EUROPE. Paris, June 11. Supplementary elections will be held July 2. The press of Paris continues firm in support of Thiers.

Restoration of public buildings has begun. All children found with arms in their possession after a certain day, will be tried by court martial.

Prussia has resigned Governorship of the Bank of France. Orleans Princes are still at Versailles. Bonapartists will be very active in approaching supplementary elections.

Communist Superintendent of the Bank of France has been given a safe conduct to leave the city. French prisoners are rapidly returning from Germany.

All property stolen from churches has been withdrawn in mist and returned. Austrian Government instructed its representative to follow Victor Emmanuel to Rome.

London, June 12. In the House of Lords last evening, Earl Russell moved an address to the Queen against the ratification of the Treaty of Washington, and opposed the sixth article, which lays down a new rule of international law.

Earl Grey and Ripon defended the Commission from Earl Russell's charges, and Lord Cairnes, Duke of Argyll, and Earl Kimberley also opposed Earl Russell's motion, which was finally withdrawn.

Prussia proposes a tax of 450,000,000 francs. Princes de Joinville will sit for the department of Marne. Bonapartists hope to carry 50 of 114 seats in Assembly to be filled.

The Tories are organizing for a vigorous opposition to the Treaty of Washington, and a spirited struggle is expected in Parliament. The harvest prospects of France and Prussia are discouraging.

Much of the seed has perished. In the more eastern portions of Europe, however, the crops promise an abundant yield. The Emperor and Empress of Brazil have arrived in Portugal.

Late advices from Tehran state that the famine in one district of Persia has reached such a state that the starving people have killed and eaten 50 children. The Bonapartists will make a strong effort to gain success at the elections, and the Prince Imperial will be a candidate for the Assembly instead of the Prince Napoleon.

London, June 13. The report before telegraphed, of the burning of the ship 'Dun Junc' at the coal pier, has been corrected. The coal pier was not the vessel. In the struggle which took place for the possession of the ship's boats, the Europeans fastened a hundred coals below, and these were all burned to death.

A hundred and thirty-five Europeans, and a hundred coals have reached Macao, at the entrance of the Canton river. The Mayor of Dublin is dead. A fusion of the Spanish Bontons has been arranged.

The Duke of Montpensier is to be named the regent, and Prince Alfonso is to be recognized by the family as the rightful heir of the throne of Spain. The International Society of Working-men protests against the alleged barbarities exercised by the Versailles towards the Communists of Paris.

The 'Financiers' says the discussion yesterday in the House of Lords, shows the advantages of the Treaty of Washington, and the deficiencies. To yield to conciliate an opponent is unwise, but American Commission also has been their original demands.

The claims on London could hardly be settled in a better way. In the French Assembly yesterday, Gen. Trochu defended his administration of affairs in Paris.

Prince de Joinville, the Duc d'Aumale and Felsheim, called on Thiers, on Monday. Princess Mathilde has asked Thiers' permission to return to Paris, promising to abstain from political intrigues.

Paris, June 13. Gen. Ulrich, the defender of Strasbourg, solicits a seat for one of the Assembly districts of Paris, as a permanent protest against the accusation of Strasbourg to Germany.

The public gardens have been reopened. The work of restoration in the Bois de Boulogne is begun. Laborers are replanting trees and shrubbery, filling ditches and leveling the works of the streets.

Vienna, June 15. Gen. Von Gabling goes to Berlin as the special representative of Austria, to attend the triumphal ceremonies. He is the bearer of a congratulatory letter from the Emperor of Austria to the Emperor of Germany.

London, June 14. The trial of Rochouard has been postponed, as he is pronounced seriously ill. A despatch from Paris states that the authorities have arranged for a grand review of troops on the Camp de St. Mandé. The grand review will take place in the evening.

Yesterday twenty nobles were executed in the Bois de Boulogne. A fresh outbreak is feared at Lyons. The troops stationed here have been informed, in view of the circumstances, that they are to be ready to march at a moment's notice. The Emperor of Austria has issued a decree, ordering the Emperor of Germany to withdraw his troops from the Rhine.

The French Academy resumed its sittings to-day. A Republican manifesto, signed by 81

deputies, of the Left, charges the Legation members from the Province with intrigues for restoration of monarchy, and for intervention in Italy in favor of the Pope. The official statement of the Bank of France states the bullion in its vaults at \$2,000,000 francs.

The Financiers express the hope that, taking pattern from the adjustment of the American question, all the nations of Europe will rise to another conception of the duties of international fellowship. Berlin, June 11. The Alabama question having been practically decided by the treaty of Washington, it is said that the American envoys on the continent have received instructions to agree with the Powers for the protection of private property upon the sea.

The Emperor will distribute four millions of thalers among the Generals and Statesmen who have achieved the results of the war. London, June 15. Marshall McMahon has again expressed his desire to resign the supreme command of the French army.

Gen. Vinoy's reserve will be immediately dissolved on the occasion for its services having passed. The Paris workmen are almost all Communists, and evince great bitterness of feeling towards the Government of France. Many of them are making preparations to emigrate, and a large exodus is anticipated.

The Eastern railways are crowded with Germans going home. The papers assert that the retiring Germans are laden with plunder. Twenty thousand persons reach Paris every day. London, June 15. The saloons, concert halls, and theatres in Paris are re-opened, and crowds still flock to Paris.

The 'Gazette' newspaper says that the fusion of the Orléanists and Legitimists is yet incomplete. Caution will be taken by the Italian Government to prevent any disturbance on the occasion of the Pope's Jubilee. The French Journals ridicule the idea of any interference to secure a restoration of the temporal power of the Pope.

Persons arriving from Paris say that half has not been told of the trouble in that city, and that the destruction of life and property immensely exceeds both government and newspaper accounts. Versailles, June 15. The manifesto of the Deputies of the Left, protesting against the intrigues of the Monarchists, is generally approved; but the radical address to the electors of Paris creates a bad impression, because it endeavors to excuse the Communists.

London, June 16. The Pope has decided to leave Rome on the day King Emmanuel enters the city to make it his capital. His Holiness will retire to the island of Gorizia, where he will fix his residence, on the invitation of the Government of France.

The French Government will remain at Versailles. Rochefort and Rosell are to be tried by Court Martial next week. The International Society of working-men publishes a circular, in which it asserts that the reasons why they are yet a hundred thousand strong. Jules Favre, Trochu, money and the Priests, have obtained a temporary advantage over us, and have presented our principles having a fair trial in actual practice. But we await calmly and confidently the course of events.

The American Minister in France announces the reasons why he has been induced to claim damages for losses sustained by Americans in Paris. The United States and European naval force in Chinese waters have had a fight with the forts on the coast of Corea, in which the forts were demolished. The triumphal entry of the German army into Berlin, yesterday, was a wonderful spectacle. The city was crowded with spectators, and the decorations were magnificent. The procession was one of the finest displays of the century.

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New York, June 14. The New York Sun this morning asserts that England is negotiating with Spain for the purchase of Cuba. The price named is one hundred millions of dollars. The British Government will, so the Sun says, reserve to itself the right to control the Orléanist regulations of the island, but will, in every other respect, leave the people free to deal with their own matters as they like.

An American company of capitalists has offered to rebuild the public buildings in Paris, to receive in payment public bonds of France. Galveston, Texas, has been visited by another severe rain storm, which has done a great deal of damage to the crops, and several outcrops.

New York, June 15. A new horse disease has broken out in New York city. It is very violent and fatal. Seven hundred horses are reported infected, and over a hundred deaths have already occurred.

Pottsville, Pa., June 15. Committees of operators and miners have agreed on two dollars and fifty cents as the average price of coal for the week ending June 15. New York, June 15. The overflow has almost entirely disappeared. Gold 123. Exchange 107.

The horse disease, before reported, has been pronounced of an epidemic type. Many gentlemen are sending their horses out of the city, to get away from the disease that several owners and horse curriers have been compelled to stop running. C. C. It is officially announced that British Columbia comes into the Union on the 20th July. Information received here today, states that Langens has been elected for Quebec County by acclamation. The Privy Council meet to-day, at noon, to make final arrangements for the Pacific voyage.

Mr. Langens's return to the city is expected on Wednesday. The annual survey is expected to be started next week. A delegation from Montreal and Ottawa has just arrived in Quebec, to arrange for a union in connection with the election of the Mayor of Montreal. Mr. Plack, who was sentenced to hang in Almyer, for rape, last winter, has had his sentence commuted to life imprisonment.
