A BUILDING FOR MANUFACTURERS.

Some objection has been raised to the passing of the by-law authorizing the city to borrow \$250,000 to erect a building for manufacturers...

That puts a different complexion upon the by-law. The city is asked to give credit to a deservingly institution which will meet all the expenses...

Though this enterprise was suggested by some members of the Industrial Bureau, it will be a city building, the property of the city, under the management of the city.

But that is not all. Small manufacturers who desire to come to the city to start business complain that they have some difficulty in getting satisfactory locations at a reasonable rental...

There are many small manufacturers who desire to locate here who will be enabled to start business here if the citizens endorse the by-law to be submitted next week...

Granted that these industries are not large and at the present time are not as important as they will be later on, but we cannot get the larger industries, and it would be much better to have a number of smaller industries than one larger one...

The citizens by endorsing this by-law will do

something to encourage manufacturing in Calgary. It will be a good start; it will have good results. We predict that if the citizens vote right next week on this measure, that Calgary will soon have a second and a third building of this kind...

This is one of the most practical schemes for attracting the manufacturers that has yet been brought to the attention of the people. It is an experiment that is surely worth while.

And the manufacturers have nothing to offer that man except advice, and that advice is that a man with a family of five should be able to live with comfort and thrive, prosper, and grow fat on \$500 a year.

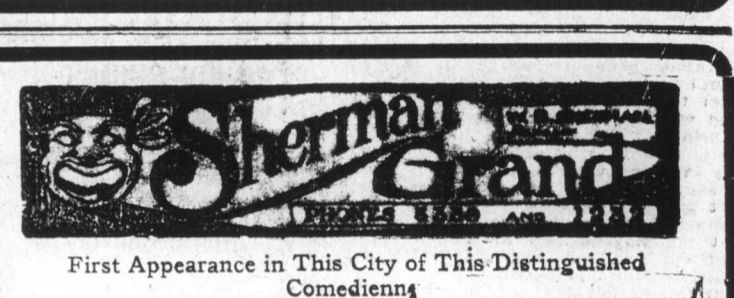
