CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. oxtakio.
$\pi$-a mentiful supply of cars since the middle of November has resulted in a heavy movement of lumber by rail. Mills are Uusy shipping out orders which should liave been filled weeks ago, but which remained unfilled owing to the impossibility of securing transportation. The inability to oblain lumber has caused projected works 10 be deferred until next spring, while some of the stock intended for such works will probably remain in the yards over winter. The quantity of unsold lum. ber at the mills is smaller than has been known for years. Prices of good lumber remain unchanged, but the advance on the lower grades does not seem to have yel been checked. Common and mill culls are selling in Toronto at about it per thousand higher than they were two weeks ago. The average quotations are, for mill calls about $\$_{11}$, for $1 \times 10$ and 12 common from $\$ 13$ to $\$ 15$, and for 1 -inch stıips, mill run, $\mathbb{S}_{15}$ to $\$ 1550$. A peculiar feature of the trade is the fact that wholesale dealers have not taken full advantage of the advanced prices. In Toronto, for instance, lumber is selling at prices litale, If any, highei than are now being paid for stock at the mills. Of course, the stock so offered was purchased a short time ago at lower prices than now preval, but this is no reason why the present selling price of lumber should not bear its proper iclation to the mill price. It night be argued that to advance wholesaie prices to their proper basis would cause a cessation of buying, but this would not likely be the result as consumers hold unusually light stocks and must continuc to buy for almost immediate requirerrents.

Hardwood prices appear to have settled down to a winter basis. There has been
no change excepting in respect to maple, whoch has advanced slightly. From the Wiarton district sates of inch maple, common and better, are reported at $\$ 12.50$ per thousand at the mill.

The shingle market has undergone no material change, $16 \cdot i n c h$ N:N selling in Toronto at $\$ 2.65$ and $\mathcal{X C L}$ at $\$ 1.75$. The demand is quite active. The lath situation is bordering on the sensational. Such rapid advances as have been made of late in the price of this material have not been known for many years. Manufacturers are realizing from $\$ 2.75$ to $\$ 3$ for No. I lath at the mill, and in Toronto the wholesale selling price is from $\$ 3.25$ to $\$ 3.50$ for No. 1, and $\$ 2.75$ for No. 2. These prices repiesent an adrance of urer one hundred per cent. within a couple of months. It is the opinion, however, that the present prices of lath will not hold throughout the winter. Fowards the approach of spriag at least, if not before that time, we predict signs of lower prices.

## gURaf:C AND NBW bRUNSWICK

A slight improvement is reported in the timber trade at Quebec. The prices of timber now on the market are unchanged, but for white or red pine, elm and ash of this winter's production contracts are being made at an advance of from two to four cents per cubic foot. The market for spruce deals exhibits greater strength as the season advances. Stocks at the mills in Nicw 13runswick and Nova Scotia are smaller than they have been in the past twenty years, while deals which sold at $\$ 8$ one year ago are now realizing $\$ 11$. There is a considerable quantity of lumber cut for the South American market still in the hands of manufactures owing to the inability of shippers to abtain tonnage, but most of this has been contracted for. There are good prospects for a lively demand until May next, when the new stock may probably reduce prices slinhtly.

Cedar shingles and spruce lath are moving frecly. Manufacturers are obtaining $\$ 2.10$ per thousand for lath f.o.b. mill, while in the fall of 1898 not more than 60 or 70 cents per thousand could be obtatned for similar stock.

## maNITORA ANI) bRITISIt COI.UMDIA.

Outside work in Minitoba and the Territories is being rapidly finished up. Contractors have their buidings well closed in, and the bulk of the luniber tequired for building purposes during the next couple of months will be finshing ma. terial. lectall dealers are steadily adding
to their slock, and apparently antucipate an early spung trade. Dritish Columbia manufacturers refiort a stendy demand for all grades of lumbel, with prices more satisfactory than they have been for some years. Considerable shipments are being made to Australia and China, and it is said that the Oriental steamers have their entire capactity for some tume to come spoken for. It is announced that the con solidationof lumber interests in the Boundary district of the Kontenay has been effected, through the efforts of Mr. G. O. Buchanon. The mills and hmits repre sented ate said to be valued at olte million dollars, although a report states that one or two prominent corcerns have refused to becone identified with the combine.

## unithis staths.

The dealers at eastern wholesale centres are taking in their last cargoes Naturally some altention has been given to the stocks availible for the winter trade, particularly as theie are excellent prospects for an active demand duting the winter for neally all classes of stock. The stock oi good lumber is on the whoie of average size, perhaps sufficient to carry dealers through the winter. This cannot be said of the lower grades, as it is generally admitted that a famine in cheap lumber is an assured thing. Coarse lumber at Buffalo and Tonawanda is at a premium, and the demand is reported to be growing daily. Several cargoes of mill culls have been received at Tonawanda and disposed of at the price of $\$ 15.50$ and $\$ 16$ on the ciock, to be shipped direct from the boat. Box and No. 3 barn are likewise scarce. Pine prices in all grades are being fimly maintained. At Albany three inch uppers are selling at $\$ 70$, and one to two tnch at $\$ 55$. Box boards bring $\$ 18$ to $\$ 20$, and No. 1 barn, $1 \times 12, \$ 25$ to $\$ 27$. The foreign trade in pine is rather quiet with the exception of West Indian bnsiness. Prices on West Indian shippers are $\$ 2:$ for 12 inch rough and $\$ 24$ for dressed. Spruce maintains its strong position, dealers hoiding firmly to list prices.
No further advance in hardwnod prices is reported, but as the season advances greater difficulty is found in purchasios stock. There has been a slight increase in the demand for birch, and wibite and black ash is also very scarce, manufacturing ndustries purchasing it as fast as it is recenved on the market.

The recent quotations from Great Britain show that pine and spruce deals have considerably advanced of late. Broad first quality pine deals are selling at Ginssus at $2=4$ to 627 ; second quality, it inch and up, at 2.16 to f.rg; third quality at $f 11$ to $\mathcal{f}, 2$, and fourth quality at 2 S is to f 8 s tos. First quality pine sidngs bring fis to fins. The quotations for Quebec spruce deals at London are: Furst qualuty, foto fir ios; second quality, 88 ios to 59 ; third qual-
 ts 28. New Brumswick spruce deals
 sells at Cilashow $3 t$ as jd to as fid per cubic font, elm at 25 to 259 d, birch at from is al to $2 s$, and ash at about 2 s .

## the shingle and lath market.

The shingle market throughout the United States is one of great strength. The receipte of red cedar shingles have not been large and there is but a small slock in the hands of dealers. Hembock shingles nppear to be out of the market, and there is only a limited sup. ply of white cedars. Coming to white pine, the reports are that manufacturers nee practically' sold out, while the stocks helil by dealers are much below the average. In view of the alowe conditions, there is reason to ex. pect a further advance in the price of shingles before spring, notwathstanding that best is inch pine now loings $\$+$ in the liuffalo maskel.
The shoutare in lath is, we ielieve, unprecedented. The American Lumbertman reviews the lath situation as follows:
It wats only a few moniths ago that lath sold at a pice which hardly covered a handling bill, to asy nothing of the cost of manufacture. To. day dry No. I white pine lat! bring at whole sale from $\$ 4.50$ to $\$ 5$ a thoussad, and the supply is not cyual to the demand. There ta been an advance of over 100 per cent. in the selling price, with no prospect of much lowet prices in the near future.

The lath market this season has been a peculiar one. A great many wholesate dealers argued that breause the shingle trade was compatatively dull there was. perthaps, less than the usual amount of small building throughou the country; and it is undoubtedy true that much of the aclivity in the lummer business has been due to the manufacturing demand and the laige amount of factory builangs constructed. to dines not appear, therefore, that the strengti fo the bath market is dute so much to unusual demand as it is to other causes. We may nsoume, however, that owng to the conditicn of the iron matiket metal lathing is not used as exlemsively this season as it has been for several years past, and this undoubtedly has had some effect upon the latio market, hough the chief clement of strength this year is a supply that is kelow nomal for an average building scason. "sccumate fipares as to the hath proviaction of nothern mills for a period of jears are not avalable, but subficient information is at hand in the outpur since thas been a steady decline in hie ouphat since cut lass yens was slighly havier lhan in 1897, but the dechine in production for the seven. jear period named has been appreximately 50 per cent. In former years practically all of the slakis weat intotath, of of late much or this while the introduction of improved methods and machunery has matevially reduced he slat anul mactimery has materially

According toleports, 30,00,000 feet of No. 4 and No. 5 boards of next season's praduction 31 Duluth, Minn, have been contracted for. The No. 4 buards were sold at about $\$ 11$, and the No. $;$ at $\$ 6.50$ to $\$ 7$.
Duffy \& Company, of Hillsbore, 11.13. have nurchased a tract of simber land along the Liverpool river in Nova Scotia. They are setting up a rotary mill, and will saw spruce deals for the British market.
