Terrible Scenes at the Burning of the Surgical Institute.

Many Unrecognized Bodies Take from the Ruins.

The Place Was a Veritable Fire Trap Names of the Victims—Ecroism of the Rescuers.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 23.—A score of helpless human beings burned to death. That is the record of Thursday night. At 11:45 that night from box 92 three alarms were given in close succession, and every piece of fire-lighting apparatus in the city was quickly on the run, and upon their arrival the firemen were horrified to see flames leaping from the roof and fourth floor windows of the National Surgical Institute, on the corner of Illinois and Georgia the corner of Illinois and Georgia reets, with an extension on the latter reet. About 250 crippled people were in the institution at the time. The building

was almost
TOTALLY ENVELOPED IN FIRE,
and when Chief Webster arrived his first
order was: "Let the building burn,
but run up the ladders and save the
people." This was obeyed, and the work
of rescuing the imprisoned patients commenced. The fire, when first discovered,
was located in the Georgia street building.
An alley separates the Georgia street building
from the one facing Illinois street. A

The fire leaped up through the floors of the building in which it started, reaching the stairway, about two feet wide, thus securing a draught, and sped through the other floors, crossing the alley and setting fire to the

WHERE THE DREADFUL WORK WAS DONE. On the third and fourth floors the horrible work was done. The buildings were a network of narrow halls, entrances and stairways. The fire could not have chosen a better place. In the small rooms throughout the building were from one to five beds, all occupied by patients, many of whom were perfectly helpless. When they became aware of their peril their fright was awful. They became frantic in their efforts to reach places of safety. Every effort was made by fire, police and ambulance forces to rescue the caged unfortunates, and acts of heroism and daring were performed by men that should perpetuate their memories.

Above these departments on the third and fourth floors were the sleeping apartments of the patients. When the fire was discovered every means of escape was cut off and many perished there. The flames ate up the entire interior of the building, and when the floors fell to the bottom there was no telling how many people were killed. The Survical Institute was

The stairs were narrow, the halls dark,

It made a turn midway between two floors, and at that point there was a landing. From that landing to the top step of the lower section was a distance of at least two and a half feet. In speaking of that place a fireman remarked; "How could they expect cripples to get up or down those stairs?" TERRIBLE SCEYES.

Just as the department arrived on the scene a woman appeared at a third story window. She wrung her hands and screamed for help, while smoke rolled up in wreaths about her. Chief Webster shouted at the top of his voice, "Hold on! hold on! Don't jump! for God's sake don't jump! We'll get you out in a moment!" Scarcely bad the words left his lips when the woman, with a shrick of agony leaped into space. The body struck the stone flagging but a few lest from where the chief stood, and was picked up in the pange of death and removed across the way.

At a window on an upper floor a panic stricken mother was seen struggling in an effort to throw open the window. In her arms she clasped ber infant. She finally succeeded, after frantic efforts, in reaching the air and received relief from the stifling smoke and death-dealing flames within. Her acreams fell upon the ears of thousands of helpless spectators. No ladders were at hand. Her face was deathly pale, and her form partially nucle. Flames were closing in about her, and she looked into the furnace of death, then down to the pawment below, as if choosing between two things, either of which seemed certain death. Then she clasped the babe to her breast, tossed the precious load out of the window and gave her life to the flames within. Pipeman O'Brien had watched the heartrending scene from below, and as the child left the arms of its mother, he planted himself firmly with outstretched arms underneath the window. The baby, wrapped in its night clothes, whirled about in the air and tumbled into O'Brien's arms, unhurt by the fall. A few minutes later it was smiling, seemingly unconscious of the surroundings.

GENUINE HEROISM.

The heroism of Fireman John Loucks, of Company No. 2, will be long remembered. While flames were shooting from a window on Illinois street he went up the ladder to the upper floor. As he reached the window sill he was met by Fireman Webber Robinson, who had pushed his way through the smothering smoke with a child in his arms. "Take this baby, for God's sake, Loucks, and let me breathe," said Robinson, as he pushed his head into the open air. Loucks grasped the living load and started down. He had descended but a few feet, when the brave fellow missed his footing and fell head foremost, his leg catching in the rungs of the ladder, thus doubtless saving his life. He clung to the child pluckily, although his leg was broken. As he hung there the dense mass of people below turned away from the swful scene, thinking that Loucks would perhaps be obliged to loosen his grasp from weakness. Not so, however. He called for assistance, and in a twinkling he was rescued by two other firemen, who carried the child safely to the ground and tenderly helped Loncks to an ambulance, which conveyed him to his home.

Quickly he pushed one woman out of the window and held her with his teeth by her night clothes. He held the other woman inside the room, hung himself out and drew the ladder to himself and descended safely with the women. Hoyle was frightfully burned.

"IT WAS AWPULM"

Said Fireman Jim Madden, of head-quarters: "I will never forget those bricks. My God! It was awful! Those poor caged people, who could not help themselves, screamed until you couldn't stand to listen any longer. I took a little child out of a Georgia street window. It was with its mother, and I told the lady to stay and I would return for her. When I got part of the way down the ladder I dropped the child into Gid. Thomson's arms and started back for the mother, but hefore I could reach the window she jumped to the sidewalk. I do not know what became of her. In a few minutes I heard a scream, and looking up saw three faces at a fourth-story window. But it was impossible. Madden's hand was severely cut by broken glass. SICKENING SIGHTS.

As soon as the hallways had been sufficiently cleared of smoke to permit an investigation, some of the most horrible scenes were developed. In one room, the third floor, four victims were found dead, kneeling in the attitude of prayer. The windows in the room were up, but their occupants had apparently made no effort to escape nor appeal for rescue. The stifling smoke had overtaken them, and seeing no avenue of escape, they had become resigned to their fate.

Although the occupants were nearly all more or less seriously crippied, many of them became so frantic that they lost all self-control, and almost invited death by their actions. They would rush to a win-

Even after receiving the telegram announcing the Duke's death he continued his sports and had another day's shooting, returning the Berlin Friday evening, and instead of hastening to express his condolence the Emperor did not call on the British Ambassador until Sunday afternoon.

Horrors of Convict Life in Siberia.

How a Prisoner Released Himself from a Dead Companion.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Jan. 23 .- Chas. Wilson, mate of the sealing schooner George R. White, tells a tale of suffering in Siberia.

For the past three years this schooner has been sealing off the coast of Alaska and Siberia. On a trip in the spring of 1890, the schooner got into Russian waters and barely escaped arrest. The small man became frantic with hunger and murdered the greedy prisoner while he slept. He called to the guard at the mouth of the shaft and told him he had killed his companion, and asked to be loosened from the dead man.

The guard refused. In desperation the small man took a coal shovel and cut the dead man in two and loosened the band from his waist. Neither was seen again.

The supposition is that the murderer was killed by a guard or starved to death. The story is told by a prisoner who worked in the mines where the tragedy occurred. Many arrests are reported of poaching sealers by the Russian authorities, and many prisoners never leave the mine alive.

Meeting of This Important Body.

The Officers Elected-A Successful Past and a Bright Future-The Library Report-A Grand Union

Meeting.

The meeting of the London Trades and Labor Council last evening was well attended. Proceedings were commenced promptly on time, the president, C. E. Keene, in the chair. Credentials of delegates were received from the Brotherhood of Carpenters and also from the Industrial Brothrhood of Canada, the latter body sending in their representatives for the first time. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, T. C. Thornhill; vice-president, Joseph Leah; secretary, H. B. Keene; treasurer, Edmund Wallace; sergeant-arms, H. Pearce. The appointing of standing committees was laid over until the next meeting.

The delegates to the Library Board brought in the following interesting reports Brothers of the Council, your delegates to the Library Board are pleased to lay before you their report for the year just closed, more especially as it has been a year of progress and success. One year ago the Workingmen's Free Library could not count upon its shelves more than twenty volumes at best the design of the scheme count upon its shelves more than twenty volumes at best; the design of the scheme had been outlined, the plans laid, but even the most sanguine of the Board attimes had doubts as to the outcome of their efforts. The organizations of labor not only elected delegates but gave substantial aid out of their treasuries. Two concerts in aid of the library fund were magnificently supported by the public, and many of our prominent citizene gave us their aid in cash and books. During the year the Board petitioned the City Council for agrant of \$200 to aid them in supplying reading material to aid them in supplying reading material to the public, and as the Council had been very liberal in advancing money out of the public treasury we had full confidence that our request would be granted. Before the Financo Committee of the Council we based Finance Committee of the Council we based our hopes of success on the following facts: That this library was a free one and for the benefit of every citizen; that it cost the city nothing for its support; that it was a means of educating the masses, and that young men who were learning the various mechanical trades were enabled to precure and read mechanical works which otherwise they could not procure as their wards. they could not procure, as their wages would not be sufficient for them to buy would not be sufficient for them to buy works of such a nature. But your committee were surprised to find that the Finance Committee of the City Council, which had voted money so lavishly for other purposes, drew the line at education, apparently believing that what was good for Toronto, Hamilton, and even towns like Chatham, was dangerous for London, and the vote, which was a tie, was decided against us by the casting vote of the chairman. But, nothing discouraged, the Library Board, which felt it had been slighted, sent a deputation to the City Council and

rary Board, which felt it had been slighted, sent a deputation to the City Council and secured from that body the sum of \$100, which was expended in books. At the present time the library contains over 760 volumes, many of them being very expensive, which cannot be found on the shelves of any other library in Western Ontario. The Board is constantly adding new works to its stock. The number of persons at present who hold cards and are regular readers amounts to nearly 300, and this number is constantly increasing, so much so that it takes the labor of at least six members of the Board every Saturday evening to meet the demand of its patrons. As we have stated, most of these books are of ve have stated, most of these books are of an expensive character. We believe that the Holy Ghost breathes throughout the world, and gathers into union with God and to eternal life all those who faithfully co-operate with his light and grace. None are responsible for dying inculpably out of the visible body of the church. They only are culpable who knowingly and wifully reject its divine voice when sufficiently known to them. But I must not go on for you are seeking union in agreements, and I have no will to strike a discordant note. You say truly 'the controversies to which most of our churches owe their rise have lost much of their interest for us; some of them are hardly intelligible.'

"I have two great advantages. I can hope and embrace you in the soul of the church, and I can rejoice in all, and gladly share in many of your good works."

Lighting Up the Cave.

Among the lately discovered wonders of Tasmania are some large and beautiful caverns, near the town of Southport. While these caves have been explored for less than a mile, it is believed that they extend several miles underground. They contain large chambers ornamented with splendid stalactites and stalagmites.

One of the most interesting facts about them is reported by a recent visitor, who says that when the lights carried by the explorers were extinguished, the ceilings and sides of the caverns seemed to be studded with diamonds! This was found to be due to the presence of millions of

and sides of the caveras seemed to be studded with diamonds! This was found to be due to the presence of millions of glow-worms.

It is known that the phosphorescent light of the glow-worm is emitted only by the female insects, which are wingless, while the males, being provided with wings, lack the power of making light. Naturalists formerly explained the exercise of this strange power by the female glow-worms as an effort to attract the attention of the males, or literally to shine in their eyes.

Of late, however, the explanation has been advocated by Mr. Wallace and others that glow-worms shine in order to save themselves from capture by animals, such as birds, which feed upon insects. These animals have learned by experience that glow-worms are not good food, and accordingly avoid them when their light enables them to be recognized.

But is it for such a purpose that the glow-worms light their diamond lamps in the caves of Tasmania? If those caves are also inhabited by many insect-feeding animals, the answer may be yes; but in the absence of information as to the existence of such animals, it would seem to be more interesting, at any rate, to adopt in this case the other view, namely, that the glow-worms shine to give light to members of their own race. And if so, what a little wonder-world they have there in the darkness of those underground chambers!



CLAD TIDINGS.

The China Central mission of the Presbyterian Church makes A la farnest The China Central mission of Appeal. the Presbyterian Church makes a very strong appeal for reinforcement. The field immediately accessible to them includes the whole great valley of the Yang-tse-Kiang, the "Son of Ocean." The four provinces of Kiangsu, Kiangsu, Sanhui and Chehkiang have 121,600,000 imhabitants within an area of 204,000 equare miles. There are signs of a sudden breaking-up of the fallow ground of general indifference. They want to be ready to answer spontaneous calls from all parts. The accession of a new emperor, and an uneasy expectancy of political change, join with an extraordinary frequency of natural calamities of flood or drought, famine or pestilence at once to unsettle and humble men's minds.

The province of Szechuen, on the Upper Yangtse, with some 45,000,000 of people, ought to be occupied in force. Untouched by the Tai-ping insurrection, it retains all the glory and prosperity of ante-rebellion times. The people are a hardy, straightforward, enterprising race, as is shown by their various and productive industries. For centuries they have been boring salt and gas wells from 3,000 to 5,000 feet deep, and using natural gas for evaporating the brine pumped from the bowls of the earth. Their bronze, silk and white wax industries are noted over the enpire. Their language is Mandarin, in which a Christian literature is already prepared.

The Central China mission statistics for last year show an increase of a little over 8 per cent. Five of their fifteen churches pay their own pastors. Everything is encouraging. "Come over and help us," they say. The great church to which they speak will assuredly not be heedless.

America.

Kenker writes to the same effect, as to the steady decadence of the old systems of religious belief, saying: "In my intercourse with educated Hindus and Mohammedans on my journeys through Muttra and Agra, in the railway carriage or in my study, it seemed to me the impression is spreading that the war which Islam and Hinduism wage with Christianity is hopeless. With those who think, the feeling is gaining ground that slowly, but surely, Christianity is advancing, and resisting its progress is as vain as an attempt to stem progress is as vain as an attempt to stem the tide of the ocean."

In Important King Lewanika, the ruler Conversion. of the great Barotse, on the Upper Zambesi, has been converted from human sacrifices, the slave trade and alcoholism. The king has not offered a human sacrifice for three years, has become a teetotaler, and forbids the sale of liquor in his capital. He has sent his eldest son, Litia, to Morija, in Basutoland, to receive Christian instruction. The chief has many excellent parts, and for some time has been on terms of friendship with Mr. Coillard, of the Paris Society of Missions, and Litia himself is a promising young man of Christian character.

Items of Interest.

Rev. L. P. Weinberg, of Jaffa, quoted in the Jewish Intelligencer for February, writes: "The general topic of conversation among Jews at the present time is Palestine, and almost every Jewish newspaper speaks of this country as 'the only place of refuge' for them.

Arias, missionary of the London Society for the Conversion of the Jews, reports a significant remark of some Italian Jews: "Till the Christians treat the Jews well, we shall never believe that Jesus is our Messiah." Most of the Italian Jews that

Messiah." Most of the Italian Jews that he has met with seem to be in the dregs of Judaism, with few signs of longing for anything better.

The Missions-Berichte gives a stinging remark of a South African Caffre, that among the whites they became acquainted with two things—the Bible, to save their souls, and brandy to destroy their bodies. But, he added, he was content with the former.


