The Archduchess Elizabeth, in anticipation of her marriage to Prince Otho Von Windisch-Graetz, who is not of royal blood, today took the oath, renouncing all claims for herself and her descendants to the Austrian throne. The ceremony occurred at noon, in the privy council chamber of the palace in the presence of the emperor, a number of statesmen and the foreign diplomats. 

Board at St. Andrew's Church Present Annual Report.

Record for the Year Shows Truly Gratifying Progress.

Pastor and People Delighted With Success Shown—Church's Revenue Totaled \$18,000.

The congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church held its annual meeting last night, when the yearly statement of the board of managers was submitted to a large gathering of the members. It is now customary with St. Andrew's, so voluminous has the annual business become, to divide their annual meeting in two-the first to receive the managers' statement and the woodwork needs painting. and elect managers and auditors, and the second for consideration of the remaining portions of the congregational work. This latter meeting will be held next Wednesday. That of last night was well attended and differed somewhat noticeably from some that have been held in the past, in that there was a striking absence of lengthy discussions-even of the pleasant variety. Repairs to manse The members of the church present seemed possessed of the belief that their managers had presented to them, in their statement, something good, something gratifying, with which fault could not be found. Pastor and people alike expressed commendation for the board's work and earnest thanks for the means and the desire to do the work of the congregation as successfully as it had been done. The church, it was shown, had carried on a very important work during the past interest on deposits, \$124 44; service of year, and the harmony which characterized last night's meeting was the natural ending of a year spent in united efforts for the church's upbuilding. How successful these efforts have been may be inferred from the fact that in the twelve months just ended the receipts at St. Andrew's amounted to within a very small sum of \$18,000. At the last annual meeting of the congregation a grant of \$300 was made to St. George's Church, London Junction. That church is doing a good work and is prospering, but is not yet self-sustaining. The managers would recommend a grant of \$200 for the year 1902. Next year the outside of the manse in particular will need renovating, the verandas are in very bad condition, The estimated expenses for the year





The postoffice revenue for the six months ending Jan. 1, 1899, was \$1,629,985, which is \$55.014 less than that for the past six months with the reduced rates in force. For the past six months of the present financial year, the postal revenue has expanded to the sum of \$90,-762, which is a most gratifying proof of the success of the penny post, and an effective reply to those cavillers, who, when the great reduction in postal charges took place expressed themselves that the country would lose "millions" by the reduction.

Ontario's Finances.

The public accounts were placed before the members of the Ontario Legislature recently. The balance on the proper side is exceedingly creditable. At the beginning of this year the amount of cash in the banks to the credit of the Government was \$1,468,-492. Of this sum, \$1,292,931 is drawing current account, and \$22,808 in interest bearing debentures. The Province began the year 1901 with \$824,398 in the banks, and finished it with \$1,292,-931. The amount of interest received from money deposited in the banks is \$39.298, and on the amount of provincial funds still in the hands of the ed to \$366,581. A large proportion of the receipts was returned to the people for the following services: Administration of justice, \$416,042; education, \$782,193; public institutions maintenance, \$833,163; agriculture, \$209.858: hospitals and charities. \$192.-280; colonization roads, \$179,008. All public expenses, unless grants to railways, are paid out of the current revenue and not allowed to accumulate. Manitoba and the Great West.

The official returns showing the result of the grain harvest in the Province of Manitoba and in the Northwest Territories, indicate that 1901 was a phenomenal year in the history of the great West. Last summer great forecasts were made regard the wheat crop of the West. These forecasts have been greatly exceeded by the actual results.

In Manitoba the total area of wheat aggregate yield was a trifle over 50,-000,000 bushels, or 25 bushels to the acre. The oat crop of 689,951 acres amounted to 27,796,588 bushels, or an average yield of 40 bushels to the acre. An average of 34 bushels per acre was realized off 191,009 acres of barley. The total grain crop amounted to over 85,-000,000 bushels.

Manitoba has made a creditable showing in other lines. The potato crop was 4,797,433, or an average yield of 196 bushels to the acre. Of the 10.214 acres of roots, a yield of nearly 3,000,000 bushels was realized, or to be exact, an average yield of 233 bushels to the acre. The sum of \$926,314 was obtained for dairy products.

If last year may be held to indicate anything, a promising future is in store for Manitoba and the great West. It is a land of promise for the homeseeker, who, abounding in youth and vitality, is willing to venture and accept results. For any new country has in store for the incoming settler a great amount of hard work.

THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Points From Premier Ross' Budget Speech.

How the Financial Position of the Province Has Been Improved and Its Resources Developed.

Toronto, Jan. 22.—Premier Ross to-day delivered his budget speech in the legislature and drew a glowing pieture of Ontario's bright financial pres-When the Liberal party came into power in 1871 the total income was only two millions and a half; the government was given 80 cents per head to keep house with-not nearly adequate-and the first duty of the government was to set to work to improve that income. The government had 1876, and from time to time afterwards, increased the

from tavern licenses until last year it was \$315,481, not counting \$61,891 received from brewers and distillers. It had been charged that the Provincial Government in so doing had been robbing the municipalities, but if they examined the figures they would find that of the total receipts from liquor licenses, \$11,517,021, the municipalities had got \$5,440,172, and the municipalities today were in a better position than before and actuallegislation of 1876 and succeeding years

The policy of compelling the manufacture of logs in the province had worked satisfactorily, and as a result \$1,030,900 had been invested in the great sawmilling industry of the province, and employment given to 2,323 hands. Turning to the succession duties, the treasurer said if the policy of the Opposition had been followed, the provincial secretary would have lost since 1892 \$1,839,602, the revenue last year being \$366,581—a thousand dollars a day. Alluding to other sources of revenue, Mr. Ross said the honorable gentlemen opposite could not point to a single interest that had been taxed by the supplementary revenue act of

The railroad mileage of the province had been increased five-fold in thirty years, and of this 2,219 miles had aided out of the provincial treasury. 




