

FIGHTING THE SEA. Holland's Continuous Perform

In Preventing Floo

Holland is a country of wooden piles and dikes, for the people are perpetu fighting against the encroachments of water. One building in Amsterdam rests on no fewer than 13,659 piles, though the dikes around the town, which have been erected at enormous expense, effectually prevent any chance of a flood. The streets of the flourishing port of Rotterdam even are frequently under water in the winter, and in some parts of south Holland the people are compelled to do their shopping in boats.

When the Zuyder Zee breaks on to the land, those who wade up to their knees along the streets of a flooded village meet all manner of fish. This is explained by the fact that the Zuy-der Zee, with its mud bottom, is literally crammed with finny tribes; and one authority states that if it were well scraped of all its fish one year,

it would be full again the next.

The land of Holland is really of four distinct levels, and from ten to twelve feet between the highest and the lew-est. A large number of engineers are specially engaged to look after the dikes, and no less a sum than \$2,500,000 is expended every year in keeping these fortifications against the sea in proper repair.



CHARRED BONES IN RUINS.

DAMAGE THAT MAKELED AR

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—One more name has been added to the death roll of the Gilmour Hotel fire, Harry T. Walker of Mallakahill, N.J., died at 10 o'clock last night as the result of his injuries. Mr. Walker was asleep in bed when the fire broke out and had to jump from the fourth storey to the one storey roof of a building attached to the hotel. He had both legs broken, was burned severely about the arms

This brings the list of known fatalities up to four.

All day the work of searching for the remains of the victims has proceeded, but up till late last night only two had been discovered. It is practically impossible to identify the few charred bones the searchers discovered, but they are believed to be those of Miss Loveday of the Barnardo Home, Peterboro, and Miss O'Nelll, the head waitress.

Mrs. Pentecost is still in a very low condition. At the hospital she is reported as having "passed a good day."

A letter of enquiry from A. E. Maynard of Galt, concerning Miss Alice King an English girl, gave rise to a rumor last night that she had perished in the fiames, but on enquiry it was said that Miss King, who had been employed at the Gilmour as a waitress, was now at the new Russell, Yonge street, Toronto.

It is reported that Mr. Irwin of Winchester is missing. No news of him has been heard since the fire. It is said also that a new bell boy and a new waitress, whose names are unknown, are missing.

KILLED AS SHE SLEPT.


