No. 7, London, Ontario, do hereby humbly and respectfully pray that your honorable commission take immediate steps to change a condition of affairs that now exists at this institution, that is fast becoming unbearable to your patients, and intolerable to your excellent staff here.

They are not so free in their criticism as are the men, but conversing with them, one gains the impression that they are seeking to make the best of things only for the sake of the boys.

G.W.V.A. SEGRETARY DECLARES TOTAL DISABILITY PENSION IS TO BE RAISED TO \$1,000 A YEAR

Soldiers' Widows Will Also Receive Increased Grants, Says W. E. Turley-Government Action Claimed To Be the Result of Recent Protests Made by the Veterans.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, March 11 .- "I have it on good authority from Ottawa," said W. E. Turley, the provincial secretary of the G. W. V. A., "that the total disability pension is to be raised almost at once to \$1,000 a year. I am Informed, also from the same source, that widows' pensions will be raised to the same amount as the total disability pensions of the men. That is the result of our protests. It is the greatest proof I can offer of the power of the G. W. V. A. "Just now," he continued, "We are on the flood tide of a wonderful expansion. Over fifty new branches were opened last week, and ten to-day. There are over one hundred branches now in Ontario alone." 'Is it true that a branch has been opened in London, England?" he was asked.
