Realizing the hopelessness of her plight with the forces of the other members of the Balcan League against her. as well as the antagonisms aroused against her in other quarters, Bulgaria sees that no alternatue remains but to sue for peace. In view of her hopeless position in the war she is reported to have placed herself unreservedly in the hands of Rusaia, with a view of bringing about a cessation of hostilities, and France has undertaken to negotiate with Servia and Greece on her behalf to ascertain what terms of peace can be arranged. It will thus be seen that the final stage of this senseless and sanguinary conflict appears to be in sight; although much still depends upon the action of the powers.

## The Agricultural Grant.

The Federal department of agriculture has concluded arrangements with the Governments of the Maritime Provinces and of Saskatchewan, re garding the sums which those respective Provinces are to receive under the Agricultural Instruction Act. This leaves only Alberta and Quebec unsettled. The amount distributed this year is \$700,000 as against \$500,000 last year. The increase of \$200,000 is largely absorbed by the flat grant of \$20,000 to each pro vince, irrespective of size This arrangement inures greatly to the benefit of the smaller provinces. ## A Colonial University.

A proposal is under consid eration in London to establish Colonial University for the ourpose of giving special training to young men who ntend to leave England and mbark on commercial or gricultural careers in the Dominions. The curriculum would be specially adapted to the future requirements of the students. Agriculture, com merce, geography and ethno-logical study would be includspecial courses would provide instruction on matters relating to special countries, tropical conditions and Indian affairs and languages would receive due share of attention. The student who had profited by such a training would be fully equiped, on the theoretical side, for the problems which would confront him in

his new home. In addition to this branch of the work, facilities would be provided for colonial stud ents to complete their education in the Mother Country, and gain a profitable acquaintance with the condition of affairs in England. That the proposal to establish a university on the lines indicated is worthy of support is evident from the success of similar in stitutions in France and Germany. In each of these countries, with comparatively small outlying possessions, three such universities have been established.

Any person who is the sole head of a amily, or any male over 18 years old. may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manltoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, laughter, brother or sister of intending

Daties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his bomestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a homesteader in Postmaster General, will be received at good standing may pre-empt a quarter Ottawa until Noon, on Friday, the 15th section alongside his homestead. Price August, 1913, for the conveyance of His

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

\$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside six months in each of three years. cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


