It would be difficult, he says, to imagine that any class of the community would offer irreconcilable opposition to Gladatone's reinstatement of the Home Rule bill, that matter being one of the first conditions of permanent peace in Ireland.

Bros. Failed

Eight Witnesses Examined and a Variety of Opinions Expressed—The Mayor, Give Their Views.

examined eight witnesses yesterday at their first session in Toronto held in the Executive Committee room of the City Hall. Sir Joseph Hickson, Judge Macdonald, Mr. E. F. Clarke and Mr. G. A. Gigault

were the commissioners present. Rev. Mr. McLeod was absent, but will be on hand this morning. S. J. Carson, Montreal, and Malcolm Gibbs of the city represented the temperance people and L. P. Kribs was present on behalf of the brewers and dis-

Mayor Fleming testified to the fact that Mayor Fleming testified to the fact that drunkenness was on the decrease. This happy state of affairs was due to the influence of temperance societies and churches, a more stringent license law and greater enlightenment of the people. He advocated a prohibitory measure to prevent the sale and manufacture of liquors as a beverage. He favored the separation of saloons and hotels. The hotelkeepers were respectable in Toronto beyond the ordinary. He believed the effect of prohibition would be favorable to the trade of the city.

Judge Macdougall Opposes Prohibition.

Judge Macdougall did not favor the passing of a prohibitory law, because he considers it impracticable, and the attempts considers it impracticable, and the attempts at evasion of liquor laws had demoralizing effects. He would recommend the Swedish plan, that of the Government being the saloon-keeper, as one for consideration. Chief of Police Grasett attributed the decrease in drunkenness to the enlightenment of society. Public opinion, however, he believed, was not yet ready for prohibition.

hibition.

Curran Morrison, Clerk of the Police Court, favored the prohibition of the sale and manufacture of whisky and brandy, and advocated a more stringent labor test for those convicted of drunkenness.

Thomas Hazzard of the Mimico Industrial School claimed that a large majority of the children of that school were born of intemperate parents.

of the children of that school were born of intemperate parents.

Mr. John Green, governor of the jail, turnshed statistics, showing the decrease in the convictions in drunkenness since the labor test was established. He believed that the influence of temperance societies and higher licenses aided in establishing this favorable condition of affairs. He favored prohibition if it could be enforced. He thought that some provision should be made in the form of compensation to brewers if the sale and manufacture of liquor was prohibited. liquor was prohibited.

Favors Compensation S. R. Heakes was looked upon as spokes man of the Labor people. He claimed that the decrease in drinking was due to the amelioration at the present time of the condition of the lower classes, and the only way to further increase sobriety was to scatter contentment among the working classes by favoring shorter hours and better wages. He had seen the workings of the Scott Act and believed that the establish-ment of prohibition would have no better effects. He believed that saloons were more injurious to society than hotels. Saloons, if maintained, should be situated in mercantile centres. Compensation should certainly be made to brewers and distillers
