

### **Industrial Court**

New York, June 11.-"Establish an industrial court with full power to settle all questions between employer and employe," said Isaac A. Hopper, president of the Building Trades Employers' Association, "in the same manner and with the same authority that the civil court disposes of cases of creditor versus debtor, and the criminal court disposes of cases of the people versus the man charged with a crime, and in this way differences can be and will be quickly and finally disposed of, and the tendency to socialism and anarchism will be curtailed. Arbitration has proved a failure, because there is nothing binding on one side, nor nobody to be held responsible. I am fully convinced that this problem must be handled and solved, so that decisions will be binding on both sides and a failure to abide by decision will be followed by punishment

Blood polsoning had set in, and every means known to medical skill was employed to check it. Quickly, the poison made itself manifest over the patient's entire body. The finger was opened, but this afforded temporary relief only. Several blood specialists were summoned, and they remained with Miss Kilmer. They were astounded by the fortitude with which she withstood extreme suffering. She lost consciousness last Tuesday and died that night.

Dr. Kilmer was notified and reached Jamaica yesterday. The calm demeanor of the medical practitioner as the grieving father as he bent over the coffin. The face of his daughter told cil against Leadbeater. the story of terrible suffering. He stretched out his hands and wept bitterly. 

# FRANCE FACES

Deficit in Budget Caused by Army Expenses and Old Age Pensions.

Paris, June 8. - The political situa. tion, or, rather, the financial situation, will furnish the Socialists occasion for a dangerous campaign. This financial situation takes into account the permanent deficit of 194,000,000 francs (\$38,800,000) for the budget next year, without counting other sums which represent expenditures already made and for which the chamber will be asked to care by authorizing an issue of short term bonds.

The bill excludes the use of water for sanitary and domestic purposes. such as the Chicago drainage canal from the limitation, and establishes the principle of equality between the two countries in the electrical diversion at the falls. The life of the bill and of all permits issued under it is three years, and the President is directed in the meantime to begin negotiations with Canada for a permanent treaty.

In Canada the question of jurisdiction has not been raised between the federal and provincial authorities. They have co-operated harmoniously in tryhas ing to solve a difficult problem. An international treaty of a permanent character should be welcomed on both sides of the line. Perhaps the best plan would be the appointment of a permanent joint commission to deal with many questions continually arising between the two countries. The method has worked well in the case of the international waterways commission, and has the obvious advantage of bringing the representatives of both nations into constant personal contact.




