THE FAST DAY.

As far as we have been enabled to ascertain, the day appointed by public authority for a general fast and humiliation throughout the Island, in consequence of the outbreak in India, has been very generally and properly observed. All the shops in the city, with a few exceptions, were closed, and the quietness that reigned around reminded one of the rest of the Sabbath. Appropriate sermons were preached in the different churches, and collections taken up in aid of the Indian Relief Fund; and, but for the want of the day, both congregations and collections would have been much larger.

St. Paul's (Episcopal) Church.—The Rev. Dr. FitzGerald preached, in the forenoon, from Daniel ix., 2.—"O Lord, to us belongeth confusion of face, to our Kings, to our princes, and to our fathers, because we have sinned against thee." Collection then made and since added to amounts to £10 15s.

St. James's Church of Scotland.—The Rev. Thomas Duncan preached, in the forenoon, from Luke xiii., 36, last clause.—"He that hath no sword let him sell his garments and buy one." And in the evening from Jeremiah xvi., 6.—"O thou sword of the Lord, how long will it be ere thou be quiet: put up thyself into thy scabbard, rest, and be still." Collection £5 10s.

Free Church.—The Rev. George Sutherland preached, in the forenoon, from Micah i., 5.—"For the transgression of Jacob is all this, and for the sins of the house of Israel. What is the transgression of Jacob?—it is not Samaria; and what are the high places of Judah? are they not Jerusalem?" In the evening from 1 Peter v., 6.—"Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time, and a collection had been taken in this church on the previous Monday, in aid of the Presbyterian Missions of the United States, which had suffered so severely by the revolt.

Wesleyan Chapel.—The Rev. Ingham Sutcliffe preached in the forenoon from 10th Psalm, 3 and 4.—"Thou hast shewed thy people hard things; thou hast made us to drink the wine of astonishment. Thou hast given a banner to them that fear thee, that it may be displayed because of the truth." Collection £10 11s.

THE INDIAN RELIEF FUND.

The subscriptions already received by the Home Committee, up to the 31st October, for the sufferers by the Indian massacres, exceeds £200,000, and they continue to pour in from all quarters without any sign of abatement. The most remarkable are as follows:—The King of Sardinia has subscribed the noble sum of 10,000 francs. Mr. Thackeray the novelist, £1,000. Count Bathurst, £500, who, in enclosing the amount, says:—"Although a Catholic myself, I should be very sorry if my friends and others are included among those bigots who withhold such aid as they can afford from their fellow-creatures, under the jesuitical pretext of their peculiar feelings. Pray, therefore, have my name and subscription published, as a protest against sectarian bigotry." Hamburg has sent £100,000, and £250,000 voted by the Senate. Collections have been taken up in Sicily and Naples, with the full approval of King Ferdinand. The King of Greece has sent £400 from his private purse, and directed that subscription lists be opened throughout his kingdom. The principal residents at Constantinople have sent £780. Marquesses have sent £61. The Pope of Rome has sent £50.

Our Colony has commenced a subscription list, but we are informed that no active steps have been taken to increase it. Who has charge of it? Surely if foreigners can come forward so liberally and give pecuniary expression to their friendly feelings towards England, shall her own sons be backward in her hour of need? We believe not.

FALL OF DELHI.

The intelligence from India received by last mail is of a very cheering and gratifying nature. The British troops, under the able leadership of General Wilson, have entered the stronghold of the rebel army, and taken Delhi at the point of the bayonet. In the fall of this city, the first decisive blow has been struck at the mutiny, and the re-conquest of India has virtually commenced. On the morning of the 14th September, soon after daybreak, an assault was made on the city with four columns, one of which, consisting of Ghoorkas and the newly arrived Jummoo contingent, were repulsed—the other three columns were successful. An entrance was effected at the Cashmere gate, and the

whole line of defences, from the Water bastion to the Cabul gate, fell into the hands of the British. The resistance was very obstinate, and our loss was estimated at 600 killed and wounded, including 50 officers. On the 15th the palace and other strong places in the city were shelled. On the 16th the magazine was stormed, a breach having been made in its walls the previous evening, and 135 pieces of cannon taken. On the 17th, 18th and 19th further advances and acquisitions were made. On the 20th, the anniversary of the battle of the Alma, the whole city was in our possession, with upwards of 200 pieces of cannon. Thus in six days, from the time of the first entrance within one of its gates, till the entire occupation of the city—a place rendered as strong as science and the skill of our own engineers could make it, and manned by thousands of soldiers who were trained by ourselves, and were fighting with the desperation of men who almost felt the very rope around their necks—has been stormed, and taken, and completely occupied by our heroic troops. May the God of Battles be with them and their Christian leaders, and enable them, while the dealing out strict and impartial justice to the murderous and savage soldiers, to exercise forbearance towards the innocent and helpless, and to bring no stain on the honor or the religion of their country.

NEWS ITEMS.

Considerable damage has been caused in Persia by shocks of earthquake. One town almost entirely destroyed, and the river Kour left its bed and inundated the country and several towns on its banks. The Rev. Dr. Cronyn was consecrated at the chapel, Lambeth Palace, as Lord Bishop of the new diocese of Huron by his grace the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The Indian Relief Fund has reached the sum of £200,000, subscriptions having been received from Hamburg, Sicily, Naples, Greece, Turin, Marsailles, Constantinople, Rome, the Smyrna and Aidin railway has been commenced with great vigor. His Excellency Moustapha Parha and several Turkish authorities being present.

The Religious Tract Society have placed £5 worth of their publications at the service of every ship carrying troops to India. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel have agreed to receive subscriptions towards the erection of memorial churches at Delhi and Cawnpore, where some of their missionaries and catechists have been recently murdered.

The Bishop of Strasburg has issued a circular, recommending all persons in his diocese to burn all Protestant Bibles, and all books and tracts published by Bible societies, which may be in their possession. Two priests and a friar were arrested at Cagliari on the 8th, in the act of invoking the devil, in order to find concealed treasure. They have been suspended by the ecclesiastical authority, and are now in prison.

Signor Garzanti has been lecturing at the Lyceum, and has laid aside the title of "Father" with the dogmas of the Romish Church, and declared that henceforth he is determined to know nothing among his hearers but to preach nothing but Christ Jesus and Him crucified.

TRUNK MEDALS FOR THE BRITISH ARMY AND NAVY.—70,000 medals of Medjidie are to be sent to the British army and fleet. The waters of the Ganges and the Jumna are higher than ever. The excessive rains render the march of the troops very difficult. £5000 has been offered for the apprehension of Nana Sahib, and there is some hope, it was said, of getting him.

Among the unfortunate victims who perished in the massacre at Cawnpore, were four Roman Catholic clergymen. They were put to death with great barbarities. Their chapel also was dismantled and partly demolished.
