

Civic Board Meet.

MOTOR CAR AND THEATRE TAX PROPOSED TO MEET INRCEASED EXPENDITURE- TARVIA TURN-

The regular weekly session of the Municipal Council was held last night, the full Board attending. An unusual amount of business came up for discussion, principally the Resolutions submitted by the Mayor at the previous meeting respecting proposed increased taxation for the purpose of being able to meet increased expenditure, namely, the raising of the pay of

Council employees. Tarvia paving came in for a share of animated debate and it looks now as if a revolution has taken place. Last year the people were opposed to Tarvia and the Civic Board were strongly in favor of it. Now the public are singing out for Tarvia and the

Council has turned it down. The Colonial Secretary wrote that the filling in of a dump near the R. N. Co.'s station be left with the Government and City Engineers. The Colonial Secretary stated in another communication that the Government had given the Royal Bank of Canada a loan for \$4,000 with which to purchase rolling machinery for street purposes. The Engineer reported, as instructed, that certain sheds in the West End were undesirable and in contravention of the law. Councillor Mullaly moved and Councillor Tait seconded that they : be torn down. The motion was lost and Councillor Mullaly said it was proof of more discrimination. The Newman building was ordered down a; wook ago, despite the fact that seven families depended on the work done

there for support. The Mayor then addressed the meet-

In submitting the proposals for taxation under the Charter, for additions o the tax on motor cars, and for a heatre ticket tax, I would like to ex-

The City Tax which according to the Charter is to be paid by the owners of the property, will take the place of the water and sewerage rates now paid jointly by owners and occupier. The present combined rate is 111/4 per cent. The new rate is 121/2 per cent less 10% which is exactly the same. The Ground Landlord's Tax is slightly higher, being 5% less 10 per cent; or 41/2 per cent., compared to 33/4

now paid. The Stock Tax is slightly increased, being 20 cents per \$100.00 less 10 per cent, or 18 cents, instead of 15 cents now paid.

The Vacant Land Taxes are the

The general taxation of the City is therefore practically unaltered. We have, however, to face an expeditunre for increased payments to the City employees upon which we did not calculate at the beginning of the year. It has arisen because of war conditions, and will continue while the war lasts. After the war is over there will be a gradual re-adjustment to a lower level of both the prices of com-

modities and the wages paid to labour. I look upon the increased wages we have to pay as temporary, and I therefore think temporary means can be taken to raise the additional revenue. At this time, I think that anyone who can afford to run a motor car can afford to pay a higher tax. The \$10.00 or \$25.00 additional paid by each

motor owner is nothing in the cost of running a car. The increase of 50% in this tax will give the City about \$2,000.00.

The same argument applies to theatre goers. If they can afford the amusement they can afford the extra tax, and it seems to me a fitting way to raise an extra tax in war times. I notice that similar taxes have been or are proposed to be levied in many

It is impossible to find a tax to which some one will not object, and I feel sure that the majority of citizens will agree that the additions we propose are fair and reasonable under the circumstances.

A special meeting will be held next week to further consider the matter. Mr. Manning, representing the Canadian Tarvia Company, submitted a list of names of thirty-two people who had expressed their willingness to contribute proportionately towards the proposed extension of tarvia pavement on Duckworth Street. Councilfor Vinnicombe proposed, seconded by Councillor Tait that the work be done, following the passing of the New Charter. The motion was supported by Councillor Morris and objected to by Councillor Mullay, Brownrigg and Ayre. The Mayor gave his casting vote against the motion.

After the disposal of a number of minor matters the meeting adjourned at 10.30 p.m.







Volunteer" Makes Another Appeal

For the Men of Our Fire Brigade.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-As the columns of The Evening Telegram have been at all times at the disposal of those who champion the cause of justice and fair play, I feel confident not only of obtaining that privilege to endeavor to arouse public interest in the unfair manner in which our Firemen are being treated, but also your valuable assistance in the matter. It is a downright shame the way the men of our Fire Brigade are being treated and I feel that the community are as much to blame by its indifference as those in authority, for it seems that public opinion is as dead as Julius Caesar or a public demand would have been made long ago to obtain a living wage for those men who, at the risk of their lives protect the citizens and their property when fire threatens their destruction. I have written a score of letters on the subject within the past two years, and not only that but have kept at it hammer and tongs day in and day out talking to members of the Government and members of the Council on the matter until I have almost despaired of doing any good. Just imagine that at this time when provisions, coal, clothing and house rent have jumped up in price to an enormous extent, the firemen are receiving the paltry pay of forty dollars a month. Think of it you who are getting grey trying to make both are getting gray trying to make both ends meet. Think, I say, of the position of our firemen who have to eke out a miserable existence on forty dollars a month. Can you not use your power and influence to get a fair show for those brave fellows who at dead of night in all weathers risk their lives to protect you, your family and your belongings. You insurance men, what are you doing? Are you content to sit back and see those brave fellows receive this miserable pay without interesting yourselves one iota to obtain a decent wage. Where, oh where is the justice to mankind that we hear so much talk about? You clergymen, what of your powerful influence? Can you not come forward and try to influence the "Powers that be" to give the firemen a decent increase in their wages? You business men with large interests at stake, can not you do something to arouse a feeling of justice that will demand and obtain a square deal for those men? Every citizen should feel it his duty to bestir himself and do his level best to make the Government sit up and take notice of the cruel treatment handed out to our fire fighters. If this community would do its duty we would have decent pay for the firemen long ago. But simply because these men are in a position where they must remain unheard, the crime is permitted to go on day by day, and no one seems to care two straws whether they get a fair salary or not. Once more I make an urgent appeal for these men and I ask every man and woman who reads this letter to help me to bring force enough to bear upon those in authority to wipe this grievance off the slate. Think of it-forty dollars a month; ask yourself is it going to continue, and let me ask you if you are going to use your influence to better the condition of the firemen without any more delay. 
