35,000 Prisoners Taken by Polish Forces in the Counter-Offensive Against Soviet Troops—German Officers and Soldiers Found Among De ad On Battlefield At Mlawa-Thousands of Reds Believed To Be in Forests Awaiting Chance To Surrender.

Warsaw, Aug. 23.—The process of bottling up the Russian Soviet forces on the northern front has been completed, according to an official statement issued just before last midnight. The Poles have closed the gateway of escape, taking prisoners and materials in such quantities that it is impossible to count them.

Paris, Aug. 23.—Soviet Russian armies, which invaded Poland and threatened to capture Warsaw, appear to be on the eve of complete disaster, says the Warsaw correspondent of the Matin. He quotes Gen. Weygand as saying Poland will be the grave of three fourths of the Bolshevik army. Two Polish cavalry divisions are advancing toward Bialystok for the







MR. KING'S TARIFF ATTITUDE.

Organs of Mr. Meighen daily misrepresent the Opposition leader's stand on the tariff issue They falsely charge him with stating that in his tariff scheme there would be no room for protection of any kind. Mr. King has said no such thing. Here is his declaration made in

regard to tariff revision:

In revising the tariff to this end care will be taken of the position and needs of all the industries in our country, but such tariff as may be necessary in this connection will be under Liberal policy, a tariff for consumers, not a tariff to further the interests of combines, monopolies or any special privileged

Nothing could be clearer than that, no fairer to the public. The Liberal policy will be to consider the industries when any revision of the tariff is made.

The premier has repeatedly intimated in re cent speeches that there will be no further lowering of the tariff, no matter what may be the recommendations of the tariff commission. High protection is his attitude and as that will bar from Canada many necessaries, as well as articles for the producer, it cannot be claimed honestly that he will do anything for the general public. A tariff that will furnish a revenue and at the same time bring relief to the common people is what Mr. King advocates.

THE WAR TAKES A TURN.

The heavy defeat of the Russian Red armies along the Polish front which has lifted the menace of immediate capture from Warsaw has greatly, and happily, altered the entire war and political situation in Eastern Europe. Less than a week ago it appeared certain that Lenin's hordes would roll over the Polish defence, capture the capital, and with this powerful pawn compel a peace that would be harmful and humiliating to Poland and Allied Europe. Tobeen cleared of the enemy, and the hope of whether they wished to or not. Lenin and Trotzky of scoring a triumph that would firmly establish their political system at the very gates of Western Europe has been badly shattered

Two things probably explain the somewhat unexpected success of the Polish offensive. north from the Crimea of General Wrangel with his anti-Bolshevist armies. Three of the foremost French military experts have been assisting Marshal Pilsudski, and close behind them stands the matchelss Foch. Of Wrangel's operait is significant that daily the Moscow Govern-ment issues bulletins making light of his ad-policy of governments. The people themselves have vance and explaining that the Red armies are simply leading the enemy into a trap.

If the Poles can keep up their present pace the Soviet leaders will be compelled to make a much more reasonable peace than intended. A week ago they were dictating terms and evading cessation of the fighting so that Warsaw might be occupied. Now, unless they can halt and throw back the Polish offensive, they will have to be satisfied with a compromise arrangement that will be fair to Poland and that will

The one danger that goes with the Polish gel's campaign-may encourage the Poles to beautifying the surroundings carry the war into Russia. France wants to see Soviet Russia beaten, as the Moscow administration has repudiated the enormous debt to the French Government, while Wrangel has agreed to see that it is paid should he gain power. If an unpleasant if not dangerous clash might develop between London and Paris, as Lloyd George insists that the Poles must stay within the bounds set by the Allies.

THOSE OPEN WOUNDS.

As Lord Bryce points out, in an article on Ireland, it is lamentable that not only in Ireland, but also in Poland and in other nations, the wounds caused by past ill-treatment should be kept open. It must be remembered, moreover, that only a comparitively short time ago the working and agricultural classes in England and all the European countries were ground down and treated with abominable injustice. Going back further, about one hundred years. we find England, France and Germany hanging men and boys for stealing a sheep, a prison system that was a perfect hell on earth, and destitution, poverty and misery left unregarded. Right here in London a man was legally hanged for stealing a horse, and it is not to be expected that England or any other nation would outgrow the folly of such injustices in one generation. Not only Ireland, but all over the it is at least something to the good that more of world it has been necessary to right heavy

wrongs and bear heavy burdens in the past. At the present day, it is well known that the Irish people enjoy many advantages given them the return of a work-a-day world. From an address recently delivered by Lord Grey he apparently believes that "when the League of Nations wanted the help of the United States it would get that help, provided

it could not be dealt with at the present moment. First there would have to be peace, and then some months must elapse before it could be seen what Government would be evolved. As to the United States of America, we could do absolutely nothing to influ osition except to do all we could to get the League, constituted as it was, to act up to the ideals with which it had been founded. He believed, and nothing could shake his belief, that the people of America had, as part of their very nature, an idealism which would not be appealed to in vain, and that when the League of Nations wanted the help of the United States it would get that help, pro-vided that it was not being degraded into an

instrument of private national advantage. With regard to Germany, it had been his meeting of the assembly of the League, there might have been passed a resolution that Grmany might be invited to become a member. They had now to look at the question in the light of what had happened at the Spa conference. His impression had been an unfavorable one. The proceedings had been opened by Germany first of all having to admit that she was enormously behindhand in fulfilling the treaty stipulations as regards disarmae people held that the Treaty of Versailles was onerous in some respects, ought to be revised on the points of coal and reparation. It had to be remembered that which suffered most in devastation of territory during the war was France and that the burden of that revision would fall more on France than any other country with regard to coal. He did not wish this country to have it laid to her charge that she was willing to be generous at all other peoples' expense. In the next place, he thought it a fair condition that, if any of the terms of the treaty were found to be onerous, that Germany should first demonstrate that she was doing her utmost to fulfil the de-mands that she could fulfil, and the disarmament demand was not a burden on Germany. It was important to us, so that we in turn and every nation should not find it difficult to resay the impression produced by the Spa conference was that instead of the Allies getting them to demonstrate that they were doing of the Germans gave the impression that they were exploring possible weak points in agreement of the Allies, exploiting these points, and finding how little of the treaty they need fulfil. 

Modified cow's milk is generally accepted as the best substitute for mother's milk, much better than any prepared food, which should be used only by a physician's orders.

Excellent books at small cost are to be had, giving clear and minute directions for the modification of cow's milk to meet the needs of a normal baby, from month to month.

A very simple method of modifying milk, for the first month only, is as follows: Skim off the top six ounces from a quart bottle of pure milk; add to this top milk 24 ounces of boiled water, in which are dissolved three teaspoonfuls of granulated or six of milk sugar (milk sugar is better for babies, but is expensive), and either a pinch of bicarbonate of soda, or an ounce and a half of lime water. Mix these well, and then pour into each of ten clean nursing bottles.





A unique case, and one on which the decision will likely be taken throughout Ontario courts as a precedent, was heard before Squire W. H. Chittick and John Stuart in the county court here Saturday afternoon, when John McDonald, a merchant of Middlemiss, was charged with selling intoxicating liquor containing more than two and a half per cent spirits, to wit, six a half per cent spirits, to wit, six bottles of beef, iron and wine. Accused, through his counsel, W. R. Meredith, pleaded not guilty, and mantained that the liquid was a proprietary medicine. Decision of the court was reserved one

> James Waddilove, an indian resident of the Muncey reserve, swore that on July 23 last he purchased six bottles of beef, iron and wine at the store of accused at \$1 per bottle, three of which were bought from a 10-year-old son of accused. He used the entire six in one day, as the result of which he became intoxicated. He admitted that he had purchased it before, and that he did not inform the accused that he was obtaining same for beverages purposes. License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside testified that he obtained a bottle of beef, iron and wine from Thomas McGookin, Indian agent of Caradoc Reserve, and that analysis of same showed it to contain 33.17, per cent proof spirits and 15.29 per cent absolute alcohol by weight. McGookin informed the court that the fluid analyzed was obtained at defendant's store. at defendant's store.

John McDonald, on trial as charged, swore that the beef, iron and wine was kept as a medicine, and was put up by a widely known Canadian medical firm. contains sufficient medication prevent its use as an alcoholic beverage," he declared, and produced "The National Pharmacy" an authority on the subject to prove his statement.

"It is a patent proprietary medicine," said W. R. Meredith, conducting the defence, "and it makes no difference whether it is intoxicating or not."

The prosecution would not admit this view, and the decision rests with the court, and the crown maintaining that as the fluid is intoxicating McDonald is liable to the penalties provided under the Ontario temperance act. As beef fron and wine is widely sold throughout the province by druggists and merchants the Middlemiss case is regarded as a test one, and if a conviction is registered by the court many more prosecutions will follow in this district. The manufacturers who enjoy an enormous trade in beef, iron and wine sales may appeal the conviction (if such is registered), and the case may be taken to higher courts as a precedent. defence, "and it makes no difference




