As in the previous risis situation, the Government resorts to mystifying secrecy. The only information vouchsafed was an official statement issued this evening that the conference had adjourned un-

til to-morrow. With everybody concerned in the negotiations pledged to silence what changes to-morrow will bring cannot be predicted. One fact that stands out prominently is that Government intervention thus far has proved entirely futile, what expectations are now entertained, that the ruinous struggle will be speedily terminated is based on the hope that miners in increasing numbers will break away from the leaders and resume work. 


