BATTLE NOW RAGING MAY **DECIDE WAR**

Germans, Facing Defeat, Must Bring Up Reserves or Retreat.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 10.-The French advance in Picardy, coupled with new successes in Flanders, and on the Vesle, produced an impression among some officers here that one of the decisive moments of the war, perhaps the beginning of the final battle, was rapidly approaching.

The French and British have gone ahead with such rapidity in Picardy that the German retreat must have reached the proportions of a rout in places, at least. The extent of enemy losses in prisoners, guns and war materials bear out this view.

MONTDIDIER FALLS TO ALLIES. London, Aug. 10.—The important town of Montdidier, which was approximately at the apex of the German salient, south of the Somme, has been captured by the Allies.

AMERICANS TAKE CHIPILLY SPUR. With the British Army in France, Aug. 10.—Chipilly Spur, north of the Somme, was captured by the British and American

troops at 6 o'clock last night. The attack began at 5 o'clock, when startling rapidity of the British and the Allies moved forward between the Ancre and the Somme. They were supported by tanks and were preceded by a heavy barrage fire. The enemy was driven toward Bray, northeast of Chipilly.

24,000 GERMANS HAVE BEEN CAPTURED BY THE ALLIES

London, Aug. 10.—The number of prisoners taken from the Germans in the fighting in Picardy has increased to 24,000, today's war office statement announces. 





THE PRICE IN LIVES.

THE CASUALTY LISTS are coming home to the American people. Page upon page of the names of men who have fallen are being printed in every home newspaper. The shock of battle reaches all parts of the country, and the first blow will strike heavily. Canadians recall the first dread lists to reach this country as the 10,000 toll of Ypres was being counted up day after day, and they will realize that all the hearttearing sorrow that fell upon this young land is now the portion of our older neighbor. Today the American casualties so far reported do not reach many more thousands than the Canadian losses after the first great fight around Calais. The New York Times records the American losses up to Tuesday at 15,870. Few of those soldiers engaged in the Marne fighting have been tabulated in this list, and it is certain that the American forces did not win their recent victories without paying a heavy toll. When these losses have been reckoned and published, the story of death and human destruction will have been read and considered.





To engage in the care of the sick and isabled soldiers, to provide shelters and ealth for destitute children and adults, and to guard against tuberculosis and health for destitute children and addition, and to guard against tuberculosis and other dread scourges.

The Red Cross was busily engaged in organizing hospital units long before any of America's fighting heroes reached "over there" for active service. Six base hospitals were established, among them the Harvard, Hopkins, Columbia. Yale and Chicago units. These units were organized before the Americans reached the battle grounds of Europe. Within three months after our entrance into the war this national war organization provided 18 such base hospitals in France, and had many others "making ready."

For each bage hospital there has been provided at least 22 physicians, 65 to 25 Red Cross nurses, den'ists, 150 calisted persons of high-class university or medical training, and frequently, in addition, a large independent ambulance corps. Fifty such base hospital units were ready by September 1, 1917, and their number has been growing rapidly ever since.

Those who are so badly wounded as to be incapacitated for further military duty will be promptly returned home upon convalescence.

Divisional and regimental hospitals will unite to collect the wounded from the trenches and "No Man's Land." They will give temporary relief at dressing stations. From there, wounded men will be transported to field hospitals. Later they will be shimed to evacuation hospitals—then to base hospitals. It is possible the field hospital may be eliminated later, owing to the rapidity of motor ambulance transportation between the front and evacuation hospitals.





BRITAIN ISSUES **DECLARATION OF** GOOD FAITH TO RUSSIAN PEOPLE

Entente Allies Are Coming To Deliver Them From Germany.

NOT IN SELFISH MOTIVE

No Intention of Imposing Any Political System Upon Russia.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—British representatives at Vladivostok, Murmansk and Archangel have published a "declaration of the British Government to the peoples of Russia."

The declaration says that the Allies are coming as friends to "help you save yourselves from destruction at the hands of Germany." It declares that Allied troops are entering Russia to help, and that not a foot of territory is desired, and states there is no intention of imposing a political system upon Russia. which must work out its own form of government.

The text of the declaration follows:
"Your Allies have not forgotten you. We remember all the services your heroic army rendered us in the early years of the war.

"We are coming as friends to help you save yourselves from dismemberment and destruction at the hands of Germany, which is trying to enslave your people and use the great resources of your country to its own ends.

"We wish to solemnly assure you that while our troops are entering. Russia to assist you in your struggle against Germany, we shall not retain one foot of your territory. We deplore the civil war that divides you, and the internal dissensions that felicitate Germany's plans of conquest.

"The destinies of Russia are in the hands of the Russian peoples. It is for them, and them alone, to decide their form of government and to find a solution of their social problems.

"Peoples of Russia: Your very existence as an independent nation is at stake. The liberties you have won in the revolution are threatened with extinction by the iron hand of Germany. Rally round the banner of freedom and independence that we, who are still your allies, are raising in your midst, and secure the triumph of those two great principles without which there can be no lasting peace or real liberty for the world."

Coming With Supplies.

The declaration by the British Government to the people of Russia, issued from Vladivostok, Murmansk and Archangel, states among other matters that "we not only want to stem

sued from Vladivostok, Murmansk and Archangel, states among other matters that "we not only want to stem German penetration of the country, but also to bring economic relief to your ruined and suffering country. We have already sent some supplies and more are to follow. We wish, to aid in the development of the industrial and natural resources of your country, not with a view to exploiting them for our own benefit. We desire, too, to restore exchange of commodities, to stimulate agriculture, and enable you to take your rightful place among the free nations of the world. Our one desire is to see Russia strong and free and then to retire to watch the Russian people work out their own destiny."
