The material aid which Roumania could give would be of a very great and important character. She has had between 500,000 and 600,-600 troops mobilized for nearly a year. Her army is reputed to be one of the best equipped and trained in Europe. Apart from possible Russian reinforcements Roumania would be in a position to deal a powerful blow at Bulgaria from the north in conjunction with the Allies drive from the south.
