The Division Courts in Western Canada are presided over by the Judges of the County Courts, and have jurisdiction over almost all claims on dobt, account of money demand whether payable in money or otherwise up to $\pounds 25$, and in all torts to personal chattles to $\pounds 10$. The suits are generally determined by the Judge in a summary manner; in certain cases, however, a Jury is allowed.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's changes first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the furer will the seather be during the seven days following.

2. The next space of this calculation occupies from ten at high tull two next morning.

3. The nearer to mid-day or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space of this calculation occupies from ten is, the forenoon to t wo in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly on the same ratio.

5. The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours (i e, from four to ten) may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind as is noted in the table.

ECLIPSES.—There will be five eclipses this year, as follows :—1 A partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 16, 1866; invisible in Canada and in Europe.

2. A total Eclipse of the Moon, March 30, 1866; visible here. The moon enters Penumbra at 8 o'clock 19 min. P.M., then enters Shadow at 9 o'clock 19 min., and the total Phase from 10 o'clock to midnight and 14 min.; then leaves the Shadow at 1 o'clock 21 min. A.M., and Penumbra at 2 o'clock 30 min.

3. A partial Eclips of the Sun, April 14. 1866; invisible on the Continents, except in Australia.

4. A total Eclipse of the Moon, September 23, 1866; invisible here.

5. A partial Eclipse of the sun. October 7 and 8, 1866; invisible here, but visible in the Americo-Russian possessions and in a great part of Europe.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS, C. W.

This Court is held quarterly in each County Town. The Judge of the County Court is *ex-officio* Chairman of the Quarter Sessions, who, together with one or more Magistrates of the County or United Counties, constitute the Court. The Court has Jurisdiction over all minor cases of Larceny, Misdem eanor and appeals from decision of Magistrates. Trials are by Jury.

Sittings-Second Tuesday in March, June, September, and December.

COUNTY COURTS.

The jurisdiction in cases of Notes of hand, &c., is limited to $\pounds 100$, in cases of open accounts to $\pounds 50$, and torts to personal chattels to $\pounds 50$. It has also equity jurisdiction up to $\pounds 50$, and jurisdiction in certain cases of ejectment.

The Court sits for trial of cases at the same time as the Quarter Sessions.
