At once two of the sailors, Manuel Stone, of Old Bonaventure, T.B., and Bernard Byrne, of Cupids, volunteered to go with the captain John Sinclair, Smith's Sound, to try and save the ship. On reaching her we found that she was leaking badly and that the rudder was partly unshipped. After some difficulty, we succeeded in floating and getting her under sail. After we had gone some distance we found that she was leaving badly, and that her cargo of salt was affected, and that she was in a sinking condition. However, we did not lose heart, but still kept at the pumps. Eventually we saw land which proved to be Trepassey. After a while we managed to get her into the harbor and to put her ashore near the public wharf there. The people were very kind to us, and gave us something to eat and some dry clothes to put on. The captain next employed some men of the place to free the vessel, which was successfully done, and wired the owner at St. John's for assistance, acquainting them of the misfortune. A tug was sent, and after temporary repairs had been effected, the "Dazzle" was taken in tow and successfully brought to port arriving last night. Beyond the damage to the vessel, nothing of a serious nature happened 'the crew. They, however, all feel quite pleased and glad that they escaped so fortunately.




