The Division Courts in Western Canada are presided over by the Judges of the County Courts, and have jurisdiction over almost all claims on debt, account of money demand whether payable in money or otherwise up to £25, and in all torts to personal chattles to £10. The suits are generally determined by the Judge in a summary manner; in certain cases, however, a Jury is allowed.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's changes, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The next space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to mid-day or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space of this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours (*i. e.* from four to ten) may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind as is noted in the table.

ECLIPSES.—There will be five eclipses this year, as follows:—1 A partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 16, 1866; invisible in Canada and in Europe.

2. A total Eclipse of the Moon, March 30, 1866; visible here. The moon enters Penumbra at 8 o'clock 19 min. P.M., then enters Shadow at 9 o'clock 19 min., and the total Phase from 10 o'clock to midnight and 14 min.; then leaves the Shadow at 1 o'clock 21 min. A.M., and Penumbra at 2 o'clock 30 min.

3. A partial Eclips of the Sun, April 14, 1866; invisible on the Continents, except in Australia.

4. A total Eclipse of the Moon, September 23, 1866; invisible here.

5. A partial Eclipse of the sun, October 7 and 8, 1866; invisible here, but visible in the Americo-Russian possessions and in a great part of Europe.

TO BREAK HORSES.— To prevent horses, which are disposed to break their bridles, from doing so, place a pad within the strap which passes back of the head, the inside of which is lined with cotton or linen, and in which the points of three or four very sharp nails, pointing inwards, are concealed. When the horse draws hard upon his bridle, these prick him, and cause him to desist.

TOMATO PRESERVES.—Pour boiling water on the tomatoes, and take the skins off; then add the weight of them in sugar, and some sliced lemons; take a cup of ginger and tie it up in a bag loosely, and boil it in half a pint of water; put this into the preserve, and boil the whole three hours, skimming off the top as it rises. When cool, is ready for use.


