The display of furniture is a most creditable one and reflects the highest credit on the manufacturers. The casting for the desks was done at the New Brunswick Foundry, and the coloring was done by Mr. Wm. Sutherland.

EDUCATIONAL EXHIBIT.

The Samples of School Manual Work Shown on Saturday. The Council Chamber was visited on Sat-urday afternoon by a large number of citizens for the purpose of inspecting the city school exhibits that have been prepared for the London Exhibition. There was a good dis-London Exhibition. There was a good display of the every day work of the school and the specimens shown were very creditable. There were samples of work from every department in the city. The exhibits from each school were grouped together and neatly arranged in a large book with the name of the school and the standards taught labelled on the cover. The collection included samples of map drawing, industrial drawing, penmanship, print-script, composition exercises and samples of plain sewing from the Model School. A grand feature of the collection that has been made is that the work of nearly every pupil has been taken

the collection that has been made is that the work of nearly every pupil has been taken in order, no attempt has been made in the way of ornamentation, the samples exhibited being the ordinary work of the schools.

There was exhibited also the photographic views of the exterior and interior of the Normal School and Charlotte Street Schoo buildings, and views of the different class rooms of these buildings as seen during working hours.

The collegiate school was not asked to compete in manual work, but a complete set of examination papers for the four grades taught in that school was included in the collection.

The Pope's Address to Members of the Sacred College.

Ross, March 3.—Pope Leo XIII celebrated the 75th anniversary of his birthday and the 8th anniversary of his coronation, which falls to-day, by an address to the members of the Sacred college. In this His Holiness eulogized the union existing among the cardinals and urged concord among Catholics against those seeking to corrupt and weaken the authority of the church. He deplored the oppressed condition of the Holy See as unworthy of the head of the church and incompatible with his independence. His Holiness apoke with much severity concerning the attempt to connect the ecclesiastical authority with the crime of furnishing foreign enemies of Italy with secret information about its military defences, as was done recently in the case of a man at Rome on a charge of having sold such information about its military defences, as was done recently in the case of a man at Rome on a charge of having sold such information to a foreign power. During this trial the prosecution read what purported to be a letter from Vienna, in which the writer, whose name is withheld, imputed they prisoner's act to inspiration from the Vatican, which was accused of having a purpose to undermine and destroy the present kingdom of Italy, by obtaining for foreign powers secret information concerning Italy's coast defences. His Holiness repelled this imputation with indignation, and condemned the impunity with which vulgar. this imputation with imagnation, and demned the impunity with which vulgar malignity of this kind has been employed to excite against the Vatican the hatred of the multitude.

Veterinary Department.

HIC—I have a mare seven years old that has hurt her hock by kicking; it has broken and discharged. Ans: I would not be surprised if the bone is more or less injured, which causes it to separate and break; encourage it to run well; do not let it close for two days, as you say it does; then, when it heals up, use bi-niodide of mercury, one drachm; cantharides, one drachm; vasline, one ounce; mix well and rub en hock; keep him tied up for five hours, so he cannot get at it with his teeth; on second day rub well with lard and do as for six or seven days; then wash it off and repeat as before; the less you meddle around it with a knife, the better. Feed Superior Condition Powders.

FARKER—Curb is one of the many diseases of the hock joint, and consists in swelling immediately below the point of the book joint, and is the result of sprain of the posterior. Straight liguments is more frequent in horses with the hocks inclined forward (cow hock.) The treatment best adapted is blistering, using the same blister as recommended for A C and H I D in this edition, which is not only a counter irritant, but a sorbisheient. Apply about the size of a hickory nut in quantity every six days for a few weeks, occasionally greasing or oiling the parts to prevent the skin cracking.
