The four years spent on this field Bro Foster calls "the best of his life." He leaves now, having accepted a call to Keswick.

Rev B H Nobles says the work on his pastorate—Sussex, Penobscuis, Newton and Dutch Valley—has been "very similar to that of last year." There was "a gracious revival at Dutch Valley." The matter of dividing the pastorate, which has seemed a necessity, yet difficult to do, has been decided upon. Sussex is now a separate pastorate, and promises to be greatly helped by the change. A parsonage has been built at Sussex.

Rev W H Perry spent the year with the Grand Manan churches—his

fifth year. "There has been no special revival. Four were baptized at Seal Cove. The church there is in a healthy condition; there is a good Sunday School, a good O E Society, and the church is free of debt. Grand Harbour church is reducing its debt; there is a large Sunday School, and a good O E Society. North Head is struggling on. This has been a hard year for the few faithful ones who maintain the cause." As to the needs of the cause on Grand Manan, Bro Perry says: "There should be two pastorates—North Head and Castalia being one; Grand Harbour and Seal Cove being the other. To carry out this plan would require a liberal grant from the H M treasury to the first named pastorate."

Rev C B Lewis has ministered to five churches, viz: Wickham, Bald Hill, Shannon, Henderson and Big Cove. He has preached three times each Sabbath, and, generally, attended four conferences each month. Wickham is small in membership and weak spiritually the latter condition a result, perhaps, of the loss by death of its two deacons. Bald Hill and Shannon are fairly prosperous. Henderson was without care for a number of years, and is low. Big Cove is small in resident members, and they are scattered over a large territory, and the work is hard. Five were added to the Shannon church during the year. If this pastorate is continued as now constituted it will need some Home Mission support."

Rev F C Hartley has "continued pastor at Fredericton. Twenty-eight have been baptized, and thirty-five added to the church. Prayer services and the Sabbath School have been better attended. As a whole the church work may be said to be in a fairly satisfactory condition."

Rev H A Bonnell has been pastor of "Brown's Flat, Westfield, Oak Point, Hamilton Mountain, Tennant's Cove and Bellisle Bay churches." There was revival at Bellisle Bay, where seven were baptized, and at Westfield church. The cause seems low in the other churches, but better days are hoped for."

Rev A G Downey writes that "for five months after last session he labored with the churches of the Waterville pastorate." About that time "he was stricken with what is commonly called minister's sore throat, and since has been entirely laid aside from preaching."

Rev D Long has been pastor of Victoria St church, St John. He reports "an advance in all departments of the church work. Financially progress has been made. Spiritually the condition is not so good as it should be. There is need of more consecration, shown in service. There have been a few additions, and on the whole we have reason to be encouraged."

Rev Abram Perry has "spent the year with the Salisbury group of churches, which includes Steeves Mountain, Coverdale, Eagle Settlement, Lewis Mountain, Wheaton Settlement and Steeves Settlement." He has done "the regular pastoral work in all the churches, and has held special meetings with the Eagle Settlement and Steeves Settlement churches. The congregations at preaching services have increased, the prayer meet-

ings are better, and there is more interest in Sunday School work." He has baptized forty-five during the year. "The religious condition of the field is not as good as is desirable, but it is the best it has been since he became pastor." A parsonage is much needed. Bro Perry has been pastor of five of the churches nine years, and of the other one six years. He will remain another year.

Rev J B Daggett has had charge of "Upper Brighton, Hartland, Lower Brighton, Havelock, Newburgh and Pembroke churches. The spiritual life of the churches is good.... There have been additions to two of the churches—Upper Brighton and Hartland—two by baptism and nine by letter. Financially the churches have felt the business depression, but the work has been fairly well maintained.... In none of the churches except Hartland, is there much prospect of growth, because the communities do not have increase of population. Hartland is growing rapidly, and our interest should be especially cared for.... If our people here are loyal, and every Free Baptist who comes to the place attends his own church we will grow."

Rev E S Parker has continued pastor of the Moncton church. His report of the work says,—The average congregation has been better than last year. The church has raised more money for the pastor than for many years, also for improvements, &c. Prayer meetings better attended, and meetings good. Twelve have been added to the church; nearly all of them are heads of young families, and good people. The Sunday School is better organized than for years; the attendance, also, is larger; a new library has been put in. The spiritual interest is very good.... The work of improving the church property began in March, and will not be finished for some weeks yet. The improvements are quite extensive, but were much needed. Most of the material has been donated, and a large share of the work is being done by members of the church, after their regular work hours, and free of charge. "To retain its identity the church must never relapse into the old system of being part of another pastorate.... An effective plan should be made and carried out to insure the final success of the work in Moncton." Bro Parker will remain another year with the church.

Rev F A Currier, though labouring in Nova Scotia, is still a member of this Conference, and reports his year's work. His pastorate has three churches—Rockville, Chegoggin and Sanford. He "preaches three times each Sabbath, and conducts three prayer meetings each week. "The year has been one of many blessings." He has "enjoyed the work as never before." "The churches at Chegoggin and Sanford have been in a continual revival spirit; a good many have been converted."

Rev W C Keirstead has had pastoral care of Gibson, and during part of the year of Kingsley also. In both churches the interest has been good; and both are progressing. Their spiritual life is good.

There was "a revival at Gibson, and twenty were added to the church. At Kingsley seven were baptized, and eight added to the church." Bro Keirstead has resigned, and is now at Cobb; Divinity School.

Licentiate Case reports from New Hampton, N.H., where he is a teacher in the New Hampton Institute (Free Baptist). He says it has been his aim to identify himself with every form of Christian work, and he has found ample opportunity to do service for the Master. Often he supplies some churches on the Sabbath. Though absent for the time his "interest and sympathies are with" the brethren and the work at home.

Licentiate Gregg "laboured with the Deer Island churches from last Conference till Christmas." During the winter and till June vacation he was at School in Houlton, preaching on Sundays at Littleton. In June he went again to Deer Island and has remained there till now. Of our cause on the island he says—"Though the condition is not entirely satisfactory our churches have struggled along admirably and have done well considering their disadvantage in not having a regular pastor. Nine converts have been received into the churches. Some have been revived. A better idea of Christian service has been learned by many....The churches need a pastor. After the first year they could support a pastor without H. M. aid."

Licentiate Stirling has been in charge of the Lower Queensbury, Bear Island, Lower Prince William and Dumfries churches. Special meetings were held at Bear Island, resulting in the conversion of nine persons, who were received into the church. Special meetings at Prince William helped the church. "The churches are doing very well; Dumfries is small, only five families of our faith." He thinks "the pastorate cannot support a pastor another year without help from the H. M. Board."

Licentiate Paddington has spent the year with the churches on the Tobique River, making some visits to Perth Valley church. He reports the churches "helped." "It has been a year of blessings." He has "preached three times every Sunday, and has made 389 calls." The churches have asked him to remain another year.

ENCOURAGEMENTS, &c.—Examinations of the foregoing figures and other facts reveal encouraging things. Some of them may be stated thus:

Two (2) more churches reported than last year.

There is an increase of 355 in the reported membership.

Four new church buildings and two parsonages have been erected.

The additions by baptisms are seventy-six (76) more than last year.

The average attendance at prayer meetings and conferences is somewhat increased.

Thirty-nine (39) churches report gain in spiritual life and christian activities.

Forty-three churches report that all their resident members contribute to the support of the work.

Twenty-eight churches are increasing in their support of christian work.

Seven more churches contributed to Home Missions than last year: The salaries of pastors have slightly increased.

Besides these, there are, doubtless, many things of an encouraging character in the life and work of the churches, which have been stated in their reports. Many of the best things are often difficult to tabulate.

But, while rejoicing in signs of prosperity, the Conference should not fail to note such things as these,—

Thirty-five churches did not report to their District Meetings, and nothing of their life and work appears in this report.

In the reports of twenty-two churches no mention is made of a mid-week prayer meeting.

Forty-three of the reported churches did not have the Lord's Supper administered during the year.

There were no additions to eighty-four of the reported churches.

Only ten churches mention a missionary prayer meeting, and in sixty-nine churches no missionary sermon was preached.

The per capita contribution for all purposes is less than it was a year ago.

Less than one fourth of the resident members attend the mid-week prayer meeting, and less than one-third attend the monthly conference.

Fifty-three churches report no gain in spiritual life and no increase of christian activity, and twenty-eight report loss in these respects.

Of the reported churches, seventy-five with 3241 resident members, did not this year contribute to Home missions; seventy churches with 3098 resident members, did not contribute to Foreign Missions; thirty-six churches, with 1042 resident members, paid nothing to the Conference Fund; and not a single church contributed anything to the Fund for the Relief of Sick and Disabled Ministers, or to the Ministerial Students' Aid Fund.

SUGGESTIONS.

Your Corresponding Secretary ventures a few suggestions:—

1. The financial statement in this report, while as complete as could be made from the returns that have come into the hands of the Secretary is not a full showing of the contributions of the churches. Some churches have not made reports, others have not made their contributions to missions, Conference fund, &c., when they reported to their respective District Meetings. So long as any number of churches fail to make full reports, this report will be incomplete, and its exhibit be less creditable to the body than it might be. It is respectfully suggested that every church endeavour to make its report include every contribution and every fact about its work.

2. The non-resident members of the churches are not all out of the

country. Many of them, perhaps a majority, are in the cities and towns of the Province, and have failed to transfer their membership. It ought to be fairly easy to look after these. But whether in the country or out of it, it is certainly the duty of churches to endeavour to exercise care toward their absent members. The reports show that only eight churches make any attempt to keep in communication with their non-resident members. The Waterloo St., St. John church "inquires occasionally"; and the Carleton, St. John, church says it has "no systematic method, but the pastor corresponds with some." Dover church (Lic. A. J. Prosser, pastor) has sought to reach its non residents, "by letters," and reports that "with few exceptions, all responded either by letter or in person." The five churches of Rev Abram Perry's pastorate have endeavoured to reach their non-residents, and in some cases "with satisfactory results." The care of all their members, so far as possible is surely the duty of the churches. It would, probably, have a good effect if the Conference would make a recommendation to the churches in this matter.

3. As churches too easily give up absent members, so District Meetings seem too easily to give up churches. A District Meeting sometimes says of a church—"It has not reported for two or more years, it must be dead, it might as well be struck off the roll." To be cared for, not cast out is what is needed in such case. Conference might advise the District meeting in this.

4. There are churches which are not making progress; they are scarcely holding their own. Their condition is a demand on the body of which they are members. They must be cared for. Their life depends on our care of them; so does our life. Failure to care for them indicates lack of true spiritual life.

Among the churches that need special attention are (1) the thirty-five not reported this year; (2) the seventy-five which contributed nothing to Home Missions, the seventy which contributed nothing to Foreign Missions, the thirty-six which paid nothing into the Conference fund, and the one hundred and twenty which made no contribution to the Ministers' Relief Fund nor the Students Fund, and (3) those churches which report either no gain or actual loss in spiritual life and christian activities.

5. Larger undertakings in home mission work seem necessary. Weak interests need strengthening, and new ground should be occupied. We are quite able to do this work. We cannot afford to neglect it.

No less, but more, should be done for the promotion of God's work in the dark parts of the earth. God's call to His people to go everywhere with the Gospel must always be heard by us and obeyed. Better care of languishing home interests will develop desire and ability to do more for those in "the regions beyond."

6. A survey of the field must impress the thoughtful christian that there is need of a wide spread spiritual revival. Are we being caught in

Mr. James E. McCready, Corresponding Secretary of the Executive for Sabbath Schools, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR—The Executive Committee of Sabbath Schools takes pleasure in bringing before you the report of this important branch of our Denominational Work. As we have been able to gather it from the none too perfect information which has come to our hands.

We find 93 schools have reported, having in all 5601 pupils, 490 teachers and 125 reported conversions during the year, which compared

with last year's report shows an increase of 7 schools, four hundred scholars and 40 teachers and a small increase in number of conversions reported. Each District reporting as follows:—

FIRST DISTRICT—Five schools, 178 pupils, 17 teachers, converted during the year, two.

SECOND DISTRICT—Reports 16 schools, 867 pupils, 81 teachers and (10) ten conversions.

THIRD DISTRICT—15 schools, 921 pupils, 82 teachers, with 32 reported conversions.

FOURTH DISTRICT—13 schools, 583 pupils, 55 teachers, 8 converted during the year.

FIFTH DISTRICT—Reports 9 schools, 339 pupils, 33 teachers and 11 conversions.

SIXTH DISTRICT—24 schools, 1341 pupils, 112 teachers and 39 reported converted during the year.

SEVENTH DISTRICT—11 schools, 1372 pupils, 110 teachers, with 33 reported converted. A gain in the first, second, third, sixth and seventh districts, while a loss is sustained in the fourth and fifth districts.

For comparison the following table of statistics has been prepared which will show the standing of the several districts more fully than this report will allow and to which your attention is directed.

Your Committee would first direct your attention to the fact that the seven additional schools reported this year are all evergreen schools and that the number of such schools is constantly increasing, still a great deal remains to be done while thirty of our schools are closed in the winter principally on account of the lack of earnestness on the part of church workers and members.

In this connection I might be permitted to add, the sixth district has organized a Convention held annually at the time and place of district meeting and semi-annually with some of the schools of the district in the winter season, where good is most likely to result from the meeting together of those whose hearts are in this work. Good has resulted by the adoption of this method of work, and it might be copied with profit in other districts.

The amount of money raised for carrying on our work is steadily increasing, being this year \$1814.13 or nearly four hundred dollars more than the amount raised for the same purpose last year. 85 schools out of the total 93 schools are reported using lesson helps—a large number of these report using other than denominational quarterlies. This meeting might suggest some means of introducing our own publications where they are not already used. Much has been said and written regarding the matter of pastoral attendance, 41 schools are so blessed this year, and the number is constantly growing less, and while your committee does not wish to find fault with the work or the performance of the duties of any, still a look into the statistics will show that schools with pastoral attendance are in advance of these not so situated therefore your Committee would suggest that in cases where regular pastoral attendance is impossible, that a children's service be held in the day time, at least once in each school during the summer, for the encouragement of the children and an aid to those who have the burden of this work. There are 28 schools reporting the use of books; 21 papers, and 29 both books and papers. Much has been done, still more remains. Let us in the name of Him who said "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not," press on in this good work, our efforts and our prayers united, and our motto, "The children for Christ."

Your Delegates to the Free Baptist Conference of the United States, begs to report as follows:—The Conference, triennial, was held at Ocean Park, Me., Aug. 25 to Sept. 1. The Conference is a delegated body. All the yearly meetings, State Associations, and like bodies, having Free Baptist churches as their constituency, are entitled to be represented in the Conference. There were about one hundred delegates present, of whom fourteen were women. A full representation of the bodies entitled to send delegates would have given the Conference about one hundred and thirty members. Some of the more distant parts of the field, chiefly in the south, were not represented. The subjects dealt with by the Conference are, chiefly, Home and Foreign Missions and Education. The reports showed that the total receipts for Foreign Missions were \$17,826; for Home Missions, \$7,468; for Education \$2,428. The members of Conference—the sisters included—gave very close attention to business, but meetings for worship were not neglected. The devotional spirit was marked, and the services of praise and prayer were seasons of spiritual quickening and joy.

Your delegate was warmly received as the representative of the Free Baptists of New Brunswick, and was made to feel very much at home. He presented the Christian greetings of this Conference, and as instructed, asked for a continuance of the fraternal delegation. Dr. Chase, President of Bates College, was appointed, whom this Conference has been glad to

AN ACT RELATING TO "THE FREE CHRISTIAN BAPTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK" AND TO CHANGE THE NAME THEREOF TO "THE FREE BAPTIST GENERAL CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK."

WHEREAS, The Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick, incorporated by an Act of Assembly 17th Victoria, Chapter 47, has by its Petition prayed that its name may be changed to "The Free Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick," and it is expedient to grant the prayer of said Petition.

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly as follows :

The name of of the said "The Free Christian Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick" is hereby changed to "The Free Baptist General Conference of New Brunswick," and by and under such name, it, and its associates and successors and all the Churches and Societies now connected with the said Conference and all such as hereafter be organized in connection with it shall be known as Free Baptist Churches and Societies, and shall have and exercise all the powers granted to the said Conference by the said Act and the Acts in amendment thereof and in addition thereto, but such change in name shall not in any way impair, alter or affect the rights or liabilities of the said Conference or that of all or any of the Churches and Societies now connected with the said Conference, nor in any wise affect any suit or proceeding now pending or judgments existing (if any) either by, in favor of, or against the said Conference, which, notwithstanding such change in name of the Conference may be prosecuted or continued or completed and enforced as if this act had not been passed, and all property both real and personal which the said Conference, Churches and Societies connected with the said Conference now own or may be entitled to or interested in shall continue vested in it

its associates and assigns, and each and every of them under its changed name subject to any liens or incumbrances upon it or any or either of them, which lien or incumbrance shall continue as if this Act had not been passed.

Rev. J. B. Daggett, from the Committee on Literature submitted the following report:—

BROTHER MODERATOR,—Your Committee on Literature beg leave to report:—We would reiterate the sentiments of the Conference in the past that much depends upon the class of literature that is found in the homes of our people. There cannot be a robust, vigorous spirituality when there is no religious literature there. We perceive a great danger in this age, as never in the past, from the advent of cheap books and papers. The country is being flooded with a class of cheap story papers. Some of which are low in moral tone and ideal, others of which are not openly vicious, nevertheless against both we would protest, against the first-class because of the evil writer upon every page, against the other because we believe the time spent in their perusal is wasted, it is labour from which there is no profit and which leaves the reader poorer and weaker intellectually. We would once more endorse most heartily the Religious Intelligencer, we are far from satisfied with the extent of its circulation and we are positively dissatisfied with the fact that so many people are far in arrears. It takes cash to pay the Intelligencer's bills. Upon the pastors and delegates we would urge that they bring this prominently before our people. Your Committee also regret the lack of uniformity in our churches in the use of hymn books. It is known to your Committee that there is in use at least a half dozen different kinds of hymn books. We feel that this is to be regretted, some hymn book should have the endorsement of this body and be recommended to the churches.

Once more we would recommend care in the choice of Sabbath school literature, that none be admitted which conflicts with the faith and practices of this body. Respectfully submitted,

Rev. G. F. Carrie, Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Executive, submitted the following Report:—

BROTHER MODERATOR.—The Foreign Missionary work, which the Free Baptist bodies of the United States, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are connected with and interested in, occupies a territory in India, situated in the southern part of Bengal. Within the districts where this mission is established, according to the census of 1892 the number of males are 1,782,318, and the number of females 1,828,677, making a total population of 3,610,995. In the year 1838 work was commenced at Balasore by Free Will Baptist Missionaries; and the first Independent Free Baptist mission established. On January 27th, 1839, the first Hindu convert to Christ, through the agencies of this mission was baptized. Since then, without any serious interruption, notwithstanding many discouragements at times, the work has gone steadily on, teaching the benighted way of life and salvation. I here give the names of some of the churches and a brief sketch of their present standing.

Balasore was established in 1838. To this church during the past year 4 have been added by baptism. The total membership is 144. The report says "a great change is taking place in the feeling of Hindus toward Christians and Christianity. In places where, a few years ago, almost none were willing to listen to the Gospel, now many are ready and eager to listen, some buy gospel portions, and invite the preachers to their houses, and even ask them to sleep on their verandas, a thing never heard of in this section till recently." Balasore district is evidently turning slowly but surely to the Lord. The province of Orissa, of which Balasore district is a part, is a hot-bed of Hindulism. "But" says the report, "the weeds of this hoary superstition are dying more and more rapidly under the fresh air and blessed sunlight of God's truth."

Babagadia, established in 1880, has a total membership of 20. It is one of those small Christian communities adjacent to Midrapore, where for five years there has been shortage of crops, and on that account the people have become discouraged and many are moving away.

Bhimpore has a total membership of 236. During the year 16 have been added by baptism, and on the whole seem to be a strong and vigorous church. A new building for worship, which will seat 250 people, is nearing completion. They make an appeal for \$300.00 which is needed to finish the building clear of debt, any who wish to contribute are asked to send their offering to Dr. Given.

Bhudruck has a membership of 25. Some additions during the year have been made by letter and otherwise. This station was established in 1890. The reports show that this Christian community, tho' small in numbers is strong in faith, and with four Christian workers is sowing the good seed in many villages within their reach. They ask that we all

help them by our prayers.

Chardball, was established in 1888 Five were added to this church last year, two by baptism and three by letter. The total membership is 30. Regular services are maintained and are mentioned as seasons of rich blessings. The running expenses, and half the pastor's salary, is paid by the native church. Besides this, each member is laying up a certain amount monthly toward building a chapel in which to worship.

Jallsore has a total membership of 49 While there has been no additions by baptism during the year, yet the report speaks of this church as being in a brighter and more hopeful condition than ever before. In 1840 this church was established.

Metrapore has a membership of 35 and was established in 1855. Two were added by baptism. The forward movement toward self support is very noticeable in this church, and the creditable contributions toward this object are healthy signs.

Midnapore, established in 1863 has now a membership of 109. In the past year 6 have been added by baptism. This church has had a good year, the workers are much encouraged. Recently the congregation has undertaken the entire support of the pastor, as well as paying the Sexton's wages and some other contingent expenses.

Santipore, during the year has had increase by letter and otherwise and its total membership is now 83. This church was established in 1867. Here also the native church has shouldered the burden of self support, which will doubtless prove a great blessing to them.

Ujurda church was established in 1891, and has a total membership of 18. This church, above all others in far away India, should enlist the interest of every New Brunswick Free Baptist. It was here our missionary, the late Rev. A. B. Boyer, worked so successfully for Christ, that he was the means of establishing this Christian church, in the midst of dense heathenism. An ever advancing and prosperous christian community is being built up in that place. Miss L. E. Gaunce, the missionary of the Woman's Mission Society of this province, is now in charge of the work there.

Of those churches mentioned some of which have existed many years, who can tell the good which has been done by the faithful hands of christian workers. The souls saved, and men uplifted from cruel heathen practices, to the new and better life in Jesus Christ. How and where shall the complete tabulation of this work be done, and understood? None but God knows. In no place but the Judgment can it be fully revealed. During the past, as in other years, burdens have been borne by the Missionaries which those of us in the Home Field know but little about. Battles have been fought, and victories won, by those brave soldiers of Jesus Christ. Reports show that 32 persons professed faith in Jesus in the past year and declared it by baptism.

Rev. D. Long, Corresponding Secretary for Home Mission Executive, submitted the following Report:—

BROTHER MODERATOR—Your Executive in presenting their Annual Report desire to place before you a brief statement of the work done during the past year. We convened twice during the year, once in November and May, at each session your Executive gave thoughtful consideration to the applications from the different parts of the field. Besides the business done at our meetings considerable was done by correspondence. Your Executive regret nothing has been done in general missionary work. Having a number of circuits which in themselves are not self-sustaining, your Executive made small grants to enable them to have pastoral care. Aid has been given to some of our weak churches in order that they have the gospel preached to them occasionally.

The following are the pastorates and churches which have had the attention of your Executive:

In the First District, Lic. J. H. Puddington has given pastoral care to Arthurette, Rowena, Long Island and Riley Brook churches, also held services at Dow's Flat and Blue Settlement, four were baptized at Rowena and one at Arthurette.

In the Second District a grant was made to the Hartland circuit, Rev. J. B. Daggett has ministered very acceptably to the churches on the pastorate.

A small grant was made to Rev. John Perry for care attending churches in the Second District. He reports the cause very low in some of these churches.

Rev. E. B. Gray by the direction of the Executive has given pastoral care to the churches at Knowlesville and Windsor since the first of June.

In the Third District the Upper Hainsville circuit of which Rev. S. Vanwart is pastor received a continuation of the grant of last year.

A small grant was made to the Canterbury-Southampton circuit.

Rev. John Henderson reports that he has been holding services at Jones Forks, Doran Ridge and Clover Ridge, seven were baptized at Clover Ridge. He has received a little assistance from the Executive.

In the Fourth District the churches at Waterville, Victoria and Geary received a grant of ten dollars each, which enabled them to secure the labors of Rev. T. O. DeWitt occasionally. Bro. DeWitt reports holding special meetings at each church, seven were baptized and with one other added to the church at Waterville the other churches were helped spiritually.

The Stanley and Bloomfield circuit received some assistance from the Executive. This is an exceedingly hard field, especially in the winter, the distance between Stanley and Bloomfield churches being 31 miles, and at Bloomfield. After the dedication services special services were continued which resulted in a number of conversions, some were added to the church.

Rev. E. B. Gray spent a few weeks last autumn with the brethren at Greenfield, reports cause low.

In the Fifth District Rev. H. A. Bonnell has given pastoral care to Brown's Flat, Oak Point, Westfield, Hamilton Mountain and 1st. and 2nd churches at Kars. Special meetings were held at Westfield and 1st. church at Kars, which resulted in additions to each church.

Your executive feel that the grant made to Moncton church in the 6th district has resulted in a blessing to those brethren. They have had faithful pastoral care by Rev. E. S. Parker, who reports that 12 were added to the church. The inside of the church is being repaired and beautified. The spiritual life of the church is good, and the congregations are increasing. We are glad to learn that he is going to remain another year. The church at Erb Settlement received a small grant. Rev. G. F. Parrie has extended care to this church.

David Patterson, reports regular services, interest fairly good. A little assistance was extended to Grand Manan. We are sorry to hear that the pastor, Rev. W. H. Perry, has resigned.

Bro. M. L. Gregg, who attended Rickers Classical School, Houlton, Maine, during the winter, spent the summer with the churches on Deer Island. They enjoyed his labors with them. He reports interest good. Bro. Gregg has left to attend the University at Fredericton.

Bro. L. A. Fenwick, who graduated from Acadia College in June has been in care to the churches at Upper Hampstead and Upper Gagetown.

Bro. D. B. Perry, at the close of the Normal School, went to Beaver Harbor where he spent a few weeks.

In looking over the field one is impressed with the importance of this department of the denominational work. Your Executive desire to call the attention of Conference to the necessity of a general missionary, one who would have an oversight of the work. To carefully look into the work, needs of weak circuits, and churches requiring help, and to so present the claims of those upon the stronger, so as to arouse more enthusiasm in their behalf. No Executive can do the home mission work of this denomination to be satisfactory, and beyond criticism with the meagre knowledge and limited funds at their disposal.

The fathers planted! Brethren it remains for us to cultivate. Let us hold sacred the work entrusted to us. Let us not be satisfied with what we are doing while so many weak and struggling churches are calling for help. But arise in the name of our God to answer their call, by sending the gospel of our Lord, which is for all men.

May we have divine guidance at this session while we plan for next year's work, so that greater work may be done.

Some of our most devoted and faithful fellow-laborers have been called up higher, and our loved and faithful Sister Peters whose presence through all these years has been so helpful to us, is lying dangerously ill in her home. Yet we recognize that even these things so sad and grievous to us for the present to endure, are but a manifestation of his great love towards them and to us. "Now we see through a glass darkly, then shall we see face to face, now we know in part then shall we know even as we are known."

During the year our dear Sister Gaunce has been toiling faithfully in India. As you know, our sister is located at Balasore, and lives there the greater portion of the year while the principal part of her work is at Ujurda about 20 miles distant. church of 18 members, established in 1891 by our beloved Brother Boyer, and a native Christian community of 57. Four new members have been added to the church this year and three members have died. Our native preacher Elliston Saren is doing faithful work. The Sabbath school and weekly prayer meeting have been kept up during the year. The Sunday school has been well attended by both parents and children. The day school which has two teachers, is doing good work, one of the pupils, a promising boy, is to go up for examination next year. Miss Gaunce expects to have him trained for teaching. Mishra, our colporteur spent two months or more among the people of the village visiting the markets and surrounding villages. He says that many of the country people are afraid to listen to the gospel, being ignorant and superstitious, he found few of them anxious to buy books or tracts, yet he is sowing the seed and in due season the fruit will be garnered. The Bible women are doing a blessed work as a rule they are gladly received and are asked to come again and more often. Owing to illness, Miss Gaunce could not spend as much of the cold season as she would have liked among the people. Her two Bible women, Rebecca and Uidya accompanied her and for two weeks they went out twice a day to the surrounding villages speaking helpful words, reading portions of scripture, offering prayer and singing hymns, and in every way trying to dispel darkness and instil truth into the minds and hearts of the women and children. Ulma, an efficient devoted Bible woman, whom we have supported for years is seriously ill from a cancerous disease. She is a great sufferer, one side being paralyzed and one eye sightless. We ask your earnest prayers in her behalf. At Ujurda the people are poor, and last year the rice crop was a comparative failure, yet they have undertaken to contribute a certain sum towards the support of the church. Miss Gaunce is hopeful that better work will be done next year, and that by your help she will be able to take up other lines of work. Our new house at Ujurda is the only building in India that we as a people own, and some further work is to be done upon it soon. The well which Miss Gaunce had sunk last year has proved a great blessing. She expects to have it dug deeper so that it may not go dry even in the driest seasons.

Ever since Miss Gaunce has been in India she has lived with the principal of the Boys Orphanage at Balasore. When sister Boyer was there and had charge, she lived with her, when the Hamdens took charge of the Orphanage, she remained with them. During the last year Miss Scott who lived with Mrs. Smith at the Sinclair Girls Orphanage went home to Scotland on furlough, and Miss Gaunce was asked to change and go with Mrs. Smith. She did so and was then asked to take charge of the Orphanage for four months, which she has done in such an efficient manner that she is now asked to become the permanent superintendent of that Orphanage and your Board is called upon at this season to decide the question as Miss Gaunce has referred it to you. During Miss Scott's

absence Miss Gaunce had charge of the Zonana work which she found very interesting, and it also opened up to her new homes, in which she could do Bible work. In the Zonana work she had Brahma, Moham-medan and Hindoo homes opened up to her for both secular and religious instruction. Two educated Hindoo gentlemen expressed a wish to Miss Gaunce that whenever she visited their village she would always visit their wives.

Owing to her Zonana work she was not able to do as much going out with her Bible women as during the previous year; yet good work was done. Miss Gaunce says, "There are few houses to which we have applied to speak to them about Christ where we have been refused a hearing." Last year two Hindoo Girl's Schools were reported; this year, for good reasons, one has been closed, the other is in operation and doing good work. One pupil has passed the lower primary examination and three more are being prepared for the next examination. They receive instructions in Bible and catechism, singing also being taught.

Miss Gaunce has proven herself an efficient worker, and from all I can learn is being used by the Master for His glory and the good of souls in that benighted land. During the year her health has been fairly good, with some attacks of fever, the arch enemy of the missionary as Mr. Hamlen says; although none of those attacks have been of a very serious nature, a fact for which we are profoundly thankful to our Heavenly Father and our prayer is that many useful years may yet be in store for our loved missionary. Miss Gaunce thanks you for your support and prayers, your loving sympathy and tender messages.

HOME WORK.—This is one of the most interesting features of our work. For several years we have made a grant to the Conference Home Mission Executive, and for two years we had a home missionary in the field and among our weak churches doing efficient faithful work from which as a society we have already seen much good result. Last year we made a grant of \$150.00 to the Conference Home Mission Executive, and we also procured one hundred copies of our denominational paper and had them sent to persons among the different districts. Although the work may not have been as well managed and carried out as we could wish yet we believe much good will result, and we think this is one of the best means to do successful home mission work among our churches. A lack of knowledge of the needs of the work and the methods of working is one of the greatest hindrances of our society at the present time, and I believe there is no better plan of remedy than sending our own paper to our people, which will prove a quiet, persistent, persuasive and constant instructor every week during the year. Sisters, your Secretary earnestly trusts that the Home Mission work may not be decreased in any way by us as a society; but that we may seriously consider how we may do more and better work in this particular in the years that are to come. Oh! the whitened fields, The fearful responsibility that rests upon us as

Miss Gaunce's Report.

DEAR SISTER,—Looking back over another year of work I feel like saying with the Psalmist, "O give thanks unto the Lord; for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever." The year has been full of work and though I have not seen the results I would have liked, yet trust that the seed which has been sown will bring forth fruit to His honour and glory, and to the encouragement of His servants.

During the year there have been several changes, one of which was my removal to Sinclair's Orphanage. When Miss Scott went on furlough Mrs. Smith was left alone and by her request I went to live with her. At the beginning of the year when the work in Widow's Home demanded so much of Mrs. Smith's time and attention, in addition to my regular work, undertook to assist her in the Orphanage. The daily accounts, inspection of dormitories and out houses, looking after the health of children and caring for the sick have been made over to me. There is a Matron to relieve me, and the elder girls have been very helpful in sickness. During the cold season we had several cases of long illness, that demanded good care and attention. When the children were able to be up and walk about how repaid we felt for all the care and anxiety.

In February Miss Scott returned, and Zonana work reverted again to me. This work introduced me into several new homes, to which I afterwards went with the Bible women. This year have found Bible work more interesting, probably due to the fact that I am better acquainted with the people and language. Often I go independent of the Bible women. There is an elderly woman and her sister whom I visit regularly. They have asked me to come to their home on Sunday mornings and have a Bible lesson with them and some others who will attend. I promise myself I will try, but often a time comes when a new task undertaken means something in hand dropped off. The Bible women supported by you have done fairly good work. In the last Bible examination the highest marks were made by Adjyda. Much of the credit is due Mrs. Smith.

as she gives them a weekly lesson, from the Blakeslee Graded Lesson System, for Sunday Schools and Bible Classes.

On Saturday I give a Bible lesson to a class in the Girl's School. At present we are studying the Gospel History of Jesus Christ, by Blakeslee.

Of the two Hindoo Girl's schools reported last year one is in operation and doing fairly good work. At the last Lower Primary examination one pupil was sent and passed. Two are being prepared for this year, but fear they may fail in their sewing. On account of the heavy rains it has not been convenient for me to cross the paddy fields, so for a time have had to suspend the sewing class. If the school is to be continued a new house is needed. The present building is too small and unpleasantly situated, I have asked the teacher to try and raise the money among the villagers. I think they can quite afford to build one, but shall in all probability have to assist them. The Deputy Inspector, who occasionally visits the school has advised me to apply to District Board for grant-in-aid. Should I succeed in getting it, the school can be carried on almost independent of Mission money. On account of non-attendance the other school has been closed. When the children became old enough to watch a flock of sheep or herd of cattle, pull punk, ale, etc.—books were laid aside. So it did not seem to me profitable to continue school for the few who did attend.

The condition of Ujurda church has continued about the same as reported last year. The latest forward movement (self support) has taken place since the beginning of the year. By a rule adopted at the Yearly Meeting no more Pastors are furnished for Churches. During one of my visits to them I explained the matter and they agreed to pay what they could towards support of this Pastor. The sum apportioned them is small, but it is a step towards independence.

We have lost six members of the Christian community by death. Dear old Bon Malia Ma departed this life about two weeks ago. I trust she is now happy in the presence of Jesus. The Church services and Sunday School are fairly well attended. The weekly Prayer meetings continue, but have not been as well attended as they might have been. During the cold season Mishra, the Colporteur spent two months or more among the people there. Some days he had quite a number of Hindus, who came to hear what he had to say about the Christian religion, God grant that some of the words spoken fell upon good ground.

Twice I took workers out with me. They visited the people in the village, and also did Bible work in adjoining villages. The people were very glad to have them and are anxious they return next cold season.

Dear Sisters shall we not try to be more faithful and earnest in our prayers for this church and community? There have been times when I have been very much tried and disheartened with the work in this village. But the thought of your prayers—prayers which have been offered and are being offered has given me courage. I am praying and expecting that God

It was a pitiful tale she told of the daily life of the women in India. By centuries of degradation they have well nigh lost all spirit or ambition and it would take years to uplift them. Many of them, were, no doubt now Christians, but dare not profess it. Upon her finger she wore a ring, a gift of one of these once a hardened woman, but now a Christian. Turning to the question of prospective missionaries she said it was a mistaken idea that the people of India were ignorant. They were not, but were of keen, acute minds. To send an ignorant man is to raise a barrier against successful work. Send always an educated man. Referring to the New Brunswick missionary, Miss Lizzie Gaunce, she said she was beloved by the entire mission for her work.

It is always a cause of gratitude, at the close of a year, to find increasing zeal in the Master's service, marking the life of an individual or society. It is therefore with thankfulness that I present this review of the year's work done by our sisters.
