### NORTH CAROLINA **FACTIONS UNITING BEHIND PROGRAM**

High Point, N.C.,-Despite the propaganda spread daily by white newspapers seaking to frighten, divide and discourage North Carolina. colored people, North Carolinians of all factions are uniting behind the militant program outlined by the N. A.A.C.P.

The latest evidence is found in a meeting of educators called recently in Durham by Dr. J. E. Shepard and others who are regarded as conservatives. This conference did not mention the N.A.A.C.P. or its program by name, but adopted a strong statement embodying mot of the N. A.A.C.P. philosophy. The state ment condemned mob violence and lynching, scored the barring of Negroes from jury services, calling such trials "travesties," hit disfranchisment of Negro voters, condemned the low wags scale for Negro teachers, slaying they were reduced "to the level of janitors," and called for "scrupulous observance of the law as it is written."

The statement recommends a fair salary scale for teachers, protection for Negro workers not included onder regardless of color, and registering and voting by colored citizens. It P. calls upon the North Carolina Teachers' Association "to be strong in the protection of the rights of teachers and to take every forward step possible." It calls upon the colored people of the state "to be vigilant in the safeiuarding of their rights guarantead under the law."

ATTIE HASTIE IS NAMED ASSISTANT SOLICITOR IN UNITED STATES INTERIOR DEPT

Washington, D.C.-For the first time a colored man has been appointed to the position of Assistant Solicifor in the Department of the Interior The recipient of this atest democratic honor is William H. Hastie, attorney of Washington and member of the faculty of the Howard Law School. Mr. Hastis was appointed Thursday and immediately started to work.

Mr. Hastie was born in Knoxville Tenn., but has lived in Washington rince 1916. He is a graduate of Dun-/bar high school, Washington, Amhearst college and Harvard Law chool. He taught at Bordentown Industrial school 1925-27 and has been a member of the facdlty of the Howard Law School since 1930. He was almitted to the District of Columbia Bar in 1931 and in 1933 received the degree of Doctor of Juridical Science from Harvard university, being the second colored man to receive this highest degree from the Harvard Law School

### BOULDER DAM

Las Vegas.-Under the pressure of he Department of the Interior, jobs for colored men at Boulder dam are lowly opening up. Secretary Harold .. Ickes and his assistants have assured local colored people that opportunities are being made for them.

In a letter to the contracting companies here recently Secretary Ickes stated there must be no discrimination against applicants for employment because of race or color.

Steps are being taken by the Interor department to open up Boulder City to colored residents. Up to this ime Negroes have not been allowed to live in this government owned and overnment built town near the dam.

At the prosent time there are accommodations for transients here provided by the Feleral Transjent Relief Threau so that colored workers who do come here looking for work will have a place to stay until they are employed. The number of qualified colored workers who could be employed n the dam is very low here ow and the government thus has a rool excuse to say it is not employing Negroes because no good color-0 ed wrkers are here.

Loland S' Hawkins, president of ional Associatin for the Advancement of Colored People, was here last week on an investigation trip locking to increase opportunities for colored workers on the dam. The N. A.A.C.P. and the National Bar Association which Mr. Hawkins also represents, have been working for two years to secure a fair share of workers.

#### EDITORIAL

Papers this week reported that the Scottsboro boys have been denied a change of venue, on the grounds that they have not satisfied the judge that they would receive an unfair trial. In making such a statement, the Judge has implied that the counsels for the defence are derelict in their duty in not placing before him all that happened during session of the court and outside of the courtroom, all f which were reported in the daily papers in New York and relayed to the outside world. These in themselves ought to prove beyond shadow of doubt that sentiment in Alabama is strong against the boys and under such conditions it is doubtful whether a proper trial will be given them. How can angered and ignorant people be expected to mete out justice in its true sense to these boys?

In fact, to one who knows British integrity and honour and who is accustomed to seeing justice meted out in British courts by intelligent judges of high moral and social calibre, the Scottsboro case seems a 'joke', a high tribute to American education and intelligence. The behaviour of "Attorney" Knight during the trial was ungentlemanly, in fact, it bordered on certain characters in Shakespeare's ploys whose part in the plays were to fill up the gaps to the amusement of the audiences or the entertainers of ancient kings rather than an honourable gentleman of the revered legal profession appointed as prosecutor.

Prosecution ceases to be what it should be when the prosecutor steps beyond the limits of the law. becomes then persecution pure and simple, and nothing else.

It is time for Negroes the wide world over to shake off dull sloih, get together and arm themselves against white arrogancy and domination. The Canadian New groes must realize that the Scottsboro boys are their boys, "flesh of their flesh." and if they permit the Negroes to be treated unjustly in U.S.A. or elsewhere it will be just a short way from their being handled unjustly in Canada. As it is the Negro in Canada is not considered as a factor in the equation of life at all. They are not given any positions here that count for much and this alone is sufficient reason in itself for them to bestir themselves and link with the N.A.A.C.P. of yhich Dr. DuBois is head in America. It is our wish that branches of this great organization could be established on a proper basis as in U.S.A., not for entertaining at socials and other functions but to rectify some of the ills which the poor unfortunate Negroes are suffer ing at the hands of their oppressors.



## Economy



### Co-Operation

Co-operation is the keynote of a successful civic administration. The chief magistrate must be a man with whom the members of the City Council can work in sympathy and to whom they can look for constructive leadership.

Ex-Mayor Keorge Hayman has demonstrated in his previous terms in office that he can work in harmony not only with his associates on the Council, but with the heads of civic departments. It is teamwork of this kind that provides really economic city government.

His associates recognize in ex-Mayor Hayman a capable, energetic business man, while he in turn appreciates the abilities and suggestions of those with whom he is associated.

### Efficiency

Efficiency is the corner stone on which economic civic administration is built. It is not a matter of time clocks or complicated accounting systems, but the application of sound business principles based on erperience.

Ex-Mayor Hayman has the necessary background of experience, both in his private business and in municipal affairs, to insure the maximum of efficiency and economy in the operation of the city's biggest business.

Few Londoners are as well equipped for the job of leading the city in a difficult period as is ex-Mayor Hayman. He is, first of all, a builder, and his administration will at all times be constructive.

### Pay-As-You-Go Policy

Ex-Mayor Hayman stands four-square for a pay-as-you-go policy in municipal affairs. He believes that in the past there has been too much of a tendency for municipal bodies—not only in London but in most civic centres—to use the debenture issue for purposes for which it was never intended.

Too often the debenture route has been resorted to for the financing of projects which should have been included in the general taxes, in order to fix a rate which would reflect credit on the City Council.

### Policy of Extravagance

Such a policy is rosting the taxpayers enormous sums of money each year in compounded interest. Ex-Mayor Hayman believes that an end should be put to such-work as it is esonomically impracticable to inclue in the current tax rate.

London's debenture debt up to the end of last year including coupon interest to the time that all the issues expire in 1956, totals the tremendous sum of \$29,856,252.86, which is almost double the amount of the original issues.

### Increased Tax Burden

Year after year a considerable portion of the annual tax requirements is needed for sinking fund and interest payments. Yhile some of this debt was unavoidable, there is a goodly share which has served only to increase the burden of London taxpayers.

Ex-Mayor Hayman favors a pay-as-you-go policy as far as it is possible.
