





Montreal, Dec. 6.—(Canadian Press) -In an editorial on "Beauty Contests," the Gazette refers to the strong possibility that these will come under the ban of public disfavor and be dropped, owing to the emphatic representations which are being made by church organizations, women's clubs and prominent citizens.

"Something approaching an open scandal" was the latest in Atlantic City, says the Gazette. The fact that the same "all-America" champion was selected for two years in succession was resented in some circles as tending to advertise to the world a certain paucity in the supply and distributtion of feminine pulchritude in the United States. The "Miss" who won second place was found to be a "Mrs.", which not only gave unsuccessful contestants an opening to claim a foul, but also led a participant in a previous contest, whose entry had been rejected because she was married, to enter suit against the judges, for \$150,000, the modest sum at which she estimated the damages to her feelings and the renown to which she believed her charms entitled her to. It is believed that these contests place an undue emphasis upon mere physical attributes and, as conducted in the United States, involve wearing costumes and a display of person subversive of modesty.

'While Montreal's experience with a beauty contest last year did not result in such an open fiasco as attended the Atlantic City event, those on the inside were aware of the petty bickerings and keenly-felt disappointments which inevitably occur in such competitions, while the manufactured enthusiasm for and fulsome flattery of the girls taking part is distinctly wearisome and distasteful to a large section of the public."
