Candidates, etc. To the Editor of the Advocate.

Sir:—In the Advocate of the 11th inst. the Editor of that paper intimated that it was the intention of the Liberal party of this county to throw out of its allegiance to the Hon. P. Mitchell, whom by an overwhelming majority had elected as the Representative of this County in '90 and it declared the future policy of the party in tramping tones to be that an Independent Liberal would be elected by the party at the next election. In a temperate reply thereto, I took occasion to point out to the Editor of the Advocate and to the Liberals of the County certain facts relating to the matter raised by the article in question, and I further gave it as my opinion that the interests of true Liberalism would be injured by the party in this County sending to Ottawa a man of no political creed, whose principal object would be to prey on the party for the time in power, selling his vote and his influence with the same facility as he would his friends. I asked in the name of the party that the Editor of the Advocate would be more explicit. That he would take into the confidence of the Firm of Independent Liberals the Liberal party of the County from whom alone the Independent Liberal could expect support. I expected that my letter would have been reported to the Editor of the Advocate, but it was not. But I was disappointed. The article in the Advocate of the 11th inst. gave way to a cry but appeal and an attack on the Editor of the Advocate for his conduct of his paper. With the quarrel between the Editors of these papers I had nothing to do. But I had to do with the question raised by the Editor of the Advocate and in my next letter I continued my strictures on the future policy of the Editor as outlined in an article of the 11th inst. In doing so I was compelled to make use of the name of one of the members of the Firm, but not in his private capacity. I said that our party has nothing to do with it, but I do with him in his public capacity. It has to do with him as one of the controlling powers, in fact, in his own estimation, the controlling power of the Liberal Party in this County. But even in dealing with him in this capacity in the region of fair, honest and open criticism, fully believing that the Editor of the Advocate would be driven into making a decent and honest reply. But I was mistaken in my estimate of the Editor. When I expected to find the lion I found an ass in a lion's hide. When I expected decent journalisms I found an unprovoked attack upon my personal character. One would have imagined that the past experience of the Editor of the Advocate in the mud throwing line would have convinced him of the utter futility of attempting to find in the County a man with a more expeditious pen than himself. But mud throwing has always been his policy when defeated in argument or he considered it impolitic to deal with the question at issue. But I have no present intention of entering into the scuttlery with the Editor. I am dealing with him in his capacity as one of the leaders of the Liberal Party and with his paper as the exponent of the views of the Party in his County. I do not care one rap whether a "Christmas" or a crazy feeling animates him in his belief that both himself and the community generally holds me in contempt. But I do care a rap for the interests of the Liberal Party with which I have voted and worked for years and with whose history in this County I have been identified. And I further believe that there are many other Liberals in the County equally interested with me and equally indignant at the assumption of the Editor of the Advocate and his Independent allies to speak and act for the whole party without consultation with the leaders thereof.

The Advocate in its last issue states that we threw out the suggestion of a resident Independent Liberal for what it was worth. He should have gone further. I asked him to go further and tell the Electors who his Independent Liberal is, what he is worth, and let the Liberals weigh the question both of his personality and his worth in the scales of their intelligence. The Liberals of the County are men and as such deserve the treatment accorded men of intellect.

gentle, men of thought and men of action. They will not be muzzled by the Editor of the Advocate and his Independent Liberal allies, neither will I be deterred from discussing questions affecting the future of the party by the fact that my personality is contemptuous to the Editor of the Advocate.

I warn the Editor that the Liberals of the County are interested in this matter. That they do not look with favor upon the attempt made by the Editor in his last issue to attack the question by dragging me into a personal quarrel with himself.
