

The situation as regards the Irish

Convention, which body after further liscussion yesterday of the report of its Grand Committee adjourned till to-day, is at a very critical stage, and according to the view current here, the prospects of even a modified form of substantial agreement have receded. The hope of an agreement taking in all Ireland, including Ulster, has been virtually abandoned, as the Ulster Unionist papers, which are believed to be acquainted with the sentiments of the leading Ulster representatives, have replied to recent urgent demands of the London press or an agreement by the declaration: We can't and won't be ruled by a Dublin Parliament. 


