EXPLOSION AT WOOLWICH WRECKS CHEMICAL BUILDING Several More Bombs Found at the Moscow Female University.

An Entire Department of the Great Arsenal Wiped Out has resulted in several unfilled ones being But No Lives Lost.

Woolwich, England, Feb. 11.-A huge hole in the ground is all that marks the site of the chemical research department of the Woolwich arsenal, and the cordite magazine, which exploded early this morning, with such terrific force that the concussion was felt in towns 40 miles away, and the whole countryside was thrown into a panic, owing to the belief that a violent earthquake had occurred. There was no loss of life, but buildings for miles around were wrecked to a greater or less degree by the explosion.

Within a few minutes after the explosion, thousands of terror-stricken persons, marry of them haif clad, thronged towards the arsenal. There were large holes in the walls of neighboring houses, and on all sides shattered doors and windows and wrecked roofs, testified to the appalling force of the explosion.

The arsenal was practically swept away, the rig blocks of stone of which It was constructed being scattered for hundreds of yards on all sides. Yesterday reing Sunday, there was no night shift working, hence the absence

The people of Braintree, 40 miles away, were thrown into a panic by the shock of the explosion, while nearer towns had windows shattered and chimnies demolished.

The cause of the disaster is not known.

IN AGRICULTURE

Work of Canada's Experimental Farms Shows Valuable Practical Results.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—The progress of agriculture in Canada and the practical results obtained by the extension of the experimental farm system formed the subject of an address by Professor William Saunders. director of government experimental farms. As an illustration of the growth and importance of experimental work, Professor Saunders stated that in 1899 his correspondence amounted to about 8,000 letters in the course of the year, while for the past seven years the average has been 68,797 letters. In 1887 the number of seed samples distributed amounted to 1,149, while last year the total was 43,885. Contrasting the wheat production of the various countries, he pointed out that Great Britain came first with 30.95 bushels to the acre, and Germany second with 28.25 bushels. Canada was well up, the average for Ontario being 18.92 bushels per acre; Manitoba, 18.45 per acre, and the Northwest, 19.13 per acre. Experiments with Canadian Red Fife wheat in England had been lately carried out, and proved remarkably successful. With regard to spring wheats, Professor Saunders says while goose wheat had proved eminently successful in certain localities, he could not advise Canadian farmers to plant it generally. Referring to recent experiments made by Sir William school when the days are fit for skat- Crooks with a view to extracting by means of electricity, nitrogen from air, to be used as a fertilizer, Professor Saunders said that when the scheme was perfected it would revolutionize agriculture. At Niagara Falls an American company had sunk \$1,000,000 in endeavoring to establish an industry on these lines, but the cost of electricity was too high to allow the project to be successful. It seemed that if electricity could be produced for this purpose at a cost of \$4 per hoursepower, the extraction of nitrogen from the atmosphere and the production of nitrate of lime for fertilizing could be carried out profitably. In Norway, where there were many large waterpowers, a company had been established and was competing, he believed successfully, in the supply of fertilizers. The matter was an important one, as it had been estimated that the world's supply of nitric acid would run out in nineteen or twenty years, and it was necessary that something shou'd take its place.

While they were being forcibly detained, the Japanese provided teachers for the Russians, and by this means many who were previously unable to read or write received a fair education. 

The house in which the deceased had Hved for years was also burned, and the erection of a new one begun at once
