


City Hall.



HAMILTON is situated at the head of Lake Ontario, on Hamilton Bay. The first settlers in the neighborhood were United Empire Loyalists who came about the year 1786. "The bay," however, had been discovered in 1696, by the great French explorer, La Salle. In 1813, during the war between Great Britain and the United States, part of the British army was encamped on the ground now covered by Hamilton Cemetery, and from there marched to Stoney Creek, 7 miles distant, where they repulsed the invaders. The early settlers took an active and important part in this, perhaps small but crucial engagement. From that time, to the present, Canadians living at the "head of the lake" have ever been ready to defend their country against all comers. This spirit is embodied in the 13th Regiment, and the 91st Highlanders, whose members are the peers of any volunteer troops in the world. Such is the spirit of the whole population of the "Ambitious City," which according to the latest returns is about 70,000. This abounding life fortunately

has been enabled to pursue peaceful vocations. The result is that Hamilton has become a great manufacturing centre, whose varied products are being sent into all portions of the world. The members of the General Assembly should take advantage of their visit to Hamilton to see through some of these wonderful works of man's ingenuity and industry. An insight into the labors of this one Canadian community will inspire them with a greater respect for the position this young nation is destined to take among the countries of the world. PORTION OF CITY VIEWED FROM JAMES STREET INCLINE


The Reservoir in foreground is the smallest of three owned by the City. Its capacity is 360,000 gallons

The city has provided Halls of Learning all over the continent of America with some of their most efficient teachers and professors. The medical profession has many illustrious members who began their careers in Hamilton. The bar of Ontario has been enriched by the brilliant achievements of lawyers who practised in this city, and many judicial offices have been filled by Hamilton citizens who did honor to themselves and service to their country by an impartial administration of justice.

Hamilton is a great musical city. For many years the famous band of the 13th Battalion under Bandmaster Robinson has made this city known from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Of late years the band of the 91st Highlanders has achieved success that is likely to become continental. The Elgar Choir, under Mr. Bruce Carey, and the Hamilton Choir, under Dr. C. I. M. Harris, are well known organizations. The music in the churches indicates the general artistic culture of the people. Among the several denominations the



or so seven new schools have been provided, each modern and up-to-date at the time of its erection; to three of these, important additions have recently been made, making in all an addition of 100 rooms to the school accomodation. Besides these, two old schools have been practically rebuilt.

Hamilton Public Schools

The citizens of Hamilton have always taken the deepest interest in their Public Schools, and have been very earnest in their desire that the progress of the city in Educational matters, should keep pace with its advancement in material prosperity.

One phase of this is very fully shown by the additions made to the school buildings.

In the last twenty years

Hamilton's Great Fruit and Produce Market, being the greatest tri-weekly public market in the country, as many as 600 wagons being entered on the market clerk's record for a day, the sales of fruit and produce reaching hundreds of tons in a day

There are altogether now 190 rooms, with a probable total enrolment for the year of 9,500 pupils.

In addition to the ordinary school courses, instruction is given in Household Science and Manual Training.


The girls in the Senior Third, Fourth and Fifth Forms, numbering nearly 1,200 and forming 57 classes, receive instruction in Household Science in five different centres.

Four Manual Training centres are maintained for the boys of the Fourth and Fifth Forms. These number over 800 and form 39 classes.

There are 14 Kindergartens with an attendance of 800 children.

Pupils who have passed the Entrance Examination may enter the Public School Fifth Form classes, where a three years' course is given to prepare them more particularly for entering active business life.

A system of Military Drill and calisthenics has been a feature in the Hamilton Public School system for many years.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

The Collegiate Institute, situated between Victoria and West Avenues, and fronting on Hunter Street, was erected in 1897 at a cost of \$160,000. It is built of stone and brick in the Normanesque style of architecture. A large addition, to be used as a Technical School, will be ready for occupation in September. The Collegiate contains the following: an Assembly Hall, with a seating capacity of 1000; well equipped physical, chemical and biological laboratories, household science room, manual training room, gymnasium, armory, reception room, library, two teachers' rooms, principal's office, 23 class rooms and cloak rooms.

Presbyterianism in Hamilton

PRESBYTERIANISM has had organized existence in Hamilton since 1833, when the Rev. Alex. Gale was inducted as minister of the newly formed St. Andrew's Church (now St. Paul's) in connection with the Church of Scotland.

In 1841, after occasional services for three years and a half, the "United Associate Church of Hamilton," now Central Church, in whose handsome and commodious building the Assembly meets, was formed.

As an outcome of the Disruption of 1843 in Scotland, Knox Church was organized in 1844, and ten years later, in 1854, MacNab Street congregation


In the early sixties St. Andrew's congregation built a church on Wentworth Street North, in which Rev. Wm. Masson preached for some time. The services were discontinued, and in 1870 the building was secured from the trustees of St. Andrew's, and Sunday School work was begun under the supervision of the joint sessions of Central, Knox, and MacNab Street churches. As part of the outcome of this, in 1874 St. John's congregation was organized.

As a further outcome of the Sunday School on Wentworth Street North another congregation bearing the name Wentworth Street Congregation was organized in 1885. Its name was changed a few years ago to St. Andrew's, and its site to the corner of Barton and Smith Avenue, where a new church was recently opened, and an interested and vigorous congregation meets.

While these new causes were advancing in the east and north-east of the city other sections were not overlooked. In 1873 Sunday School work was begun on Pearl Street, in the northwest, under the care of Central Church, and seven years later, in 1880, Erskine Church, since become one of the strongest in the city, was organized.

About the same time MacNab Street congregation began Sunday School work on Locke Street, in the southwest of the city. In 1890 this was formed into a congregation, now known as St. James, which a few months ago opened a handsome new church. In the north end Knox Church became active through her Mission begun in the eighties, where a flourishing Sunday School has ever since done admirable work. Presbytery has recently given its consent to the forming of a separate congregation when the parent church sees fit.

During the latter part of Dr. Laidlaw's pastorate in St. Paul's Church, what might be called "slum" work, was begun on Mary Street. There in what is called "The Laidlaw Memorial Mission," Sunday School work, mothers' meetings, sewing and cooking classes, evangelistic services are still held under the oversight of St. Paul's Kirk Session.






