This creation comprises Blouse Pattern 2044 and Skirt Pattern 2045. Both Patterns are cut in 3 sizes: 16, 18 and 20 years. Size 16 will require 3 yards of 44-inch material for the waist, and 2½ yards for the skirt, which measures 2¾ yards, at the foot.

Revolution "Rot" About Germany

A FEW FACERS.
By D. THOMAS CURTIN
Author of "The Land of the Deceitful Shadow."

You have seen pictures of the deportees bending beneath the man lash. If you have a mental picture of the masses of German, somewhat similar relative position to their authorities, get rid of it. It is not a real picture, it is a mirage. The idea that the German people are a down-trodden mass, is against their wishes to take arms and continuing to use them simply because a few men known as the Government, wish they shall do so, is in direct contradiction to the facts of the case. I grant that the Germans are distressingly sick of the war. As a result and happy means of building a Teutonic world-empire it has not met up to expectations. The majority of Germans, however, are not dissatisfied with their Government because of "But what of those violent speeches in the Reichstag?" you may say. "Don't they show a dangerous content and prove that the German people are against their form of government?"

There are 387 deputies in the Reichstag. Of these only 18 (less than 5 per cent.) are openly ardent supporters of the war policy. They constitute the Social Democratic Minority; it is their speeches, together with an occasional one from the Social Democratic majority, which make such pleasant reading in certain sections of the United Press. More people read these speeches in England than in Germany where for the most part they are made to empty benches, printed or even there in unobtrusive parliamentary type without "feature" headlines since those must be reserved, as all other papers, for German readers. Furthermore, they are read by soldiers, as the military officers are extremely sharp in detecting anything that may prove injurious to the helmeted mind.

The Social Democratic Majority, though keeping an eye on election reform, are solidly behind the machine. In fact, were I not sure of their party affiliations, I should have mistaken some of them for whom I talked for dyed-in-the-wool conservatives. Most of them display the customary German weakness, prostrating themselves at the feet of the men higher up if they show a little personal consideration. A few of them have been as willful as a mule over a conquering Napoleon and as the most sabre-rattling of the war. One of them, who in 1914 told me that he would open the Reichstag as long as he lived, committed me after three months of war to his kind were wrong in using the military form of government. "Look at France," he said.

Fighting the Submarine.

It has taken the Allies, including among them the British and French armies, three months to realise that the submarine campaign is the most important branch of the whole war. Sweeping military victories on the West front may enable the British and French armies to drive the Germans back to their own country, but such victories cannot be won in days or weeks. They would require far more time than the submarines would need, at the rate of destruction attained by them during the last month, effectively to paralyse the nerve system of supply behind them. On the other hand, it is clearly recognised that a victory over the submarine, complete enough to reduce its activities to a position of minor importance, would be a complete victory over Germany. In the words of the Scientific American, which has been uttering grave warnings over the extent of the danger, "The imminent thing is the submarine menace. Of this there can be no doubt whatever. Upon its success or failure depends the length of the war. The spirit and resistance of the German people will rise or fall with the rise or fall of the total ships destroyed. The total of the people are turned more to the U-boats than to their armies. A defeat of Tripitz would bring deeper dependency just now, than a retreat of the Hindenburg armies." The Germans have in truth staked all on this last throw, but the odds of success are far greater than the Allies believed when they made it.

It is comforting to remark that for the past week the enemy has reason to feel his spirits fall. The total number of British ships sunk is not much smaller than for the previous week, but the difference of fourteen larger ships should stand for a great reduction of tonnage lost, even allowing for the nine extra smaller ships added to the toll. Still more comforting will be if this diminution is the result of the new methods or system of defence about which so many dark hints have been dropped. If it is the proof should soon be discernible in a steady maintained decrease until the peril is well in hand.

We should not be too sanguine, however. The paper we mention states that Germany can probably build with ease twelve hundred submarines a year, and is almost certainly concentrating every resource of her navy and shipbuilding to that end. More destruction, therefore, of submarines or replacing of sunken ships will not meet the need. What is wanted before everything else is some defence of merchant ships, as nearly automatic as possible, which will render them safe from the invisible torpedo and force the attacking submarine to come to the surface and engage in a combat of guns in which it is nearly always at a disadvantage. So far the problem seems to have baffled human ingenuity and it may be that it is insoluble. The Allies appear to be placing their reliance in the extension and perfection of the methods already known and used, but there may yet arise some unknown Edison who will supply the idea that is wanted. He will achieve a fame greater than any man has yet enjoyed, for he will end the war.

YOUR OWN INTERRUPTION.

And it was true.

As I went back into my study I reflected guiltily upon the matter and came to that conclusion.

Other people's interruption I resent bitterly. My own I am ever ready to forgive.

Why are we like that?

We Are Never Aggrieved When We Interrupt Ourselves.

You see, I refuse to admit that that is a personal peccadillo. I think the average human being has this propensity to feel aggrieved at the loss of working time when someone else wants him to do something and perfectly complaisant when he wastes his own time.

I have known the Authorman to spend hours pleasantly putting about his study and then become righteously indignant and call on the gods to witness that he cannot be expected to get anything done when his wife wants him to move a piece of furniture into the attic.

Why is it?

Well, of course it's natural to a certain degree.

So That There Won't Be Any Mix-Ups.

If anyone gave as much time to other people's concerns as he did to his own, what would become of his

own? Someone else might attend to them and then again might not.

I suppose nature gave each of us the instinct to look out for ourselves first so that there wouldn't be any mix-up and each one would get looked out for. I don't mean that to sound quite as selfish as it does. Altruism is the greatest of all virtues, to my mind. And yet I can understand why we aren't by nature altruistic.

Moreover it is a law of human nature that anything you do of your own accord is play and anything you do for someone else is work.

The Difference Between Work and Play.

Painting the fence was work to Tom Sawyer because his father had told him he had to do it. It was play to the boys whom that consummate student of character inveigled into doing it for him because he made them want to do it.

Of course anyone who has those twin gifts, a sense of logic and a sense of humor will laugh at himself when he finds himself resenting other people's interruptions and permitting his own.

**WAR MISSION COMPLETES ITS
WORK.**

WASHINGTON, To-day.
The British War Mission conference here are about concluded and they will leave to-morrow for New York to join the French Mission for the joint reception to be given them by the American financial capital, and practically with the whole body of Russian (?) statesmen will make the trip on a special train. The distinguished visitors, tired out by three weeks of conferences here, are looking forward to the remainder of their stay in the United States as largely a period of relaxation. They will return to Washington on Sunday night, and later will take a short trip into the Middle West and Canada. Most of their work here is done, though there still remains a number of questions on which American officials desire information. The members of the Mission who will go to New York include Balfour, Lieut.-Gen. Bridges, Rear-Admiral Sir Dudley R. S. De Chair, Sir Ernace Drummond, Ian Malcolm, Colonel Heron and Sir Hardman Lever. They will be accompanied by Sir Cecil Spring Rice, the British Ambassador, Sir Thos. White, Canadian Minister of Finance and a delegation representing the State, War and Navy Departments, headed by William Phillips, Assistant Secretary of State.

THE NEW M.P.

LONDON, To-day.
James McGinness, the newly elected member of the Commons for Longford, is serving a three years' sentence in Lewis Prison, being convicted in connection with the Dublin rebellion last year.

OPPOSE COALITION GOVERNMENT

LONDON, To-day.
A Renter despatch from Moscow says that the local executive committee of the Workmen and Soldiers' delegates opposed the idea of a coalition government and advocates the immediate summoning to an all Russian Congress of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates.


RUSSKY REMOVED.

PETROGRAD, To-day.
General Ruskky has been removed from the chief command of the army on the northern front. He remains, however, a member of the Council of War.

COMMONS HOLD SECRET SESSION

LONDON, To-day.
An official report of the secret session issued to-night says that Winston Churchill opened the discussion and dealt with the general military situation with special reference to the position of Russia, the development of the strength of the United States and the questions arising out of the submarine attacks. The loss in personnel and material was commented on and the general diplomatic situation in the Balkans discussed. Suggestions were made for meeting the submarine danger. Further information was asked concerning marine losses and food supplies. General Henry Page-Croft and George James Wardle continued the debate. The Premier dealt fully with the points Churchill raised. He commented upon the internal situation in Austria and the military position of Germany in respect of her reserves, contrasting it unfavorably with our own. He cited the opinions of the British and French military chiefs and their satisfaction at the results of the recent combined efforts on the western front. The Premier then explained how it was proposed to satisfy the War Office demands for further reserves and also gave figures of the British tonnage sunk month by month since last August, and gave an encouraging account of the methods adopted against submarine attacks. He announced the figures of the new tonnage which could and would be (launched?) and pointed out that with judicious economy in consumption and increased productivity of home supplies we need be in no alarm as to starvation, and that in 1918 we should be self-supporting. Herbert Asquith, former Premier, who followed Lloyd George, expressed full agreement with the Premier, but deprecated the secrecy of the sitting, in which, he affirmed, hardly anything had been said which could not have been said openly. He concluded by inviting the Premier to publish to the country the greatest part of his speech.

**AUSTRIA MAY SEND PEACE
VOYS.**

LONDON, To-day.
An Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co. wires that he has learned from the best sources that three prominent Austrians are about to leave for Switzerland bearing peace proposals and that they hope to be given safe conduct to France, in order to discuss with the French Cabinet the possibility of peace.

JOFFRE TO VISIT OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, To-day.
Marshal Joffre of France will visit Montreal on Sunday. M. Viviani will be in Ottawa on Saturday. The Commons will sit on Saturday in honor of the visit of the French statesmen. The information was conveyed to Sir Geo. Foster, acting Premier, to-night. Balfour and the members of the British Mission are expected in the capital shortly.

TROUBLE BREWING IN RUSSIA.

LONDON, To-day.
A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Express says "Maxim Gorky's anti-British outbursts and assertions that Dr. Paul Milukoff, Russian Foreign Minister, is in the pay of the Anglo-French capitalists, daily mark the columns of his newspaper. The new line foreshadows another political crisis in which the Council of Workmen's and Soldiers' delegates will endeavour to retrieve their positions. The Council is very angry at the course of recent events."

**SAYS COLONIES ARE BRITAIN'S
ALLIES.**

LONDON, To-day.
Lord Derby, Secretary of State for War, speaking at South Kensington, to-day, said that it would be underestimating the number to say that we had eleven Allies, because we could no longer look upon the Commonwealth and Dominions as simply dependents of Great Britain. They were the firmest Allies any country could have. What kept them together? Not Downing Street, or the politicians. Politicians come and go. What did keep them together was the monarchy and the king to whom this country and our dependencies look, and rightly, as the proper heads of a great country.

GREAT GERMAN LOSSES.

PARIS, To-day.
Four fresh German divisions have been observed on the Aisne front since May 7th, says an official summary of operations from May 4th to 6th. The statement adds this is irrefutable proof of how rapidly these effectives are being used up. The German losses in these three days exceeded all estimates.

ZEEBRUGGE BOMBARDED.

AMSTERDAM, To-day.
English airplanes bombarded Zeebrugge early this morning. At the same time a flotilla of torpedo boats was observed from Flushing bombarding the Belgian Coast. The torpedo boat action referred to in the foregoing despatch is presumably identical.

NORWEGIANS SUNK OFF SPAIN.

LONDON, To-day.
The Norwegian steamers Tiger and DeKanger have been sunk by German submarines ten miles off the northwest coast of Spain, according to information received here. The submarines halted the steamer in Spanish waters and escorted them beyond the territorial limit, where they were sunk.

SUBMARINE POSITION IMPROVING

PARIS, To-day.
Both the French and British statistics on the submarine sinkings during the last week show a certain improvement in the situation, says Marcel Hutin, a usually well informed writer on the subject. He adds: "I understand that our means of fighting submarines is increasing daily, and without giving details I can say that the number of submarines put out of action in the last few days has risen in a very satisfactory manner."

**BULGARIANS SAY ATTACKS RE-
PULSED.**

LONDON, To-day.
Further assaults along practically the entire Bulgarian line in Macedonia by the Allied forces are reported in a long and detailed Bulgarian official report issued on Thursday. The report claims the repulse of all attacks, but says that the most violent artillery action is proceeding day and night in the neighborhood of Makova, about 12 miles northeast of Monastir. The Bulgarians say that a vigorous attack was opened after a heavy bombardment but collapsed with heavy losses. It was followed by another attack which, the report says, was completely shattered. Further to the east the Allies assaulted the Bulgarian lines in the direction of Stravina and Cradeshtitsa, but all the attacks, according to Sofia, were repulsed.

FRENCH PROGRESS.

PARIS, To-day.
French troops captured a German position in the region of Chevreux yesterday, according to the official statement issued by the War Office to-day. Heavy counter attacks by the Germans were repulsed.

**TROUBLE AMONG THE TROUBLE-
SOME.**

PETROGRAD, To-day.
Twelve members of the Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates, including the President, have gone to Schlessenburg to cope with the situation created by the District Committee in declaring itself an autonomous unit.

SAYS RUSSIA IS LOYAL.

PETROGRAD, To-day.
Thursday being the anniversary of the first Duma, an extraordinary session of Delegates and ex-Delegates was held at the Tauridaurite Palace. Members of the Provisional Government and Foreign Diplomats were also present. Prolonged applause greeted a speech by President Rodzianko in which he repudiated any idea of a separate peace. There was an enthusiastic demonstration later on when he proclaimed the loyalty of Russia towards her Allies.

ANXIOUS OUTLOOK.

LONDON, To-day.
The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily News, discussing the question of a coalition ministry in Russia, foresees the possibility that its creation may actually lead to dual authority instead of avoiding it.

CHINA REJECTS RESOLUTION.

PEKIN, To-day.
After a riotous secret session lasting to three on Thursday night, the House of Representatives refused to pass the Resolution declaring war on Germany.

THE MISSION IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, To-day.
The British War Commission, headed by Minister Balfour, will arrive in this city at 2.30 this afternoon. They will land at the Battery and the programme that attended the arrival of the French Commission will be followed. The British Commission will be escorted to the City Hall

where the Mayor will receive them, and then to the Governor's room in the City Hall, and speeches by Mayor Joseph Choate and Mr. Balfour, after which the visitors will be escorted by mounted policemen to the residence of Vincent Astor. Mr. Astor will be the host of the British envoys during their short visit.

THE DESTROYER ENGAGEMENT.

AMSTERDAM, To-day.
A German torpedo boat was badly hit in the battle between German and British destroyers early yesterday morning, according to a Flushing correspondent of the Telegraph. The correspondent says that a very hot battle took place near the North Hinder Light Ship. Great flames were visible and firing could be heard in Flushing and elsewhere in Holland. The Germans passed North Hinder at great speed at about 4.20 o'clock, the British pursuing and both sides firing rapidly. One of the German boats was seen to be severely injured. The British followed their quarry until near a mine field off the Flemish coast, the Germans taking refuge in Zeebrugge. All Thursday night fire signals were being sent up from Zeebrugge and the searchlights were flashing continuously.

STORMY SCENE IN PEKING.

PEKING, To-day.
The House of Parliament was surrounded by a mob which demanded war, making threats of violence. Under the orders of Premier Tuan Chi Jui, troops finally dispersed the mob. The Premier addressed the House urging a declaration of war. He was denounced by the mob, the press opposed to the war party urging Parliament to resist the military pressure on the ground that it threatens the Republic.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

HOSPITAL SHIPS SUNK.

LONDON, May 10. Two further hospital ships have been torpedoed by German submarines since British airplanes raided the town of Freiburg as reprisal for the previous sinking of hospital ships. Andrew Bonar Law, member of the British War Council announced to-day in the Commons.

IN MACEDONIA.

LONDON, May 10. Attacking on a front of about four miles in the Lake Doiran region, in Macedonia, British troops on one wing took Teutonic Allied trenches on a front of two miles and on the other flank advanced on a front of about a mile, according to the official statement from the Macedonian front, issued to-night. The communication, which is dated Salonika, Wednesday, says: After artillery preparation lasting several days, our troops attacked the enemy's trenches from a point southwest of Lake Doiran on a front of about four miles. On the left we captured the enemy's trenches on a front of two miles and advanced our line to an average depth of five hundred yards. We consolidated these new positions and during the night we captured the enemy's trenches between the Lake and Petit Nonne on a front of about a mile. The enemy however, heavily counter attacked our new position on this part of the front, and after determined hand-to-hand fighting, in which our troops inflicted severe losses, they were forced back by superior numbers on their own trenches. Bombing raids by airplanes on enemy tents, sheds and transports caused much damage. One and a half tons of explosives were attacked with good effect.

BRITISH PROGRESS.

LONDON, May 10 (Official). Further reports show that the fighting in the neighborhood of Bullecourt yesterday was severe and continuous. We made progress in spite of repeated and costly efforts on the part of the enemy to shake our hold on his positions, none of which met with success. During the night our line was advanced by local fighting east of Griecourt and south of the Souchez River, where we captured a portion of the enemy's front support lines with a number of prisoners. Hostile

raiding parties were driven off last night, northeast of Givenchy les Basse.

The official from the British Headquarters in France to-night reads: We advanced our line slightly during the morning on the south bank of the Scarpe. At noon to-day under cover of a heavy bombardment the enemy renewed his attack upon our positions on the Hindenburg line east of Bullecourt. His attack was completely repulsed by our troops. Further hostile counter attacks delivered during the night near Fresnoy were equally unsuccessful. A part of the enemy raided our trenches early this morning southeast of Ypres. A few of our men are missing. There was again heavy air fighting yesterday. Six German machines were put out of control. Five of our airplanes have not returned.

NAVAL PROGRAMME.

LONDON, May 10. During a discussion of the shipping problem in the Lords to-day, Earl Curzon said the Admiralty had the first claim and the first call on the national shipbuilding resources. The result of the British naval program, he stated, would be that after the war Britain's naval tonnage would exceed the naval tonnage of all other nations of the world. In the Commons, where the tonnage question also was under discussion, Sir Leo G. Chinoza Money, representing the Shipping Controller, informed the House that 92 per cent. of the total available tonnage had been placed at the disposal of the Food Controller, War Office, Admiralty and the Minister of Munitions, leaving only eight per cent. for other uses in conveying commodities.

DESTROYERS IN ACTION.

LONDON, May 10. A destroyer action, in which four British destroyers pursued eleven German destroyers to within range of the land batteries of Zeebrugge, is announced by the Admiralty. One enemy destroyer was hit. The text of the Admiralty statement reads: A scouting force consisting of light cruisers and destroyers from Harwich, under Commodore Tyrwhitt, while cruising between the Dutch and English coasts this morning, sighted a force of eleven German destroyers at about four o'clock, Greenwich time, parallel with her course and to the southward. Our forces immediately closed, and on our opening fire the enemy at once made off at full speed southward under cover of a dense smoke screen. The chase continued for an hour and twenty minutes, and the enemy was engaged at long range but our force was unable to overtake them. Four British destroyers chased eleven German destroyers to within range of the guns and batteries of

Zeebrugge. Our casualties were one man slightly wounded. Enemy destroyers were seen to be hit by our fire.

ON THE SERBIAN FRONT.

LONDON, May 10. The Serbian official dated May 9, reports artillery duels along the whole Serbian front. The Bulgarians again bombarded Monastir with asphyxiating shells, the statement adds, and a number of civilians were killed.

HUNS REPULSE ATTACKS.

BERLIN, May 10. A British local attack at Bullecourt says the official issued this evening, and a French attack northeast of Fresnoy were repulsed.

GERMANY AND FOODSTUFFS.

LONDON, May 10. Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of Blockade, stated in the Commons to-day that the British Government had no reason to believe any American foodstuffs or feeding stuffs would be passed by neutral countries into Germany. The question of the conditions under which the import of American supplies by neutrals would be permitted in future, he added, would receive the closest attention by the United States Government.

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE PRESIDENT MENCOCAL.

HAVANA, May 10. An attempt was made last night to assassinate President Mencocal, of Cuba, by means of a bomb explosion. Nine arrests were made before the conspirators could carry out their plan.

REPORT DENIED.

BERLIN, May 10. The report that recently an attempt was made to assassinate the Emperor, is denied officially in a statement made to-day.

SLIGHT PROGRESS.

LONDON, May 10. Progress was made by the British last night in the neighborhood of Bullecourt, east of Griecourt, and south of the Souchez River, says to-day's official announcement.

GERMANS HOLD FRESNOY.

BERLIN, May 10. Fresnoy is completely in our hands, says an official statement.

SINN FEINER ELECTED.

LONDON, May 10. Joseph McGuinness, Sinn Feiner, was elected to the House of Commons for the Southern Division of Longford, Ireland. The figures were: McGuinness, Sinn Feiner, 1,498; McKenna, Nationalist, 1,461.

GERMAN REPRISALS.

BERLIN, May 10. Official statement: In reprisals for placing a German General and fifteen staff officers on French hospital ships, German authorities have placed thrice this number of French officers at points especially subject to aerial attacks.

THE WAR SITUATION.

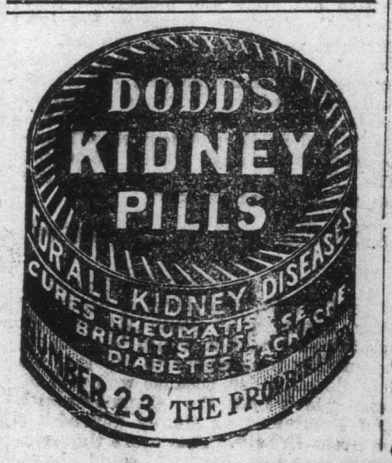
LONDON, May 10. The recent partial success of the Germans at Fresnoy on the Arras front in France, has not upset the British plans of operation, nor has it caused surprise, said Major-General Frederick B. Maurice, Chief Director of military operations at the war office, in his weekly statement to-day. As a matter of fact, the General added, the British staff has been surprised that the Germans have not succeeded before in making gains in view of the tremendous counter attacks which they have been hurling against the British front. Large bodies of Teutons continually have been sent against the British over open ground, without any apparent regard for casualties, but the British have held their line, when it might have been expected they would give way, and have inflicted heavy losses on their opponents. The Germans have hurled great reserves into the Arras conflict, employing people from Belgium and other conquered territory to release more Germans for military service. The British forced the Germans to use up twice as many reserves as were employed in the Somme offensive, which ranks next to the present one in magnitude. The Germans claimed that by their so-called strategic retreat they inflicted great defeat on the British with respect to their plans and that the Teutons held the situation in their own hands. Let me point again to the fact that the British plans for the Arras offensive were completed in February, before the German retreat began. Despite the German claims, we have continued our offensive, according to plans prepared during that month. Since the offensive began we have taken twice the amount of prisoners, four times the amount of ground, five times the number of guns taken in the Somme offensive. The British and French between them have captured fifty thousand prisoners, and 450 guns. If this is the result of defeat, then we are willing to go on being defeated. We have kept on going and we are going to keep on going. The Arras offensive is much bigger than the Somme. Our next offensive will be bigger than the Arras. Regarding the German casualties it is impossible of course to give figures, but there is no disputing the fact that they have been terrible, incomparably

larger than ours. General Maurice was asked whether the Germans appeared to have withdrawn troops from the eastern front for use in the west. He replied there was no indication of this. On being asked whether the Russian crisis was causing any uneasiness in military circles, he said, naturally there must be some uneasiness until the new Government is firmly on its feet.

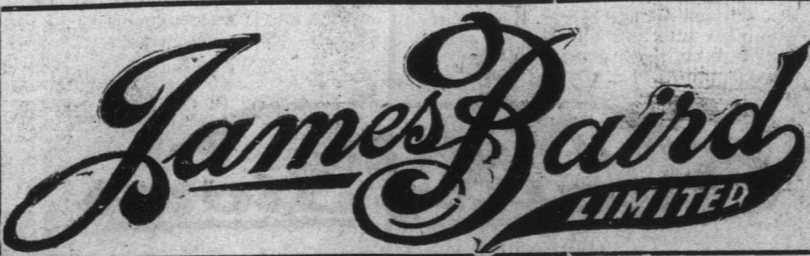

"Volunteer" Makes Another Appeal

For the Men of Our Fire Brigade.
Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—As the columns of the Evening Telegram have been at all times at the disposal of those who champion the cause of justice and fair play, I feel confident not only of obtaining that privilege to endeavor to arouse public interest in the unfair manner in which our Firemen are being treated, but also your valuable assistance in the matter. It is a downright shame the way the men of our Fire Brigade are being treated and I feel that the community are as much to blame by its indifference as those in authority, for it seems that public opinion is as dead as Julius Caesar or a public demand would have been made long ago to obtain a living wage for those men who, at the risk of their lives protect the citizens and their property when fire threatens their destruction. I have written a score of letters on the subject within the past two years, and not only that but have kept at it hammer and tongs day in and day out talking to members of the Council on the matter until I have almost despaired of doing any good. Just imagine that at this time when provisions, coal, clothing and house rent have jumped up in price to an enormous extent, the firemen are receiving the paltry pay of forty dollars a month. Think of it you who are getting grey trying to make both ends meet. Think, I say, of the position of our firemen who have to eke out a miserable existence on forty dollars a month. Can you not use your power and influence to get a fair show for those brave fellows who at the dead of night in all weathers risk their lives to protect you, your family and your belongings. You insurance men, what are you doing? Are you content to sit back and see these brave fellows receive this miserable pay without interesting yourselves one iota to obtain a decent wage. Where, oh where is the justice to mankind that we hear so much talk about? You clergymen, what of your powerful influence? Can you not come forward and try to influence the "Powers that be" to give the firemen a decent increase in their wages? You business men with large interests at stake, can you not do something to arouse a feeling of justice that will demand and obtain a square deal for those men? Every citizen should feel it his duty to bestir himself and do his level best to make the Government sit up and take notice of the cruel treatment handed out to our fire fighters. If this community would do its duty we would have decent pay for the firemen long ago. But simply because these men are in a position where they must remain unheard, the crime is permitted to go on day by day, and no one seems to care two straws whether they get a fair salary or not. Once more I make an urgent appeal for these men and I ask every man and woman who reads this letter to help me to bring force enough to bear upon those in authority to wipe this grievance off the slate. Think of it—forty dollars a month; ask yourself is it going to continue, and let me ask you if you are going to use your influence to better the condition of the firemen without any more delay.

Don't be this kind for the sake of your children and progression. Accept things as they are and try to adjust yourself to the trend of the times.

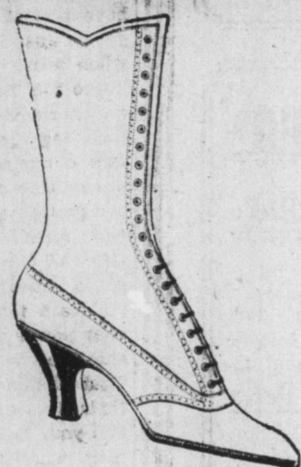

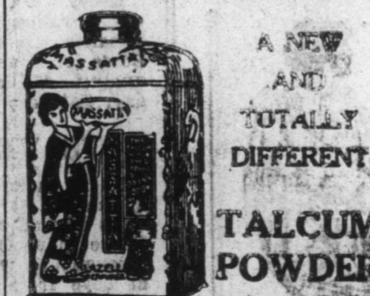
