Toronto, Feb. 13.—Dallas T. Hyams, aged 38, and Harry P. Hyams, aged 39, both brothers and both Americans, who have been residents in the city for nine years, coming here from New Orleans, were last night arrested on a charge of murder. The alleged victim was a young Englishman named William C. Wells, who on January 16, 1893, was found lying dead at the bottom of the elevator shaft of the warehouse on Colborne street of Hyams Bros., with whom he had been employed as a bookkeeper.
