LARGE NUMBER ATTEND EXCURSION

Evening Cruise On the Canada a Great Success.

The first excursion of the season was attended with splendid weather and over 300 enjoyed the cruise arranged by the Tennis Club last Monday evening. Leaving here about 7:30 p. m. the Canada made Dalhousie by 9 p. m., but was delayed in taking her berth until nearly ten o'clock thereby disappointing a goodly number from Dalhousie who were looking forward to the excursion. The company on board were kept merry and delighted by the playing of Campbellton Brass Band who accompanied the excursion and piano and vocal music was provided in the Main Saloon. The steamer arrived at Carleton at 11:40 p. m. and the captain decided not to risk a repetition at Dalhousie in the dark on the return journey and thereby decided to remain till daylight. The moon at this point was hung up in the sky at the direction of the Committee for the benefit of the excursionists who desired a moonlight excursion, and having three hours at our disposal the store at Carleton was raided by hungry hands who bought all available eatables therein. The umbrellas, shoes, suspenders etc., which some of the aforesaid marauding bands purloined, are not included as eatables. Dancing on the pier was indulged in by the younger members of the strains of the band, while others explored around the province of Quebec in the moonlight. After clearing out the refreshment stock in the dining saloon, presided over by Mr. H. Luke in a masterly hotel-keeper manner, we said Good-bye to Carleton at 8 a. m. for the return, calling at Dalhousie and arriving home at Campbellton at 6 a. m., very tired.

TOWN COUNCIL

New Town Bonds to be Sold at Par.

The Town Council held an adjourned meeting on Thursday evening under the chairmanship of His Worship Mayor McDonald. Councillors present: Messrs. White, McKenzie, Moore, Alexander, Miller, Mowat and Pinault.

The minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Communication read from McInerney and Trueman, Solicitors St. John, re claim of Ex. Chief Crawford's claim for arrears of salary; referred to town solicitors.

Communication from L. T. Joudry re alterations on his building on Minto St., was referred to Public Property and Street committee.

Communication from D. Brogan re taxes was referred to assessments and appeals committee.

Communication from W. J. O'Leary re road of O'Leary Street was referred to Public Property and Street committee.

Communication from B. Eding Inspector re various buildings shown and placed on file and that the Building Inspector be ordered to direct the owner of the planing mill to desist forthwith from allowing shavings to be scattered or stored and to have installed a hose blower to convey shavings direct to the furnace, and also to have a metal covered roof on his boiler house.

Communication from D. J. Jamieson re taxes; referred to assessment and appeals committee.

Petition from Geo. V. Parker for license for barber's shop; referred to Police and License committee.

Petition from residents on O'Leary Street for water and sewerage connections, referred to water and sewerage committee.

Reports of standing committees: Council re Public Property and streets, recommending payment of accounts totalling \$870.41. Councillor Mowat, from electric light committee, recommending payment of accounts totalling \$1191.83. Councillor Miller, from finance committee, recommending payment of accounts totalling \$88.32. All these reports were received and adopted.

In a further report, Councillor Miller recommended that Miss Corbett be appointed as assistant to Mr. John T. Reid for two months. Report was received and adopted.

Councillor Miller in a report from the finance committee stated that they had under consideration the sale of \$100,000 guaranteed debentures.

Teniers were asked for from all the leading brokers direct as well as being advertised in the press. Bids closed at 6 o'clock on Saturday last and the following are offers received: Montreal Investment and Trust Co., \$100,000; C. Meredith & Co., Montreal, \$7,500; Dominion Securities Corporation, Montreal, \$7,385; M. Robinson & Sons, St. John, \$6,875; W. M. Nixon & Co., Toronto, \$6,338; City & District Savings Bank, Montreal, \$6,500; Wood, Gundy & Co., Toronto, \$4,513; J. C. Mackintosh & Co., Halifax, \$3,170; Ontario Securities Corporation, Toronto, \$2,500.

Coun. Alexander omitted report of Water and Sewerage Committee, recommending payment of accounts totalling \$455.6. Report received and adopted.

Coun. McKenzie from Assessments and Appeals Committee recommending that the Assessment of Robert Butler be reduced \$4.00, and that the assessment of Robert Flann be not reduced. Report received and adopted.

Coun. White presented the report of the Police and License Committee in the absence of Coun. Lum, recommending that the petition of J. I. Boudreau for a pool room license be granted on payment of \$40.

NEW ROUNDHOUSE

A FINE BUILDING

F. C. R. Has Fine Equipment at Campbellton.

The Railway and Engineering Review recently published a description of the new roundhouse at Campbellton, recently completed. The building is laid out for twenty-eight engine stalls, although the actual capacity is reduced to twenty-five engines, one space being allotted to an entrance and the space equivalent to two stalls at the end of the building being devoted to the foreman's office, locker rooms and a machine and forge shop. The radius of the inner circle is 32 ft. 2 5/8 in. to the centre of the inside wall columns, and the distance between the inside and the outside walls is 85 ft. 6 in. The machine shop in one corner of the building is 42 by 48 ft. in size and is equipped with such forge and machine shop tools as are necessary. The space adjacent to the machine shop is divided into a locker room, the foreman's office and a large room well adapted for use as a stock and tool room. On the second floor, above these quarters, are stored heavy repair parts, handled by a hand operated elevator. An industrial track runs around the building inside the outer wall, facilitating the handling of materials and parts between the pits and shop and store room.

The power house is a 40 by 51 ft. structure appended to the roundhouse by an enclosed passage way under the same roof with the general lavatory. The boiler room occupies a space 24 by 27 ft. The engine room is 38 by 22 ft. in size. The power house equipment consists of three one hundred h. p. Babcock Munnell boilers, one 10 by 16 by 9 by 12 in. compound duplex steam pump for the main water supply and fire protection, one 12 by 7 by 18 in. simplex and packed plunger pump for the boiler washout system, one 8 by 4 by 6 in. duplex end packed boiler feed pump, one air compressor and supplemented by a small emergency compressor and one 60 k.w. 250 volt Crocker-Wheeler, i. e. generator for electricity driven by a Babcock Munnell Co's engine, for general lighting purposes.

Lighting is by means of incandescent tungsten and arc lamp.

A hot air heating system is provided.

A boiler washout system has been installed involving the use of a 12 by 7 by 12 in. duplex steam pump controlled by a pressure regulator, a piping system with outlets between each pair of pits, and a blowoff pipe system with similar outlets. The pump and blowoff pipe are connected to a hot well located at the rear of the building, to which all exhausts and other drips are taken from all parts of the plant. When a boiler is washed out the water it contains is blown into the hot well through the blowoff tank pipe, the pump is started, and being controlled by the aforementioned regulator, is stopped when the pressure in the system reaches 90 lbs., and immediately starts up as the pressure decreases, due to opening any of the outlets throughout the building. In this way a boiler can be washed out and refilled with warm water.

REPLY TO REV. FATHER DIXON

(From Page Two)

the persons are living in adultery, may, not even though they be two Catholics married by a Protestant clergyman. The church of Rome claims the right to say who shall have power to marry; but, it has no such right. The Pope cannot give any priest authority to marry in this Province, without the authority of the Governor in Council, a marriage by a priest would not be valid. Why, if the Pope of Rome himself were here, and held the most elaborate service in his church can produce over two individuals, and celebrated the highest mass that was ever seen, and then solemnly pronounced them husband and wife, the marriage would not be valid unless Lt. Gov. Tweedie had first given him authority to marry.

The statement of Father Dixon's that Christ consecrated marriage by making it a sacrament of the church we deny. He did no such thing; there is no scriptural authority for such a statement.

Father Dixon went very far out of his way to make an ungracious and unworthy attack on Luther. Of course he cannot love that great and good Reformer, who did so much to restore Christianity to a purer form than it had known since the first ages of the church, who indeed may be said to have re-discovered the true religion; but he ought to make no statements of any man which he cannot substantiate, and he certainly cannot substantiate his statements about Luther. If Father Dixon is as familiar with the history of the sixteenth century as he ought to be he knows that he willfully maligned that Saint of God, the latchet of whose shoes he is not worthy to unloose. He says that "Luther was a weakling," that is childish and ludicrous—if he had been what Father Dixon would never have left the church of Rome. The reference to Henry VIII is so unfortunate for the church of Rome. He claims for his church in that connection, a righteousness it did not possess. The history of the conflict between Henry VIII and Pope Clement VII reflects very little credit upon the church of Rome or that most unfortunate Pontiff. Clement was not as unwilling to grant Henry a divorce as Father Dixon would have us believe. The truth is, he was between two fires, he had to reckon with and conciliate another powerful monarch besides Henry. It was not the fear of God but the fear of the Emperor that led him to refuse to grant a divorce to the English King. It is surprising that Father Dixon should wish to revive the history of those dark ages, the less said about them the better for the church of Rome. After all, the defection of Henry from the church of Rome was only an incident in the English reformation. Apart altogether from Henry or his personal matters, the whole country had been roused and was ready to throw off the yoke of Rome.

Father Dixon tells us that the Ne Temere decree is a MODIFICATION of a law already existing, made by the council of Trent, in the early day of the Protestant Reformation. It has been promulgated in some countries and not in others; at one time and not at another; and that it has no effect where it is not promulgated. What of the pretended infallibility of a church which can in this way modify and change its decrees; which can promulgate them or hold them in retentis; and which, by dispensation, can suspend or set aside its rules as policy may deem desirable. Why, as Father Dixon no doubt deeply deplors, there are Catholic countries where the promulgation of this very decree is not tolerated and where the Church of Rome bends before the determination and resistance of its own people; and yet that church has had the audacity to publish it and to attempt to enforce it in this free and Protestant country. Such is the INGRATITUDE of the Church of Rome for the tolerance shown to it by Protestantism; and such is the appreciation of the liberty that has been given to Catholics.

In this land and under that glorious flag which stands for freedom and equality, our Catholic friends enjoy greater privileges and greater security than they enjoy in any other country in the world. This is their return they are not satisfied with EQUALITY, but are striving for dominance. It makes one wonder whether we have not been altogether too tolerant. Last year the Church of Rome was allowed to come into this country with its Eucharistic Congress. Do you know what the real meaning of that Congress was? It was not simply an act of devotion; it was a formal and solemn invasion and taking possession of this new country in the name of the Church of Rome. And because that act was indulgently tolerated, it has been foolishly claimed that this country is now a Catholic country. Is it not true then that the recent attitude and actions of the Church of Rome are an encroachment upon, and an invasion of our liberty and our progress? Our glorious heritage is being stealthily taken from us; and it is high time to sound an alarm; to rise against those who would rob us of our dearly bought privileges, who would roll back the page of history and bring in once again the reign of terror. Is this country to be given over to Rome? Is the Pope to govern this land? Shall we meekly submit to the despoiler of our peace? No! A thousand times No!

In closing I wish to say a word about the Hebert case to which Father Dixon refers in the latter part of his letter. According to Father Dixon's own argument, a self-confessed seducer and adulterer sought the sanction and authority of his church to abandon the woman he had deceived and her child; AND THE BISHOP WAS OBLIGED TO YIELD to the demand of the monster. Instead of pointing to him his duty and insisting on his making amends in the proper manner, the only way the church could "heal the wound and undo the injury" in this case was to give a defenceless woman an innocent babe with a name; BECAUSE SUCH IS THE LAW OF THE CHURCH. Is not such a law which compels the Roman Catholic Church to connive at and condone such wrong infamously immoral and unjust? Father Dixon need not wonder that a wave of righteous indignation is sweeping over the country. Surely our Catholic fellow-citizens will not stand for such immorality and injustice! They ought to unite with us in seeking for such amendments to our marriage laws as will secure the supremacy of the civil law over the ecclesiastical law of any church, and maintain the sanctity and validity of a marriage when such laws have been complied with. Let religious equality be the watchword, and if our Catholic friends will meet us fairly and stand squarely with us on that platform, we may confidently look forward to a future of peace and harmony, progress and prosperity for our beloved land.

Let us forget the things that are behind and reach unto those things that are before remembering that though we cannot see as others see, they may be just as good as we are, just as truly the children of our Heavenly Father, and just as sure of Heaven. If any man trust to himself that he is Christ's, let him of himself think this again that, as he is Christ's, even so are we Christ's.

REPLY TO REV. FATHER DIXON'S LETTER

Rev. F. C. Simpson's Sermon on The Ne Temere Decree

[The Union Advocate]

The following sermon in reply to Rev. Father Dixon's recent letter on the United Baptist Convention and the Ne Temere Decree, was preached by Rev. F. C. Simpson in his own church in Douglastown, July 9th, and in Newcastle Methodist church on the 16th.

Rev. Mr. Simpson took as his text--
"If any man trust to himself that he is Christ's, let him of himself think this again, that as he is Christ's, even so are we Christ's," I Cor. 10: 7.

It is to be greatly deplored that the peace and harmony of our young and prosperous Dominion, should have been so unnecessarily disturbed, and the civil rights of the people should have been so seriously interfered with, by the introduction of, and the attempt to enforce, the Ne Temere decree. It ought to be possible in this land, and in this age, for Christians of any church and of every church to live and work together for the glory of God and the good of man. And I am free to say that, so far as the enlightened and intelligent membership of the Catholic Church is concerned, IT WOULD BE POSSIBLE, if they were allowed to exercise their own judgment. I am persuaded that they share with Protestants the desire to "live peaceably with all men." I make a distinction as, I am sure we should, between the Catholic people and the Catholic church. The full responsibility for all the bitterness and strife that is being engendered by the obnoxious decree in question must rest upon the LEADERS of that church. It is a pity that the Catholics of this country do not follow the example of their co-religionists in those countries where the church is being so clearly taught that it cannot control, may not interfere with matters civil and political. By its insatiable lust for temporal power, the church of Rome, if allowed its own way, will curse this land, as it has cursed those lands which have for many centuries been dominated by its power.

Behind this Ne Temere decree, is the arrogant assumption that the church of Rome is the only church of Jesus Christ on the earth; and when that assumption is so offensively heralded forth, it is high time to rise in indignant protest and to let it be known beyond the peradventure of a doubt, that the spirit of our Fathers is not dead yet, and that the power of Rome can never be a controlling power in this fair land. The Church and Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ in the world, is something far greater than the church of Rome. That spirit of exclusiveness, of sacerdotal pride and priestly assumption which inspires men to cry "the temple of the Lord are we" is the precursor of religious indifference, ignorance, intolerance and infidelity. The true church of Jesus Christ is not a Lo here or a Le there! It is an ideal that has been more or less partially realized in all churches, Roman, Greek and Protestant; an ideal that has never yet been fully realized in any religious organization. The truest church is the church which reflects most fully the religion of Christ, and it is certain that Christ's ideal of religion was non-sacerdotal, non-political, spiritual, personal, democratic; trusting absolutely for its spread and support to the power of truth and the power of love in the souls of its disciples. Jesus Christ had no relation to the priestly order of things save one of antagonism. He made all the great spiritual blessings dependent, not on consecrated rites, but on the possession of certain inward and spiritual qualities. And the society he sought to gather and inspire was a brotherhood of equal souls, in which every believer was a King and Priest unto God; and the only authority and greatness were

those of greater goodness and service. Jesus said: "where two or three are gathered together in my name there am I in the midst of them." The presence of Jesus in the midst of a company of believers constitutes a true church, even though there be no priestly presence or priestly authority. The church of Jesus Christ in the world is composed of the aggregate of all true believers in Him, no matter by what name they may be known among men. Therefore we are perfectly justified in appropriating and employing the language of our text: "If any man trust to himself that he is Christ's, let him of himself think this again, that as he is Christ's, even so are we Christ's." But I promised to deal particularly with the letter which recently appeared in the papers from the pen of Rev. Father Dixon, and I shall now proceed to do so. And I do so for two reasons; first, because in his letter Father Dixon has attempted to give a biased, and luminous exposition of the "Ne Temere Decree"; and second, because he himself applies his remarks to all who have dared to take similar action to that taken by the Baptist Convention which recently met in Newcastle. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada, which met last month in Ottawa, must therefore be numbered among those characterized by Father Dixon as gentlemen who appear to be as deficient in learning, as they are in good judgment and in the proprieties. Surely it is a piece of gratuitous impertinence on the part of Father Dixon (to say nothing of the "proprieties") to apply such language to those who are at least his equals in learning, intelligence, and courtesy. Father Dixon assumes far too much when he assumes that there is widespread ignorance among Protestants regarding "the contents of the Ne Temere Decree and its bearing on the people in general; such is not the case. Even those who may not have read the decree, are able to form a fairly accurate judgment regarding it. When a man holds an apple in his hand he does not need a technical knowledge of horticulture to know that the fruit came from an apple tree, and not from a pear tree; and a far greater than Father Dixon said "by their fruits ye shall know them" and again he said "a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit," and we are being made far more familiar than we could wish, with the evil fruit of this tree of discord.

This decree, which pretends to safeguard the moral and religious life of Catholics, is in reality employed to destroy the sanctity in the home life; it is promulgated in defiance of our civil laws; yes, and in defiance of the plain teaching of the New Testament, for the converts to Christianity were strictly forbidden to put away or forsake their heathen and idolatrous partners. The marriage was to hold good though an unbelieving husband or wife refused to become a Christian.

Whatever the intention may have been in promulgating the Ne Temere Decree in this country at this time, in point of fact, it is an intolerable interference with, and an encroachment upon the civil rights of our people; and by methods that are both question-

able and unworthy attempts are being made to enforce it. I say that this decree is promulgated in defiance of our civil laws; that is true, for it presumes to declare a marriage invalid which the law has pronounced valid. Father Dixon's letter is certainly elaborate, but yet not as explicit as it might be. The Catholic church does not consider a marriage between a Protestant and Catholic invalid PROVIDED THE OFFICIATING CLERGYMAN IS A CATHOLIC PRIEST; it is only invalid WHEN A PROTESTANT CLERGYMAN OFFICIATES AT THE MARRIAGE. Of course this is implied in the letter, but I think it ought to have been clearly stated in a document that pretends to enlighten the ignorant. Now I want you to see where that places the Protestant clergyman. It puts him in a position of inferiority which is simply intolerable in a Protestant country like this.

Father Dixon says that in the case of a mixed marriage by a Protestant clergyman "the Catholic church will willingly and gladly heal the wound and undo the injury." But how? by requiring the Protestant to repudiate his marriage, to repudiate the right of his own clergyman to marry, by making him a TRAITOR; a traitor to his own religion and church, a traitor to his King and country, for to yield to the decree of Rome is to yield a homage to the Pope which belongs to the King, and the Protestant who weakly submits to the cajoleries and threats of a Catholic priest is the man who would sell his country to the Pope.

I understand that Father Dixon has himself been busy in this way "healing the wound and undoing the injury." With regard to that particular case I wish to say that, notwithstanding the Ne Temere Decree and the claims of the church of Rome regarding the validity or the invalidity of a marriage, that ceremony of Father Dixon's over those two young people was not their marriage. If you want to know where they were legally married, you may find the date duly recorded in the Provincial record of marriages, and you will find the name of the clergyman that married them, and it is not the name of Father Dixon. THAT WAS THE VALID MARRIAGE, and all the power of Father Dixon and his church cannot change it. It is silly and wicked for Father Dixon to tell such people that they are not married. Let Father Dixon employ the authority of his church to separate such a couple, and then let him undertake to marry one of them to a third party and he will soon find out whether the marriage was valid or not. He knows well enough where he would place himself by such folly.

A marriage in this Province is valid when the requirements of the civil law have been complied with, and the ceremony has been performed by a CLERGYMAN OF ANY CHURCH, who has received authority to marry from the Governor in Council and no Catholic priest has the right to question such a marriage. I declare it in-
signed that



REV. FATHER CAMPBELL WANTS CHURCH SCHOOLS

The following is taken from a Vancouver paper—

The Catholic community of Vancouver are seriously taking into consideration the necessity for providing a number of schools in the district for the education of the children, who are at present attending the public institutions of the city. Preliminary steps to this end were taken on Sunday by the congregation of St. Patrick's church, who appointed a deputation of four members to wait upon Archbishop McNeil, on a night to be arranged, in order to confer with him as to the best method to adopt to raise funds for the first school to be erected in the Mount Pleasant district. The Rev. Father Campbell explained the proposition to the congregation during the service, and asked those interested to assemble after church was over, when he placed his scheme before them for discussion. The Catholic of the city possess several pieces of property in the city and suburbs, on which they propose erecting schools as they are required. The site suggested for the new St. Patrick's school is on the corner of the lot already occupied by the church, on Twelfth Avenue and Quebec street, and runs through Thirteenth Avenue. There is ample room for a large building and play ground and the proposal is to construct a four compartment school in such a manner that it can at any time be added to and improved. The total cost of building will run close on to \$10,000, and of the preliminary amount required it is understood that at least \$2,000 has been promised.

N. B. BAPTISTS MEET IN CONVENTION

Very Success Year Reported for the Denominations—Officers Elected

The N. B. Baptist Association opened its meeting at Hartland, on the 11th instant. Rev. Dr. Cousins was chairman of the Minister's Conference, which took up the first day. About 200 ministers and lay delegates attended the meetings.

The committee appointed to consider a communication from the Misses Crossley of the Ludlow street church, West St. John, re the case of Rev. W. R. Robinson, reported that as the matter had been gone into very fully by the denominational councils, and as no further evidence had been adduced, the conference deem it most inadvisable to reopen the case, Rev. W. R. Robinson having been fully exonerated. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

At the Women's Society meeting Mrs. W. E. McIntyre, St. John, superintendent of Mission Bands, reported 150 Bands, with 24 organized this year. Miss Bennet, the corresponding secretary, reported 165 societies with 9 organized this year.

The following officers were chosen: Mrs. A. C. Smith, St. John, West, President; Mrs. Cousins, Newcastle, Vice-President; Miss Coates, St. John, corresponding Secretary; Miss Augusta Slipp, Hampstead, Recording Secretary.

Wednesday afternoon the Anglican delegate, Rev. G. A. Kuhring, was introduced to speak on the question of religious education in the public schools. He proposed a teaching of Bible story and history and biography along with the great normal teachings, as well as the beatitudes and the Lord's prayer, etc. This teaching has been systematized in Quebec and an approved catechism had been drawn up. Every church but the Baptists had appointed a committee to confer in regard to this matter. He believed this was vital to Protestantism. It was decided to give an hour on the programme to a discussion of this important matter.

A letter was received from Rev. Mr. Lennix, stating that he had withdrawn from the Baptist denomination and united with the Presbyterian, which had been his original church.

Rev. J. G. Belyea, corresponding secretary, reported that there were 294 churches enrolled; 229 reported; 219 had pastors. There were 765 baptisms; 166 churches contributed to denominational work. There were 293 church edifices, 82 parsonages. The value of church property is \$876,683. The amount raised for pastors' salaries was \$60,437; local expenditures, \$72,154; denominational work, \$11,031.68; total moneys raised, \$163,914.36. Most of the offerings were less than last year, with the notable exception of pastors' salaries, in which there was an increase.

Rev. H. H. Saunders of Sussex was chosen Moderator; Rev. C. T. Phillips, Jacksonville, Assistant Moderator; F. W. Emmerson, Sec.; James Patterson, Treas.; Rev. C. T. Clark, Assistant Sec.; Rev. G. H. Belyea, Corresponding Sec. The so-called "Go Preachers" were condemned.

GAME CASES

The cases of Chief Game Warden Doyle and Deputy Game Warden Keating versus John Hare, for alleged violation of Game Act by trapping out of season and dynamiting fish, were tried on Monday before Police Magistrate Maltby, R. A. Lawlor for prosecution and T. W. Butler for defence. Defendant pleaded not guilty, that his traps found set had not been set by him. Decision was postponed till Thursday next at 2.30 p. m.

FOREST FIRES IN NORTH ONTARIO

Destroy Several Mining Camps and Many Lives Lost.

Several mining towns in the Lake Temiskaming district of Ontario were destroyed by forest fires on July 11th instant. Many people were burned to death and many others drowned in the lake whither they had fled for safety.

Fully 100 persons are known to have been burned or drowned, while many others are still missing.

Three carloads of supplies were sent in to Porcupine camp Saturday.

The mines destroyed are: Dome Mines, all of the buildings except Mr. Meek's house; loss, \$800,000, includes all shaft houses, new forty-stamp mill almost completed, and large up-to-date compressor plant.

North Dome Mines, loss \$50,000, plant and camp.

Preston East Dome, loss, \$150,000, plant and camp.

Vipond, loss, \$100,000, plant and camp.

Foley-O'Brien, total loss, estimated at \$100,000.

Philadelphia Mines loss about \$50,000.

United Porcupine Mines, loss \$20,000.

Eldorado Porcupine, small buildings destroyed.

Standard, loss about \$40,000.

Imperial, loss about \$35,000.

Success, probably destroyed.

West Dome Mines, plant and all buildings, loss about \$75,000.

Total, \$2,220,000.

Coun. Alexander in reply to a question stated that the cost of the new proposed outlets would be, at Shives' \$800; and at F. Andrew's, \$1700, approximately. The discussion then developed on Sewerage, but the engineer would go into this matter thoroughly at a later period.

His Worship stated that a Clock would be placed on the new Post Office, and it is expected that a clock with four faces, to be illuminated at night and to strike the hours, would be placed on the building. It is expected that the bell would be used for fire alarm purposes.
