In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Counsellor, Vincent Massey, Member of Our Order of the Companions of Honour, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Canada.

AT OUR GOVERNMENT HOUSE, in Our City of Ottawa, this eighth day of January in the year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven and in the fifth year of Our Reign.

#### GOVERNMENT HOUSE OTTAWA

December 20th, 1956.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that His Excellency the Governor-General will arrive at the main entrance of the Houses of Parliament at 2.30 p.m. on Tuesday, the 8th January, 1957, and when it has been signified that all is in readiness, will proceed to the Senate Chamber to open formally the Fifth Session of the Twenty-second Parliament of Canada.

A Message was delivered by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod:

Mr. Speaker,

"His Excellency the Governor General desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Chamber of the Honourable the Senate."

The House attended accordingly;

And being returned;

Mr. St. Laurent (Quebec East), by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. 1, An Act respecting the administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy, which is as follows:

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

It is again a pleasure for me to greet you as you resume your Parliamentary duties in this New Year.

The international scene continues to be characterized by instability in the Middle East and in Eastern Europe.

My Ministers remain convinced of the need to maintain the basic unity of the Commonwealth and the reality of the Western Alliance, to contribute effectively to the supervision of the cessation of hostilities between Israel and Egypt under the authority of the United Nations and to the achievement of a lasting settlement of Middle East problems.

Visits to Canada in the last few weeks by the Prime Ministers of Ceylon and India have been conducive to a renewed strengthening of the bonds which unite the peoples of the Commonwealth in their constant aim to cooperate in the pursuit of peace, liberty and progress.

An encouraging advance is being made, as evidenced by the latest Ministerial Meeting of the Council, in the development of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in the non-military as well as in the military field. My Ministers remain strongly convinced of the need to maintain the North Atlantic Treaty as the keystone of the defence of the Western nations.

In the Middle East Canadian servicemen, as part of the United Nations Emergency Force proposed by Canada at the General Assembly of the United Nations, are performing valuable tasks in the interest of world peace.

The United Nations has served to focus world opinion on the brutal repression of the heroic Hungarian people in their endeavour to throw off the yoke of Soviet imperialism. The vast humanitarian problems that have arisen as a result of Soviet intervention require the joint efforts of many

countries. Through the United Nations, the Red Cross, and in cooperation with the Government of Austria, this country is playing its part in relieving suffering and re-settling the refugees.

The entrance into Canada of Hungarian refugees has been greatly facilitated and free transportation provided from Austria to new homes in this country. Already thousands of these Hungarians have been welcomed to Canada and we look forward to receiving thousands more during the winter and spring. There are also substantially increasing numbers of immigrants from the British Isles arranging to proceed to Canada this year.

Recent events have confirmed my Ministers' belief in the importance of seeking solutions to international problems through the United Nations and of upholding by all practical and constructive means the principles of the United Nations Charter. My Ministers also believe, however, that while making every effort to achieve these long term goals, the Western nations must remain strong and united in their defences and in their diplomacy in order that aggressive action against them will be prevented and international tension can be lessened.

Excellent progress is being made in our national economic development. Expansion is evident in every part of Canada. Rapid strides are being made in opening up and utilizing our natural resources and in our industrial and urban growth. Employment has reached unprecedented levels. Once again we have been blessed with good crops. External trade was considerably greater last year than during any previous year. Canadians in almost every part of the country have been enjoying the benefits of this invigorating economic climate.

Indeed our economic expansion has been so rapid that it has put a serious strain upon the supply of various types of labour and materials needed for the many projects which are being put in hand. The corresponding competition to borrow savings to finance all these projects has brought about an increase in interest rates. Increases in the volume of money and credit have had to be carefully limited in order to check inflationary tendencies and the financial policies of my government have also been directed to counteract these same tendencies.

In the last few days a serious industrial dispute has led to a stoppage of work on one of the major railways of Canada despite the use of the normal processes of conciliation. Special efforts have been made and are continuing to be made by my Ministers to assist the parties to reach an agreed settlement.

The preliminary report of the Royal Commission on Economic Prospects has been received and will shortly be laid before you.

You will be asked to approve a measure for the establishment of a Canada Council for the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, in order to give a new impetus to the development of Canadian scholarship and culture. In this measure you will be asked to approve an endowment for the Council so that it may discharge its functions with the greatest possible sense of responsibility.

Because it is important that our universities should be able to keep pace with the increasing demands to be made upon them by the increasing number of young Canadians, you will be asked to approve a further grant of money to the Canada Council to be distributed by it for the purpose of assisting Canadian universities in some of their necessary construction projects. You

will also be asked to approve the doubling of the annual grants to universities, and the payment of these funds to the National Conference of Canadian Universities for division by it among the recognized institutions of higher learning.

A measure will be placed before you for the purpose of renewing on a revised and increased basis the federal programme of grants to provincial governments in aid of technical and vocational training.

It is proposed to recommend in the Senate the establishment of a committee to consider what should be done to make better use of land for agriculture and thus to contribute more effectively to the improvement of agricultural production and the incomes of those engaged in it.

An amendment extending the scope of the Municipal Grants Act will be laid before you to authorize the payment of grants in lieu of taxes on federal property in all municipalities where such property receives the normal municipal services.

An amendment to the Merchant Seamen Compensation Act will be presented making appropriate improvements in the scale of benefits to disabled seamen and the dependants of deceased seamen.

You will be asked to consider legislation for the implementation of a North Pacific Fur Seal Convention.

An amendment to the Sockeye Salmon Convention Act to include pink salmon in this international agreement will also be laid before you.

You will be asked to consider a revision of the law controlling narcotic drugs in the light of the report of the Senate Committee on the use of narcotics in Canada.

A bill will be introduced for the purpose of continuing the Canadian Wheat Board as the sole marketing agency for Western wheat, oats and barley.

A measure will be laid before you to provide for the division of the National Museum of Canada into two Museums to be known as the Canadian Museum of Natural History and the Canadian Museum of Human History.

A revision of the Federal District Commission Act will be presented for your consideration.

Amendments of detail to a number of other Acts will also be introduced.

Members of the House of Commons:

You will be asked to appropriate the funds required to maintain the services and payments provided under the authority of Parliament.

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Parliamentary Librarian has the honour to submit his report for the year 1956.

The Library was officially re-opened on June 19, 1956, by His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, the Right Honourable Vincent Massey, in the presence of Senators and Members of Parliament. A full report of the ceremony will be found in appendices to the Debates of both Houses. Senators and Members, as represented in the Joint Committee on the Library of Parliament, inspected the restored library and expressed agreement with the Minister of Public Works who stated that "the architects and contractors had maintained the integrity of design and the ideas which were in the minds of the original architects and builders".

Members of the staff who had occupied temporary quarters in the House of Commons Reading Room, the Supreme Court building, and the Canadian Bank Note building for more than three years were able to move back to the Library in the summer and fall months.

We have to this date brought back to the Library all the official publications of the Canadian and Provincial Governments, and of the United Kingdom and Commonwealth countries as well as those of the United Nations Organization and affiliated agencies. In addition more than 70,000 re-classified books, all our bound periodicals except newspapers, and our complete law collection are now in this building. Our bound newspapers are now available only from the Supreme Court building, but microfilm copies of 30 important newspapers can be seen in a special room of the Library. However, much of our collection is still in the Supreme Court building. A large number of books is still in dead storage in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics building. these will be carefully arranged in the next few months, and a decision will then be made as to which should be kept and which sent to the National Library.

The enlarged cataloguing staff have this year re-catalogued 24,139 volumes, which brings to 72,259 the total to date.

During the same period our staff have answered 2,516 reference questions, and have circulated 8,335 volumes. No statistics are kept of the circulation of newspapers and magazines from the House of Commons Reading Room.

On October 13, 1956, the General Librarian, Mr. Felix Desrochers, retired. Mr. Desrochers had served the Library faithfully for over twenty-three years and will be greatly missed.

Under the provision of the Library of Parliament Act as amended by Chapter 35 of the Statutes of Canada 1955, Mr. Guy Sylvestre, Assistant Librarian, was appointed Associate Parliamentary Librarian by the Governor General in Council.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Excellency for the gracious Speech which Your Excellency has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And the debate continuing;

Mr. Castleden, seconded by Mr. Campbell, moved in amendment thereto, —That the following be added to the Address:

"We regret, however, that Your Excellency's advisers seem to favour a flexible price support programme, the effect of which is to leave the agricultural industry in a state of uncertainty and insecurity; we also regret that your Excellency's advisors have failed to take the necessary steps to establish a system of parity prices for agricultural products at levels to insure 100% parity of income for agricultural producers."

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: I think I am in duty bound to say something about the manner in which questions are being asked. I am sure there is on the part of honourable Members a sincere desire to observe the rules. Standing Order 39(1) reads as follows:

"39. (1) Questions may be placed on the order paper seeking information from Ministers of the crown relating to public affairs, and from other members, relating to any bill, motion, or other public matter connected with the business of the house, in which such members may be concerned; but in putting any such question or in replying to the same no argument or opinion is to be offered, nor any facts stated, except so far as may be necessary to explain the same; and in answering any such question the matter to which the same refers shall not be debated."

Citation 297 of Beauchesne's third edition is to the following effect:

"297. A certain number of oral questions are permitted in practice by members, without notice, before the orders of the day are called; but these are merely allowed by courtesy in connection with the business of the house or with very urgent and important matters of public concern. They are always brief, no debate being permitted, and the replies are as concise as possible. The minister interrogated may reply at once or may direct that the usual notice be given. Such questions are governed by the same rules of order as questions of which notice has been given."

Therefore if oral questions are to be governed by the same rules of order as are questions of which notice has been given, they are subject to the following rules found in Standing Order 39(1), the last part of which I will read again:

". . . but in putting any such question or in replying to the same no argument or opinion is to be offered, nor any facts stated, except so far as may be necessary to explain the same; and in answering any such question the matter to which the same refers shall not be debated."

There are other citations in Beauchesne which further explain what the practice should be. I should like to cite citation 311 which reads as follows:

"311. Although there may be no debate on an answer, further questions, within due limits, may be addressed to the minister as may be necessary for the elucidation of the answers that have been given. The extent to which supplementary questions may be asked is in the discretion of the Speaker.

After a minister has answered a question asked by a member when the orders of the day are called, no discussion of any kind

should take place."

Then it goes on to cite a statement by Mr. Speaker Lowther in 1915 which I will not read to this House but it is there for honourable Members to consult. Citation 295 gives the details of the various rulings that have been made by my predecessors on questions asked from time to time over the years. I would also mention citations 296, 298, 299, 300, 301 and 302.

Last year I made a statement with regard to questions after having made a study of the matter and it was my hope that the statement which I made then, which was a lengthy one, would be the last one that I should be obliged to make. See Journals, Friday, 16th March, 1956, pp. 299-305. I think it is obvious to any honourable gentleman that we may be departing from the requirements of the rules as they actually exist I think that honourable Members will agree—and this is my own view—that at question time I have been so lenient that some honourable Members may have felt justified in addressing to me serious reproaches for my lack of vigilance at that stage of the proceedings. I am not going to divulge private conversations but certain Members on both sides of the House have often told me that, at question time they were "getting away with murder". They know what the rules are. We all know what they are. We also know how much more entertaining it is perhaps to have more latitude than that which the rules allow. But the rules as they stand are the rules that I must apply, no matter how much perhaps I personally should like to see another system established. The only way in which the rules can be changed is by the House itself through a committee on procedure which would recommend certain changes and have them debated. If honourable Members do not like this type of procedure—I refer to the one that is provided for—they may take the steps that are necessary to have it changed. See Beauchesne's 3rd Edition, citations 9 and 10.

What I have said today does not apply to any questions that have been asked today in particular. My remarks are not addressed to any honourable Member in particular. I am not admonishing the House. I am not reprimanding anyone. I am just speaking in general as to the manner in which we have conducted ourselves, and I include Members of the Opposition and Members of the Government as well. The rules are to the effect that the replies must be concise and should not include any more facts than are necessary to give the reply. The rule applies to the question and it applies to the reply. I include myself in the remarks that I have been making because I perhaps should have been more vigilant in the interpretation and observance of the rules. Having in mind the ambition that we all have to respect our rules, let us resolve that if we do not like them we shall change them in the manner which is provided under our rules. Let us hope that we can carry on from here. I hope we may have interesting question periods just the same but that we shall keep within the rules.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: I do not wish to make a definite ruling at this moment but in fairness to the honourable Member for Burnaby-Coquitlam (Mr. Regier) I should point out that this bill is merely an amending bill which deals with the sub-division of shares. It is not like the bill incorporating the company in 1951. At that time the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) moved a motion declaratory of a principle different from that which emanated from the bill.

The honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre seconded the motion moved by Mr. Wright, the then honourable Member for Melfort, whose amendment, as it appears in the *Journals* of 1951 at page 142 reads as follows:

"That this bill be not now read a second time but that further consideration thereof be deferred until this house has had an opportunity to record its opinion that consideration should be given to the construction and operation of pipe lines by a crown corporation, or by a public agency owned and controlled by the government of Canada."

That referred to a bill entitled "An Act to Incorporate Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company". This is merely an amending bill which deals exclusively with a subdivision of the shares.

Although by virtue of citation 657 it is competent for an honourable Member to move an amendment to the second reading of a private bill it would appear that the other rules relating to relevancy and principle and not going beyond the scope of a bill have to be considered.

As I say, I shall allow the amendment to stand until the bill is called again. I hope that in the meantime the honourable Member will be able to think of some good reasons why his amendment should be considered to be in order. At the moment I do not think it is.

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER.

"Mr. Speaker: I should point out that this bill is merely an amending bill which deals with the sub-division of shares. It is not like the bill incorporating the company in 1951. At that time the then honourable Member for Melfort (Mr. Wright) moved a motion declaratory of a principle different from that which emanated from the bill.

The honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles), seconded the motion moved by Mr. Wright, whose amendment, as it appears in the *Journals* of 1951 at page 142 read as follows:

'That this bill be not now read a second time but that further consideration thereof be deferred until this house has had an opportunity to record its opinion that consideration should be given to the construction and operation of pipe lines by a crown corporation, or by a public agency owned and controlled by the government of Canada.'

That referred to a bill entitled 'An Act to Incorporate Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company'. This is merely an amending bill which deals

exclusively with a subdivision of the shares.

Although by virtue of citation 657 it is competent for an honourable Member to move an amendment to the second reading of a private bill it would appear that the other rules relating to relevancy and principle and not going beyond the scope of a bill have to be considered."

And the debate continuing on the main motion;

Mr. Cameron (Nanaimo), seconded by Mr. Winch, moved in amendment thereto,—That Bill No. 15 be not now read a second time, but that the subject matter thereof be referred to the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Harris, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. 238, An Act to amend The United Kingdom Financial Agreement Act, 1946, which was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The following Bill from the Senate was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House:

Bill No. 226 (Letter E of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to amend the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act".—Mr. Garson.

On motion of Mr. Zaplitny, seconded by Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain), it was ordered,—That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General praying that he will cause to be laid before this House a copy of all correspondence, telegrams and/or other communications exchanged between the government and farm organizations and/or commercial firms with regard to cash advances on farm stored grain and/or the Prairie Grain Producers Interim Financing Act, since January 1st, 1957. (\*Notice of Motion No. 13).

The Order being read for the House in Committee on Bill No. 15 (Letter I of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company";

Mr. Knowles raised a point of order to the effect that the order for the consideration in Committee of the Whole of this Bill, An Act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company, should stand until the printed evidence of

the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines with respect to the consideration of the said Bill therein had been distributed to Members of the House.

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. Speaker: This is a novel point. I do not even recollect any insistence being made upon the production of printed evidence before a second reading of a bill was proceeded with. In all my experience in the House since 1945 I cannot recollect any request being made in the House, except in the case of divorce bills, that the printed evidence should be made available to all honourable Members before they proceeded to the second reading of a bill.

I do not know whether the honourable Member for the Battlefords (Mr. Campbell) wishes to address himself to the point of order which has been raised, but I want to say that the point raised by the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) is in my view a novel one, and one which is not easy. I have listened to him very carefully, as I always do. I have my own views on the matter, but before I give a ruling I would like to have a chance to consult with the officials of the House. The honourable Member has had a chance, so to speak, to prepare himself, and he has come to the House well prepared to put a certain point of order. If the House is to insist, as it usually does, and as the House, I think, may be entitled to—on a decision on my part, I would say that I am almost prepared to give one, but I would like to have an opportunity of looking at this point further and, at least, for consultation with the Clerk.

And a debate arising on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: It seems to me that the manner in which honourable Members have placed the point of order before the Chair indicates that they forget that the printing of evidence by a committee is for the use of the committee. I can see the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre is surprised at what I say.

The point that has been raised is not an easy one and it is one about which, as usual, I want to make a very sound ruling. I say that the printing of evidence is done by a committee, through an order of the House at their request, for the use of the committee. When I say that I am merely echoing citation 539 of Beauchesne, third edition, which is in these words.

"In case a committee requires its evidence to be printed for its own use in the course of an inquiry, it will make a report requesting that this be done. Formerly it had to apply to the Joint Committee on Printing, but this practice had to be abandoned in view of the fact that the Printing Committee consists of Senators as well as Members and the matter is one which concerns the Commons only."

Therefore, in case a committee requires its evidence to be printed for its own use in the course of an inquiry it will make a report requesting that this be done. Immediately the honourable Member will ask himself what I asked myself. Why is it that the report of the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, to which the bill now up for consideration in Committee of the Whole was referred, is in the form found at page 159 of Votes and Proceedings? As found there, it reads:

"3. That it be empowered to print, for the use of the Committee and of Parliament, such papers and evidence . . ."

Whereas down below on the same page we find this. The Standing Committee on Industrial Relations asks that its evidence be printed but it asks for it in the following form which is the traditional form:

"1. That it be empowered to print from day to day 750 copies in English and 250 copies in French of its Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence, and that Standing Order 66 be suspended in relation thereto."

The wording in the report of the Standing Committee on Industrial Relations which appears in the Votes and Proceedings at page 159, the very same day, is in the traditional wording whereas the Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines does not use the traditional wording. I can see a very good reason for that. So far as I can remember—and I think at one time I was a member of that Committee-that Standing Committee never asks that its evidence be printed except on extraordinary occasions. The Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines very seldom request the services of shorthand reporters. So far as I can recall, I have never seen a bill going through that committee where the proceedings were being taken in shorthand. We hear the officials at various sittings of the committee and they answer questions, and the evidence is not printed. I am informed by the Clerk that it may be that the clerk of that committee prepared the report which was submitted to the House and approved, as it appeared at page 159 of the Votes and Proceedings, in that form. But as I say, that is not the traditional form. The traditional form is the one exemplified in the report which appears at the bottom of the page; and the report which appears at the bottom of the page is quite in line with citation 539 of Beauchesne's third edition which contains the words, "a committee requires its evidence to be printed for its own use".

There is another point I should like to bring to the attention of honourable Members. The honourable Member for Mackenzie (Mr. Nicholson) himself stated that the committee had asked for the printing of 650 in English and 150 copies in French. If the honourable gentleman could state that as of right he must have the evidence before he can proceed with the second reading of a bill, he should at least make sure that there are enough copies in both languages to proceed with the bill; that is 265 copies in English and 265 copies in French. That is so with respect to any measure that comes before the House. The rule is to the effect that all documents that we deal with here must be translated into the two languages.

I should also like to point this out to honourable Members. If we were to agree with the reasoning that was presented to us by those who have placed the point of order before the Chair, then towards the end of the session when several committees have had matters referred to them, if we had to wait for the evidence to be printed before we could deal with the legislation that has been reported from these committees, and evidence printed in both languages, we would have to wait sometimes one week, two weeks or three weeks, and sometimes more than that; and in cases of French evidence we would have to wait for from one to two to three months, so I am informed by the officials at the Table. What that would mean is this. Any bill reported from the various standing committees towards the end of the session could not be proceeded with until about three months, four months or five months in order to get the evidence.

The point raised by the honourable Member is, as I said—and I think he will realize it himself—a novel one. In my experience I never heard it raised before. It is a matter of courtesy, I would say. The honourable Member has asked the sponsor to allow the bill to stand because he would like to see the evidence. Presumably he is not a member of that committee.

The sponsor of the bill says no. The honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre raises the matter as a point of order. After consultation with the Clerk at the Table I must come to the conclusion that, under our practice or under our rules it has never been contemplated that we should have to wait for the evidence to be printed before we take up second reading, study in Committee of the Whole or third reading of a bill. I am satisfied that citation 539 of Beauchesne's third edition states the position clearly, namely that the minutes of evidence of a standing committee are printed for their own use and once they are reported, they become a permanent record of the House of the proceedings of that committee. But if we were to state that they are required for the study of any of the stages of a bill, I would say that we would in fact be placing in our book a new rule to the effect that the bill had better not be reported before the evidence is ready and we would have the result as I outlined a few minutes ago, namely that in certain cases the committee would not report the bill because the evidence could not be printed for three or four months.

The point is, are we going to be put in the position in the future, through a ruling of the Chair, that the printed minutes and evidence of the committee, for the use of Parliament as part of the records, is to be available before a bill is proceeded with in the House, when under the rules a bill is put on the Order Paper, has been called and read by the Deputy Clerk, the particular bill must be either proceeded with or must be withdrawn or discharged. I must rule against the point raised by the honourable Member.

From this Ruling, Mr. Knowles appealed to the House.

MR. SPEAKER: The question is on an appeal from the Speaker's Ruling. The order for the House in Committee on Bill No. 15 (Letter I of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company" (Without Amendment) being read, the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre, Mr. Knowles, raised a point of order to the effect that the order for the consideration in Committee of the Whole on this bill, An Act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company, should stand until the printed evidence of the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines with respect to the consideration therein of the said bill has been distributed to Members of the House.

Mr. Speaker ruled that the point of order was not well taken since the evidence of a committee is printed for the use of the committee as stated in citation 539 of Beauchesne's third edition and that the words in the report of the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines which appear at page 159 of Votes and Proceedings—"for the use of the Committee and of Parliament"—must necessarily mean that the printed evidence will be ultimately for the use of Parliament as part of the permanent records of Parliament and cannot in any way preclude and stop the consideration of an order appointed such as that which has been read this day, because immediately it would place the consideration of such orders at the mercy of the printing in both languages of the various reports coming from the standing committees which, as it is well known, sometimes may take from one to five months before they are made available.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker:

Shall the Ruling of the Chair be sustained?—It was decided in the affirmative on the following division:

### RULING BY MR. ACTING SPEAKER.

Mr. Acting Speaker: It was intimated at the time this amendment was proposed that the amendment would be looked at again to determine whether or not it fell within the rules of the House.

It is not necessary to go very far to look for precedents and for a decision on that point. At page 155 of the *Journals* of this House for 1956, the debate of February 14, 1956, an item reads as follows:

"The order being read for the second reading of Bill No. 82, an act to provide for Short-Term Credit to Grain Producers in the Prairie Provinces to meet Temporary Financial Difficulties arising from inability to deliver all their Grain;

Mr. Howe (Port Arthur) moved,—That the said Bill be now read the second time.

And the question being proposed;

Mr. Harkness, seconded by Mr. Dinsdale, moved in amendment thereto,—That Bill No. 82 be not now read the second time, but that it be resolved that in the opinion of this House consideration should be given to the introduction of legislation which will provide for cash payments on farm stored grain."

Delivering his ruling, Mr. Speaker went into the matter at some length. I do not think it is necessary for me to read the two full pages. He did say:

"It is a reasoned amendment and a reasoned amendment must oppose the principle of a bill; it must be relevant.

The bill now before the house deals with credit, with the lending of money, whereas the amendment deals with cash advances."

Mr. Speaker said later, on page 156.

"I am basing my remarks today on principles, and I am prepared to state them to the house. The honourable Member for Kamloops (Mr. Fulton) has doubted the point I made with respect to relevancy. There is no question about relevancy. I have before me May, fifteenth edition, and at page 508 there is the following:

'The principle of relevancy in an amendment governs every such

motion.'

This is the chapter dealing with second reading of bills and amendments thereto, and in saying that May refers to page 400 of the same volume where I find the following:

'The fundamental rule that debate must be relevant to a question necessarily involves the rule that every amendment must be relevant

to the question on which the amendment is proposed."

The bill under discussion at that time and the amendment under discussion at that time are, I think the House will admit, so very close to the principle and the wording of the bill under discussion at the moment, and the amendment under discussion at the moment that I have no alternative but to adopt as my own the last two lines of Mr. Speaker's ruling on that occasion, on page 157, which reads:

"Much to my regret, for the reasons I have given and the authorities I have cited, I must rule the amendment out of order."

From this Ruling, Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain) appealed to the House.

MR. SPEAKER: The question is on an appeal from the Acting Speaker's Ruling. To the motion for second reading of Bill No. 263, An Act to amend the Prairie Grain Producers Interim Financing Act, 1956, Mr. McCullough (Moose Mountain), seconded by Mr. Bryce, moved in amendment as follows: That Bill No. 263 be not now read a second time, but that it be resolved that in the opinion of this House the government should give consideration to the advisability of introducing legislation to provide a permanent system of cash advances on farm stored grain.

Mr. Acting Speaker ruled the amendment out of order on the ground that it was not relevant to the Bill now before the House since the amendment proposed that consideration be given to the introduction of legislation to provide for a permanent system of cash advances on farm stored grain, whereas the Bill, on the other hand, proposed to authorize and govern guaranteed bank loans for a limited period.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker:

Shall the Ruling of the Chair be sustained?-It was decided in the affirmative on the following division:

Your Committee has considered the following items of the Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1958, referred to it on March 13, 1957:

Vote 454—Prince Edward Island Car Ferry and Terminals deficit, 1957;

Vote 455—Newfoundland Ferry and Terminals deficit, 1957;

Vote 465-Maritime Freight Rates Act; and

Vote 466—Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships Limited.

Your Committee recommends approval of Votes 454, 455, and 465. In respect of Vote 466, your Committee has ascertained from its study of the 1957 Capital Budget of Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, that this item will not be required and, accordingly, recommends that it be withdrawn.

The foregoing items of the Main Estimates stand referred to the Committee of Supply, pursuant to Standing Order 57.

Mr. Cavers, from the Sessional Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Pursuant to the Orders of Reference of the House of Commons of March 12th and 13th, this Committee had before it for consideration the following:

- 1. The Annual Reports of Canadian National Railways, the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, for 1956, and the Auditors' Reports to Parliament in respect thereto.
- 2. The Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways Securities Trust for 1956.
- 3. The Annual Report of the Trans-Canada Air Lines for the calendar year 1956 and the Auditors' Report to Parliament in relation thereto.
- 4. The Capital Budgets of the Canadian National Railways, the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, both for the year 1957, and the Operating Budget and the Capital Budget for Trans-Canada Air Lines for the calendar year 1957.

Your Committee held eight meetings during which meetings the officials of C.N.R. and T.C.A. and the auditors were heard and the reports, budgets and certain matters relating thereto were considered and evidence adduced thereon.

Your Committee was gratified to note surpluses for each of the transportation systems which submitted reports to it. The Canadian National Railways report revealed a surplus of \$26,076,951.00 which indicated a greatly improved financial position over last year. The average net income for the past five-year period works out to approximately \$1.7 million a year. Freight revenue rose to an all-time high of \$612.8 million, up \$72.6 million from the results of 1955.

Your Committee noted the continued progress of the dieselization programme. This approach, with emphasis on the application of diesel-electric power to specific runs and services, should offer a greater return on investment. The said Annual Report was adopted.

The Annual Report of Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, for 1956 indicated a net operating surplus of \$23,281. This compares most favourably with a deficit of \$95,964 in 1955 and represents a net improvement of \$119,245. The operating revenues showed an increase from \$5,946,605 in 1955 to \$6,125,470 while operating expenses increased from \$5,995,684 in 1955 to \$6,052,570 in 1956. South-bound tonnage was up 2% in 1956 largely because of increased flour shipments to Jamaica. North-bound traffic declined by 14% in 1956 due entirely to a decrease of 12.5% in sugar traffic. The said Annual Report was adopted.

The Annual Report of Trans-Canada Air Lines for 1956 showed a net surplus of \$1,556,212. This was the sixth successive year in which a surplus had been recorded. The improvement over the previous year's results was attributable to increased traffic throughout the system, a slight increase in the

proportion of capacity sold and to improved productivity of personnel and aircraft. Air transportation in Canada felt the effect of a strong national economy. The Committee noted that the delivery of additional Viscounts permitted an extension of service for these extremely popular aircraft. An aggressive sales policy has been maintained and, for the first time, this year over two million passengers were carried in a single year. The said Annual Report was adopted.

The Auditors' Reports to Parliament with respect to Canadian National Railways, the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, and the Trans-Canada Air Lines, as well as the Report of the Canadian National Securities Trust, for the calendar year 1956 were severally considered and

adopted.

The Financial Budgets of the Canadian National Railways System, the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, and Trans-Canada Air

Lines for the calendar year 1957 were examined and adopted.

The Committee also considered Votes 454, 455, 465 and 466 of the Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1958. In its Second Report, your Committee recommended approval of Votes 454, 455 and 465 and that Vote 466 be withdrawn.

Your Committee was assisted in its deliberations by the evidence which was presented by Mr. Donald Gordon, C.M.G., LL.D.; Mr. S. F. Dingle; Mr. R. D. Armstrong; Mr. J. A. Sauvé; Mr. G. R. McGregor; Mr. W. S. Harvey; Mr. J. A. Wilson, and Mr. J. W. Beech which was readily delivered by these gentlemen in a most efficient and straightforward way.

  - (d) ignores the problems and needs of agriculture."

And on the proposed motion of Mr. Cameron (Nanaimo), seconded by Mr. Knowles, in amendment to the said proposed amendment,—That the amendment be amended by changing the semicolon at the end of subparagraph (a) thereof to a comma, and by adding immediately thereafter the following words:

"by increasing the old age pension to an amount commensurate with the increase in the gross national product since 1949, which would call for a pension of approximately \$75 a month;".

And the Debate continuing; at 9.45 o'clock p.m., Mr. Speaker interrupted the proceedings pursuant to Standing Order 58(4);

The hour for Private and Public Bills having expired.

By unanimous consent, the House reverted to "Motions".

On motion of Mr. Weir, seconded by Mr. McCubbin, it was ordered,—That the name of Mr. Shaw be substituted for that of Mr. Patterson; and That the name of Mr. Robichaud be substituted for that of Mr. Michaud, and That the name of Mr. Tucker be substituted for that of Mr. Studer; and That the name of Mr. Gardiner be substituted for that of Mr. Weselak; and That the name of Mr. Richardson be substituted for that of Mr. Demers; and That the name of Mr. Lafontaine be substituted for that of Mr. Fontaine;

That the name of Mr. Bennett be substituted for that of Mr. Weaver; and That the name of Mr. Hanna be substituted for that of Mr. Decore; and That the name of Mr. Goode be substituted for that of Mr. Harrison; and That the name of Mr. Bryson be substituted for that of Mr. Jones, on the Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization.

Debate was resumed on the proposed motion of Mr. Harris,—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Ways and Means.

And the debate continuing;

The Minister of Finance having risen to speak;

Mr. Knowles raised a point of order to the effect that our standing orders permit a right of reply only on a substantive motion and a motion that Mr. Speaker leave the Chair does not qualify as such.

MR. SPEAKER: That was my understanding of it, although I would not be prepared to make it as clear as the honourable gentleman seems to make it. That is my understanding of it, but I would not want to be in the position of making a snap ruling on the matter. I feel secure enough in my opinion, however, so as to not allow the Minister to speak today.

And the Debate continuing; at 9.45 o'clock p.m., Mr. Speaker interrupted the proceedings pursuant to Standing Order 58(6);

And the question being put on the said proposed motion, it was agreed to, on division.

The House accordingly resolved itself again into Committee of Ways and Means and, progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: A moment ago when the Minister of Finance rose and indicated that he had the right to reply to what he considered to be a substantive motion, namely the one that I do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Ways and Means, I indicated that I felt sure enough of my opinion not to allow him to use the right of reply and I did say he did not have such a right.

When the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) indicated that it should be made clear that the motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means in this instance is not a substantive one I indicated perhaps it is not that clear.

I think that a point can be made both ways. One can make a very good argument to the effect that this is a substantive motion and that the right of reply should be attached to it. There is only one motion that is in use under our rules traditionally, for the purpose of presenting the budget especially now since our rules have been changed and, since a substantive motion is a self contained proposition which is amendable, this is the case with respect to this type of motion.

The other argument is that a substantive motion should not be incidental to any other proceeding. If one looks at the theory behind a motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means one must begin with the Speech from the Throne where His Excellency tells the Commoners:

"You will be asked to appropriate the funds required to maintain the services and payments provided under the authority of Parliament."

This is a command to us which we have translated into a standing order, S.O. 55, which is to the effect that as soon as the Address is adopted in obedience to this command we appoint the Committee of Supply and Committee of Ways and Means which must remain open until all the business to be dealt with in those two Committees has been completed. Therefore the motions to go into Committee of Ways and Means or to go into Committee of Supply are merely incidental to the standing order pertaining to the creation of these Committees and their functioning and in turn this procedure is adopted in relation to the command that is received in the Speech from the Throne at the beginning of every Parliament.

Of the two opinions I have spoken about I prefer the latter and I am convinced in my own mind that it is the right one. The only reason I did not say it was so clear because I think and the Clerk agrees with me—we have been discussing this at some length—that a good case could also be made to say that this particular motion for the budget presentation is a substantive motion and the right of reply should be attached to it. But I would rather leave it as my opinion that it is the other way around. The other argument I presented is, I think, better.

Citation 294 is to the effect that by custom the second reading of a bill is construed to be, for the purpose of the right of reply, not a substantive motion, but one to which the right of reply is allowed. That is only by custom. At one time it was expressed in our standing orders that second reading was also to have the right of reply but it has been taken off and continued by custom.

The right of reply attaches to substantive motions. The question is simply whether this motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means is or is not a substantive motion. My honourable friend the Deputy Chairman of Committees (Mr. Applewhaite) answers yes but I believe a case can be made for both sides of the question. I prefer the one I made a moment ago and that is that no right of reply attaches to this motion.

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: I would have liked very much to have asked the House to give me an opportunity of looking at the authorities before making a decision. You sometimes come across a pertinent section in the authorities, but when the question is raised in the House it is difficult to find that section. In Campion's Introduction to the Procedure of the House of Commons, there is a paragraph which says that the House, no matter how ample its powers may be, is not entitled to all the documents it requests. In May it says the same thing; perhaps I can find it more precisely.

The point is simply this. I know for a fact that in all the authorities there is this statement. The House is not entitled—I am repeating almost word for word the statement that appears in May—no matter how ample its powers may be, there are certain documents to which the House is not entitled and that is those a Cabinet Minister refuses to produce on his own responsi-

bility. The only point that may be debatable is the ground on which the Minister refuses to produce the document. One may argue it can be done only on the ground of public interest. Others may argue, quite successfully, that they may do so not only on the pure ground of public interest, but they may simply do so on their own responsibility. The only way of dealing with that type of refusal is to argue the matter out at election time and let the people decide.

And the question being put on the said motion;

More than five Members having risen and asked for a division, Mr. Speaker gave the order to call in the Members.

MR. SPEAKER: While the Members were being called in I had a chance to find the authorities that I had quoted from memory. Campion's An Introduction to the Procedure of the House of Commons, at page 169, reads:

"The rule as laid down by May is, 'A minister is not at liberty to read or quote from a dispatch or other state paper not before the house, unless he is prepared to lay it upon the table.'

The rule is akin to the rule of evidence in courts of law, and is a recognized standard for ministerial practice. It only applies to direct quotation from a paper, not to a mere summary of arguments contained. Nor is it always enforceable in the case of actual quotation. In the first place it may be overridden by considerations affecting the public interest. Nor does it apply to private memoranda or correspondence or generally to any papers the production of which would, but for it, be refused to the house as being beyond its jurisdiction. The conclusion from these divergent considerations is that papers which cannot be laid in toto should not be read or quoted in extracts."

Then, May's 15th edition, at page 258:

"Returns may be moved for, either by order or address, relating to any public matter, in which the house or the crown has jurisdiction. They may be obtained from all public offices, and from corporations, bodies, or officers constituted for public purposes, by acts of parliament or otherwise; but not from private associations, such as Lloyd's, nor from individuals not exercising public functions. The papers and correspondence sought from government departments should be of a public and official character, and not private or confidential. The opinions of the law officers of the crown, given for the guidance of ministers, in any question of diplomacy or state policy, being included in the class of confidential documents, have generally been withheld from parliament. However ample the power of each house to enforce the production of papers may be, a sufficient cause must be shown for the exercise of that power; and if considerations of public policy can be urged against a motion for papers, it is either withdrawn, or otherwise dealt with according to the judgment of the house."

The following Bill from the Senate was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House:

Bill No. 402 (Letter F-14 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to amend An Act respecting the Buffalo and Fort Erie Public Bridge Company".—Mr. Marler.

The House resolved itself again into Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolutions were adopted:

#### EXCISE TAX ACT

Resolved, That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend the Excise Tax Act and to provide, among other things:

- 1. That the sales tax on the following goods be repealed:
  - (a) certain building materials which are in addition to those already exempted, viz:—

chimney caps:

circulating pumps for use in forced hot water heating systems for the heating of buildings;

door and window screens;

precast concrete shapes when purchased by municipalities for bridges in public highway systems;

septic tanks;

structural steel when purchased by municipalities for bridges in public highway systems;

- (b) desks and chairs specially designed for use in class rooms when sold to educational institutions;
- (c) printing produced by a school or university when for its own use and not for resale;
- (d) gasoline powered self-propelled trucks, mounted on rubber tired wheels, for off-highway use exclusively at mines or quarries, and complete parts thereof;
- (e) seventy-five per cent of the sale price if manufactured in Canada, or seventy-five per cent of the duty paid value if imported, of trailers for use as homes;
- (f) potted, flowering or bedding plants, dormant flower bulbs and cut foliage;
- (g) geophysical surveying precision instruments and equipment as enumerated in Customs Tariff item 431h;
- (h) goods enumerated in Customs Tariff item 695d;
- (i) tanks for collecting milk, not including chassis or cabs;
- (j) railway ties;
- (k) certain foodstuffs which are in addition to those already exempted, viz:—

baking powder;

baking soda;

bases or concentrates for making beverages other than soft drink beverages;

cocoa:

cocoanut:

cream of tartar;

dessert powders;

edible gelatine;

flavouring extracts:

gravies and meat extracts;

meat tenderizers;

pickles, relishes, catsups, sauces, olives, horseradish, mustard, and similar goods;

pie fillings;

prune juice, grape juice;

salad oils, mayonnaise and salad dressings;

sandwich spreads;

spices, condiments and seasonings;

tea, coffee and substitutes therefor;

vinegar;

2. That equipment specially designed for use directly in road making, road cleaning or fire fighting, but not including automobiles or motor trucks, when sold to or imported by municipalities for their own use and not for resale, be

exempted from the sales tax when the price is in excess of five hundred dollars (\$500) per unit, instead of the present exemption for units priced in excess of one thousand dollars (\$1000) per unit.

- 3. That the excise tax on the following goods be repealed:
  - (a) soft drinks and imitations thereof;
  - (b) carbonic acid gas for aerating non-alcoholic beverages;
  - (c) candy, chocolate, chewing gum and confectionery;
  - (d) motor cycles and all other two- or three-wheeled motor driven vehicles including motors for attachment to bicycles;
  - (e) ash trays and certain smokers' accessories, not to include tobacco pipes, cigar and cigarette holders and cigarette rolling devices;
  - (f) fountain pens; ball-point pens, ink pencils; propelling pencils, desk sets and all other desk accessories;
  - (g) gold-plated or silver-plated ware for the preparation or serving of food or drink;
  - (h) articles of cut glassware, crystal glassware, cut or not, etched glassware, or metal decorated glassware;
  - (i) articles of china, porcelain, earthenware, marble, stoneware, or other pottery ware;
  - (j) Canadian raw leaf tobacco;
  - (k) pewter ware.
- 4. That any enactment founded upon this Resolution be deemed to have come into force on the fifteenth day of March, nineteen hundred and fifty-seven.

#### INCOME TAX ACT

Resolved, That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend the Income Tax Act and to provide, amongst other things:

- 1. That for the 1957 and subsequent taxation years an individual be allowed to deduct, in computing taxable income, the amount of \$100 in lieu of claiming any deduction for medical expenses, donations to charitable organizations, trade union dues and professional membership dues.
- 2. That the amount of a taxpayer's donations to charitable organizations in a year in excess of the amount deductible under the Act be allowed to be carried forward and included with his charitable donations for the immediately following year.
- 3. That a taxpayer whose chief source of income is farming or fishing be allowed to appeal his assessment for a year of averaging even if no tax is assessed for that year of averaging.
- 4. That the rule for the determination of the capital cost of depreciable farm property sold by a farmer, to his child be extended to include cases in which a taxpayer whose chief source of income is fishing sells a fishing vessel or a fishing vessel and other property used in fishing operations carried on by him to his child.
- 5. That for the 1956 and subsequent taxation years, in computing income from an office or employment a taxpayer be allowed to deduct annual professional membership dues the payment of which was necessary to maintain a professional status recognized by statute, even although he is not required to maintain that professional status by his contract of employment.

- 6. That for the 1957 and subsequent years the special deduction from income allowed to corporations whose principal business is mining or production of petroleum or natural gas for expenses incurred in searching for minerals in Canada or exploring or drilling for petroleum or natural gas in Canada be extended to corporations whose principal business is processing mineral ores for the purpose of recovering metals therefrom or a combination of processing mineral ores for the purpose of recovering metals therefrom and processing metals recovered from the ores so processed.
- 7. That for the 1956 and subsequent taxation years payments made for the full-time care in a nursing home of the taxpayer, his spouse or dependant who was throughout the whole of a 12 months' period ending in the taxation year necessarily confined by reason of illness, injury or affliction to a bed or wheel chair may be included in the medical expenses for which a deduction from income may be made for the purpose of computing taxable income.
- 8. That for the 1956 and subsequent taxation years payments made for the full-time care in a nursing home of a dependant of the taxpayer certified by a medical practitioner to be a person who, by reason of lack of normal mental development, is and in the foreseeable future will continue to be dependent on others for his personal needs and care may be included in the medical expenses for which a deduction from income may be made for the purpose of computing taxable income.
- 9. That for the 1957 and subsequent taxation years donations to certain corporations established for the purpose of providing low-cost housing accommodation for the aged may be included in the charitable donations for which a deduction from income may be made for the purpose of computing taxable income.
- 10. That for the 1956 and subsequent taxation years a teacher be allowed to deduct, in computing income, an amount not exceeding \$250 paid by him in the year to a fund established by the Canadian Education Association for the benefit of teachers from Commonwealth countries present in Canada under a teachers' exchange arrangement.
- 11. That for the 1957 and subsequent taxation years an individual be allowed to deduct, in computing income, an amount paid by him as a premium under a registered retirement savings plan and, for this purpose, that the Income Tax Act be amended to give effect to the inclusion therein, following section 79A thereof, of a new heading and section as follows:

### "Registered Retirement Savings Plan.

### 79B. (1) In this section,

- (a) "annuitant" means an individual referred to in subparagraph (i) or (ii) of paragraph (h) to whom, under a retirement savings plan, any annuity for life is agreed to be paid or is to be provided;
  - (b) "benefit" means any amount paid or payable under a retirement savings plan, otherwise than as a premium;
  - (c) "earned income" means earned income as defined in subsection (5) of section 32, plus any amount deductible in computing income under paragraph (i) of subsection (1) of section 11;
- (d) "maturity" means the date fixed under a retirement savings plan for the commencement of any annuity the payment of which is provided for by the plan;

- (e) "premium" means any periodic or other amount paid or payable under a retirement savings plan,
  - (i) as consideration for any agreement referred to in subparagraph(i) of paragraph (h) to pay an annuity, or
  - (ii) as a contribution referred to in subparagraph (ii) of paragraph(h) for the purpose stated in that subparagraph;
- (f) "refund of premiums" means any amount paid or payable under a retirement savings plan, on or after the death of the annuitant thereunder in the event of his death before maturity, as or on account of
  - (i) a return of premiums,
  - (ii) reasonable interest on premiums, or
  - (iii) a share or interest in or a bonus out of profits or gains;
- (g) "registered retirement savings plan" means a retirement savings plan accepted by the Minister for registration for the purposes of this Act as complying with the requirements of this section; and
- (h) "retirement savings plan" means
  - (i) a contract between an individual and a person licensed or otherwise authorized under the laws of Canada or a province to carry on in Canada an annuities business, under which, in consideration of payment by the individual of any periodic or other amount as consideration under the contract, that person agrees to pay to the individual, commencing at maturity, an annuity for life, or
  - (ii) an arrangement under which payment is made by an individual in trust to a corporation resident in Canada of any periodic or other amount as a contribution under the trust, to be used, invested or otherwise applied by that corporation as trustee for the purpose of providing to the individual, commencing at maturity, an annuity for life.
- (2) The Minister shall not accept for registration for the purposes of this Act any retirement savings plan unless, in his opinion, it complies with the following conditions:
  - (a) the plan does not
    - (i) provide for the payment of any benefit before maturity, except by way of a refund of premiums, or
    - (ii) provide for the payment of any benefit after maturity, except by way of
      - (A) an annuity to the annuitant for his life, or
      - (B) an annuity to the annuitant for the lives, jointly, of the annuitant and his spouse and to the survivor of them for his or her life.

commencing at maturity and with or without a guaranteed term, not exceeding fifteen years, or, in the case of a plan entered into before the 14th day of March, 1957, not exceeding twenty years, commencing at maturity;

- (b) the plan does not
  - (i) provide for the payment of any amount by way of annuity except
- (A) equal annual or other periodic amounts throughout the lifetime of the annuitant, and

- (B) equal annual or other periodic amounts (not exceeding the corresponding annual or other periodic amounts referred to in clause (A)) throughout the period, if any, after the death of the annuitant, for which payment of the annuity is provided for by the plan,
- (ii) provide for the payment of any premium after maturity, or
- (iii) provide for maturity after such time as the annuitant attains seventy years of age;
- (c) the plan includes a provision stipulating that no annuity payable thereunder is capable either in whole or in part of surrender, commutation or assignment; and
- (d) the plan in all other respects complies with regulations of the Governor in Council made on the recommendation of the Minister of Finance.
- (3) The Minister may accept for registration for the purposes of this Act any retirement savings plan notwithstanding that the plan
  - (a) provides for any annual or other periodic amount payable by way of annuity to any person to be reduced by any corresponding annual or other periodic amount that is or may become payable to that person under the Old Age Security Act;
  - (b) provides for the commutation of any annuity payable thereunder if the amount so payable, expressed in terms of a monthly rate, is less than \$5;
  - (c) in the case of an annuity for a guaranteed term, provides for the annuity to be assignable by will, or, in the event of the death of any person to whom any such annuity is payable, to be assignable by the heirs, executors, administrators or other legal representatives of such person in the distribution of his estate, so as to give effect to any testamentary disposition, or to the rights of any person on an intestacy, or to its appropriation to a legacy or a share or interest in the estate; or
  - (d) contains such other terms and provisions, not inconsistent with this section, as are authorized or permitted by regulations of the Governor in Council made on the recommendation of the Minister of Finance.
- (4) No tax is payable under this Part by a trust on the taxable income of the trust for a period during which the trust was governed by a registered retirement savings plan.
- (5) There may be deducted in computing the income for a taxation year of a taxpayer who is an annuitant under a registered retirement savings plan the amount of any premium paid by the taxpayer under the plan during the taxation year or within sixty days after the end of the taxation year (to the extent that it was not deductible in computing his income for a previous taxation year), not exceeding, however,
  - (a) in the case of a taxpayer in respect of whom any amount is deductible under paragraph (g) or (h) of subsection (1) of section 11 in computing the income of any other person for that taxation year (or would be so deductible if that other person were a person taxable under subsection (1) of section 2), an amount that, when added to the amount deductible under subparagraph (i) of paragraph (i) of

- subsection (1) of section 11 in computing the income of the taxpayer for that taxation year, does not exceed the lesser of \$1,500 or 10% of his earned income for that taxation year; and
- (b) in the case of any other taxpayer, the lesser of \$2,500 or 10% of his earned income for that taxation year.
- (6) There shall be included in computing the income of a taxpayer for a taxation year all amounts received by him in the year as a benefit under a registered retirement savings plan, otherwise than by way of a refund of premiums.
- (7) Where an amount is received by a person in a taxation year under a registered retirement savings plan by way of a refund of premiums,
  - (a) the amount so received shall be deemed not to be income of that person for the purposes of this Part, and
  - (b) there shall be added to the tax otherwise payable by that person upon his taxable income under this Part for that taxation year an amount equal to 15% of the amount so received.
- (8) Where, at any time after a retirement savings plan has been accepted by the Minister for registration for the purposes of this Act, the plan is revised or amended or a new plan is substituted therefor, and the plan as revised or amended or the new plan substituted therefor, as the case may be (hereinafter in this subsection referred to as the "amended plan") does not comply with the requirements of this section for its acceptance by the Minister for registration for the purposes of this Act, the following rules apply:
  - (a) the amended plan shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act not to be a registered retirement savings plan;
  - (b) there shall be included in computing the income of a taxpayer for a taxation year all amounts received by him in the year that, by virtue of subsection (6), would have been so included
    - (i) if the amended plan had been a registered retirement savings plan at the time he received those amounts, and
    - (ii) if those amounts had been received by him otherwise than by way of a refund of premiums,
    - and no deduction shall be made under paragraph (k) of subsection (1) of section 11 in respect of those amounts in computing his income for that year;
  - (c) there shall be withheld or deducted from any amount paid to a person in a taxation year as a benefit under the amended plan, by the person paying that amount, an amount equal to 25% thereof, and any amount so withheld or deducted shall forthwith be remitted to the Receiver General of Canada on account of the payee's tax for the year under this Part;
  - (d) where an amount is withheld or deducted under this subsection from any amount paid to a person as a benefit under an amended plan, it shall be deemed, for all purposes of this Act, to have been received at that time by the person to whom the benefit was paid; and

- (e) where an amount is withheld or deducted under this subsection from any amount paid to a person as a benefit under an amended plan on account of that person's tax for a taxation year under this Part, and the amount or the aggregate of the amounts so withheld or deducted exceeds
  - (i) the amount of that person's tax, if any, for the year under this Part before making any deductions under sections 33 to 41, minus
  - (ii) the amount that his tax, if any, for the year under this Part before making any deductions under sections 33 to 41 would be if no amount were included in computing his income for the year by virtue of paragraph (b),

the amount of the excess shall be deemed, for the purposes of this Act, not to have been paid on account of that person's tax for the year under this Part, but as a debt due to Her Majesty.

- (9) For the purposes of subsection (8),
  - (a) a reference to an amount paid as a benefit under an amended plan shall be deemed to include any amount paid under that amended plan, otherwise than as a premium or an amount that would, by virtue of paragraph (e) of subsection (1), be regarded as a premium if that amended plan were a retirement savings plan; and
  - (b) an arrangement under which a right or obligation under a retirement savings plan is released or extinguished either wholly or in part and either in exchange or substitution for any other right or obligation or otherwise (other than an arrangement the sole object and legal effect of which is to revise or amend the plan) shall be deemed to be a new plan substituted for that retirement savings plan."

That in determining the aggregate net value of property subject to duty under the Dominion Succession Duty Act upon the death, after the 31st day of March, 1957, of a predecessor, there shall be deducted the dutiable value of any succession to a charitable organization in Canada operated exclusively as such and not for the benefit, gain or profit of any person, member or shareholder thereof.
- 2. That where provincial duties have been paid in respect of property subject to duty under the Dominion Succession Duty Act upon the death, after the 31st day of March, 1957, of a predecessor, the successor to that property may deduct from the duty otherwise payable under the Dominion Succession Duty Act in respect of that property, one-half of the duty otherwise so payable in respect thereof.

The said Resolution was reported and concurred in.

Bill No. 404 (Letter H-14 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Samuel Jack Goldberg".

The following Question was made an Order for Return under the provisions of section (5) of Standing Order 39:

Question No. 60, by Mr. Pommer,—Order of the House for a Return showing: 1. What was the total expenditure in each province of Canada for the fiscal year 1955-56, by the Federal Government, including the statutory subsidy and tax rental agreement payments?

2. What was the total expenditure, during the fiscal year 1955-56, in each province by each Federal Department and Agency?

Mr. Harris, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,—Return to the foregoing Order.

The House resumed the adjourned debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Martin,—That Bill No. 320, An Act to authorize Contributions by Canada in respect of Programmes Administered by the Provinces, Providing Hospital Insurance and Laboratory and other Services in Aid of Diagnosis, be now read the third time.

And on the proposed motion of Mr. Knowles, seconded by Mr. Nicholson, in amendment thereto,—That Bill No. 320 be not now read a third time but that it be referred back to the Committee of the Whole House for the purpose of reconsidering the requirement that six provinces must enter into an agreement before contributions can be paid to any province, as set out in sub-clause (2) of clause 6 of the said Bill.

And the debate continuing;

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: I have been deeply troubled by the amendment because of my predecessor's pronouncements in 1952. One day he allowed an amendment for the reconsideration of certain payments to be made in respect of a Bill which was An Act for the Control and Extirpation of Foot and Mouth Disease, and that appears at page 23 of the *Journals* of 1952. He reversed his position on March 6, 1952, and he said:

"Yesterday when the house was considering third reading of the bill in connection with the foot and mouth disease, Mr. Diefenbaker moved an amendment. The Minister of Agriculture contended that the amendment was out of order. However, I allowed it to stand. Since that time I have given further consideration to the amendment and although it may have been technically in order I am rather doubtful of the practical results which would have followed if it had carried. The committee would have reconsidered an amendment which would have necessitated an expenditure of money. But the committee could not have taken any action on the matter without a motion by a member of the government. The government had intimated that it would not propose such an amendment. Accordingly, I am doubtful if any useful purpose would have been served by referring the matter back to the committee. The purpose of this statement is to advise the house that, for the reason which I have stated and for other reasons, should a similar amendment be moved on any future occasion, I would not feel myself bound by the ruling which I made yesterday."

The amendment moved at that time by the honourable Member for Prince Albert (Mr. Diefenbaker) was as follows:

"That bill No. 7 be not now read the third time but that it be referred back to the committee of the whole for the purpose of reconsidering an addition to section 2, subsection (1), to provide that in no case shall such compensation be less than the economic value of the animal or animals at the time the said disease was diagnosed."

The financial resolution which preceded this bill was as follows:

"That it is expedient to introduce a measure to authorize contributions to be paid out of the consolidated revenue fund to provinces in respect of costs incurred by them in providing insured hospital and diagnostic services pursuant to provincial law and to agreements made in accordance with the said measure, to commence when at least six provinces containing at least half the population of Canada, have entered into such agreements and qualified for the receipt of such contributions."

I have read the discussion which took place on an amendment in Committee of the Whole. I read the whole argument presented by the honourable Member for Eglinton (Mr. Fleming) as it appears at pages 2662 and 2663 of *Hansard*, 1957, which had to do with the amendment in committee, in much the same terms as that which is being proposed now.

I saw the amendment that was sent to the Chair in substitution for another one, but I did not go back to the earlier one. I read the debate which took place at the time, and the citations referred to in Beauchesne's third edition and May have particular application today. What troubles me is that Mr. Speaker Macdonald confronted with a similar situation was, as I confess I was until I saw his changed opinion, inclined to allow the amendment. However, the next day he felt he ought to warn the House that should a similar amendment be offered in the future and I consider this is quite similar, he would declare it out of order.

I have been examining this thing very closely. The resolution that was introduced disclosed the fundamental terms, together with His Excellency's recommendation. A resolution preceding a money bill is part of the introduction of the bill, and it attaches to the bill throughout the various stages, which are merely various stages offered for reconsideration.

The argument of the honourable Member for Eglinton in Committee of the Whole was that no particular money is being voted now; that it will have to be provided for by Parliament later through an estimate. At page 732 of May's 15th edition May deals with that type of expenditure. He says:

"The most frequent case of expenditure of this type is that of charges upon moneys to be provided by parliament for salaries and other expenses caused by the imposition of novel duties upon the executive government by the legislation of the session."

At the top of the page he says:

"The effective imposition of a charge has been extended by an amendment of standing order No. 78 to include the imposition of charges upon "money to be provided by parliament" which before 1866 had been excluded, probably on the ground that it implied no immediate charge but only authorized the presentation of estimates."

I was discussing this particular matter with the Clerk because I know that in certain instances we are 100 years or 150 years behind the United Kingdom in our practice; but he tells me that although we have no standing order such as they have in the United Kingdom dealing with this very matter, we are following the practice which prevails in the United Kingdom, and that a bill in which moneys are contemplated to be provided later by Parliament through an estimate, is considered here and has been for many years, a money bill preceded by a money resolution.

The only point which troubles me is a term in the money resolution which was preliminary to the introduction of this bill. The words, "to commence when at least six provinces" are part of the fundamental terms of the resolution. Citation 440 of Beauchesne's third edition reads:

"The fundamental terms of a money resolution submitted to the house with the Governor General's recommendation upon which a committee of the whole is set up cannot be amended. Amendments will only be in order if they fall within the terms of the resolution. The procedure in committee on those resolutions follows in principle the

procedure of the committee of supply, and amendments are out of order if they are proposed with a view to substituting an alternative scheme to that proposed with the royal recommendation."

Some honourable Members may claim that the way the amendment is worded it is in the abstract form. The amendment reads:

"... that it be referred back to the Committee of the Whole House for the purpose of reconsidering ..."

Well, the words "for the purpose of reconsidering" are tantamount to instructions to reconsider the requirement. What would be the use just to send it back to the Committee of the Whole and just say, "We do not want to do anything effectively with this; we just want to reconsider it." If, after having done so, the Minister says that he does not want to make any alteration, then what? And he could not do so unless he received another recommendation from His Excellency the Governor General. Even if he did not need a new recommendation, I take it that since the amendment was moved in Committee of the Whole, his pronouncement was to the effect, as I read it in the record, that he was opposed to changing the scheme. I have read the regrets expressed by Mr. Speaker Macdonald on Wednesday, March 5, 1952, when he allowed the amendment and warned the House that he would not feel bound by the ruling that he had given. That took place on Thursday, March 6, as it appears in the Journals of that day at page 27. I am very much impressed by the warning of Mr. Speaker Macdonald.

And a debate arising on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: It must be very clear to all honourable Members that when I said that the amendment, if it were carried, may not serve any useful purpose, I was echoing the words and the reasoning of Mr. Speaker Macdonald; he did go along with the reasoning of the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) on March 5, 1952, as it appeared on page 23 of the Journals. However, on page 27, the next day, he rose and said:

"Since that time I have given further consideration to the amendment and although it may have been technically in order I am rather doubtful of the practical result which would have followed if it had carried. The committee would have reconsidered an amendment which would have necessitated an expenditure of money. But the committee could not have taken any action on the matter without a motion by a member of the government. The government had intimated that it would not propose such an amendment. Accordingly I am doubtful if any useful purpose would have been served by referring the matter back to the committee. The purpose of this statement is to advise the house that, for the reason which I have stated and for other reasons, should a similar amendment be moved on any future occasion, I would not feel myself bound by the ruling which I made yesterday."

I was merely repeating this and this is the reason why I have been troubled about this amendment from the very start. If it were not for this ruling of Mr. Speaker Macdonald I would have said nothing about the amendment. However, why did Mr. Speaker Macdonald, after having made the statement which he did on an amendment of a similar nature at page 23, feel that it was his duty at page 27 on the next day to make the further remarks which I have just read to the House?

Therefore I have been examining and re-examining the point and the conclusion to which I have come is that on a matter of this kind you can just as easily go either way. I could take the reasoning of the Minister of National

Health and Welfare (Mr. Martin) and say that is good enough for me and make a ruling along that line. On the other hand, I could take the reasoning of the honourable Member for Winnipeg North Centre, because that would be just as good. I could find decisions both ways more or less on a half and half basis. Because of all the difficulties involved I would like to have more time to go behind the reasons that motivated the statement of Mr. Speaker Macdonald on the very next day after making a ruling. I would ask the House to go along with the suggestion that I have often made that the amendment be modified by unanimous consent, so that we do not have a dispute on the point of an amendment respecting third reading of the bill giving instructions to reconsider a money clause in a money bill which must necessitate a money resolution at the time of introduction and must be moved by a Minister of the Crown. I see no reason why the House cannot agree to have the amendment simply read that the bill be referred back for the purpose of reconsidering subclause (2), clause 6, because any Member has the right to change a word, or a comma into a colon or a semicolon. So therefore I do not think if the House would agree to have the wording of the amendment changed in that manner, that the point with respect to the financial initiative of the Crown would be involved in any way whatsoever. Of course that is left to the unanimous consent of the House. If the House does not wish to give unanimous consent I would not at the moment feel prepared to declare the amendment out of order. Does the House agree that the amendment be changed so as to read that this bill be not now read a third time but be referred back to the Committee of the Whole for the purpose of reconsidering subclause (2), clause 6 of the said bill?

By unanimous consent, the amendment was amended to read as follows: That Bill No. 320 be not now read a third time but that it be referred back to the Committee of the Whole House for the purpose of reconsidering sub-clause (2) of clause 6 of the said Bill.

And the question being put on the said proposed amendment, it was negatived on the following division:

My Government has sought both inside and outside the United Nations to play a constructive part with a view to reducing the risk of renewed hostilities between Israel and Egypt; to facilitating the early clearance and reopening of the Suez Canal, which is so important to the waterborne commerce of our friends in Europe and Asia; and, through Canada's participation in the United Nations Emergency Force, to establishing conditions conducive to a long-term solution of the political problems of that area.

In March, discussions were held between my Prime Minister and the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom at Bermuda which dealt with a wide range of matters of international concern and in particular with questions of primary interest to Canada and the United Kingdom. The possibility of a meeting of Commonwealth Prime Ministers early this summer was also discussed.

The emergence of the former colony of the Gold Coast into full Commonwealth membership as the independent state of Ghana was welcomed by all Canadians as a further confirmation of the value and the adaptability of our free association of sovereign states linked by common interests and common loyalties. One of my Ministers represented Canada at the inaugural ceremonies.

During the present session useful discussions were also held with the Prime Minister of France who addressed a special joint meeting of both Houses of Parliament.

The brutal suppression of the Hungarian people by the armed forces of the Soviet Union served to emphasize the continued need for the greatest possible degree of unanimity of purpose among the nations of the free world and the importance of maintaining an adequate system of collective defence.

My Ministers continue to believe that our position in the Commonwealth and firm support of the United Nations, and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization are essential contributions to the advancement of our aim of preserving peace and promoting prosperity throughout the world.

In the course of the present session you have approved important items of legislation of lasting benefit to the Canadian people.

You have authorized the Government to enter into agreements with the Provinces for the establishment of a nation-wide system of insurance programmes for hospital care and diagnostic services. This legislation constitutes an important step forward in helping to improve the standard of health for the Canadian population and in relieving individual citizens from the worrisome burdens of large hospital bills.

You have approved legislation for the establishment of a Canada Council for the Encouragement of the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. Undoubtedly, both the fund for scholarships and grants and the fund for assistance to universites for capital expansion projects will accelerate the cultural and intellectual growth of the nation.

To the same end the annual federal grants for universities have been doubled.

Provision has been made to assist the transportation to Canada of Hungarian refugees. Special arrangements have also been made for the movement of large numbers of British, French and other immigrants to this country.

Canada's development is proceeding at such a pace that it continues to place a strain on our human, material and financial resources. In order to hold inflationary tendencies in check, my Ministers have urged that governments and private enterprise exercise restraint in their expansion projects.

A special committee of the Senate has begun a comprehensive investigation of the use of our land resources to contribute more effectively to the improvement of agricultural production and the incomes of those engaged in it.

The Report of the Royal Commission on Economic Prospects has been laid before you. In accordance with its recommendation that special consideration be given to assisting the economies of the Atlantic Provinces, the Government has announced its intention of undertaking a detailed examination of transportation conditions in that area. In the meantime, increases in the payments under the Maritimes Freight Rates Act have been authorized. An offer has been made to construct inter-connection facilities between the electricity systems of the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and to build and operate large thermo-electric plants in the Atlantic area to meet at the lowest possible cost the power requirements of growth and industrial development in that region. The recent adjustment in the tariff on potatoes should also have a favourable influence on its economy and on the economy of other farming areas.

A Royal Commission has been established to review the financial position of the Province of Newfoundland in accordance with the Terms of Union of that Province with Canada.

The Report of the Royal Commission on Radio and Television Broadcasting has been completed and presented for your consideration.

In furtherance of the government's policy to maintain a high standard of social welfare in this country, increases are being made in the scale of payments to veterans under the Pension Act and the War Veterans Allowance Act, as well as payments under the Family Allowances Act, the Old Age Security Act, the Old Age Assistance Act, the Disabled Persons Act and the Blind Persons Act.

You have approved a measure authorizing the payment of the equivalent of full taxes on federal property in all municipalities where such property receives normal municipal services.

You have approved legislation authorizing the continuance of the Canadian Wheat Board as the sole marketing agency for Western wheat, oats and barley. You have also enacted amendments to the Agricultural Products Marketing Act, the Prairie Grain Producers Interim Financing Act and the Prairie Farm Assistance Act, as well as a measure extending the scope and provisions of the Canadian Farm Loan Act.

Other measures enacted during this session included the Pacific Salmon Fisheries Convention Act, the Pacific Fur Seals Convention Act, the Windsor Harbour Commissioners Act, the Fertilizers Act, and amendments to the Export and Import Permits Act, the Territorial Lands Act, the Canada Shipping Act, the Currency, Mint and Exchange Fund Act, the Export Credits Insurance Act, the Judges Act, the Exchequer Court Act, the Quebec Savings Banks Act, the Merchant Seamen Compensation Act, the Eastern Rocky Mountain Forest Conservation Act, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act, and the Prisons and Reformatories Act.
