TWO BRITISH DESTROYERS LOST
HEAVY LOSS OF LIFE.
LONDON, Jan. 17.
The British Admiralty announces two torpedo boat destroyers were lost in the violent gale and heavy snow storm of last night. The vessels ran ashore on the Scotch coast and were totally wrecked and all hands aboard were lost, except one man.

AUSTRIANS MAKE DESPERATE ATTACKS.
ROME, Jan. 17.
The Austrians yesterday made desperate and prolonged attempts to recapture positions taken Monday by the Italians east of Capo Sile on the Lower Piave front. The war office announced that the Austrians were repulsed leaving 119 prisoners in the hands of the Italians, while the battlefield was covered with enemy dead and with more than six hundred rifles.

GARFIELD'S ORDER POSTPONED.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.
Fuel Administrator Garfield's drastic order restricting the use of fuel which is effective at midnight tonight was promulgated shortly before 6 o'clock. Within a few minutes after the Senate adopted a resolution asking that the order be postponed for five days. Officially the resolution was 50 to 19. Virtually no substantial changes were made in the order though some war industries specially designated will be exempted from the provision of closing manufacturing plants for five days, beginning to-morrow, and for Monday holidays during the next ten weeks.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.
In a statement to-day detailing the plight of the railroads and the expected relief which the federal fuel order should bring in clearing the freight congestion, A. H. Smith, Assistant Director General of the Interstate Commerce Commission, said that the fuel shortage in New York Harbor for ships held in New York Harbor for lack of bunker coal, would have a far-reaching effect on the general situation. When fueled, he said, they will take cargo which in turn releases freight occupying space required to take in other freight, which should back in cars on the piers in the yards and on the side tracks which have been congesting operations. 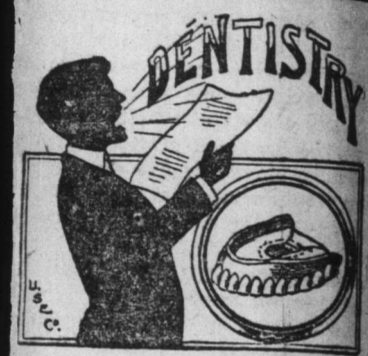

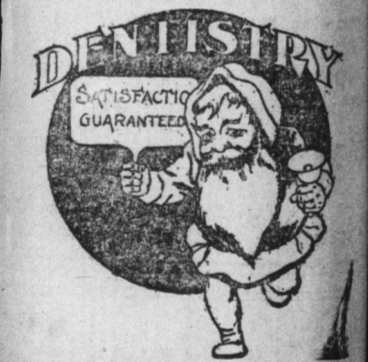

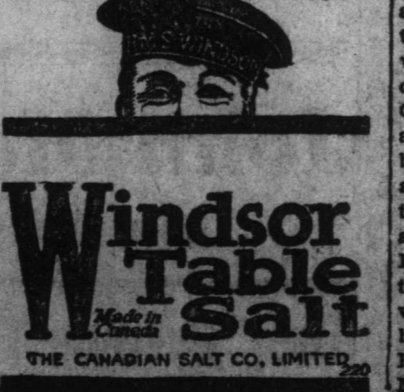
WAR REVIEW.
