The Gas Problem.

Yesterday's mail brought in a bag of answers as to the easiest way of finding the net amount of a gas bill in Toronto. Only two of these solutions were the divide by eight method, D. F., Berlin, W. April 22. As present it is the business of United States troops to keep out all who may seek to enter; but from and after that date the new territory will be open to settlers. And the rush that will begin next week is expected to be at anything of the kind ever known since Uncle Sam had a country to call bis own. For this many thousands of people have been getting ready for weeks a cramouths back. The heaviest crush will come from the north, that is, from the southern border of Kansas, where thousands are wairing for the legal hour to strike. Before that, and in the meantime, no one is allowed in on any pretence, neither as prospectors, intending settlers, or whatever also they may call themselves. Dennis T. Flynn is the name of the man who will enjoy the honor of being the first bona fide white settler in the new Territory of Oklahema. Mr. Flynn is a former resident of Buffalo, N.Y. He is a young Irish-American, twenty-sight or thirty years of age, who drifted West a decade ago to grow up with the country. He located at Klowa, Kan., in Congressman Peters' district, and has since been one of that gentleman's sturdiest political aupporters. Several weeks ago Mr. Peters secured Mr. Flynn's appointment as Postmaster at Guthrie, a place which now has uo existence save in name, but which a fortnight hence will contain a population of several thousand sonis.

Mr. Flynn's appointment as postmaster at Guthrie will make him independently rich within a twelvemonth. Mr. Peters explains this by saying that the appointment will permit Mr. Flynn to enter the Territory before the date fixed by the President's proclamation, in order that he may erect a post office and in other ways arrange for the anticipated rush which will begin on the 22nd inst.

This, if divided into city lots, ought to make him a nallilonaire within a brief space of time, and all this good fortune comes from his appointment as a fourth-class postmaster in a wild western frontier town.

There has been an Oklahoma difficulty pending for a number of years back. First, there was a large extent of territory that fairly and honestly belonged to the Indians. Next, there was an attempt by cattle men and ranhers to seize this territory, and to use it as their own. 
