Manning Doherty Takes Exception To Statements Made At London Meeting.

TORONTO, Feb. 3 .-- Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, took exception today to statements in the report of the London Trades and Labor Council meetnig, in which disparaging reference was made to the alleged way in which the Ontario immigration department was bring dwellers under the guise of farm workers.

He said similar charges had been made before, but had never been substantiated, and that the officers of the department in England were being repeatedly reminded that only real farmhands should be encouraged to come here.

"Occasionally men who had lived on the farm until they reached manhood had been able to fool the immigration officials, but such men knew something about farming and turned out well." As to the assertion that considerable sums had been spent in helping camouflaged mechanics to come over, the minister said that last year only \$304.20 had been advanced altogether, even to experienced farm laborers.



REPORT SHOWS LARGER DEMAND FOR CITY HYDRO

Public Utilities Commission **Publish Annual Statement** of Activities.

IMPROVE WATERWORKS

Sales in London Hydro Shop for 1921 Greatest in Department's History.

Despite the industrial depression in 1921, a steadily-increasing demand for hydro power in London was experienced, as revealed by the annual report of the public utilities commission issued Saturday morning.

As a result of this, the main power distributing station at Horton street was operated under severe overload conditions. The highest peak obtained during the year was 14,750 horsepower, an increase of 3,504 over the highest in 1920. To provide for the increasing loads, the erection of a new switching and transforming station was undertaken in East London, which was completed and officially opened Saturday afternoon. Other features of the report are:

Waterworks Department .-- A not able increase in construction work has been noted during the year About five miles of water main was laid, accounted for mainly by the river water main laid along Queen's avenue and Ontario street to supply the Canadian Pacific Railway. Trouble Nullified.

Trouble with plugged services is gradually falling off, only six cases being reported in December. The force pump designed by the London department to clean out these deposits of iron has been employed with every success.

Special Construction Department. -During the early part of the winter Hunt's old flour mill was renovated nd adapted for use as a store building at a cost of \$8.500. This has proved advantageous, the cost of a new building being estimated at

During the summer months an extensive program of work was undertaken for the playgrounds department, the most notable of the permanent work being the construction of new lavatories, concrete wading pool and concrete tennis courts at Thames Park and cinder tennis courts at Queen's Park. New equipent was erected and grading and minor construction work was done at

all of the nine playgrounds. Secretary's department-As in the stock accounts are yet to be made and the audit of the books and accounts of the department have not been completed, it is impossible to give an accurate statement of the past year's opera-

Increase Number of Consumers. Electrical department-The number of consumers has been increased from 14,878 to 16,259, an average of 106 a month. from the consumers for light and power for the past 13 months amounted to \$565,526.19. In the wiring and job department the receipts amounted to \$101,129.41. The total receipts in the hydro shop, including cash sales, charge sales, motor sales and repairs were \$290,192.01.

Electrical department-The total disbursements of the electrical department through vouchers and pay sheets was \$1,094,836.59.

Waterworks department-The cash receipts in this department, not including proceeds of debenture issue Receipts from water

Wire Old Houses.

Wiring installation-house-Wiring of old houses on the installment plan brought considerable new business with 218 houses wired. This was mainly the result of a special campaign last June and July. The revenue derived from this source

amounts to about \$3,300 per annum. New business-The maximum bill to the Hydro-Electric Power Commission for power was based on the peak load established December 16, 1921, of 14,750 h.p., an increase of h.p. This large increase is due in a great measure to the number of stoves, heaters, appliances and the increased candle power that consumers are now using and also counted for by the absence of restrictions in the use of power.

Cannot Proceed.

"If the municipalities are not fav orable the commission cannot proceed, and in addition, the commission cannot go on unless the government sanctions the agreement, so that the charges sometimes made that the commission have autocratic powers are not well founded.
"The government have announced

that they will not further guarantee the bonds of the commission, and it is therefore necessary for the hydro commission to issue bands, only guaranteed by the municipalities, that will finance the construction of the railways on their behalf.

"I still think if the members of the government and of the Legislature properly understand the situation they will not pass legislation that will effectively destroy the possibility of proceeding with the con-struction of the contemplated radial railroads, and those that have already received the sanction of the ratepay ers entitled to vote on money bylaws. and on account of which the municipalities have deposited with the commission approximately \$20,000,000 of bonds."





The shoes were brought to the Tombs by a woman said to be Boddy's sister, who asked that he wear them during the trip to Sing Sing. I take the brown sugar (I never measure, as I can about judge by the size of the cake), about 1 cup, and a piece of butter the size of an egg or more accord ingly. Cream these together and add enough sweet milk to make the desired consistency. Add a few drops of vanilla.

White Cake Recipe - Onehalf cup butter and 1 cup granulated sugar, cream well together, 2 eggs, well beaten, ½ cup sweet milk, 1½ cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add eggs to butter and sugar, and beat well. Next add the 1/2 cup flour and the baking powder to the mixture, beat well. Add the rest of flour and the milk alternately, and the vanilla. Beat it well again. Bake in moderate oven in well-greased, but not too large a loaf tin. I hope Mrs. Hoople will have

In nearly every engine the intake system has so been designed that a great amount of heat is imparted to the gas mixture.

Tackle Fuel Problem. Hot spots, special electric-heating devices, exhaust-heated intakes, water-heated intakes, intake passages in direct contact with hot portions of the cylinders, etc., are some of the methods which have been improved upon, and appear in greater

The fuel problem is not alone one of saving gasoline, it is one involving engine life. If much raw fuel gets into the cylinders it washes away the lubricating oil around the pistons and on the cylinder walls.

What fuel does not work down past the pistons to contaminate the oil in the crankcase and further reduce lubricating efficiency leaves an appreciable amount of carbon in the cylinders. There are but two sources of heat to work with in an automobile -the heat of the exhaust and the electric heat. Both are utilized in the 1922 cars. The electric heat is avaliable instantly to heat the gasoline or the mixture. The exhaust heat comes only after the engine has started running.

It is used between the clutch and trensmission where the latter is separately mounted and also on some propeller shafts. Those using all-metal joints are for the most part provided with means for retaining the lubricant longer, and many cars use the type which is oil lubricated.

Prices Are Much Lower.



AUTO INDUSTRY FOSTERS RAPID DEVELOPMENT OF PNEUMATIC TIRE TRADE

Story of Acceleration of Rubber and Fabric Manufactures To Meet Demands of Motorists Constitutes Wonderful Indus trial Romance.

played in the development of the au-Without the pneumatic tire the automobile of today would not have been possible. The growth of the tire industry has been as renarkable as that of the car manufacturing field and when reduced to writing reads much like a romance. Just now the industry is about gainng its equilibrium after having been haken up and tossed about during period of depression into the depth of which it was suddenly plunged during the summer of 1920.

Not only are tires being made bet-ter than ever before, but they are eing sold at prices that establish new low levels. From few industries is the public receiving greater return for its money. In most instances present prices for merchandise are creatly in excess of those quoted ten or twelve years ago. In the case of pneumatic tires, tremendously inof twelve years ago. The experimental stages have been passed. tire to render more than 4,000 miles of service, while today it is not unmileage guarantees, which have been feature of merchandising peculiar to the tire business, in themselves have provided a barometer of effi-ciency. The first definite guarantee ffered by the manufacturers insured the tire user of at least 3,500 miles of service, while recent guarantees on fabrics have run from 6,000 to 7,500 miles. Cord tires, of course, have returned and have been guaranteed for a greater mileage. Enters New Period.

With the development of the cord tire, now in almost general use on all but the smaller cars, the industry entered a new period and motorists were offered a product of greater efficiency and economy. The characteristic feature of the cord type of casing is that the cord is not fabric but a layer of separate cords, lying side by side, all running in one direction and held together with delicate threads which break when the tire is placed in service. The fabric tire is built up of a layer upon layer of closely woven cotton fabric, one thread being bent closely under and over other threads. When the tire es into use these cross threads

While the original cord tires made in this country were covered by Engish patents, the casing of this type with which we are familiar today is the result of development work by American tire engineers. So marked has been the advance of the cord tire that within a few years it is ex-

Discontinue Guarantees

Not only have radical steps been taken toward greater economy in manufacture, but with the first of the year the industry put into effect an important revision of its merchandising policy. The long standing and much abused definite mileage guarantee has been abolished, and the tire manufacturers are selling their product on the same basis as the makers of clothing, shoes and creased in efficiency, the prices are from 50 to 60 per cent under those guarantee against defects in maguarantee against defects in ma-terial or workmanship. In the past a large percentage of the adjustments granted by dealers and manufacturers were made on what the trade terms a "policy" basis, the desire to keep the customer using their particular make of tire. Policy adjustments are now taboo and the user is required to place in writing any claim he may have for factory consideration. Allowances will be made only when defects are the fault of the factory. This will result in better care being taken of tires. It is believed that the elimination of the definite mileage guarantee will

also have the effect of removing the questionable class of competition that has been offered by dealers and manufacturers who sold their product on adjustments rather than on actual service.
