ENGLISH SYMPATHY WITH GREECE. London, March 8.-A large Radical meeting was held in Hyde Park yesterday to give voice to the feeling in favor of Greece, which generally ob-

Beecher at the Age of 85 Years. Stamford, Conn., March 8.-Mrs Henry Ward Beecher, died at 10:45 o'clock this morning. She was 85 years Stamford, Conn., March 8 .- Mrs.

Henry Ward Beecher was born in Sutton, Mass., August, 1812, her father being Dr. Bullard, who was a farmer as well as a physician. There were seven sons and two daughters in family. 



New York Fashionables. For the best-liked game on skates this season posts are set up at one end of the rink, five in all; from these flutter many gay ribbons, each about a yard in length. They are so arranged that they can be easily detached, and the object of the sport is to secure the greatest number of the silk trophies as you skate rapidly by the posts. Only one ribbon can be taken at a time, and from one post only, and speed must not be slackened in detaching the ribbon. The skaters follow one another round the rink at a rapid pace and seize the ribbon as they glide past,

Finally the ribbons have all disappeared but one -a long, fluttering white scarf. This no one is allowed to touch until the signal from the leader, which comes while all are whirling gayly about and possibly just after the post has been passed. The contestant who understands the art of wheeling about quickly and surely is the one who captures the trophy, and the first prize. Second and third prizes are also awarded, and the game is voted the merriest sort of fun.

It was a singular fact that the late Marshal Canrobert, the last of the French marshals, offered in himself a constant example of the violations of the regular tions of the army in which he was so conspicuous an officer.

Throughout almost the whole of his military service Canrobert wore long hair flowing down upon his shoulders, and this hair was a sort of oriflamme to the

But ever since the year 1833 the French army regulations have positively required that every officer and soldier shall wear closely cut hair, "without any tufts, curls or ringlets whatsoever," and severe penalties are provided for persistence in letting the hair grow long. Canrobert had a profuse mass of hair

which he was very proud of. It was cropped to his great grief when he went into the military school of St. Cyr in 1826; but when, as a young officer, he went into the Algerian war in 1835, he profited by the relaxation of many regulations there to let his hair grown down his shoulders again.

Several years later, also in Algeria. Colonel Canrobert, bareheaded, led a heroic charge at Zaatcha, and his long. floating hair, in the thick of the combat, served as a rallying sign to the Zouaves as they swarmed through the breach. After this war Canrobert's head of hair

had already become so famous that no superior ventured to command him to cut it off, though General Pelissier, who hated him, once called him "professor" in a cafe in Paris, and by way of excuse affected to have mistaken him for a doc tor of philosophy on account of his hair. The Emperor Napoleon III. did once venture to remonstrate with Canrobert for wearing long hair. The marshal's response was very "Frenchy." 'Sire," he said, "my hair belongs to

He did not cut it. It floated all through the French and German war, becoming legendary among the soldiers. It became snow-white and fell upon the old marshal's shoulders in his declining days; and it clustered about them as his body lay in state in Paris after his death.

INSECTS IN COLD STORAGE.

Temperature Below 45 Degrees Kill Some Destructive Ones.

Cold storage companies derive a large income in summer from keeping valuable furs, woolens and rugs which might be injured by the larvae o ther insects which feed on such goods he companies to keep the goods at a emperature of 12 to 20 degrees Fah enheit during the summer. Dr. L. O. Howard, entomologist of the United States Department of Agriulture, made a number of experiments with destructive insects and froze up to 45 and 50 degrees. As the insects died at a moderately low temperature. companies which put their stores in 0 degrees or 12 degrees temperature are wasting a good deal of energy, as a 40 degree temperature is low enough o protect the goods.

The insects which shivered in the interests of science and cold storage companies were the common clothes moth, the cabinet beetle, the black carpet beetle, the dark meal worm and leather beetle. It is said that the black carpet beetle on feeling the temperature going down wrapped itself in a Turkish rug, hoping to weather the unusual frost. It was frozen stiff in the rug, having the general appearance of a mummified beetle when unwrapped. The meal worm was equally circulation by eating wheat.





And at every cessation of the sound the pencil, followed by the strained eyes of the patient, made its mark on the skin. This operation was continued for several minutes, at the expiration of which there appeared, clearly drawn in blue upon the man's breast, the outlines of a misshapen heart.

Always heroic, even in her decadence Greece has never taken a nobler or braver stand than she occupies at present. Her great ruler, Alexander, could he return to life, would himself be appalled by her reckless daring.

Can you realize what it is that Greece has done in her bold defiance of Europe? With a total fighting force on a war footing of only 215,770 men, she has jumped into the arena as champion of the oppressed Cretans, her sons in blood and tradition, against the allied forces of Europe, numbering nearly 19,000,000 men on a war footing. In other words, for every man Greece can put into the field the combined powers that have undertaken to coerce her can muster about ninety. These are odds that even Alexander was not called on to face.

At sea poor Greece cuts even a smaller figure. She has only fifteen war ships of all classes, and about thirty-five torpedo boats. Her three most powerful battle ships, the Hydra, Psara and Spetsai, carry but 400 men each, and are outranked by hundreds of ships in the other

But striking as these odds on land and sea against her, Greece is not dismayed. She looks back on her history for inspiration. Her annals are replete with battles fought against the most overwhelming odds. From Thermopylae, in 480 B. It was by the exercise of valor such as was displayed in these battles that the Greeks revived their nationality. For hundreds of years prior to the revolution of 1821 they had been blotted out as an independent nation. They were vassals in time of the Romans, the Venetians and the Turks. The height from which they had fallen made their position especially humiliating.

Always leaders in civilization and the arts, the Greeks became under Alexander practically the rulers of the world. Egypt, Persia. Babylonia, India and a do other great places besides took their laws and government from Athens. Greece as it is to-day was but a speck on this vast map of empire stretching from sea to sea. In the chart of Alexander's empire, printed here, the outlines of modern Greece are shown in black. The country forms little more than a speck of the dominion that called the Greek empire master 38 years before Christ.

It is the hope of every Greek that some day all this great stretch of land, or most of it, will once again come under Grecian dominion. The Greeks are in this section of the world nearly twelve million people who are pure-blooded Greeks, while in the dominion ruled over by King George there are only 2,187,268 inhabitants. Every Greek patriot will declare that he and his fellows will never rest content until all the people of Hellenic origin are once more united under their own government, instead of living as the subjects of the Turk and other alien rulers. In the trouble stirred up over Crete they see the entering wedge of a movement that shall ultimately bring this about. They know that they have the sympathy of the peoples of Europe, and while the allied governments are now solidly arrayed against their pretensions, they trust to the popular movements in England, Italy, France and the other countries to change all this, so that the forces now with the Turk shall be employed in the dismemberment of the Ottoman Empire and the aggrandizement

Alexander started out on the conquest of the East in 334 B. C. His father, Philip of Macedon, had established himself firmly in Greece in 338 . B. C., and was chosen to lead the allied armies against the Persians. Alexander succeeded to the throne in 336 B. C., and after crushing what opposition remained in Athens, began his tour of conquest. For ten years he cut his way at the head of his forces through the richest lands of the world, subjugating empires, kingdoms and principalities. He died at Babylon in 323 B. C., and from that time Greek power began to crumble, until there came the t tal subjugation of the Grecian people.

Out of the wreck there rose the new kingdom of Greece in 1821 A. D., as the result of the revolution against the to the postal guide and learn that there is Turks. The European powers then as now



were arrayed at first against the Greek patriots, but after a time they swung around in aid of the "rebels," finally lending their aid to establish the first Greek government that had been known for more than a thousand years. It took seven years' fighting on the part of the Greeks to gain independence, and then only to find new troubles in civil strife. There were revolutions and counter revolutions until George was elected to the throne. Since then the country has been quietly forging ahead in spite of the handicap of weakness and poverty. Every change has been for the better, and every few years has seen the addition of a new slice of territory, even if it was only a small island.

Now the Greeks are firmly impressed with the belief that if they will only stand firm they will soon see the rehabilitation of their power, and that patience and courage only are required to make them once more one of the great govern-

Because of this belief they are prepared to make any sacrifice, to defy the armed strength of entire Europe. They mean to enlarge the dot they now hold on the map of the ancient Greek empire to the nensions of old.


