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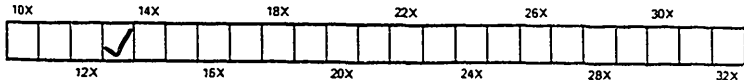

TWELFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

KNOX CHURCH, GUELPH, April 10th, 1888.
10.30 a.m.

Three hundred ladies present.

The President, Mrs. Ewart, in the chair, who conducted devotional exercises, assisted by Mrs. Goldie, Guelph, and Mrs. G. H. Robinson, Toronto, the 1st and 34th hymns being sung.

The Secretary read the minutes of the eleventh annual meeting (held at Toronto), which were confirmed.

Mrs. White, Guelph, read the welcome, expressing the kindest and most thoughtful care for the comfort of the strangers, and the success of the gathering. It was expected that Mrs. Farrell, Smith's Falls, would have responded, but being prevented by home afflictions Mrs. Blair, Prescott, kindly prepared a reply which was read by Mrs. Cockburn, Uxbridge.

The President then addressed the Assembly, pointing out the various lines through which the work of the Society, in the Providence of God, had been laid out, and drawing some inferences from the manner of its development for future guidance.

The Secretary read letters of kindly greeting from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies in New York, Philadelphia, and the North-West United States, also from the Woman's Union Missionary Society, New York; the Canadian Woman's Board of Missions, Montreal; St. Andrew's, Quebec; Enfield, Nova Scotia; Halifax, Nova Scotia, and the Indore Society, Quebec.

The reports of the Presbyterian Societies were then presented as follows, being read in nearly every case by a lady from each Presbytery respectively:—Ottawa, Lanark and Renfrew, Glengarry, Brockville, Kingston, Peterborough, Lindsay, London, Chatham, Huron, Maitland, Orangeville, Whitby, Barrie, Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph, Paris, Stratford, Brandon, Saugeen and Winnipeg.

The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Maclaren, 1st Vice-President, in which she expressed her appreciation of the honour conferred upon her by the Society during its past history, and her desire that in present circumstances her name might be withdrawn from the list of elected members of the Board, her connection with which will still continue as President of the Maclaren Auxiliary. This decision was heard with much regret by the Society.

Moved by Mrs. T. Goldie and Mrs. Ure, and agreed to by a standing vote, That, the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, now assembled at this its twelfth annual meeting, desires to express on this public occasion the high appreciation of its members of the loving character of their dear departed sister, Mrs. Wardrope, and to say, however feebly, how very much touched every heart has been with deep sympathy for their friend Doctor Wardrope and his family.

Mrs. H. Alexander, Ottawa, then led in prayer, closing the morning session. The other songs of praise were the 169th, 262nd and 128th.

2.30 p.m.

Mrs. McTavish, Lindsay, led in prayer, and the 101st and 20th hymns were sung.

Delegates from sister societies were then received in the following order:—For the Canadian McAll Mission, Mrs. Hewitt, Toronto, who explained the purpose and origin of this effort for Christ in old France. Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society, Montreal, Mrs. Parker, who specially referred to the work of that Society among the French-Canadians. Baptist Woman's Missionary Society of Canada, Mrs. Thomson, Guelph. Methodist Missionary Society of Canada, Miss Sarah Smith, Guelph. Queen's College Mission Band, Mrs. Robinson, Toronto, who presented a cheque from the Band for \$300, to be used for the proposed hospital at Indore. Indian Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, Beulah, Manitoba, Mrs. Bryce, Toronto, who presented to the Society \$10, their first contribution to Foreign Missions. (Mrs. Big Hunter, President.)

The reports of the Auxiliaries and Bands not yet in Presbyterian order, in the Presbyteries of Owen Sound, Sarnia, Bruce and Montreal, were then laid before the Society.

The reports of the Society were then presented in the following order :—Report of Foreign Work, read by Mrs. Macdonnell, Toronto, in the absence of Mrs. Harvie, Foreign Secretary. Home Work and Literature Statement, Mrs. Campbell. Financial Statement of Publication Fund and General Treasurer's Statement, Mrs. MacLennan; taken as read. Report of the Board of Management, Mrs. MacMurchy. These Reports, and those of the branches read in the morning, were received and adopted on motion of Mrs. Beattie, Guelph, and Mrs. Clark, Toronto.

and the Presidents of Presbyterian Societies, Auxiliary Societies and Mission Bands to form the Board of Management for the coming year. On motion of Mrs. Leach, St. Helens, and Mrs. McCrae, Cobourg, these ladies were elected by the Society to fill that position.

Mrs. McEwen, Cornwall, took charge of a number of most interesting questions which brought out clear and satisfactory answers.

Mrs. H. Alexander, Ottawa, addressed the Society on the work and principles of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union

Mrs. McCalla, St. Catharines, led the closing devotions of the meeting. During the afternoon the young ladies sang a sacred quartette with much acceptance, and the proceedings were closed with the hymn "Blest be the Tie that Binds."

WEDNESDAY, April 11, 1888.

Five hundred ladies present.

The proceedings were opened by singing the 68th hymn, "Blessing and Honour," Mrs. Rodger, London, conducting devotional exercises.

A paper on Medical Missions, prepared by Miss McKellar, Queen's College, was read in that lady's absence by Mrs. Robinson, Toronto, the 233rd hymn being afterwards sung.

The following allotment was then made of the money :—

1st. On motion of Mrs. MacLennan and Mrs. McEwan—\$1,923.71, the sum by which the expenditure exceeded the estimates for the year 1886-7.

2nd. On motion of Mrs. MacLennan and Mrs. Roger—\$17,550, the estimated sum for the present year. It was agreed, on motion of Mrs. Parsons and Mrs. McMurtry—That \$300 of the \$600 voted for Trinidad should be given for Mrs. Morton's schools.

3rd. On motion of Mrs. MacMurchy and Mrs. Drainie—\$1,000, the sum remaining unpaid to the Foreign Mission Committee for the boarding-school at Broadview.

4th. \$2,620 to be used to pay the extra salaries of the married missionaries in India and China. This was passed with explanations, on motion of Mrs. Ball and Mrs. Smellie.

5th. On motion of Mrs. Shortreed and Mrs. Brimer—That if it be found in the autumn, when we receive our statement from the Foreign Mission Committee, that the sum expended has exceeded the estimates, the Board be authorized to pay to the Foreign Mission Committee a sum not exceeding \$2,000.

With this last exception all these sums were agreed to be placed in the hands of the Foreign Mission Committee, for the purposes specified in the various motions, *at once*.

This offering was then solemnly dedicated to God, to be used for His service, by Mrs. McCrae, Cobourg.

The following items of business which had been previously considered by the Board of Management, and referred to the Society with commendations, were then decided upon :—

1st. That each Auxiliary buy its own envelopes and supply its members. The ladies who spoke on this question were Mesdames Parsons, Stewart, Hamilton, Smellie, Leask and Goldie. It was understood that every new Society on application should receive a free supply for the first year.

2nd. That 12,000 Reports be published for circulation, great care to be taken in the distribution, and that as far as possible each family to receive one copy—Reports to be free. Mesdames

Armstrong, Shortreed, Roger, McTavish, Campbell, Leask, J. Smellie, Byers, Dempster and Jeffrey took part in this discussion.

3rd. That our representation at the Annual Meeting, for the present, be one delegate and the President from each Branch of the Society. Mesdames Ball, McCoy, Roger, Lyle and others took part in this discussion, it being explained that all the members are welcome to attend the Annual Meeting, but homes will be found for delegates only.

Moved in amendment by Mrs. Ball and Mrs. Hamilton, and agreed—That the number of delegates be unlimited.

It was here mentioned that only members paying one dollar annually or life members have a right to vote at the annual meeting, and that the members of the Board are the thirty-six elected and the Presidents of all the branches.

4th. That permission be given, at the discretion of the Board, to those who apply for it, to reprint the letters which appear in the MONTHLY LETTER LEAFLET at the end of one month after the issue.

5th. In accordance with a suggestion from the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, it was decided to change the plan of nominating the members of the Board of Management, and that each church in Toronto, after being notified of the number of members to which they are entitled, shall nominate such members by ballot, and send the list to the Nominating Committee, with the addition of the two names which have the next highest number of votes. The voting members in each congregation to be *dollar members only*.

NOTICES OF MOTION.

The following Notices of Motion, originating from a discussion of the subjects to which they refer, were then agreed to and ordered to be sent to the branches through the LETTER LEAFLET:—

1st. Recommended by the Barrie Presbyterial Society, and presented by Mrs. McKee—“That the interests of the Woman’s Foreign Missionary Society would be greatly advanced by the publication of a missionary magazine, devoted especially to our own work, and requesting the Board to appoint a committee to examine the whole subject thoroughly and report.”

2nd. Presented by Mrs. Alexander, Ottawa,—“That in future, when it is found impossible for the President of an Auxiliary to attend the annual meeting, the delegate appointed by

that Auxiliary shall be eligible to take her place and vote on the Board of Management at that meeting." *

3rd. By Mrs. MacMurchy—"To change the Constitution, for the sake of greater clearness of expression. In Article 3rd of the Constitution of the General Society, change the word 'person' to 'woman.' In Article 3rd of the Constitution of an Auxiliary, change the word 'person' to 'woman.' And also in Article 2nd of the Constitution for a Mission Band, make some change which will render the meaning quite clear." During the discussion which arose from this notice, the question of boys being members of our Mission Bands was brought up, several ladies taking part. Mrs. McKee, Barrie, urging the ladies to give this subject *most careful* consideration.

4th. By Mrs. Macdonnell—"That an addition be made to the Constitution providing for the recognition of 'Associate Branches' of such Woman's Missionary Societies as shall be desirous to work for the Society, to report to it and contribute *statedly* to it a portion not less than half its funds. That the 'Associate Branches' may be represented in Presbyterian Societies by one delegate instead of having several representatives as Auxiliaries have. And that the Presidents shall be entitled to attend meetings of the Board as corresponding members, but shall not have a voice in the Board, unless especially elected thereto by the General Society."

5th. By Mrs. Campbell—"That this Society deems it inexpedient to adopt the proposed amendment to the Constitution, but will thankfully receive money from sister societies, and gratefully acknowledge them in the Report. But inasmuch as the notice previously given introduces a new element into our Society and these associate branches seek representation, I hereby give notice of motion, That in accordance with our Constitution, we continue to be a Woman's Foreign Missionary Society."

6th. By Mrs. Jeffrey—"In view of the rapidly increasing amount of correspondence, it is possible that in the near future some of our secretaries may require assistance; therefore, as the Constitution cannot be altered without a year's notice, I beg to give notice of a motion to be made at next annual meeting, That Article four of the Constitution be amended by the addition of two words, so as to provide for two or more Corresponding Secretaries."

* This will involve a change in the Constitution.

A telegram was received by the Society from the Canadian Woman's Board of Missions, assembled at Montreal, greeting, from 2nd Thess., 2nd chapter, 16 and 17th verses: "Now our Lord Jesus Christ Himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts and stablish you in every good word and work."

A message was received from Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa, conveying warmest Christian greetings and good wishes with the words from 2nd Chron. 15: 7: "Be ye strong therefore, and let not your hands be weak, for your work shall be rewarded."

The Secretary announced that two delegates had been appointed by the Board to represent the Society at the General Missionary Conference, to be held at London, England, in June. Mrs. Maclaren, Toronto, and Mrs. James Watson, Hamilton, and also read a letter from the Rev. James Johnston, General Secretary, accepting those appointed with great cordiality.

Mrs. Bignal favoured the audience by singing a very sweet solo, "Angels Ever Bright and Fair."

On motion of Mrs. Shortreed and Mrs. Robinson, a hearty and unanimous standing vote of thanks was passed to the hospitable and generous ladies of Guelph for their thoughtful care of the Society, and also to the ladies who conducted the praise, the managers of Knox and Chalmers Churches, as well as the railway companies, for their usual courtesies.

Mrs. Byers, of Gananoque, then imparted much useful information to the ladies in answering a number of questions, bringing out points of great importance in the interests of the work, after which she and Mrs. McLean, Belleville, explained interesting methods of managing Mission Bands with illustrations from maps, etc.

A question was discussed upon an enquiry from Mrs. McEwan, Cornwall, respecting the best plan of meeting the expenses of Presbyterian and Auxiliary work, which was answered in a variety of ways and much information conveyed. The decision arrived at seemed to be—"That on the whole it is better to leave this matter entirely in the hands of local societies, as no general plan can be followed or adopted." It was therefore agreed, on motion of Mrs. Macdonnell, that the question be brought before each Presbyterian Society, whether a delegate attending the annual meeting of the General Society in order to bring information to the Auxiliaries should be obliged to pay her own expenses, and if not what plan should be taken to defray such expenses?

Mrs. Ewart presented the thanks of the newly elected officers to the Society. The missionary hymn "Go ye into all the world" was then sung, and in the absence of Mrs. Gordon, Harrington, Mrs. Grant, Hamilton, led in the closing prayer, remembering especially the work of our sisters among the French-Canadians.

The President announced to the Society that she had received an application from a young lady, a graduate of the Toronto Training School for Nurses, with high testimonials, offering her service as trained nurse for the Foreign Field. It was agreed that this application and testimonials should be forwarded to the Foreign Mission Committee.

The President explained that she had received a petition from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, of Canada, with a request that the official signature of the officers should be attached to it, but that in the circumstances, and owing to the impossibility through want of time to consult with the Executive, she felt constrained to decline.

The Twelfth Annual Meeting was then closed by singing the 317th hymn, "From Ocean to Ocean."

Officers,—President, Mrs. Thomas Ewart; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. MacMurchy, Mrs. D. J. Macdonnell, Mrs. J. C. Hamilton; Home Secretary, Mrs. Hugh Campbell; Foreign Secretary, Mrs. J. L. Harvie; Treasurer, Mrs. James MacLennan.

At a special meeting of the Board of Management held at Toronto on the 17th April, Mrs. G. H. Robinson was unanimously chosen as Recording Secretary.

SPECIAL NOTICE.

As the question about the reading of the Reports of the General Society was not decided at the Annual Meeting, Auxiliaries are requested to bring it up for decision at their earliest convenience, and notify the Home Secretary, if they agree with the following proposal by the Executive Committee:—

FOREIGN LETTERS.

INDIA.

INDORE, *Feb. 9th, 1888.*

MRS. WILKIE.—Two weeks ago to-day the box reached us, and the same evening Miss Beattie, Miss Oliver and I distributed it equally among the five schools, viz.: Miss Rodger's, Miss Ross', Mrs. Campbell's, Mrs. Builder's and Mrs. Wilson's. The things which Mrs. Wilkie, of Toronto, sent I kept for the Christmas tree. Kindly thank for us all who contributed to the box.

We had the tree a week ago last Monday, and this year to the women we gave warm jackets, sleeping pillows and cards; to the men, handkerchiefs, texts and walking-sticks; to the little girls, calico jackets, dolls and handkerchiefs; to the large boys, books, cards and handkerchiefs; and to the small boys, trumpets, tops, left from last year, and calico jackets. All seemed pleased and happy, and the dolls were hugged and admired. One baby got the long strip of crochet work, to which were attached a number of bells, which greatly amused it, as well as its larger sister and brother. The children never seem to tire of dolls, and no mistake can be made in sending unlimited numbers. I was present at Miss Rodgers' prize distribution in her school, and saw some tears shed, in spite of brave efforts to keep them back, when it was known that all could not have dolls. One thing I noticed with pleasure—three little girls standing around a gentleman reading a lesson in English in the midst of the prize distribution. A few years ago this would have been impossible, as, first, they could not show their faces to a male, and, second, the prizes were of greater interest than the lessons, as they are still to the greater number. I was also pleased to see some Parsee girls accept of books with pleasure. When looking back to the first time I was present at an examination in Miss Rodger's school and comparing it with to-day's, I see great reason for rejoicing at the gradual progress that has been made in breaking down of prejudices, and in the advancement of the work among the women and children here. But I must pass by Miss Rodger's school, which is of long standing and well-known, and which, if present intentions are carried out, will be turned into a high school before very long, and tell you of Miss Ross' farewell meeting, at which I was also present in her city school a few days ago. She has succeeded in gathering around her about seventy girls, thirty-five, or about that, being generally present, some of whom can read up to the Third Reader in Marathi and Hindi. On learning that Miss Ross had felt constrained to leave the field, the scholars

and teachers themselves resolved to give her an address and a keepsake, and we were called together to witness some of the results of Miss Ross' labours before presenting that which was to show their appreciation of it. It was a new experience, and rather a painful surprise to Miss Ross to be taken charge of in place of being in charge, and well did the teachers do their part. Hymns were sung—one an original one referring to the occasion—lessons recited, including a recitation with acting, Scripture questions from Genesis to Revelation were answered, the Lord's Prayer and ten commandments repeated, and then Miss Ross was called forward, and one of the teachers, in the midst of genuine tears which few could restrain, told of Miss Ross' arduous and faithful labours, of the fruit thereof visible, and the homes unrepresented that through the Bible women wished to send their salaams and sincere regrets, of their sorrow at being forced to part with her, and their earnest hopes that after a period of rest at home she might again be able to return to them. I have neither done justice to the sentiments or feelings of the orator, whose eloquence was that of natural and sincere feeling, but I hope enough to express the pain we all shared in that circumstances had forced Miss Ross to leave a work in which she had won the confidence of so many by her hard and self-sacrificing work. They then put a garland of flowers around her neck, a beautiful handkerchief of Indian work into her hands, and, after prayers, sorrowfully bid her farewell.

With them we join in an earnest hope that the difficulties that now cause her to leave may soon be removed, and that she and all faithful workers may long be enabled to work in India's promising and, in many ways, encouraging field. Miss Oliver, in the meantime, takes charge of Miss Ross' school.
