Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6. In the Senate the Postal Bill was under discussion. Amendments have been passed making the payment optional; other radical changes will certainly be made in the bill, and strong hopes are entertained of killing the newspaper postage, the section relating to which is now being considered.

In Commons the debate continued on the Territory resolutions. Blake made a speech asking for delay. Macdougall replied making a brilliant and able speech. Blake is now replying. Smith will speak and Tilley reply this evening.

It is rumored that Mr. T. Handford has been appointed Inspector of Internal Revenue for New Brunswick.

Dec. 7. In Senate yesterday, after an animated debate on Postal Bill, the Government gave up compulsory prepayment of letter and newspaper postage, and the Postmaster General's claim to give contracts and appoint Postmasters without the formality of an order in Council.

House sat till two this morning, the North West resolutions finally passed through committee with the understanding that the debate might be resumed on the question of concurrence on Monday.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7. The Hon. John Rose the new Minister of Finance, made his financial statement to-day.

He occupied two hours and a half and in course of very able speech renewed the financial affairs of each of the provinces of the Dominion, giving state of affairs at the date of the Union, the present financial standing of the Dominion and the estimates for the current year.

The deficit in the Province of Canada last year (prior to Union) was half a million of dollars, caused by unusual expenditure for militia and public works.

The floating debt of the Dominion, seven millions of dollars will be largely reduced by calling in the same due by from Corporations and Municipalities; by establishing system of Life Annuities and by extending the Lower Provinces system of Savings Bank to the Dominion.

The estimates for the current year from July last are:

The Government will ask vote of credit for \$3,500,000 for expenses till 1st March next from 1st July last.

Rose took up subject of Inter-Colonial Trade and gave full details.

He stated that the exports from Ontario and Quebec to the Maritime Provinces, this year, were nearly double those of the previous year.

LONDON, Dec. 8. Her Majesty's Theatre, one of the largest in London took fire on Friday night after the audience had retired and was totally destroyed. Loss heavy.

The Globe's editorial of Friday says the present attitude of France involves a confidence of the European Powers for the settlement of the Roman question is utterly impossible.

The Italian Government has granted universal amnesty to the adherents of General Garibaldi.

In the House of Peers this evening Earl Mayo had a set speech in which he deplored the late and evil effect of the public funeral given for the Fenians, executed at Manchester, which had taken place in England and Ireland.

Such a non-transaction he declared showed a disposition to sanction murder. He was glad to say that precautions had been taken by the Government to prevent or suppress any outbreak arising from the late passions thus fermented.

In the House of Commons to-night Lord Stanley alluding to the European Congress on the Roman question, proposed by France, said he could not see that any good would result from a meeting of the European powers in general conference without a previous agreement as to the basis on which their deliberations should be conducted.

In the course of the evening the new mail contract concluded with Cunard Steamship Line was unfavorably criticised.

Mr. Hunt, Finance Secretary of the Treasury, defended the action of the Government declaring that the contract was the best one which could be made at the present time.

At a late hour to-night both Houses of Parliament adjourned to meet on the 13th of February, 1868. Consols 92 1/8. 5 20's 70 1/2. Markets unchanged. New York, Dec. 9. Gold 137. Washington, Dec. 9.

The resolve for the impeachment of President Johnson was defeated in the House of Representatives on Saturday, 57 voting for it and 108 against it. Gold 136 1/2.

PRINCE ALBERT AND HIS SENIOR OFFICER.—A good deal of gossip (says the Army and Navy Gazette) has reached this country from the Cape of Good Hope in reference to the Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh flying the standard of Eng. on the occasion of his entering Simon's Bay, in the presence of his senior officer, and thus expecting from the latter a salute, which, in fact, was due from the former. An explanation, we understand ensued, which led to the ordinary compliment being paid to Captain R. Parves from the guns of the Galesia, and so the matter was settled; but, doubtless, the attention of the Admiralty has been drawn to the subject, as although the Duke is entitled to, and will receive all the honors which are consistently due to a prince of the blood, it must be remembered that he is a Captain in the Royal Navy, and as he is in command of one of Her Majesty's ships, it is expected that he will comply with the rules of the service.

The cold was intense on Monday and Tuesday, the thermometer indicated 10 below zero on Monday morning.

After the 1st January, the old favorites, the Cunard Steamships, are to ply directly between Liverpool and New York. This change will necessitate a line between St. John and Liverpool, such a move would strengthen St. John claims as a terminus for the Intercolonial!

The Lecture season at the St. John Mechanics Institute opened on Monday evening last, by Dr. Adams, 22 Regt., his subject was—"Egypt and the Nile," which is highly spoken of in the St. John papers.

The Wesleyan Tea Meeting last evening we learn, was a successful affair, the Hall being full. Business prevented our acceptance of the invitation kindly tendered us.

Evening School.—From a Card in our columns to-day, it will be seen, that an Evening School is to be opened by Mr. Mulligan, on Monday next. The success which has attended his teaching a day school, is a guarantee that the pupils who intend meeting for instruction in his evening classes, will receive a similar amount of instruction. The opening of the school, will also afford an opportunity to boys and girls whose avocations prevent their attending a day school, to acquire an English education.

THE RAILWAY.—The work on the Branch Railway is, we are glad to say, being proceeded with in the most satisfactory style; and even now, the general appearance of things along this end of the line of road, has become considerably changed. The hill side before the Mill of J. A. Morrison, Esq., has been cleared of trees, and the heavy character of the rock-cutting required there is fully disclosed. This is perhaps the heaviest piece of work on the whole line, yet the character of the sandstone constituting the rock is such that it can be easily worked. The only heavy work upon the road, is stated to be that on the section commencing at the foot of McKay's Hill, and extending as far as the residence of Edward Simonds, Esq.; yet all the difficulties can be overcome without much trouble. The grading of the road is being carried on at six points in this distance; and in a few weeks the whole road between the School House below the Mills and Mr. Simonds's will probably be opened.—[Colonial Farmer.]

CHEAP OCEAN POSTAGE.—The British Government recently informed the House of

Commons that the National Steam Navigation Company was one of the unaccepted bidders. That line offered to carry the American mail between New York and Liverpool at a rate of one penny per half ounce, but required fourteen days for the trip without penalties in case of failure. By the present contract one penny per letter is to be paid.

HOW TO STOP THE WHISKY FRAUDS.—The New York World says that in view of the fact that no one engaged in the illicit whisky business is adequately punished to check it, Secretary McCulloch favors the immediate prosecution of all engaged in the manufacture of whiskey or who make false returns of the same. Hitherto the United States District Attorneys have failed to put in force the section of the revenue law providing for the imprisonment of those engaged in defrauding the Government, and its enforcement is now regarded as the great remedy by which the tax can be collected and fraudulent distillation stopped. It is believed that if some of the millionaires who have fortunes from the business by cheating the government were locked up as criminals for a year, there would be an end of the sale of liquor on which no tax had been paid.

A FUNNY INCIDENT.—The other day a man was running at a break neck speed through the streets was mistaken for a thief, and arrested by the police. Explanations followed, and it appeared that he was only a box of three or four, to use on a burned child.—Moral: always keep Grace's Salt in the family, that it may be at hand for immediate use.

Rev. W. A. Russell of Trinity College, Dublin, is to be Bishop of the new Bishopric of Ningpo, China, about to be founded.

A signalman on the London and Dover Railway is suffering two months' imprisonment for neglect of duty. The thing is possible, it seems.

Changes in the United States army uniform are proposed, substituting the Prussian helmet for the slouch hat, and the long Russian great coat for that now worn.

A fine sea-devil was recently captured near Quebec, whose stomach contained a perfect codfish two feet eight inches long.

A Mr. Gunter of Nashawak, was badly frozen on Saturday night last while crossing the river at Fredericton. He started about 5 o'clock in company with another man to cross in a small boat. The wind was blowing a gale and the weather was piercingly cold; they were unable to manage the boat and drifted with the floating ice, not reaching the opposite shore until they had been out three and a half hours. It is feared that Mr. Gunter will lose his hands.

ATTEMPT TO COMMIT SUICIDE.—On Friday, Mr. Thomas O'Connor, of the Marsh Road, proprietor of the Rope Walk, attempted to destroy himself by cutting his throat with a knife. Happily the wounds inflicted were not fatal. They were sewed up by Dr. Travers, whose aid was promptly obtained. Mr. O'Connor is expected to recover. He has been in ill health for some time, and in a melancholy state of mind. He is a highly respectable, sober and industrious man, and has hitherto lived happily with his wife and children.—[Journal.]

The Quickest Passage across the Atlantic.—An abstract of the log of the steamer City of Paris, Captain Kennedy, shows that her late run from Queenstown to Sandy Hook, was made in seven days, twenty three hours and four minutes, which is four hours shorter than the quickest passage ever made by the Cunard steamer Scotia, which was in July 1866 the City of Paris belongs to the "Human Line."

GLOUCESTER COUNTY.—The election of a member to represent this County in the Local Legislature, in place of Hon. Robert Young, promoted to the Legislative Council, will take place on the 2nd January.
