It is time to decentralize. The memorial recently addressed by the teachers of the Parkdale Collegiate Institute to the Collegiate Institute Board, protesting against the present system, pursued in the School of Pedagogy, is worthy of serious attention from educational authorities and parents of pupils alike.

A brief history of the Training Institute may not be out of place. For some years prior to 1890, the five Collegiate Institutes of Kingston, Owen Sound, Guelph, Hamilton and Stratford were also training institutes. Those wishing to enter the High School teaching profession were distributed among these schools, and trained there for about two months. They observed the teachers at work, taught trial lessons themselves under the observation and criticism of the masters, and were required to read some works on the science of teaching.

A GREAT MAN AT HOME. THE INNER LIFE OF A CELEBRATED BUT SECLUDED GENIUS.

How Mr. Taine, the Great Historian, Lives and Works—The Inventor of Scientific Criticism Not Without a Touch of Poetry in His Nature—His Extreme Reserve.

M. Taine, outside his works, is certainly the least known and least accessible of the great men of the time. He has a horror of having his privacy invaded, and carries his reserve so far that he refuses to have a superb portrait which Bonnat has just completed of him exposed in the Salon.

The portrait is a Bonnat of the first style—pale and luminous. The entire man is there; the head somewhat narrow and elongated, crowned by the well-developed forehead of the thinker; the light eyes, behind his glasses; the short beard, slightly tapering, adding to the impression of the length of the head.

Truly Taine is the inventor of that powerful machine called scientific criticism, criticism invariable, inexorable, which in some way destroys individual liberty, making of man the simple product of the social and physical conditions from which he can under no pretext disengage himself, such as race, epoch, surroundings; which classifies in a museum of natural history, which seeks, above all, the law, and forgets, in its deans

to bring all things into common, this element of difference which is felt, this vibration of soul to soul, this something which escapes and which constitutes genius.

Yet this systematist is at times an exquisite poet, and has in certain pages a profound and a man who understands and profoundly appreciates her, bringing to his descriptions the warm shades and purple tints which flash in his first writer, of our time.

Taine's youth was most austere and laborious. Without fortune, he had to work, not only for his own livelihood, but also that of a mother who he adored and surrounded up to his death with the most touching attention. Now that glory and success have assured him a fortune, the matter pre-occupied him in his early years have left in his mind a kind of vague disquietude; material questions do not rank as secondary in his mind, and he has again and again the profound philosopher calculating very precisely the percentage of himself about the economical crisis, not as a philosopher, but as citizen and shareholder.

Leaving the early years of hard work varied knowledge which has enabled him to speak with authority on so many diverse subjects—literature, art, philosophy, politics, etc. At this time he read all that was possible to read and stored up his treasures.


In 1855, Taine then being 25 or 28, appeared the "Philosopher Francis," then successively "La Fontaine," "La Littérature Anglaise," "Le Voyage en Italie," "L'Intelligence." Between whiles, his position having improved and the future assured, he had married the daughter of an architect of great talent, M. Demol, and it may be said that the twenty-four years of his union—of which he has had a son and a daughter—have never been crossed by a cloud.

In 1860 an author went to see Taine, carrying one of his works, which the latter had willingly consented to look over. He was ushered into the floor in front of an armchair, on which sat a child of 2 or 3 years. "Pardon me," said Taine, without looking at himself, "will you excuse me a minute? He will permit nobody else to cut his toe-nails."

The lady was his nephew, Andre Chevrillon, who is now a man whose "Journey in India" made a great sensation on its appearance last year in the Revue des Deux Mondes.
