GENERAL TENDENCY UPWARD.

SPECULATION ENCOURAGED BY STRENGTH SHOWN IN MARKET.

LEADING SHARES RECOVER MUCH OF THEIR LOST GROUND.

The most noticeable fact connected with this morning's board was the firmness displayed on receipt of any encouraging news. The holders of shares have decidedly the best of the market as little stock comes out on breaks, and if sold to affect the market is not a profitable transaction for the seller, as the rise occurs with little or no stock changing hands.

The list gained its losses of yesterday and in some cases prices are higher than on the 22nd. The market was broad and rather erratic. In one or two instances sacrifice sales were made, which were doubtless the outcome of positive orders to sell. The most noticeable fact connected
