DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, N. B. VITAL STATISTICS.

The service for the collection of Vital Statistics in New Brunswick, which goes into effect on the first day of January 1920, is in consonance, so far as general principles and report-forms are concerned, with those adopted by each of the other provinces of the Dominion.
The object sought to be obtained is that the information relating to births, marriages and deaths received by this province, should be, so far as may be, common with that obtained by every other province. These particulars will be transmitted to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa, where they will be collated, compiled and published. Such co-operation has been undertaken at the express request of the Dominion Bureau.
These compilations and publications will be of the greatest value to the public, not only with respect to the public health, but also, the local, racial and occupational status of every resident of Canada.

NOW WANT NEW ASSESSMENT ACT

Council Will Discuss Matter at
Next Meeting—Other
Changes Wanted.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Thursday evening, the 8th. His Worship Mayor Murphy presiding. There were present Councillors Campbell, McKay, Ingram, Matthews, Dickie, Devereaux.
A communication was read from the Minister of Militia stating that it would be impossible to give rebate of freight charges on carriages sent to Campbellton. Placed on file.
Mr. Belyea who is installing the new accounting system wrote recommending that a charge be made in the collection of water rates. He recommended that the owner instead of the tenant be billed for such rates.
Coun. McKay moved that the council make the change as recommended by Mr. Belyea that after February 1st all bills be rendered to the owner of property instead of tenants and the public be notified of change in usual way.—Carried.
The men at the Electric Light station were inquiring what had been done their request for increase in pay and hoping the matter would be dealt with at once.
The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that C. A. Alexander assessment on Water St. lots be reduced \$1250. as there were only three lots not three and a half as stated in assessment. Report received and adopted.
Department accounts were passed and ordered paid.
The first agreement under the housing scheme, which was later represented by another and better agreement, was laid on the table, having been duly returned by the Government. This was examined by the council, and then destroyed by the Mayor.
Coun. Dickie made a verbal report in reference to the water situation. He said that the company making the pump had reported that the work was progressing favorably. They also reported that they could supply an electric motor to drive the pump until the district connected motor could be made. Rental of temporary motor to be \$75.00 per month. The water situation was improving slightly as the amount of water gained during the night was growing larger, but there was not yet enough to supply the higher levels at night. Temporary pumps were working every day.
The Town Clerk reported that he had written Mr. Peter Clinch as directed but had received no reply.
Coun. Ingram moved that as Mr. Arch. McKenzie could not act Mr. A. G. Adams be auditor to audit the Town accounts for 1919.—Carried.
The matter of appointment of assessors was taken up.
Coun. McKay said that from experience gained during the past year he knew the council would have great difficulty in procuring assessors to act. He would like to have the whole assessment matter discussed, and if possible have a new act passed after the style enacted for St. John where every ratepayer had to make a sworn statement of the value of property and land owned. In Campbellton the small property owner and wage earner were paying more than their proportion of taxes, while large property owners, and business houses were not paying their share. The old system was a failure. He would like to hear an expression of opinion and if advisable have a bill prepared for the next session of the legislature.
He asked Councillors to think the matter over and get all the information possible in reference to this matter as he would be the next meeting submit a resolution covering this.
Coun. Matthews explained that on account of present water conditions it was necessary to have the pump sleep at the Fire Station to be near in case of fire to see that the steam fire engine was promptly taken out. Parker wanted half time for this, or \$1.75 per night.
Coun. Matthews moved that Parker be paid \$1.50 per night for duty so long as present circumstances make it necessary.—Carried.
Coun. McKay said that while the Council were discussing fire protection matters he would like to set forth the necessity of a salvage corps. At a recent fire the spectators, with best of intentions no doubt, removed household goods and much was broken and damaged.
Coun. Matthews said at the next meeting of the Fire Brigade there would be a reorganization and he hoped a salvage corps would be organized.
Coun. Matthews moved that the Fire Protection committee be authorized to purchase four, three gallon chemical fire extinguishers.—Carried.
Coun. McKay gave notice that at the next meeting he would submit a resolution for the preparation of an assessment bill for enactment by the Legislative.
The Council then adjourned.

EXTRAORDINARY EVENT IN INDIA

Two Thousand Men, Women and
Children Shot Down by
Troops.

An astounding story of the shooting of 2,000 Indians who were present at a meeting of over 5,000 during the Punjab disturbances last April has been unfolded before a Disorders Inquiry Committee sitting at Lahore, and has deeply disturbed Great Britain. For eight months no news of the affair reached the British public. Full newspaper reports of the evidence were to hand on Saturday. The storm center was Amritsar, one of the richest of the Punjab cities, and it is stated that there the following tragic incidents took place:
For at least ten minutes fifty rifles fired into a crowd of 5,000 natives. Between 100 and 500 were killed. The day after the shooting the natives were ordered to crawl on their hands and feet through a certain street. General Dyer, of the 50th Division, gave the order to the troops to fire. He looked upon his action as "a duty—a very horrible duty."
The disturbances, of which these incidents were the culmination, arose out of native opposition to the Rowlatt Act. On April 10 two of the native leaders were deported and the mob at Amritsar burned the National Bank premises, murdered the manager and accountant and burned their bodies in kerosene.
Giving evidence before the committee of which Lord Hunter, the Scottish judge, is the president, Mr. Miles Irving, of the Deputy Commissioner for Amritsar, said that on April 10 the city was in the hands of a wild mob. They captured the telegraph office, burned down the Town Hall, the Zenana Hospital was attacked and an English woman doctor was beaten and left for dead.
Brigadier-General R. E. H. Dyer stated that he assumed charge of affairs at Amritsar on April 11. He had previously sent 100 British and 200 Indian soldiers to the city.
He had issued proclamations forbidding any public meetings, and it did not occur to him that there might be a good many in the crowd who had not heard of the proclamation.
On the afternoon of the 13th he heard that a meeting was to be held the city. He marched there with 25 British and 25 Indian rifles and two armored cars. A crowd of 5,000 was being addressed by a native "agitator." It did not occur to him to warn. He did not ask the meeting to disperse. He merely felt his orders were disobeyed and martial law defied, so he felt it his duty to fire.
Asked if he did not consider it necessary to consult the deputy commissioner in regard to this extreme measure, witness said that there was no deputy commissioner on the scene and his mind was already made up. His object was to disperse the crowd, and to do so he would not have hesitated to use force. He would not have dispersed without firing, witness said: "I think it is quite possible I could have dispersed the crowd without firing, but they would have come back and I would have had to fire again. I would have made what I would consider a fool of myself."

He regarded the incident as a military revolt, and added: "I had no choice but to fire and I considered it was my duty to fire and fire well."
He continued firing until he ran out of ammunition.
The General stated that he had received a wire from Lahore saying: "Your action correct. Lieutenant Governor (Sir M. O'Dwyer) approves."
General Dyer was asked: "After firing took place did you take any measures to attend the wounded?"
"No certainly not," was the reply. "My force was not in a position to render medical aid. Hospitals were open, and they could have gone there."
Another extraordinary episode recounted before the committee was that which took place on April 15, the day after the shooting. Another was issued to the effect that no one should walk through the street in which a lady named Miss Sherwood had been assaulted, but must crawl. General Dyer explained that women had been brutally assaulted, and added: "We took upon women as sacred. I searched in my mind for a form of punishment that would meet this action."
Referring to sentence of flogging which had been carried out, the General said his object in ordering flogging in the street where Miss Sherwood was assaulted was that the people should see.
Lord Hunter asked whether, in administering martial law, they had not to see they did not permanently alienate the sympathies of the people. Witness agreed. He erected a triangle in the lane before issuing the order. His train could not involve any other punishment, though it was not the one he was thinking of. He thought the Indians had rebelled, and it did not occur to him, in those days especially, that any order which humiliated people

BOARD OF TRADE DISCUSSES BRIDGE

Enthusiastic Meeting Held in
Council Chamber on
Friday.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings ever held here was that in the Council Chamber last Friday evening. Every seat in the hall was occupied. President Murray occupied the chair and explained that the meeting was called principally to discuss ways and means of placing before the government the necessity of a bridge at Campbellton.
Members present spoke enthusiastically in regard to what a bridge meant to the whole district.
Mr. H. J. Currie moved that a resolution committee be appointed to draft a resolution re the "Bridge—Carried."
Messrs. Currie, McKenzie, A. T. Lelland, Thos. Bastedo and A. A. Chabon were appointed sub-committee and immediately retired to prepare report.
Upon returning to the meeting the committee reported as follows:
Report of Committee.
At a meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade held in Campbellton on the 9th of January 1920, at which meeting were present several prominent citizens from the County of Bonaventure, for the purpose of urging the construction of a highway bridge between Campbellton, N. B., and the County of Bonaventure, it was moved by Mr. H. J. Currie, seconded by Mr. A. A. Andrew and unanimously carried that:
A committee from this Board of Trade be appointed to interview the Provincial representatives of the County of Restigouche and the Honorable Minister of Public Works of the Province of New Brunswick to ascertain what amount of help the Province of New Brunswick will contribute towards the construction of said bridge and further that the Board of Trade of the Counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé and the County Councils of said counties, be asked to take similar action with their provincial representatives and the Honorable Minister of Public Works of the Province of Quebec, and report to this Board forthwith.
The following committee was appointed:—Mr. A. Kelly, H. J. Currie, W. E. Richards, D. Champoux, Geo. St. Onge.
The suggestion was made that this committee should have all data referring to surveys for the bridge and if possible have engineer Stead meet with the committee and the Hon. Minister of Public Works.
Mr. John Harquail spoke of the lack of hotel accommodation and thought something ought to be done in this regard.
W. H. Wallace spoke in favor of a publicity committee, and moved that such a committee of three be appointed.—Carried.
The following committee were named:—W. H. Wallace, H. B. Anderson and John T. Reid.
The meeting then adjourned.

**MAJOR JONES
DIES SUDDENLY**
Principal of Dalhousie School
Expires After Few Days
Illness.
Dalhousie, Jan. 14.—A gloom was cast over this community to-day when it became known that Major L. D. Jones, the efficient principal of the Dalhousie Superior School had passed away at his home here at 4 o'clock a.m. after a two days illness of meningitis.
The deceased had trouble with one ear, before he went to France, where, he did excellent work during four years of war. Last week he went to St. John, N. B., to consult a specialist, and took cold during the trip, resulting in illness and death.
All that medical aid could do was done, as both Doctors Ferguson and MacPherson, were in attendance.
The late Major Jones, is a native of Carleton County, N. B. He decided to make his home in Restigouche Co. when he married Miss Eva McLean, daughter of River Charlie, N. B., and there will be general sympathy extended to the bereaved widow and her three children, in the loss of a devoted and kind husband and father.
Mr. Jones was a splendid teacher, and one of his teaching staff said to your correspondent "that it would be difficult to fill his place."
The funeral will be held on Friday at 2 p. m. from St. John's Presbyterian Church, Dalhousie.

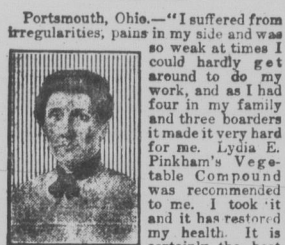

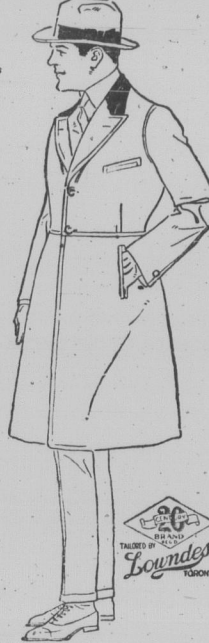

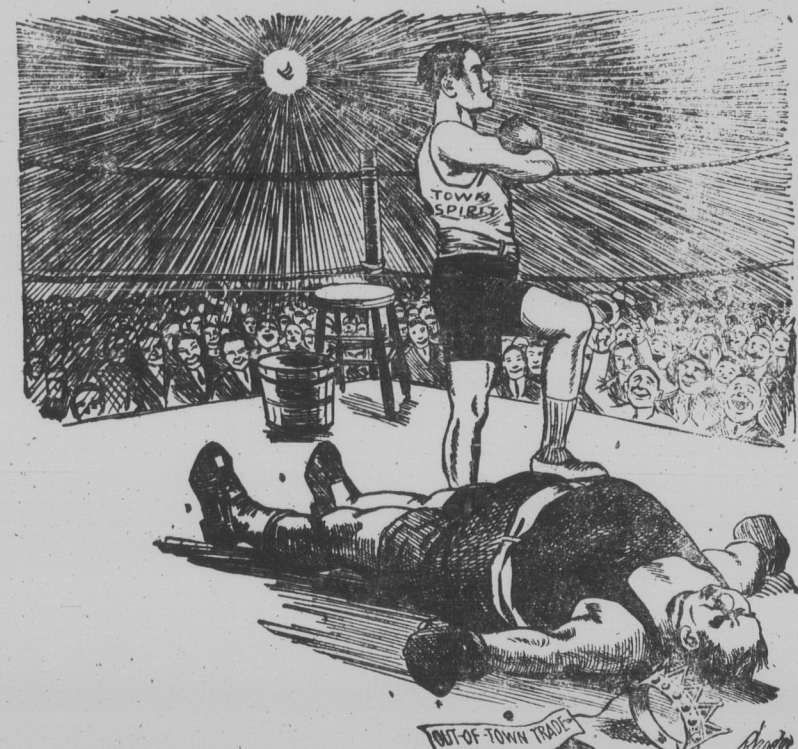

FREEZING DOES NOT KILL FISH

Evidence Found in Serbian Rivers.

(New York Evening Post.)

Fishes belong to the class of creatures that have variable body temperatures of their environment. In extreme cold they assume a rigid condition, in which all the vital functions are suspended, while life still remains present during several months of each year some of the great rivers of Siberia are frozen solid to the bottom but many of the fishes imprisoned in the ice retain their vitality and resume their active life when the ice melts in the spring.

This fact has suggested experiments in the freezing of live fish for transportation. Many years ago a celebrated physicist, Pictet, of Geneva, put fresh water fishes into a tub of

water, which he kept liquid at the freezing point for twenty-four hours, and then allowed to freeze slowly into a solid block of ice. When the ice was melted a month or even two months afterward, the fishes began to swim as briskly as they did before freezing and showed no symptoms of ill health. Similar experiments were made in France. The fishes were placed in water which had been kept near the freezing point for fifteen to eighteen hours and finally frozen by immersion of the vessel into a freezing mixture producing a cake of ice a few inches thick, in which the fishes were embedded. The cake was wrapped in cloth and surrounded with a heat-insulating package to prevent melting during transportation. It is necessary to thaw the ice very slowly and to keep the water near the freezing point for several hours in order to preserve the life of the fishes. Even those which do not survive are in perfect state of preservation.

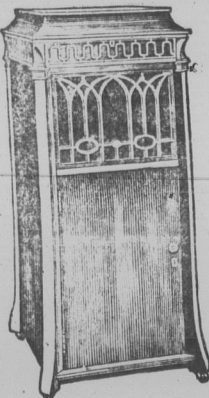

A TOWN MANAGER.

The Town of Grande Mere, P. Q., is a modest town in many respects. The Laurentine Company, one of the largest pulp and paper manufacturers in the Dominion have their head office there.

The directors of this company at a recent meeting, believing that the town should be efficiently managed, decided to pay the salary of a town manager and also to spend in five yearly instalments \$200,000 for improvements to municipal work.

The town of Pictou has just completed its first year under a town manager and local papers state that the manager has proved very successful and has directly saved the town more than his salary.

The town of Campbellton will be appealing to the local legislature for legislation this year, why not have a section in this act giving the Town Council authority if it deems wise, to employ a town manager. By doing this we would be in a position at any future time to employ such a manager.

We trust that this suggestion will be given consideration as we feel that it is a step forward.

Dear Sir,

I read with much interest your editorial in last week's issue, also a letter from Alan Brock, on that now interesting subject, Town Manager system. For the last two years I have taken little interest in town affairs, beyond taking exception to our assessment of taxes, and getting an opinion on the Waverly property and preparing plans for an up-to-date public building, hoping the authorities, and ratepayers would see fit to adopt same, thereby giving us a Town Hall, Board of Trade rooms, Police Court, Lock Up, and Market Place, etc. This however did not seem to meet with the approval of the Mayor and Town Council, who have favored a much smaller lot, away from the business section. However, I am sure the time is not far distant when the rate payers will take more interest in Town affairs, and thus manage affairs, with more economy. I have great faith in the town management system, and am confident great benefit would accrue, and thousands of dollars could be annually saved. Last spring I spent five weeks in a town in the adjoining locality, with a population of 40,000, working under this one man management, where it proved a great success, and from information I can obtain, the results are the same in other towns, similarly managed. I am told that the present Council are favorable to the scheme, and if so, it is up to the ratepayers to take some action looking to the adoption of a change.
