Few people can be found to-day who will dispute the power of judicious advertising. It is looked upon as a prime factor in business success.

Now I am not intending in this paper to lay down for you a set of rules that will prove an infallible guide to anybody with so important a problem confronting him.

Of course, you must advertise. This can be done in most of the nationally circulated mediums that have been brought into being and continue to be fully nourished by advertising.

There is no profession in which more can be learned from hard experience than advertising.

First and Always—Let whatever you send or write to your customer be as safe and honest as the checks that carry your firm's signature.

Second—Answer your customer's letters the same day they are received.

Third—Be frank with him and try to write to him just as you would talk to him, as one honest man to another.

Fourth—Answer his questions minutely and carefully. Sometimes they may seem insignificant to you, but to him they are very important.

Fifth—Do not try to get something from him for nothing. Do not permit him to expect something from you for nothing.

Sixth—Remember that he is probably just as good a fellow as you are, and that he is quick to detect a shortcoming in you and your work.

Eighth, Ninth and Tenth—Be on the square with him from one year's end to the other—and use Common Sense.

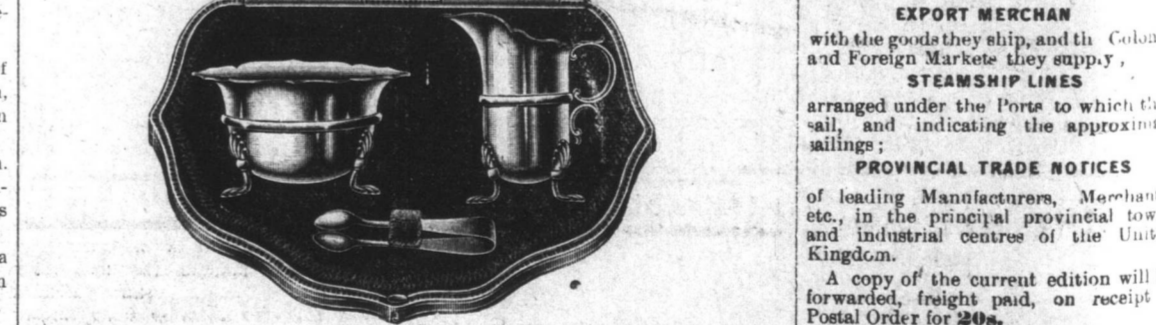

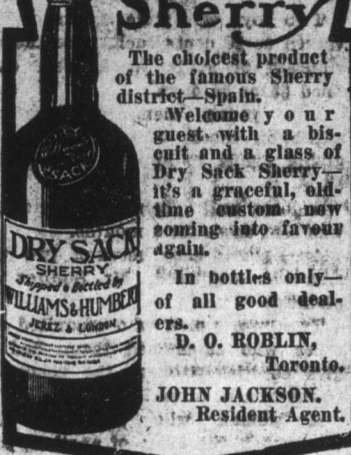
The Evening Chit-Chat

Strange Story of Murder in Balloon.

Rejected Suitor Inveigles Girl into Car, Then Kills Her and Scales—Romanian Police Find Headless Bodies.
 London, July 8.—A remarkable story of murder in a balloon is sent to London by the Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail.
 A number of policemen, while walking across a field near Dorchol, Roumania, saw an abandoned balloon with a guide rope trailing along the ground.
 When the balloon was hauled down the headless bodies of a young man and a girl were found in the car. Both bodies showed evidences of a desperate struggle.
 The girl had been stabbed to death. Her companion had been shot. The gas bag had been split with a knife.
 An investigation revealed that the girl was the daughter of a distinguished army officer of Bucharest, and that she was to be married on the day the balloon was found.
 The man in the car was the son of a wealthy land owner, named Joneson, who had fallen in love with her. The Roumanian police say that the young man, finding his advances rejected by the girl, who was promised to another, induced her to go with him on a balloon trip, and then murdered her and killed himself.
 How the heads were lost from both bodies is not explained, however.

Killed Woman Who Refused to Accept Him as a Boarder.

Petrolia, July 8.—William Moore, a young man employed in the wagon works, instantly killed Mrs. John King to-day, and probably fatally wounded her 12 year old daughter, Florence. Mrs. King, who keeps a boarding house on the east end of Main Street, had refused to accept Moore as a boarder, as she had turned him out months ago.
 Moore entered the house to-day and it is supposed, enraged at again being refused, shot the woman and child. He was arrested by "Policeman" Whitlock, who was passing at the time. He gave himself up quietly and said nothing. Moore used a sporting rifle for his murderous act.
 Mrs. King is a middle-aged woman and for some time has been separated from her husband.

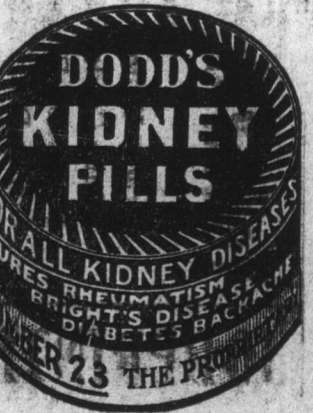

Reciprocity.

We republish in this issue an article on Reciprocity which appeared in The People. It will be observed that the writer is of opinion that it is of little importance to Newfoundland whether Canada gets reciprocity with the States, or whether Newfoundland gets it. The writer assumes that Newfoundland can—each and every fish cheaper than any other country, and that as Nova Scotia already buys 100,000 quintals a year from Newfoundland, the enhanced price that would result to Nova Scotian exporters would tend to force up the price of their purchases in Newfoundland.

It seems to be a fact that our Newfoundland bankers on the South Coast have done much better in catching fish than the bankers from Lunenburg and Gloucester, owing probably to the better facilities they enjoy in obtaining men for the fishery and in obtaining bait to catch fish. The latter advantage has resulted in the success they have achieved in recent years in the voyages they pay to the banks of the Labrador late in the summer and in the early fall when the stormy season which prevails on Grand Bank handicaps fishing there.

London, July 12.—The Royal Commission appointed a decade ago to study the relation between human and bovine tuberculosis have issued a voluminous report which briefly finds that man and man can be reciprocally infected, but that there is not sufficient evidence to show that bovine and human tuberculosis are identical. The bovine form, the report says, is constantly transmitted to children through milk but rarely to adults. The commission recommends a more stringent regulation with regard to milk and meat supplies.

Sa'oonless Nation by July 1920.

Atlantic City, N. J., July 11.—"If President Taft succeeds in winning his campaign for universal peace, he will win with it a place among the foremost statesmen of the world. It was during his first year of his administration," declared former Vice-President C. W. Fairbanks, before the Christian Endeavorers to-night.

Among the several resolutions introduced in the convention to-night and adopted, was one which provides for a country-wide anti-saloona campaign, the slogan of which will be "a saloonless nation by the first of July, 1920."

The convention this afternoon secured pledges of \$10,000 of the \$25,000 fund they expect to raise before the close of the meetings here to add to a fund of \$175,000 already secured for the International headquarters building at Boston.

Feet Fast in Mud Boy is Drowned.

New York, July 9.—While bathing in Newton Creek at the foot of Ten Eyck Street, Williamsburg, yesterday, Gottlieb Helper, eighteen years old, of No. 120 Knickerbocker Ave., was drowned when his feet became stuck in the mud. Helper leaped from the end of the pier. His feet became fastened in the mud and he was unable to free himself. His companions tried to reach him but failed, and shouted to persons on the pier.

In response to the call, Charles Miller, thirteen years old, of No. 133 Thames Street, jumped into the water, and, after a hard struggle, brought Helper to the surface. Helper was apparently unconscious and with the aid of Miller was dragged from the water to the pier. Vain efforts were made to revive the youth.

Matched to Fight.

Los Angeles, Calif., July 11.—Ad Wolgast, lightweight champion of the world, and Freddie Welsh, challenger, will meet in a 20-round fight for the title here on Thanksgiving Day. The terms accepted by the fighters from promoter T. J. McCarthy call for an unpublished amount for Wolgast, said to be \$35,000, and \$25,000 for Welsh. In addition, Wolgast will get 51 per cent of the receipts from moving pictures, and Welsh 49. There will be no side bet. The weight will be 132 pounds at ringside. The fight will be refereed by either Jack Welsh or Eddie Smith.

Real Tragedy Recorded on Film.

New York, July 12.—A real tragedy was recorded on the film of a moving picture machine here late yesterday. As Albert Breyer, actor and expert swimmer and diver, leaped from a boat on Staten Island Pond, the machine was set in operation to record his aquatic feat. His lens focused on the bubbling surface of the Pond where he had disappeared. The moments passed and the widening circles from the impact of his dive touched the shores. The diver's last feat had been caught on the film. He did not reappear and is supposed to have been held fast by the soft mud at the bottom. His body was grasped for and recovered.

By agreement between the two parties, Timothy Healey, K.C., Independent Nationalist, and John Muldoon, Nationalist, were returned for Parliament unopposed on Saturday for the North East and East divisions of Cork County, respectively.

State Dinner.
Dublin, July 10.—The King gave a state banquet at Dublin Castle to-night. The royal party was specially brought from London for the occasion. The guests included the Lord Mayor of Dublin.

Afterward the King held a chapter of the Order of St. Patrick, at which the Earl of Shaftesbury and Field Marshal Lord Kitchener were invested as extra knights companions.

Reciprocity.

A great deal of discussion has taken place lately in the daily press on the subject of Reciprocal trade between Newfoundland and the United States, more especially in its connection with the Reciprocity arrangement made between the President of the United States and the Government of Canada, which is now before the United States Senate and the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada. To our mind it will make but little difference to Newfoundland whether we get reciprocity or not, or whether Canada gets it or not. We must assume that Newfoundland is as able as, if not able than, any other fishing country to compete in the fish markets of the world. We boast of our splendid advantages as a cod fishing country, of our splendid advantages as a cod fishing country, of our exhausted banks so convenient of access and our unequalled bait supply, and it would ill fit in with our wide claim if we are not able to catch and cure fish, and cure it too in any way that the market may demand, cheaper than any other country. That being assumed, let us consider for a moment what, from the economic standpoint, ought to be the effect of a free entry of Canadian (or Nova Scotia) fish into the United States whilst ours was excluded by a tariff wall. It is obvious that for some years by the very law of inertia very little difference in supply or demand would result; prices would be enhanced, not necessarily to the full extent of the duty of 34 cents per cwt., but whatever advantage would accrue to Nova Scotia would proportionately attach to that part of her export which she now obtains from Newfoundland. Competition would force up the value of all suitable fish in Nova Scotia, and the enhanced price would extend to the purchases from this Colony. Nova Scotia buys in round numbers 100,000 qtls. of fish from Newfoundland, and a large portion of this is exported to United States markets including Porto Rico. It cannot be assumed that Nova Scotia's access to the States markets will give her any preponderant advantage in conducting her fisheries and it is therefore manifest that to meet the demands of her markets she cannot and will not lessen her reliance on Newfoundland. So that in the case we are supposing, that is of free entry of fish from Canada into the United States market, with a tariff in the United States against Newfoundland, Newfoundland cannot be injured but on the contrary advantaged to a certain extent.

We have no space in this issue to discuss the other possible positions, of Newfoundland obtaining the same Reciprocal arrangement as Canada, on similar terms, or of Newfoundland obtaining Reciprocity with the States, should it prove impracticable with Canada. But we feel sure that in either case Newfoundland's present position would not be much injured if it would not be improved.—The People.

SMALL POX VANISHING.—Small pox, so called, which had been very prevalent about the city during the late winter and early spring, has now completely vanished. Only three cases exist outside of St. John's—one at Little Bay West and two at Newtown, B.B. These patients are rapidly getting better, and it is hoped that all vestiges of the disease will soon have completely disappeared.

FIVE ARRESTED.—The police made five arrests last Saturday night, three being taken under warrant.


