Will Carry Wheat From Far West States to the Pacific.

Portland, Ore., April 7.-The State of Oregon has delivered to Major W. C. Lang a deed conveying the title to the Government of the entire right of way for in the morning of April 4 at Tsintsatun the Dalles-Celilo Canal. This action removes the last obstacle to the construction of the canal, and insures the early beginning of the work.

This great undertaking is a canal and locks around an obstruction in the Columbia River, about 100 miles east of Portland. The construction of the canal will admit of transportation by water of almost the entire wheat crop of Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington and Idaho which last year amounted to about 45,000, 000 bushels, to the Pacific Ocean.

Declaration Made by Rev. J. W Pedley at Congregational Convention.

"The Bible in Danger" was the sub ject of an address given at the meet-ing of the Congregational churches in Toronto, by Rev. J. W. Pedley, at one time pastor of the First Church, here. Mr. Pedley said some people thought that Christian religion was passing through a crisis. Some people were losing faith in the Bible, and some in Christianity. He thought that some changes should be made in the Bible as it stands now. He declared that Sunday school conventions at which ignorant men got up and warned the people to be on their guard against the higher critics proved so irksome to him that he seldom attended them any more. Among the enemies of the Bible were those who maintained that the Bible was absolutely infallible, a po-

sition that could not be maintained. Luther thought the Book of Esther, in which God was not mentioned, should be left out of the Bible, and he also considered the Pook of James as a book of straw. The Roman Catholic said the seat of final authority in religion was the church, and the Protestant said t was the Bible. He considered that the Catholics had the stronger position, because there was some kind of reason in leaving the matter to inspired religious teachers. He himself thought the seat of final authority was

in a man himself. The aim of the Scriptures was the formation of a perfect manhood in Jesus Christ. Its object was not to give a system of theology, or a scienpivots were character and conduct.


