

**That Wonderful Thing Called Sleep.**

"Oh dear, how I wish we didn't have to spend so much time in sleep!" said a strenuous young woman to me the other day. "If only we didn't have to go to bed at all, what a lot more we could accomplish and how splendid it would be."

Doubtless you have heard that wish before perhaps expressed it yourself. If so, you will probably be ready to put me down as lazy or queer when I confess that it is a truly terrible thought to me.

Like almost every mortal in this overcrowded day and generation, I have often been troubled by the pressure of more life than I had time to live, and I have often wished that the days might be longer, but I certainly would not wish them longer at the expense of doing away with night and sleep.

To regard the wonderful peace of night as merely a negative day, and that marvelous thing called sleep as an unfortunate waste of time, is truly typical of the impatient utilitarianism of to-day.

All life is alternation. Everywhere in the world we find twin forces combining to make the perfect whole. Ebb and flow, day and night, seed-time and harvest, positive and negative, labor and rest, male and female. So runs the eternal systole and diastole that keep the heart of the world beating.

To cut these twin-forces in two, to

Beach, and the services of Dr. Fairfield, who was fortunately in the vicinity, were hurriedly requisitioned. Giving directions for the sending to Hamilton for a palmtor and trained assistance, the physician set diligently to work upon the apparently lifeless body of the lad.

Hour after hour the doctor worked, his efforts augmented by the aid of the palmtor and two trained nurses, but seemed to obtain no result. Although life was by this time believed to be hopelessly extinct, physician and nurses continued their efforts. The boy was taken on board the steamer "Tussock" at 7:30 in the evening, accompanied by the indefatigable workers. On the vessel some three hours after he had been given up as dead the first indications of revival started and gladdened those who were still working and hoping against hope. The progress was rapid, and ere the vessel reached Toronto consciousness had been restored.

Although extremely weak, the boy's revival was assured. There were some 1,500 passengers on the Turbana, but few knew the grim battle which had been waged with death. On arrival in Toronto the Ellis ambulance, which had been summoned by long distance message to meet and remove what was expected to be a dead body, received rapidly reviving young patient in charge of a physician, two nurses and two maids, and took him direct to his home on Van Koughnet Street.

The Hector lad, whose remarkable experience has perhaps never before been paralleled, had his leg broken some time ago, and when he dived under the water a sudden cramp set in which tied his limbs and made him powerless. For a few moments he floated helplessly under the water, and then lost consciousness. He never rose to the surface, and remained at the bottom till the heroic efforts of young Blenkarn located him. Blenkarn had a hard struggle to raise the unconscious youth to the surface, and was much exhausted.

The Hector boy is a son of a widow, Mrs. Hector, who lives at 5 Van Koughnet Street with two younger sons. When interviewed at her home at 4 o'clock this morning she stated that the boy was resting quietly and Dr. Eby, the family physician, is in attendance. The pastor and Sunday school teacher of the lad followed him to his home and spent a portion of the night with him. The boy, who was the only member of the family at the picnic, was sleeping when the Globe representative went to his room to see him. Although still weak, he is apparently now quite out of danger.

Napoleon used to say, an army crawled on its stomach, and the fate of the Turkish army illustrated the truth of the saying. The Turkish commissariat broke down and the Turkish army collapsed, and the battles in the open resulted in a real debacle for Turkey.

Killed by Horse.

FURTHER PARTICULARS. From passengers who came in from Kelligrews to-day we learn that in the accident which occurred at Bell Island on Friday afternoon the victim was a lad named Patrick O'Flaherty, of Avondale, aged 8 years, who, while on the way to the beach with a string of caplin, started a horse which was grazing on the side of the public road and the animal kicked out, one of the hoofs striking the lad in the region of the heart. When he was picked up the lad was apparently lifeless, and on Dr. Ames being summoned, death was pronounced due to the shock sustained by the kick from the animal. The remains were taken to Avondale by the steamer on Monday for interment.

The Pitcher Case.

Mr. Brian Dunfield, on behalf of Mr. Herbert Pitcher, informs us that it is not correct, as we stated, that Mr. Herbert Pitcher "seized a heavy flat-iron and striking his brother with great force in the head inflicted two severe cuts," and that the affair "came near ending in the death of Frederick Pitcher." This latter statement was taken from the police charge. Mr. Frederick Pitcher was the aggressor and in the course of the quarrel, Mr. Frederick Pitcher fell and his head came into contact with an iron stand, used as a stand for a flat-iron, and a wound was inflicted, which Dr. Stanford states is consistent with a fall against the stand, but not with a striking with a flat-iron. The police case was called up on Tuesday and postponed in order that Mr. Herbert Pitcher might take out a cross summons. Meanwhile the parties settled their difference and the police withdrew the charge against Mr. Herbert Pitcher, which they found to be without foundation. ## 6,000

### Were Killed & Wounded in the Big Battle.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day. The condition of affairs following the Balkan rupture has been extraordinary. The twenty-four hours which the Bulgarian Government accorded to Greece and Serbia to cease operations has expired. During the same period, Bulgaria undertook to abstain from hostilities in order to give Russia time to intervene in favor of peace, but hostilities are being carried on both sides apparently with the ferocity characteristic of Balkan soldiers. No declaration of war has yet been made. The respective diplomatic representatives are still at their posts. There is now only the faintest hope that Russia or the Powers will be able to prevent the struggle which will decide whether or not Bulgaria shall be predominant in the Balkan confederation. The Servian Government issued no reports from the theatre of war, but according to a despatch to the Servian legation in London, the Servian losses in the first three days fighting amounted to six thousand killed and wounded. This included the great battle of Ovchakopolva. The Servians captured two thousand prisoners and three hundred guns from the Bulgarians. While casualties exceeded those of Serbia. Official reports issued in Athens, claim the capture of Gouggeli, a Kilkish after severe fighting and heavy losses. They declare the Bulgarians are preparing to attack Saloniki. According to a Berlin despatch to the Daily News, Bulgarian and Roumanian have accommodated their differences and reached an agreement by which Bulgaria is given a free hand against Serbia and Greece, but there is no confirmation of this statement. From other sources it is still unknown what course Roumania will take with her army of forty thousand men, will adopt.

ATHENS, To-day. A despatch to the Telegraph says the Greek Minister at Sofia has been recalled and the King will proclaim war to-day on the Bulgarians. The despatch adds the Bulgarians are retreating under the fire of the Greek artillery.

LONDON, To-day. Despatches from Athens announce that the Greeks have occupied Negralia to the North East of Saloniki, which they found burning; the inhabitants having been massacred by the Bulgarians.

Even the walking-stick or umbrella will act as part of a barometer. The handles before rain will reveal a slight deposit of moisture and be sticky to the touch. In this way the question whether it is the wisest to take a walking-stick or umbrella on leaving home will be settled for the observant person by an inspection of the articles themselves.—Tit-Bits.

## Cable News.

MONTREAL, To-day. The four day campaign to raise funds for the co-operative schemes of four Theological colleges affiliated with McGill University, proved successful. They set out to raise half a million dollars and were successful in raising \$526,250.

OTTAWA, To-day. The possibilities of developing the Hudson Bay into the large lucrative fishing industry will be investigated by Professor McCarthy, of King's College, Windsor, whom the Government is sending North with a hydrographic expedition. Professor McCarthy is a well known Biologist and believes the Bay and Strait is full of fish.

WASHINGTON, To-day. After three months tinkering with the Democratic tariff revision, at last it is on the way ready for launching in state, as the Underwood-Summers Bill democratic caucus of the Senate late yesterday, finally approved of the measure as revised by the Finance Committee. The final meeting of the caucus will be held on Saturday when the resolution to bind the Senators to its support will be presented and adopted.

## Dr. W. Morris.

In reference to Dr. Morris, the Daily News had a later message than the one we published yesterday. It is as follows:—

BOSTON, Mass., July 3. "A gentleman who gave the name of William Morris, and said that he was a San Domingo physician, was taken from a liner here yesterday in an exhausted condition. He told the officers that he was returning to St. John's, Newfoundland, from San Domingo, where he had been living for the last twelve years. He was reported to be seriously ill."

## Salmon Fishing.

At present there are more sportsmen up country fishing than at any previous season at this period. Salmon are reported to be plentiful at Salmonier and on the West Coast.

Quite a number of sportsmen are fishing at Codroy and are doing well. The captain and officers of H. M. S. Sirius are salmon fishing at Main Arm River, Bonne Bay. They are having excellent sport.

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

**NEW YORK, July 3.**

A cable from Vienna says that there is a general disposition to blame Russian assumption and bumptiousness for the Balkan tangle. The Czar's warning letter created a considerable amount of discussion.

**GENEVA, July 3.**

The casualties in Macedonia have been much greater than the published figures would indicate. The Serbian Red Cross Society has telegraphed the Swiss Red Cross for doctors and nurses. The message stating that 3,000 wounded had already been brought from the front.

**WASHINGTON, July 3.**

President and Mrs. Wilson have announced the engagement of their second daughter, Jessie Woodrow Wilson, to Francis Bowes Sayre, of Lancaster, Pa. The wedding will take place the last week in November, at the White House. Sayre is at present an attorney in the office of District Attorney Whitman, of New York.

**CHICAGO, July 3.**

Twenty-eight additional deaths occurred yesterday from heat, making Chicago's total for the last three days, 111. There were more than 5,000 prostrations, and of these victims many may not survive. Eighty-five babies have died here in the last three days of heat. 78 deaths are reported from various points in central and west Illinois. In one spot near the Union Station, horses fed exhausted to-day inside two hours. Seven of them were shot.

**MONTREAL, July 3.**

Grave fears are entertained that the entire crew of the barque Glenmark, from Norway, have lost their lives. The Glenmark, now a dangerous floating buoy, was boarded on June 27th by Capt. Griffiths, of the C.P.R. liner Montezuma, which arrived here this morning. The wreck was sighted 640 miles west of the Fastnet Lighthouse, lat. 50.57 north, long. 23.11 west. She is directly in the track of ocean liners, on her beam ends, mastless and sparsless.

**LONDON, July 3.**

News received at Saloniki of the fight at Cuyghell and of the passage of the Bulgarian Army through villages of the neutral zone, contains horrible details of the treatment meted out both to Serbian prisoners and to the population in these regions by the Bulgarians, who burned villages, and massacred many men, women and children. The Greek Army at Saloniki fear daily attacks inagrant violation of a sworn compact; whilst atrocities by the Bulgarians are general.

**LONDON, July 3.**

The Duke of Connaught's decision to resume his duties as Governor General for another year, appears to have been taken rather suddenly, and is owing to the King's express desire that his uncle should act as chaperon to the Prince of Wales, when he visits the Dominion next year. The physicians assured the Duke that he need have no fear that the health of the Duchess would be injured by her spending another year in Canada. She is now almost well, and has been taking drives daily in the West End.

**LONDON, July 3.**

King Constantine, of Greece, in a statement to the British public, stated that in spite of the agreement the Bulgarians had neglected to evacuate most points which they had promised to abandon. He says that ever since the occupation by the Bulgarian Army of the territories of Thrace and Macedonia, where the Greeks are in the majority, the population has suffered the harshest treatment. The Bulgarian Army has respected neither the property, the honor, nor the lives of the Greek population. After the flight of 40,000 Musulmans from Bulgarian horrors, the mass of them the Greek government was compelled to maintain for six months in Saloniki. It was now the turn of the Greek population to be in flight safety from the inhuman man tyranny of the Bulgarians.

Supreme Court.

(Before Mr. Justice Johnson.) Mr. Justice Johnson delivered judgment in suit of Hockens vs. Goodridge for the detention of the Ada Pearl during 30 days subsequent to the demurrage. Thos. Jefferson.



This is the 87th anniversary of the death of Thomas Jefferson, third President of the United States and composer of the popular hymn entitled the declaration of Independence. Mr. Jefferson composed this tune at the request of a large number of people who had grown tired of paying taxes without holding any of the offices, and every fourth of July some of its best words are inscribed by patriotic freemen.

Mr. Jefferson was born on a small Virginia farm of 1900 acres, which grew tobacco and slaves in great abundance. At the age of twenty-two he entered the law and proceeded to all of the offices that could be found in Virginia. In 1772 he married a charming young widow who paid taxes on 40,000 acres of land and 135 slaves, thus enabling Mr. Jefferson to devote all his time to composition. One of the best things he composed at this time was the Jeffersonian democracy, which later decomposed, but is now in good health. He was also the first man to put the classic phrase, "E Pluribus Unum," (which being translated means "One for All and a Hail for Each") on the silver dollar.

After serving five years as minister to France, which needed ministers as badly as anybody could, Jefferson was invited into President Washington's cabinet as secretary of state. Jefferson was quite highstrung in spots and on one occasion he referred to Washington as a boss and a standpat, after which he hurriedly retired from the cabinet. He then ran for the presidency, but lost by an eyelash to John Adams, who was glad to let go at the end of one term. Jefferson was then elected, and rounded out forty-four years of genteel office-holding with two terms in the White House.

Jefferson's greatest act while president was the purchase of about half of the American continent from Spain for \$15,000,000. Nobody but Jefferson would have given 15 cents for the Louisiana territory at that time, as it was inhabited mainly by the tenacious chigger and the swamp mosquito, but now Spain would be glad to trade back and throw in her army and navy to boot.

The Tragedy at Roseville.

ANOTHER DEATH—VICTIMS NUMBER SIX.

As far as can be learned the explosion at Roseville, Alexander Bay, occurred at a few minutes before 9 o'clock Wednesday, and the mill was demolished, pieces of it being thrown hundreds of yards away while the boiler and machinery about were shattered into fragments. Definite information as to the cause of the accident and details could not be had yesterday.

Hon. S. D. Blanford had the following message in the early afternoon:—"Mr. A. Rose's mill blown up yesterday. Mr. Rose, his son Jas. and two other men killed instantly. Another man, badly injured, died last night. A girl seriously scalded, died at 8 o'clock last night."

Another message received last night by private parties reads:—"James Whealan, the remaining victim of Wednesday's accident, died at 8 o'clock last night. The two Roses and two Whealans were buried to-day. Mrs. Rose is prostrated and very ill."

As a result of this awful accident six deaths have been recorded, and there is mourning all around the section where the awful affair happened. Mrs. Strong, a sister of Mr. Rose, who resides in St. John's, left here by the express last evening for the scene of the occurrence. Before she left she had a wire from Mrs. Rose stating that the bodies of the victims were blown into fragments and that it would be difficult to get them together for coffining.

The Babstock girl was not one of the regular employees of the mill but lived near, and when the explosion occurred was hit by the flying fragments and terribly injured. She, as well as her father, belongs to Happy Adventure, T. B., and both bodies will be brought home to-day for burial.

Mrs. Rose, wife of the deceased Alexander Rose, received such a terrible shock as the outcome of the awful affair that she is since ill, and there is mourning all around the section where the awful affair happened. Mr. Patrick Breen, of Bambrick St., has been in Roseville for several months past doing the work of a clerk for the proprietor of the mill. It will be remembered that a few weeks ago Mr. Rose saved this lad's life when he and a companion were drowning by the overturning of their boat. Mrs. Rose is a cousin of Mrs. Breen, and when the latter heard the news Wednesday evening she concluded her boy had been killed and as a result was in a terrible way until she received the following message yesterday:—


