Agriculture. Progress in Cattle Breeding. An old style, conservative breeder was heard to remark to a young man just contemplating starting in the business: "I have no patience with the nonsense of some proprietors in the breeding business, those who say you must look to the system of management in raising the animals as well as to their strain and purity of blood."

Management of Horses. I have a firm belief (remarks a writer in Field) that if a horse cannot be held with a snaffle, used by good and judicious hands, he cannot be held at all; if there are exceptions, they are rare, such horses are few and far between, and their idiosyncrasy, or what appears as such, arises from their mouths having been spoiled by rough usage. A horse cannot be held by any force a man can employ; certainly not by a force applied by a man.

Early fruit begins to ripen, and it should be carefully picked and sent to market in nice looking packages. The bushel boxes are growing in favor for this purpose as being better than barrels when the fruit is not to be transported over a long distance.

About Shoeing Horses. The question of shoeing or not shoeing horses is one that must be answered by conditions and circumstances, and cannot be settled by the adoption of a fixed rule.

Selecting Seed Corn. A good crop of corn is dependent first of all on good seed. If the seed falls in a well, and is dried promptly, requiring a second planting, the loss time invariably reduces the crop; or if the seed sends up a weak blade in consequence of having its vitality impaired, the result is the same.

A Horse's Hind Legs and Shoulders. Did you ever notice the pleasure a horse seems to get from elevating his forelegs, says a farmer; Leave your horse in the stall, and you will see him pawing the pavement and his hind ones in the gutter.

FARM NOTES. The best cider is made in cool weather from late apples. The Nova Scotia potato crop this year is estimated at 6,000,000 bushels. Recent heavy rains have almost ruined the crops in the north of Ireland.

Let every farmer attend the fairs this fall. Select the best specimens produced on the farm and place them on exhibition. Sulphur and old tobacco leaves burned in the poultry house—the house being closed perfectly tight—will clean out the red lice.

Remember it is the appearance of goods that sells them. Size, large, fat, plump white turkeys, chickens, ducks or geese always brings outside prices. Foot rot in sheep, distemper in horses and cattle, blight in pigs, and a score of other ailments arising from the filthy barnyards in winter and spring.

During the last few months a new variety of sheep has sprung up in the Northwest—that of shipping hogs to eastern points. In one day recently, nine cars, seven for Toronto and two for Ingersoll, left Winnipeg. This trade promises to grow in large proportions.

Having selected the birds intended for table use, don't begin to fatten until it is decided when they are to be killed. If given all they can eat for ten days and deprived of exercise, they will put on flesh rapidly in that time, and be better for the table than if allowed to ruminate on their food, and the future success of the flocks and fruit plants, will be well assured.

England is a great consumer of the agricultural products of the world. During the first six months of the present year her imports of agricultural produce amounted to £21,575,178 or about \$250,000,000. The average for several years has been over \$300,000,000 per annum. This is exclusive of cotton and all products that are not also produced on English soil.
