CONSTITUTION.

I.

The Society to be called THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary, within six months of the said meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceeding such meeting.

VI.

OFFICERS.

1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, if any, shall be the Senior Vice-Presidents; and any Life Member may, at any meeting of the General Committee, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of death, resignation, or removal from the Province of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a special meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life

Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or St. John, on the first Wednesday in January; on the day next following the Annual Meeting; on the first Wednesday in March; on the first Wednesday in June; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following the aforementioned days, as may be approved by the President, or, in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but, so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate, and property whatsoever, which may now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee, or any General Meeting of the Society would have in session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer, and Secretary or Secretaries, of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, *ex officio*.

2. Five Clerical and Seven Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the

General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed Member by two Members of the General Committee, together with one Clerical or Lay representative chosen by each Deanery and resident within the same, whose name shall be certified to the Committee by the Secretary of such Deanery, as having been duly elected at a regular meeting.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation and disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any resolution, Bye-law or Regulation of the General Committee.

4. Five Members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

OBJECTS.

The Society shall embrace the following objects and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of School-masters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a Fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or securities as special Trusts.

11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy.

12. The establishment of Missions to Seamen, and other Missionary work.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergymen on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to His Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

LOCAL COMMITTEES.

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Parish, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the Members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to elect two Lay Delegates and two Substitutes at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The Members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay Delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the said Delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said Delegates, upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as members of the General Committee

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and St. John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special Meeting of the General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or, in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and St. John respectively.

XIV.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors; the Rector or Missionary of each

Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees, as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* Members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the Funds of the Society, and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The order of business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held; provided that in every such case a Report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries: therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the General Purposes of the Society.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church, in each Mission requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregation notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary through the Society shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof. Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled, in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e) The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter. If paid in money the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer; and if paid in produce such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

(f) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g) Should neither the money nor receipts for produce to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice (C), and should neither such money nor receipts have been so received, by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice (D). However, the arrears be subsequently paid, the Board shall have power to renew the grant on application from the Mission.

(h) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missions shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half yearly, or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply generally to any such Mission.

(k) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules and regulations, as in their opinion may be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That every Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return, on the first day of May in each year, showing—

- (1) The estimated number of the members of the Church of England.
- (2) The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively.
- (3) Whether or not there is a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
- (4) The income from Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 30th April last.
- (5) The amount contributed towards the support of the incumbent, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
- (6) The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.
- (7) The average congregation in each place of worship at Sunday services.
- (8) The number of baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
- (9) The number of communicants last year.
 - A. Added.
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
- D. Present number, (counting all those who having had opportunity have communicated within the year).
- (10) The number confirmed.
- (11) Marriages.
- (12) Burials.
- (13) Names of Church Wardens.
- (14) Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.
- (15) The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the second object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the directions of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the Capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter be made to exceed in any one year the interest on the Capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of Clergymen who are incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity shall consist of the Capital sum of \$3,000; being the amount heretofore specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to the Society for this special object, and the interest only of this Fund shall be applied to the relief of disabled Clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in a Committee to consist of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor (if any) of the Diocese, and of three Clergymen and three Laymen, to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, at the July meeting thereof.

4. Any Clergymen duly appointed as Rector, Missionary or Assistant Curate in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application, in writing, to the Committee appointed under Rule 3, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The application shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension, or income of which applicant may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit. In all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of an application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure with all its emoluments.

7. The Committee may, at their discretion, alter or withdraw any of the pensions, subject to an appeal to the General Committee.

8. If any pensioner shall be able to undertake any clerical duty for which he shall receive any stipend, the pension shall be reduced, or shall cease, at the discretion of the Committee, as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergymen shall receive any benefit from this fund unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his continued disability shall accompany his draft for the pension.

11. Pensions shall be payable quarterly, and proportionately for any part of a quarter, on the first day of January, April, July, and October, in each year.

12. No alteration or amendment to the above rules may be made except by the General Committee, and upon notice of the proposed change given in writing, at the next previous annual meeting.

THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund to be called "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities), of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these rules; and this fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance to these rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund shall, within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman being a member of this Fund shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments and all congregational collections shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days. If this rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrears.

5. Upon compliance with the above rules the Diocesan Church Society undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension of Two Hundred Dollars, to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood. Provided that in case the income should at any time be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions for which it may be liable, such pensions shall be reduced by the Executive Committee, *pro rata*; provided, nevertheless, that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

6. If the widow die or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age the pension shall cease.

7. The trustees named in the will of the Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his

widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act; or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes with the Bishop's consent from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the sum of \$6.00 in lieu of the collections from his Parish or Mission.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall from time to time under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published, in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half yearly, on January 1st, and July 1st, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations, and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener if required by him.

16. None of the above rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto (being \$1,869.79), of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to, or applied by, the Society for this special object; and the interest of this fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of Clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died, or retired with the Bishop's approval on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of The Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of The Diocesan Church Society, who if they shall think fit, may vest such management in a sub-committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant, to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension or income, of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, may, in any case, require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, shall determine, in each case, the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee, be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Executive Committee or its sub-committee may direct.

9. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of The Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

ABSENCE OF MISSIONARY.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee, for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made and shall expire with it.

VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money, whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

CONDITIONS OF GRANTS.

Whereas, The Grants made by The Diocesan Church Society from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions.

Therefore Resolved, That, in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

BEQUESTS TO BE FUNDED.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

RETURNS FROM PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes, and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized.

Therefore Resolved,—1. That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

CONTRIBUTIONS—HOW CHARGEABLE.

That the Secretary of the Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions, reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds, that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting, and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

SECRETARIES OF LOCAL COMMITTEES.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually, to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

That the certificates of the Lay Delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

MISSIONS BECOMING VACANT.

That when any Mission now receiving aid from the Society shall become vacant, the grant from the Society shall therefrom cease, and shall only be renewed upon application to the General Committee, or to the Board of Home Missions, and upon such terms as to assessment and grant as they, or either of them, shall consider equitable.

AID TO LOCAL ENDOWMENTS.

Whereas, It is desirable that this Society should encourage the formation of moderate endowments to take the place of grants now made to Missions throughout the Diocese, which grants must of necessity be rapidly reduced, and in many cases completely withdrawn before very long.

Therefore Resolved, That if at any time within the next three years any Mission receiving a grant from this Society shall raise an endowment of not less than Three Thousand Dollars, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer of this Society, in trust, for the payment of the stipend of the Missionary, the Board of Home Missions shall be authorized to order the Treasurer to pay into such Trust Fund, out of the Capital Funds of the Society, not specially appropriated, a sum equal to double the grant that such Mission may be receiving from the Society at the time such endowment is completed; and thereupon all grants in aid of such Missions shall be withdrawn and shall not afterwards be renewed.

PROVISION FOR THE RETURN OF SUCH ADVANCES.

And Further Resolved, That in order to provide for the return to the Capital Funds of the Society of monies so paid, the Treasurer shall reserve and set aside out of the income of the Society each year, for four years after such payment has been made, one-half the amount of the grant that such Mission was receiving at the time the endowment was completed, and shall re-invest the same as part of the Capital of the Society.

PROVISION AS TO THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF SUCH ADVANCES.

And Further Resolved, That the payments made under this resolution out of the Capital Funds of the Society shall not exceed Two Thousand Dollars, until further authority shall be given by the General Committee.

TRAVELLING OUTFITS.

(Resolution passed July, 1884.)

Resolved, That when a man commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Diocesan Church Society, a sum not exceeding \$250 may be advanced to him for the purchase of the necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to serve at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be repaid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of the three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL COMMITTEE, JULY, 1887.

Resolved, That all grants made to Missions by the Diocesan Church Society be upon the condition that insurance on Parsonages be maintained as heretofore required.

RESOLUTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

GLEBE LAND COMMITTEE.

A Committee shall be appointed to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, at public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purposes to advertise in any manner the said lands, or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the seal of the Society to be affixed to the same; also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made; all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisions, and stipulations of 48th Victoria, Chapter 36, ss. 50, 51, 52, 53, 54; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of lands leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

REPORT.

1888.

Never since this Society has undertaken the Missionary work of this Diocese have greater apparent difficulties been encountered than during the past year. In July last, the General Committee, at the recommendation of the Board of Home Missions, made the most careful appropriation of the funds; only in one instance was provision made for new work. It has been found that the grants then made have exceeded the disposable funds to a considerable amount. Most unfortunately the contributions for General Purposes fell short of the estimate. To this subject the most anxious and careful consideration has been given by the Board of Home Missions, with the most earnest desire to avert the probable result.

By a careful estimate, it was discovered that to go on with the work the Society had taken in hand, a large addition to the funds would be required,—to be continued year by year. Otherwise certain Missions must be abandoned; those in prospect left aside, and a reduction made in the already too limited allowances to the Missionaries. Various plans have been suggested and discussed by the Board to avert the impending misfortune. One plan, accepted by the majority of the Board, will be submitted for the approval of the General

Committee. This has wisely been laid before the several Rural Deaneries, by which means, the present state of things, the requirements and prospects of the Society, are plainly made known to the members of the Church.

The Parishes in the Diocese, which are supported wholly, or in part, by endowments or by comparatively wealthy congregations, will most earnestly be solicited to add to their offerings. In many instances a generous response is anticipated. Those Missions which are maintained by aid from this Society will be called on for reliable contributions to the General Fund. It is most earnestly to be hoped that this proposal will not entail additional burdens upon the clergy. Their stipends, if punctually paid, apart from all sources of anxiety, are very insufficient, and greater care should be taken in the several Missions, from local sources, to relieve their burdens.

The crisis, which has been long anticipated and of which timely warning has been given, has arrived. It remains for the members of the Church to decide whether the work, undertaken by the Society, shall advance or decline. Shall Missions be withdrawn, Churches closed,—all calls for aid be disregarded?

Surely, He who loves His Church, will in mercy put it into the hearts of His people to avert such a dread calamity! A calamity, which would fall alike on those left destitute of the means of grace, and on those who, with means at hand, refuse compliance with the Divine Will.

ANDOVER—REV. LEO A. HOYT.

The past year has been, to me, one of more than ordinary labor, and I feel that the work has received more than ordinary blessing. It is probably known that in July, 1886, the Bishop Coadjutor placed in my hands \$500 for the maintenance of work in this portion of the Diocese. It was intended that this should be an annual payment. But the Bishop, having lost \$1,000 deposited in the Maritime Bank, for church building purposes (every cent of which he recouped), I felt that he should be relieved as far as possible. I have therefore been striving to overtake two men's work. Since Easter, I have had the assistance of the Reverend H. B. Morris, but as he is living upon his private income, I could not in fairness ask him to do more than take the charge of one congregation. Work of this kind is more effective than the diffused effort of ordinary missionary labor, and Mr. Morris will be of the greatest benefit to the congregation of St. George's Church, Bairdsville.

The congregation of Birch Ridge are working bravely, and I hope to report next year that St. Bartholomew's Church, of this place, has been consecrated. I hope also to report next year the consecration of St. Alban's Church, Undine, which is approaching completion. Your committee for promoting the third object of the Society has given much encouragement to different parts of this Mission field. A grant of Bibles, Prayer Books and Catechisms, to the Sunday-school of Birch Ridge has facilitated the conducting of the school, while a handsome set of wall cards prove at once an ornament to the wall and a means of instruction to the children.

A similar grant has been made to the Sunday-school at Foster Cove—for which your committee will please accept the thanks of these Sunday-schools.

This committee has also been very useful in the matter of exchange of books. Andover having through this medium exchanged with Grand Falls, and Birch Ridge with Woodstock.

I have also to acknowledge with thankfulness the gift to this Mission, of a cabinet organ, from some unknown friend

in St. John. While I have thus much cause for thankfulness, I have also been reminded more than once during the past year that the strongest physical powers have their limit. If you expect to retain the life of the Church here at all, it is imperative that two men should be sent at once. The district of Carleton County, lying to the east of the River St. John, at one time had a grant under the name of Aberdeen. There is at present in the Parish of Peel in this district a strong nucleus for work. The Sunday-school conducted by Mrs. Tompkins is a most interesting feature, and at my monthly services a goodly number of communicants are always assembled. The district lying along the Tobique is daily growing in importance. The Birch Ridge Settlement has been already referred to as a nucleus in this district, while the presence of Mr. Jago at Arthurette is a security that the interests of the Church will not be neglected at this point, and the Messrs. Philippin and others, at Foster's Cove, have always cheerfully consented to do what they could for the interests of the Church. In this district, which will be known as the Mission of Gordon, there has been made an offer to guarantee from one party \$300 for five years, on condition that the balance be paid and clergyman provided. As this is the first offer of its kind in the history of the Diocese, we assume great responsibility if we ignore or neglect it. Contributions, \$60.

BATHURST—REV. G. D. PETERS.

CAMBRIDGE—REV. CHARLES H. HATHEWAY.

Cambridge can now rejoice that it is one of the few country Parishes that possesses a stone church; and although the work is not yet completed, we are looking forward with pleasure when it may please God to allow our venerable Bishop to return to his Diocese and consecrate our little Church in September.

The "Foundation Stone," which is of red polished granite and the gift of Messrs. Stanton Bros., of St. John, was duly laid on the 4th of last August by the Bishop Coadjutor, assisted by the Clergy of the Deanery and the Rural Dean, of Fredericton. And we had (L.D.) our first service in the Church on Christmas Day, when it was crowded to excess.

The walls of the church are of rubble, the trimmings to doors and windows of Caen stone from the Cathedral, Fredericton, and the gift of the Metropolitan and Mrs. Medley. Grey granite adorns the base, quoins, buttresses and lintels. It is to be finished on the inside with white birch and black ash battens.

Many kind friends have assisted us in this our work and labor of love, yet we still want a few hundred dollars to enable us to have our Church free of debt at the time of consecration.

The Parish Church has been enriched by a splendid bell from the McShane foundry—the gift chiefly of the Sunday-school children; and the new Warden, Mr. John Orchard, has erected almost at his own expense a shed for the horses.

St. Luke's Church, Young's Cove, has had the rafters cut and the roof raised, and we have advertised for tenders for the completion of the work, which means a chancel, vestry, tower; a surbase and arched roof inside.

We are thankful to the "Finance Committee" who have given us the balance due us from the Scovil Trust Fund.

Through the kindness of Bishop Kingdon we were able to start a new Sunday-school at Coal Creek, and the work in the Parish seems to prosper in spite of much opposition.

CAMPOBELLO—REV. FREDERICK PEMBER.

I took charge of the Parish at the end of August, 1887. There had been an interregnum of seven months, which fact

had a prejudicial effect on the Parish. I found a great desire on all sides to have the vacancy filled, and a certain readiness to help generally in the work of the Church. Our congregations are declared to be rather above the average, while there has also been a small but appreciable increase on the communicant roll. The most encouraging feature is our Sunday-school, which numbers about 110 scholars and 10 teachers—we have usually about 80 in attendance. The choir is very fair, though lacking in masculine element; we now chant the Psalms at evening service on Sunday. Periodical services have been held in other parts of the Island, viz.: Near the "Narrows" and at Wilson's Beach, which have been well attended and thoroughly appreciated. But at present I have not thought it necessary to extend any efforts beyond the Island. The church is to be embellished by the addition of an aisle, which we hope to dedicate on July 27, St. Ann's Day. The financial condition of this Parish continues about the same; it is essentially a fishing population, and there is not a rich person among them. Still, the assessment is always promptly paid. Last autumn, just before winter, I handed in nearly thirty dollars to the treasurer, voluntary offerings to the D. C. S. This summer I expect to hand in fifty dollars. On the whole, I am disposed to be encouraged at the outlook of affairs, but I am certain that in addition to faith in God, it will require of us all patience and perseverance, perhaps for years to come, to find any substantial success.

CANTERBURY—REV. C. A. S. WARNEFORD.

CANNING—REV. N. C. HANSEN.

Our contribution to the D. C. S. will be \$20.00, which is an increase over last year.

We are sorry that there are no erections of Churches and Sunday-schools in this Parish to report this year. If we were to judge from outward appearance we could lay no claim to

progress. Nevertheless, we trust that the Church's administration has not been in vain, and that deep in the heart seed has been sown which will bear fruit to eternal life.

If the Bishops return before winter we will have a large class to present for confirmation. We certainly call it an ill wind that has blown both our chief pastors to England during the most useful season, yet we sincerely hope that it may blow somebody good.

I cannot refrain here from mentioning the zeal and labors of Mr. Coburn, of Little River. When others refused to take the trouble he undertook the laborious task of collecting a large portion of my salary. The Church is cleaned, lighted and heated by himself or his family. His whole family sing in the choir and his daughter plays the organ. If wind and weather keep all others home they are always sure to be there. Mr. Coburn also is superintendent of the Sunday-school at Little River and always takes a class himself. All these services and offices are entirely voluntary. It would be well for the church if she had many sons as active in her service as Mr. Coburn, and I hope that he may serve as an example to many churchmen.

CARLETON—REV. O. G. DOBBS.

Through the kindness of the Rector of Newcastle there has been regular fortnightly services at Derby and Nelson, but Blackville has been almost entirely without any.

DORCHESTER—REV. J. ROY CAMPBELL.

It is ebb tide with us yet, nor do I know when we shall reach low water, and still less can I see the flood. The names of several subscribers will again be missed this year; but a perusal of the list will prove that the Society has yet among us staunch and generous friends, who will give as long as they have the means.

I am glad to be able to report upwards of one hundred and sixty dollars for the General Purposes Fund; and probably about a hundred for the Incapacitated Clergy Fund.

As Rural Dean I may say that the thanks of the Society are due to Canon Brigstocke and Canon Neales, who did good work in January last by visiting every Parish in the Deanery of Shediac and speaking on the needs of the Diocese. Their reports from the several Parishes will, I believe, show that they feel the impetus to the work of the Society which that deputation then gave; and I have no doubt at all but that if a similar deputation of the right men went into every Parish in each of the other Deaneries, that the Society's financial difficulty would entirely disappear.

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT—REV. W. LEB. MCKIEL.

FAIRVILLE—REV. J. C. TITCOMBE.

Church life in this Parish has progressed greatly since I last made a report. We are now able to chronicle a communicants' roll of over 100, and many others desire confirmation. The congregations still keep very good, and work is all the time progressing. There is a good Sunday-school

with an efficient and faithful staff of teachers, a large Bible class, and a painstaking and regular attending choir, and last, but not by any means least, two very excellent sewing guilds; the self-denying labors and ceaseless zeal of the younger guild can call for much praise. Our men, many of them, are also excellent and faithful workers—giving their time and labor in many works on behalf of their church. All the necessary works connected with the Church are done by voluntary workers. Lay-reader (Mr. H. F. Perkins, to whom the priest in charge is greatly indebted), the organist and our verger, Mr. Wm. Miller, being alike unpaid. To them the best thanks of priest and people are undoubtedly due. The Church is also kept neat and clean by our Willing Workers, and the fuel required during the winter is also sent in as free-will offerings.

We have had rather a trying time during the past year. Many outsiders, aided by what seems to be found in every Parish, a section of slighted, jealous malcontents and one or two disappointed office-seekers, being jealous of the success of the Church in this place, and without their aid, have tried to annoy us and to upset our work; the result, however, of their labors was to unite more closely the faithful ones. We are also very much hindered in doing many other works, being burdened with the task of furnishing our Church and building, what now is absolutely necessary, a Parsonage; until that is done we shall find it very difficult to make both ends meet. Then, again, our people labor under greater disadvantages than those of any other Parish that I know, for in addition to the burdens already mentioned, work is only obtainable here in the mills (the principal means of support) from May to December. After the mills are closed money is very scarce, and as the people have neither homesteads nor farms to fall back upon for produce, etc., they are forced to run into debt during the winter, and their first earnings are required to pay house-rent and store debts. We have therefore been unable at present to do much for the D. C. S., but we are not ungrateful, and hope yet to repay the Society for the help they have hitherto granted us, and which we hope they will for a few years more continue to give. The following is a record of work done by the people during the two years of our existence as a separate mission:

Our large old debt has now been entirely wiped out. The Church and School have been insured for \$3,000. The glass

in windows has been paid for. The nave of Church finished and painted on the outside. The narthex built as a Jubilee gift and offering. The Church grounds cleared up, levelled, walks made, and a new substantial fence erected and painted. The School enlarged, clapboarded, chimneys built, repaired and painted both inside and outside. A new porch, library and guild room erected and furnished. A barn and woodsheds erected. The foundation of the chancel built. Trench cellar of rectory dug, and over \$100 in hand for it.

New furniture bought for the Church, and our running expenses and stipend fund hitherto paid. Much, however, has yet to be done before the Church is finished. The roofs of building inside are being sheathed and other work done.

FREDERICTON—REV. G. GOODRIDGE ROBERTS.

I am happy to be able to report that a special effort has been made to increase the subscriptions from the Parish of Fredericton to the D. C. S., and that it has been so successful that I feel safe in promising not less than \$1,630, of which about one-half has already been collected.

In addition to this amount the Women's Mission Aid Association, of Fredericton, has raised two or three hundred dollars during the past year for the aid of the Poor Missions of the Diocese.

GAGETOWN—W. B. DINGEE, WARDEN.

At the resignation of the Rev. James Neales last October, after being Rector for nearly 30 years, we wrote to the Bishop to know if there was any clergymen we would be likely to get. The answer was that he did not know of any. We then advertised in the *Church Guardian*, and to the answer Mr. Hackley from the Diocese of Montreal made application. After communication and recommendation from some of his parishioners we nominated him to the Bishop. We then went to work to collect for the Diocesan Church Society, and the amount is \$70.00. To the present date, through the kindness of the Rev. Wm. Armstrong, the services of the Church have been performed gratuitously.

We are now making necessary repairs on the Rectory, and it will soon be very comfortable.

GRAND FALLS—REV. W. B. ARMSTRONG.

During the last winter, owing to its unusual exemption from severe storms, the services have been maintained in this Mission without interruption.

On the 7th October last we had a visit from the Metropolitan accompanied by the Rev. F. Alexander, Sub-Dean. The day following, Saturday, the journey to Edmunston was made by rail. On Sunday the Church, with the new chancel, which had been just finished, was consecrated by the name of St. John the Baptist. The churchyard also adjoining was consecrated at the same time. There had been for some time a difficulty in the way of consecrating the main building, a claim having been held against it. On the day of consecration, however, all claim was renounced, and we had the great satisfaction of worshipping in a Church unburdened by debt, free and unappropriated forever!

The east window, of triple form, which the Bishop gave us for this Church has been much admired. The central light contains the Lamb and the Banner, and on the two side lights are inscribed the words: "He brought me to the banqueting house, and His banner over me was love." We have also to thank His Lordship for two other most appropriate gifts, more recently given, namely, a handsome ash reredos, which was made at Sussex, and a very nice piece of linoleum extending the length of the nave.

On the return to Grand Falls a Harvest Festival was held at All Saints Church, when the Bishop preached. The Church was very tastefully decorated for the occasion, and aided by the Rev. F. H. Rowse, late musical director of the Woodstock Choral Union, the singing was very bright and hearty. Altogether it was a most enjoyable service, and one to be long remembered.

The contributions to the General Purposes of the Society will be slightly in advance of last year, namely, \$50.00.

GRAND MANAN—REV. W. S. JOVERT.

I have little to report beyond the usual routine of work. The services have been very regularly kept up, and the Sunday-schools are doing well. Some farther improvements have been made on the Church of the Ascension at North Head,

and some repairs are to be made on the Parish Church (St. Paul's) at Grand Harbor, and in this we hope to place a bell some time during the coming year. This last is a stone building erected in 1840. It was the second Church built of stone in this Province. The Metropolitan has held a confirmation on Grand Manan since the last meeting of the D. C. S., and the number of communicants has been considerably increased.

Our churchwomen have done much for us by means of their sewing societies.

The death of H. Chip. Seely, Esq., some time superintendent of the Sunday-school in the Church of the Ascension and a Church Warden for one year, was a great loss to us, but we trust that our great loss is his gain.

GREENWICH—REV. D. W. PICKETT.

No report.

HAMPTON—REV. O. S. NEWNHAM.

The work of the Church in the Parish of Hampton has gone on as usual during the past year. Another school chapel has been licensed by the Lord Bishop for divine service. This chapel is situated at Hampton Station, and is known as the School Chapel of the Messiah. At a confirmation held in St. Paul's Church on April 22nd, twenty-three persons received the Apostolic rite at the hands of His Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor. The depressed state of business has made itself felt in Hampton, and, as a result, the income of the Church has not been up to the average; and, moreover, a number of young persons and one or two families have removed away, which has lessened somewhat our communicants' list; but otherwise there is much in the work to give encouragement, and one's heart is often cheered by the kindness and sympathy of the parishioners.

The collections have not yet been taken up for the Society, but it is hoped that the amount will not fall short of the sum expected by the Society.

JOHNSTON—REV. C. P. HANINGTON.

The work of the Church has been steadily going on in this Parish since my last report, and there are signs of progress. The services continue to improve in heartiness, and the attendance at them is good. I have been carrying on services this summer for the first time in that section of Johnston called Bagdad. About fifty persons attend these services, and the interest taken in them is good. A Sunday-school has also been started in this district, which is well attended. As Bagdad is on the borders of Waterborough the Rev. Mr. Hatheway, Rector of Waterborough, assists in carrying on these services.

We are about to build a new Church in that part of Johnston which we call Canaan Rapids. The site has been chosen and the framing hauled. We hope to put up the frame in July and to enclose the building in the autumn. It will be but a small building 17x35, large enough, however, for our congregation. The Sunday-school there has taken rapid strides this summer, since Miss Coyle has taken it in hand. Nineteen children attend it, which is very good for a very small place.

The services at Cody's have been much improved by means of the organ, kindly loaned by Mrs. C. F. Cody. We have had hardly any singing there hitherto, but now the services are bright with music. The responding has always been good. Some day we hope to get a Church built there; but one Church at a time is enough for us to undertake.

The Rectory (which is Glebe Property) has had a new piece added to it, making it more convenient, comfortable and also more handsome.

The Parish will endeavor to raise towards D. C. S. general fund about the same as last year.

KINGSCLEAR—REV. H. MONTGOMERY.

This Parish, like many others in the Diocese, has suffered much during the year past from emigration. Within that short period three families have left the Parish, and are now residing in Fredericton, taking with them some of my most energetic and faithful helpers in the work of the Church, besides decreasing the parochial funds no small amount.

But notwithstanding this we have laymen good and true still remaining and hope for others to come in good time. There are many hopeful and encouraging signs in the work and life of the Church in the Parish for which we feel deeply thankful. The average attendance of the congregation at the two Churches has slightly increased since my last report, and we are convinced that, while the Church's growth is not as rapid as we would like to see, yet it is progressing steadily and surely though slowly. We are certainly not losing except by emigration. Financially the Parish never was in a better condition. We are entirely free from debt, and thanks to some of our energetic Churchwomen we have a good sum on hand towards erecting a new fence around the Church lot. Steps have also been taken towards putting in a memorial window in the Parish Church to the late Rev. J. F. Carr, one of my predecessors. Services have been regularly held during the year past, notwithstanding my absence and additional work in Ludlow. For the services performed in my absence I am deeply indebted to His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor, the Rev. G. G. Roberts, Rector of Fredericton, and my Lay Reader Lt.-Col. Maunsell. Owing to the proposed scheme for raising funds for the D. C. S. which comes before your committee for consideration, no collections have as yet been made for the General Purposes Fund, but we feel that when the demand is made Kingsclear will do its duty.

KINGSTON—REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT.

No report.

LUDLOW AND BLISSFIELD—REV. H. MONTGOMERY.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to report that the work in this new Mission has during the year past been most prosperous and encouraging. Many events have transpired since my last report which mark the year as a most important one for Ludlow. The ninth of last July was, as one of the parishioners expressed it, Ludlow's big day. On that day the Most Rev. the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishop Coadjutor and a number of the Clergy of the Diocese, consecrated the beautiful Church of St. James the Great. A large num-

ber of Church friends from St. John and Fredericton were present on that occasion and greatly gladdened the hearts of the parishioners by their interest in the Mission and their kindness in other ways. The services held on that and the following day were most hearty, and the addresses by the Bishop Coadjutor and the visiting brethren present were most encouraging and convincing. It was a time never to be forgotten and for generations to come the events which happened in connection with the consecration of Ludlow's first Church will be told with heartfelt joy and thankfulness. Since the consecration regular services have been held in the Church twice a month by myself, and on the remaining Sundays of the month by Mr. Walter Price, who has been licensed by the Bishop as lay reader, and who is also a great-grandson of the Rev. Walter Price, first Missionary on the Miramichi. The services are regularly and well attended and but few country Churches can boast of better singing or more hearty responding. This feature of the work is due very largely to the careful training given the congregation by that zealous and energetic servant of God, Miss Jacob, a name not unknown to the members of the Church in the Diocese and one that shall never be forgotten by the Church people of Ludlow and Blissfield. Work has also been begun in the thriving village of Doaktown under very favorable auspices. The people there are anxiously looking forward to building a Church, about which, their brethren in the faith will no doubt be reminded when the proper time comes. The congregation at this place averages about eighty. Since my last report there have been sixty-four baptisms, and eighty-one candidates confirmed. There are about fifty-two communicants on the roll, whereas a year ago there were only eight. Never was work more encouraging than in this field so long neglected, and never were there kinder or more willing hearts, ready to learn the blessed truths of our Holy Church. The Mission has, since work was begun there, found many friends good and true, but none more faithful to its interests or more beloved by the people than the Bishop Coadjutor. To him and all those kind friends in St. John, Fredericton and elsewhere, the Curate in charge and the parishioners feel deeply grateful for their interest, their prayers, and their substantial aid in carrying on the work in this Mission. To the parishioners I owe a debt of gratitude for all their kindness to me personally. To mention names would occupy too much space,

for one and all of them never cease to show their appreciation for what is being done for them. A branch of the Women's Aid Society has been formed, and in my next report I hope to be able to tell you that through their efforts a new fence will have been placed around the graveyard adjoining the Church, and God's acre more reverently and tenderly cared for. There are in the Mission four Sunday-schools comprising about one hundred scholars, in whose hearts we trust such good seed is being sown, by faithful teachers, as will redound to the future well-being of the Mission and the advancement of God's Kingdom in their midst. God grant it, and may all praise be given to Him for the mercies and blessings which have so abundantly been vouchsafed to the Church people of this Mission since our last report. The subscriptions towards the D. C. S. General Purposes Fund have not yet been completed but thus far have reached \$86.

MAUGERVILLE—REV. HORACE E. DIBBLEE.

Since my appointment to the charge of this Mission in January last, Sunday services have been held regularly (morning and evening) in the Parish church.

During the season of Lent I held week-day services in the Upper Maugerville hall, where the congregations were very large and attentive. The Friday evening services in the church during this season were also comparatively well attended.

Through the kindness and liberality of the people some much needed repairs have been recently added to the Parsonage. Our Sunday-school is in a most satisfactory condition.

The thanks of the congregation and myself are due to the Rev. R. Simonds, of Burton, who, at great inconvenience to himself, gladly came to us on several occasions and celebrated the Holy Eucharist in our behalf.

In the departure of Thomas H. Perley, Esq., and family, to Eau-Claire, Wis., the Church in this Mission sustains a severe loss, and the missionary at the same time loses a kind friend and hearty co-worker. The voluntary contributions from this (self-sustaining) Mission to the D. C. S. will not this year exceed \$15.00.

MONCTON—REV. J. H. TALBOT.

Since last July affairs have been moving very quietly forward in this Parish. The repairs last year reported as necessary to the church, were duly carried out, and, I am glad to say, paid for as they went on; they cost nearer six hundred dollars than the estimated five. We are not yet out of debt, but are in a better position than last year by about \$400, and the new rectory question has become a practical one; the Ladies' Willing Workers Society (which contributed nearly half the cost of repairs on the church, and has been mainly instrumental in reducing the debt) has taken it up and will be sure to see it through in time.

I was incapacitated for work during three Sundays in the year by illness, but through the kindness of the Rt. Rev. the Bishop Coadjutor, and the Rev. A. J. Reid, the church was only closed for one Sunday. I have to record another visit of His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor, on Sunday, March 18th, when thirteen persons were presented to receive the laying on of hands. The congregations are growing as the town grows, and the Sunday-school has increased somewhat faster and bids fair for the future strength of the Church. The communicants on Easter day numbered 116, an increase of 14 over last year.

There is no need to report contributions, as by the scheme proposed by B. of H. M. the Parish will be pledged to a share apportioned by the Rural Deanery of the sum required from the Deanery by D. C. S. If, however, the old system should be carried on, the voluntary contributions will increase slightly, unless the Parish is treated exceptionally in the matter of assessment. I find it difficult to do much collecting till this is ascertained, but may know more certainly by July.

MUSQUASH—REV. H. M. SPIKE.

By the new plan proposed by the Board of Home Missions we will publish the subscribers to the D. C. S. stipend of salary as the Board seem to suggest.

and we hope when the time comes for the Church to be self-sustaining in this Parish, the people will freely do their part, and the work of the Church will increase by that liberality which we expect from those who have so long obtained the generous help of the Society.

NEWCASTLE—REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

I have little to report to the Society beyond endorsing what I stated last year with respect to the status of this Mission. The experience of another year has confirmed the expression then made that the condition of the Parish of Newcastle must be placed upon a different basis in order that the work of the Church may be carried on in the future. I mentioned in my last report the constant exodus of Church people from the place; this removal has not decreased during the past twelve months. Those who remain are consequently much reduced in numbers and cannot support the Church as heretofore. They are, I firmly believe, doing what they can, but if the ministration of the Church is to be carried on, it must be on some such terms as those proposed last year—the entire re-arrangement of the missions of Newcastle and Derby.

As the Parish is now making an effort to pay up assessments not yet paid, for the two quarters ending Dec. 31st, of last year, I am unable to report any voluntary contributions to your Society. As it is not the intention of the Parish to call upon the Society for the payment of the grant already voted to the Parish for the year ending Oct. 1st, beyond that due on Dec. 31st, the Society will be the gainer, rather than the loser, by this arrangement.

NEW DENMARK—REV. N. M. HANSEN.

This summer I am busy with the preparation of twenty young persons to be presented for confirmation at the Bishop's return in September. I find it wise to spend a good part of my time and strength on children and young people, to educate them as well as possible for the Church. If my efforts are crowned with success the Church will prosper, if not it will lose. In my Mission there are now about 200 children under the age of 15 years (the number every year increases), nearly

all baptized by me. About 90 children are instructed in the Sunday-schools; of those about 70 attend the school at my own house, taught by me every Sunday with the assistance of my daughter. At the school in Foley Brook, a back settlement, there are about 20 children, instructed by a woman. Besides that, I go out there once a month on a week day and teach the children, and give a service for the adults. In Outlet, another remote part of my Mission, I intend working up another Sunday-school when the school-house is finished and a suitable teacher can be found.

Blessed be the venerable Church Society for enabling me and other missionaries in poor and small places to take care of the children and educate them for the Church and the Kingdom of God.

My contribution list is not yet completed. We will try to do a little better this year.

NEW MARYLAND—REV. F. ALEXANDER.

The services of this Mission have been carried on with regularity during the past year.

I regret to state that for some months past I have been obliged to suspend the work of the Sunday-school, not being able to supply the place of the late superintendent, who has removed to Fredericton.

The contributions to D. C. S. will, I trust, not fall short of those of last year.

To the care and blessing of Almighty God through another year I again humbly commit the work of this Mission.

NORTON—REV. E. A. WARNEFORD

Reports contributions to the amount of \$83.85.

PETERSVILLE—REV. W. HENRY STREET.

During the year past the Church's work in this Mission has been going on steadily and with little interruption. In the month of October last we had the privilege of a visit from Bishop Kingdon, to confirm. Twelve received the holy rite. His wise counsel and encouraging words were not in vain.

Through his kind gift of devotional books and useful tracts for distribution, there may already be noticed fruit from the good seed thus sown over the field of my labors. In due time the increase will come.

The exertions of some of my parishioners were successful in securing, at Easter, an organ for the Parish church. A large instalment on the cost has already been paid, and we hope soon to have it free from debt.

List of contributions to the Society not as yet completed.

PETITCODIAC—REV. CUTHBERT WILLIS.

Our church collections for past year for W. and O. Fund and General Purposes, amount to \$19.97. It is of course impossible to make any statement as to the probable sum that might be collected for General Purposes, as, owing to the proposed change, I have decided to take no steps to make any collection until after the question is decided at our meetings in July.

I am glad to report that our new church in Salisbury has been completed, and is occupied, although not yet consecrated. This can not be now until the autumn, by which time I hope the whole amount yet due will be raised. I am sorry to say collecting was never so difficult, and but for kind friends in England the sum now due, about \$200, would have been considerably larger.

The assistance given to me by my late assistant, Mr. H. S. Hartt, was invaluable, and although he is not now with me, I can not but express my gratitude to him for his zeal and energy in promoting and superintending the work from day to day.

I regret to say that our resources have been much weakened, and our numbers thinned by death and emigration during the last year or two. We must hope, however, that increased liberality on the part of those left behind will be the result, and the Mission still be kept on the active list. Our services, three each Sunday, have been kept up as before.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND MANNERS-SUTTON—REV. ARTHUR LOWNDES.

I beg to report as follows:

St. Clements, Riverside.—I am thankful to be able to re-

port that this congregation have voluntarily assessed themselves to make some long needed repairs on this ancient structure, and I can only hope that this is but the commencement of such repairs and restoration as will make Saint Clements church somewhat worthier of the Divine Presence. We hope this summer to exchange the old roof, which has done duty for threescore years, for a new one, and paint it, and try and make such internal alterations as will lend dignity to the two sacraments. I would remind friends of this ancient structure that it never had an altar. Offerings of a suitable table (to replace the present ordinary table), a credence and an altar rail, would be very welcome gifts.

The churchyard has been cleared of weeds and undergrowth.

Saint John, Magundy.—We are commencing the erection of the new church, and hope to have it completed before the winter sets in. I have to thank Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lockard for a deed of the site, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Henry for a deed of land adjacent to preserve the picturesqueness of the site. I also take this opportunity of thanking Mrs. Brigstocke and the ladies of Trinity Church for their help in raising funds for us.

All Saints, Maguadavic.—A troublesome dispute that has been smouldering for years, as to the ownership of the churchyard, has been set at rest, and the churchyard is at last completely fenced. The church lands have been partially fenced anew, and cutting in the church woods has been stopped. Certain trespassers have consented to pay stumpage for the timber they felled. To avoid any chance of future misunderstandings, a surveyor was engaged to run out the dividing lines afresh. This is all I have to report regarding church property in this Parish.

The Right Reverend the Bishop Coadjutor paid us a visit last October, confirming eleven candidates.

The congregations of Saint John and All Saints, as special Lenten offerings to some work of mercy, gave \$12.00 to Lady Tilley's hospital, Fredericton.

Notwithstanding considerable losses by death and emigration, the communicant roll is higher now than it was last year. The increase in frequency of communions is very marked, and only five communicants failed to make their Easter Communion.

While, therefore, I feel that there is much to thank God for, and take courage, I cannot but acknowledge that in a Parish of so large an area, much more ought to be done.

In conclusion I must repeat my thanks of last year for the increasing kindness shown me by my parishioners.

MANNERS-SUTTON.

Although the Parish of Manners-Sutton is not within my cure, yet I plead for a few words on behalf of it, simply because it is a deserted Parish. I was at one time in hopes of being able to hold occasional services at York Mills, but I soon found I could not in justice to my own Parish continue doing so, notwithstanding the kindness and liberality of the people. Still, regular services ought to be held at York Mills, and occasional Sunday services at Prince William station.

No doubt other points within that populous Parish would soon demand services, were a resident clergyman in charge of it; but these two points, being the nearest to me, are those I know most about. I am being perpetually asked to give them services, but Prince William station is twenty-five miles from the rectory, and York Mills thirty. To give any other Sunday services than those I am now doing could only be at the expense of the churches I serve. When the Right Rev. the Bishop Coadjutor visited my Parish last October, he availed himself of the opportunity to pay a long promised visit to York Mills and hold service in the school-house, when nine children were baptized. Until the Church is able to send a regular clergyman to this Parish, where the field of work is more promising than in many an old Parish, I hope something will be done to establish on some permanent basis a Sunday-school at York Mills, and perhaps Brockaway, and arrange for periodical visits of some priest.

At Prince William station a Sunday-school has, since my last report, been opened by Miss Agnes Dougherty, and kept open summer and winter, with an average attendance of 13.

Through the kindness of the Bishop Coadjutor and friends in St. John the children were able to have a Christmas tree last Christmas, and the Committee on Object III. have made a timely grant to provide Bibles, prayer-books, and catechisms. The natural result of a year's training is, that scholars and parents now ask for Sunday services. Is their request to go unheeded? It is for the laymen of the city parishes to answer that question.

RESTIGOUCHE—REV. C. D. BROWN.

Church work generally, in this large Mission, may be reported to be in a fair state. Financially, everything concerning church affairs is in a good condition. All debt has been cleared off. The churches and the rectory are insured, in accordance with the wise rule of the Church Society. There is the sum of \$120 in the bank, to the credit of the Campbellton congregation, for the purchase of a bell or other church improvement, to which our beloved Metropolitan has liberally added \$20. The Dalhousie congregation has on hand a sufficient sum to meet current expenses.

Divine services have been carried on pretty much in the same way as reported last year. I have held each Sunday, alternately, morning service or evening service at Campbellton and Dalhousie. This order, however, was broken for a few weeks during the worst part of the winter, when the roads were impassable. Then I gave the Sunday either to one or the other of the congregations. On the Campbellton Sunday the church was closed at Dalhousie; and on the Dalhousie Sunday Mr. Armstrong held the usual evening service at Campbellton. He has regularly given an evening service there once a fortnight. There is, therefore, a celebration of the Holy Communion every Sunday in the Mission, and service each Sunday evening in Campbellton.

The Litany is said at the evening services, as allowed by the Canon of the Provincial Synod. Special services have been given in both churches in Lent, and upon the principal days appointed in the Book of Common Prayer. I had to abandon the Wednesday evening service at Campbellton during the winter. The Friday evening service at Dalhousie has been regularly carried on.

Occasional services have been given at Flatlands, Dawsonville, Upsalquitch, and Mann's Mountain. His Lordship the Metropolitan visited the Mission in September, for confirmation, when thirty-eight persons were confirmed.

A nice new organ has been put in the church at Dalhousie. It is paid for. The communicants among the ladies of this congregation formed themselves into a Church Guild for the winter months. It worked on quietly and successfully. By its means a fine new chandelier and new matting were got for the church. Besides, it has some money on hand for some other good purpose.

The Sunday-school here is in good condition. Mr. H. A. Johnson is the superintendent. The teachers are faithful in their work. The Bishop Doane series of S. S. Manuals are used, and give satisfaction. In Campbellton, by the good work of the Ladies' Sewing Circle, two handsome chairs have been procured for the school. They were much wanted. The Sunday-school is improving. As there are not many church children it is not a large one. The superintendent, Mr. Armstrong, and all the teachers, are faithful and regular in their good work. The Bishop Doane series are also used here.

At Dawsonville, Upsalquitch, and Mann's Mountain I think a fairly large congregation could be got together if Sunday services could be given. At a week-day service held at Dawsonville there were 70 people present, and 21 communicants. At Upsalquitch the school-house was filled. At Mann's Mountain 35 people were present, and 13 communicants. If a church could be built at Dawsonville, all these could form one congregation.

It is to be hoped that the time is not far distant when the Church Society will be able to place an extra man in this Mission. It is impossible for one to do justice to so large a field.

I am very thankful to all who have interested themselves in church work in the Mission, especially to the Church Wardens of both congregations, to Mr. Smith, our Treasurer, to Mr. Armstrong, our Lay Reader, to the superintendents and the S. S. teachers, to Miss Murray and the members of the choirs.

The contributions to the D. C. S. are not yet completed. Last year \$81 was sent; this year we hope to send \$100.

Confirmed, 38; Baptisms, 21; Marriages, 4; Deaths, 7.

RICHMOND—REV. A. W. TEED.

Since my arrival in this Mission, towards the last of January, the services have been regularly held, and, in general, well attended. The thanks of my congregations, and of myself, are due to the Rev. Canon Neales, Woodstock, and the Rev. J. E. Flewelling, Wicklow, who, at considerable inconvenience to themselves, exchanged duties with me, in order to give to the people opportunities for partaking of the Holy Eucharist. The south side of the roof of St. John's church

has been re-shingled and painted, this spring, the cost being defrayed out of some funds which the ladies of the Sewing Circle earned last year. The rectory, which has been unoccupied for a year, is now being put in thorough repair. There is great need of a church on the Meduxnekeag. Land for a building has been offered at two different points, and if the people would agree upon a site, work could, I think, soon be begun. I hope next year to report some progress upon it.

RICHIBUCTO—REV. D. V. GWILYM.

During the past year services were held regularly at Richibucto and Kingston. The church's season of penitential sorrow and sacred joy was well observed, and the special services during Lent were surprisingly well attended. Services were held occasionally at Kouchibouguac, Buctouche, and Nicholas River, which were also well attended. On August 28th, a confirmation service was held by the Bishop Coadjutor when twenty persons were confirmed. There was a large congregation present and the Bishop's able and instructive sermon will be long remembered. Last winter we lost two families by removals; and as they were communicants and good contributors to the funds of the parish their loss is keenly felt. In regard to the present condition of the parish I may state that there are 351 persons, including children, who belong to the church, of whom only thirty-seven are communicants and fifty-eight confirmed.

The tone of church feeling is not very healthy; but it is improving. There is, however, one encouraging feature in connection with the parish and that is there never was more unanimity among the members of St. Mary's Church than at present, and this is not the unanimity of the grave; but the unanimity of active co-operation in everything that may be conducive to the best interests of the church in the parish. Definite work is being done in the Sunday-school; good text books have been introduced and the teachers evince great interest in their work. In addition to three full services every Sunday, I teach a large Bible class at Richibucto from 1:45 to 2:45 p. m. These young people are being taught the elements of theology as contained in Bishop Wordsworth's excellent manual: "Theophilus Anglicanus." Thus the sources of

permanent and future prosperity are being cultivated, and we may hope that the rising generation of church people at Richibucto will be able to give a reason for the hope that is in them.

In regard to the financial condition of the Parish I may say, that I found when I was appointed to it, eighteen months ago, every department of our little parochial machinery in debt; from the clerical stipend fund down to the Sunday-school. The Church Wardens had borrowed a hundred dollars to pay the Rev. Mr. Almon's stipend, which was drawing interest at the rate of ten per cent, and even the paint which had been used to paint the Sunday-school room nearly four years ago, had not been paid for. Last August the ladies of the congregation held a sale of work which enabled us to rejoice in a parish clear of debt. In addition to this, the following improvements have been made and paid for, viz.: an altar frontal worth seventy dollars, a chandelier worth thirty dollars, and a carriage-house, in connection with the rectory, was built last fall and paid for, and at the close of our ecclesiastical fiscal year, on Easter Monday, the Church Wardens were able to report a balance of ten dollars in hand. All told, our little congregation—a mere handful of people—none of whom are wealthy, contributed towards various objects over a thousand dollars last year. But owing to the almost total failure of the smelt fisheries last winter, and losses sustained by removals, coupled with the fact that we are likely to lose some of our best supporters next fall, I fear the Church Wardens will have more than enough to do to meet the assessment during the coming year. In conclusion, I would record my gratitude to the people committed to my care for many voluntary expressions of good will towards me, and especially for the generous gifts they gave Mrs. Gwilym and myself last Christmas.

SIMONDS—REV. G. SCHOFIELD.

Since my last report few changes have taken place in this Parish, except that rather too frequently individuals or families have removed to the United States in search of more remunerative employment.

The shipyards at Black River and Gardiner's Creek, though not quite silent, are nearly so. This is a great loss to my parishioners there.

During the year I have officiated at 16 baptisms, 4 marriages and 4 burials, and during the 29 years of my incumbency I have officiated at 997 baptisms, 255 marriages, and 337 burials.

A few weeks ago I experienced the sorest bereavement any man can sustain. Yet I was not left to sorrow as they who have no hope; but rather to marvel at those wondrous words: "Absent from the body—present with the Lord." I trust this trial will be sanctified to many, but especially that in the short time during which I may yet hope to be actively employed in the work of the ministry, I may be enabled more devoutly and more successfully to minister in holy things, seeing "the night cometh when no man can work."

SPRINGFIELD—REV. A. J. CRESSWELL.

In this, my second report from this Mission to the Society, I have little of special importance to relate. My work is as void of startling incident as is the routine of any city parochial clergyman. The three services have been kept up steadily every Sunday, involving by nightfall a triangular drive of nineteen miles.

On June 19th, of last year, the Most Rev. the Metropolitan visited us for the purpose of confirmation. 18 were confirmed—5 males and 13 females. In the afternoon His Lordship drove one mile to confirm Mr. John Kellier, who was bedridden, and since taken to his rest. Driving on four miles further, to SS. Simon and Jude's church, afternoon service was held, the Bishop again preaching. We thankfully record a gift of an altar rail from Mrs. James Scovil. It was greatly needed for the aged and infirm communicants, and therefore greatly appreciated. Likewise a Bishop's chair, kindly given by Mr. J. W. C. Northrop. We have also bought a matting for the aisle, whilst externally a picket fence is being erected.

At Norton Station the services have been regularly sustained, though the congregation does not increase. The past winter has severely tried the worshippers of this church, the stove being a poor one, and the church, in consequence, cold. This we are going to remedy. In this church also we have matting for the aisle.

I am glad to say that the Sunday-schools are doing good work, and the teachers willing to do their best. However, a word of caution is greatly needed in regard to certain Sunday-school statistics, put forth in pamphlet form relative to the numerical strength of Sunday-school scholars in this Mission, this pamphlet containing a great exaggeration.

Coming, lastly, to the Parish church, I may say that the congregations are fairly good. Mainly through the efforts of an earnest churchwoman, together with the hearty co-operation of the parishioners, \$153 were raised last summer for a bell for Trinity Church. His Lordship the Bishop kindly promised \$10, but gave us \$20, towards our bell, and its joyful sound now breaks the stillness of our quiet Sunday. I hope in the autumn to present a small class for confirmation.

An exodus to the States, I regret to say, has taken place in this Mission this spring, and in a small village community

these are seriously missed. The recent schedule from the B. H. M. finds favor amongst us, and I hope it will work more successfully than the old system.

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK—REV. CANON KETCHUM

Reports contributions from St. Andrews \$206.20, and from Chamcook \$104; total for General Purposes, \$310.20. For Algoma, and Domestic and Foreign Missions, \$30.91; W. and O. Fund, \$12.00.

ST. DAVID—REV. J. W. MILLIDGE.

I reported last year that we had commenced a new church on Tower Hill. This church is now finished, and well finished too, in the remarkably short period of eight months, and not only finished, but furnished. It was opened on the fourth Sunday in Lent, with a crowded congregation, and everybody present was delighted with the beauty of the edifice and the attractiveness of the site. Almost everything necessary for the conduct of divine service and the comfort of the congregation has been provided—pulpit, prayer-desk, and lectern very handsomely finished in black ash by the joiners who did the work on the church. A very pretty little font, presented by the Rev. T. E. Dowling, and made by Messrs. Vroom Bros., was used for the first time on St. John Baptist's day, and a very beautiful frontal and super-frontal, sent from Fredericton by Mrs. Medley, was placed upon the altar on Tuesday in Whitsun week. This beautiful piece of needle-work was partly paid for by funds collected by Miss Annie D. Powers, but was largely the gift of our much loved Metropolitan, who also sent us a cheque for £5 sterling. We all hope we shall have the pleasure of seeing him among us on his return from England, when we are to have our church consecrated under the name of the Church of the Ascension. I very much doubt if ever, in this Diocese, a church was built by so few people, and those of but slender resources, amid great opposition and discouragement. Sanballat, Tobiah & Co. were to the fore as usual, with ridicule and covert opposition, yet there stands to-day, on a lovely spot, a very picturesque church, and but \$52 due upon it. An organ is now

greatly needed; at present, we borrow one for any special service, but that is very inconvenient, and if any kind friends feel disposed to contribute to the purchase of one, I would gladly take charge of any funds sent to me for that purpose. The debt upon St. David's church, Oak Bay Road, is all paid; the Sunday congregations continue large. The holy days are always observed in this church, and the people attend very well.

The congregation of St. Thomas's church, St. James, seem determined to do something to improve the somewhat bare interior of their church, and certain funds have been collected for that purpose. The list of contributors to the Society will show that St. James gives more liberally this year than for many years past. In the lower part of St. Patrick a small congregation of church people have determined to have a building of their own. For this purpose they have now got together \$175; some materials and windows which were once in use in All Saints, St. Andrews, have been given; a piece of land near the Roix road has been deeded to the Bishop, and properly surveyed by Mr. W. Gillespie, who, I may here state, has surveyed three lots of land, for as many churches, at considerable inconvenience to himself, without making any charge.

I have received much kindness from a widow living in Bocabec, and the church, which literally is in her house. Last year I commenced services there, going once a month, after my service at the Bethel. The services are very hearty, the singing excellent, and the house generally filled with neighbors, and some from a distance who, though not of the elect few, are very attentive and seem to appreciate the ministrations of our church. \$11.60 has been contributed to D. C. S. funds this year from this small station.

The people in this Mission have suffered much from the partial failure of the hay crop; nevertheless, I have met with a cordial response to my solicitations for the Society. But nowhere did I find greater liberality than, considering their circumstances, at Beaconsfield. "For their power, yea, and beyond their power, they were willing of themselves." They are all new settlers, and therefore not too well supplied with this world's goods; yet their contribution amounts to \$7.25. A man at whose house I had dinner on my last visit there had lost a fine young horse only a fortnight before, and he was then engaged fighting a fire which threatened to burn up

everything he had. I assisted him at the fire, and when well under control I left for the school-house, where I was to have service; his wife accompanied me, and when I asked for subscriptions for D. C. S. after service, she put down \$1. At the house where I had tea they had lost their barn by fire last year, yet the family subscribed among them \$1.75. I should very much like to have a church built for these few sheep in the wilderness, and if any funds are contributed for the purpose, I would guarantee that the people would not be slack in doing their share.

I beg to report the following contributions from the St. David's local committee to the Diocesan Church Society: Widows and Orphans, \$1.44; General Purposes, \$100; first semi-annual collection, \$1.07.

SAINT GEORGE AND PENNFIELD—REV. R. E. SMITH.

There is nothing new to report from these parishes. The services of the church are well attended. During the summer months I intend holding a monthly service at Beaver Harbor on Sunday afternoon. I commenced last Sunday, and had a large congregation.

The congregation at Pennfield church is very large, and the communicants, of both sexes, and all ages, numerous, and the interest in the church continues to increase.

On the festival of St. John I baptized two adults in St. Mark's church, St. George, who, with some others, I hope to have confirmed after the return of our Bishop.

Under the proposed new schedule we will come within \$1650 of being self-sustaining. But it seems to us better for non-self-sustaining parishes to remain in connection with the D. C. S., as it tends to keep up the interest of the various parishes in the Society, and prevent them from drifting into congregationalism, and to keep the general interests of the Society more at heart. This is necessary, for we feel that upon the prosperity of the D. C. S. depends, under God's blessing, in a great measure, the welfare of the Church in this diocese.

Hard times have passed away from St. George for the present. Although owing to the general depression of business, and severe competition in the manufacture of our granite, it requires steady work and perseverance on the part of our granite proprietors and workers to keep hard times away.

ST. MARTINS —REV. R. WYNDHAM BROWN.

A year since, when the time came for preparing the annual report to the Diocesan Church Society, the present incumbent of the Parish had been in charge but two months, and therefore felt it difficult to report to the Society with any satisfaction. Since my appointment to this Parish by His Lordship the Metropolitan, the Church's services, as to time and place, have been carried on as in past years by former rectors, with the exception that two services have been held each Sunday in the Parish church without intermission, as well as the usual Friday evening and choir practice. The Church Wardens and Vestry of last year thought it best to discontinue the monthly services at Salmon River for a time, and open a new out-station at Greer Settlement, but now the services have been resumed at the former place with good results, while the work is also carried on at Greer Settlement. At Tynemouth Creek good hearty services have been held on the second Sunday and last Thursday in the month.

In October of last year His Lordship the Coadjutor Bishop came to the Parish for confirmation. A class of thirteen received the apostolic rite of the laying on of hands. In the same month the Ladies' Aid Society held a successful sale of fancy work, which realized \$130. This year the same Society promises to do good work again.

The Parish church has been thoroughly painted and a new chimney added—repairs which had long been needed. The vestry also has been papered and carpeted. The rectory, which still needs painting, has not been neglected.

The rector thankfully acknowledges a grant of hymn books, Ancient and Modern, from the proprietors of that incomparable book.

The Parish of St. Martins is at present, and has been for some years past, in a state of great commercial depression. Business is at a stand-still. Many church members, especially young men, have gone elsewhere to seek employment, which is not to be obtained here.

During the past year several new names have been added to the communicants' roll. In the death of Mrs. Charlton the church has lost a faithful and valued member.

The thanks of the Rector and congregation are due to Miss Smith for her services as organist, voluntarily given, and faithfully and efficiently performed.

In view of the probable deficiency in the funds of the Diocesan Church Society this year, the claims of that Society have been very strongly pressed upon the generosity of the congregations of this Parish. The result is gratifying. The amounts contributed will, in all probability, not only exceed the proportion laid down in the schedule for 1888, but will be double that of last year.

ST. MARY'S—REV. W. JAFFREY.

During the past year our Parish has been somewhat disturbed. Certain changes and alterations were requested to be made in the services, and I, knowing that very few of the parishioners were given to change, declined to meddle therewith. This, of course, gave rise to debate and controversy, which culminated in one of the parishioners applying to the Bishop, requesting him to allow a separate service to be held within the bounds of the Parish, yet not ecclesiastically of the Parish. To this I of course made no objection, hoping, as there were some whom nothing for good had as yet overtaken, this might overtake them.

In other ways, our work, on the whole, has been satisfactory. The baptisms number 37, of those belonging to the Parish, and three from without; a larger number than in any one year since my entering upon the work of the Mission. We hope to have the usual number of candidates for confirmation.

The sum total of all our congregations has been quite up to that of former years. In one place there has been a slight falling off, but the deficiency has been made up elsewhere. And the Church Wardens have had less difficulty this year in making up the quarterly assessment for the D. C. S. than usual. The list of communicants, however, as reported in December last, owing to the altered state of affairs, may want revision, as there have been some few names struck off the list.

Both our churches have undergone repairs and have been very much improved, thanks to the ladies' sewing circles.

ST. PAUL—REV. CANON DEVEBER.

The contributions from the Parish have not been completed. The Rector cannot guarantee more than \$300 for the General Purposes of the Society.

SOUTHAMPTON AND QUEENSBURY—REV. SCOVIL NEALES.

On the 27th of June, 1887, His Lordship the Metropolitan licensed and sent me to work in the Mission of Queensbury and Southampton. And on the same night (in company with the Rev. Wm. LeB. McKiel) I set out for my future scene of labor. Before my coming here the Parish (vacant because of inability to make up the amount required by the D. C. S.) had for some three or four years been under Mr. McKiel's care, in addition to his own large Parish of Douglas and Bright. Through his energy and zeal, however, it was not many months before the amount required by the D. C. S. for a resident clergyman was subscribed, and a guarantee to that effect sent in to the Society. For a week after my being licensed by the Bishop, Mr. McKiel went about with me, and together we visited the principal parts of the Parish, he introducing me to place and people, and thereby making my commencement of work much easier than it would otherwise have been. After getting regularly to work I found I had under my charge a parish containing some 300 square miles of country, and a population of nearly 4,000, of which not 250 are members of the Church of England. The principal stations in which work has been done in the Mission are (in Queensbury)—Bear Island, Upper Queensbury, Coverhill, and Central Haynesville. In each of the first three of these places there is a Sunday-school established and doing a very promising work. In Coverhill, the church, last fall, was much improved by having placed under it a solid granite foundation, at the cost of \$84. Since then a good substantial horse-shed has been built conveniently near, and within the next few weeks we hope to have the whole inside of the church replastered and otherwise repaired. Shortly after Christmas, chiefly through the persevering efforts of our organist and Sunday-school teacher, Miss Fanny Prescott, the amount of a hundred dollars was collected, and a new organ purchased and placed within the church.

At Upper Queensbury, the old parish church, for nearly ten years unoccupied, until last summer, has been re-opened, and divine service is now held there twice every month. The church itself has had placed under it a solid foundation, in lieu of the cobble-stone affair that was rapidly coming to pieces and threatening to tumble the church down the hill.

At Bear Island services are held fortnightly in the parish hall.

In the Parish of Southampton there is at present no church; but active steps have been taken to build one in Temperance Vale. A good site has been secured. Upwards of \$400 have been raised by the people themselves. The old foundation, laid some fifteen years ago, during the incumbency of the Rev. W. H. Tippet, the first rector of Queensbury, has been removed and set up in the present site, as the land on which it was originally placed could not be obtained. The work on the building is now progressing favorably, and we are in hopes of having it ready for consecration against the Bishop's return from England. At present the services are held in a union meeting house and always well attended. This place (Temperance Vale) is by far the most promising part of the parish as regards the Church's work. Situated in the most central part of the Mission, on the forks of the Nacawick, approachable by seven different roads, which meet within a distance of two miles, and containing a larger number of church people than any other part of the parish, it has been chosen by our Missionary as his place of abode. Here, also, we have a flourishing Sunday-school, with some fifty names on the register, under the efficient and painstaking superintendence of Miss Annie Draper, who is also teacher in the Sunday-school at the parish church in Queensbury.

At Millville, also, another station in Southampton, situated on the N. B. R., we have regular services twice a month in the union meeting house. Here, however, the number of church members is very small, not being more than a dozen altogether. But still the services are well attended, and of late the responses have been excellent—a great improvement on what they were at first, where, in a congregation of perhaps a hundred, often scarce one voice would be heard besides that of the clergyman uttering the praises of God.

I have also other stations for regular and occasional services, and other places of visiting. During the past year I have baptized twenty children, married one couple, buried three

persons, held three services every Sunday, with occasional week day services, driven upwards of five thousand miles, and paid between five and six hundred sick and pastoral visits. But, whilst having done thus much, I cannot help feeling that much has been left undone which ought to have been done. For the General Purposes of the D. C. S. this Mission will contribute this year \$91.33.

But, lengthy as this report has been, I cannot conclude without giving expression to my heartfelt thanks to the many kind friends, both within and without the Mission, who have assisted me in my work. The good Rector of Bright, of whom I made mention in the early part of this report, especially deserves my sincerest thanks for the many acts of kindness, help, and encouragement which I have received from him during the past year. On behalf of the church people in Temperance Vale, and myself, I must make grateful acknowledgement of the receipt of a very generous contribution of \$100 by the Women's Aid Association, of Fredericton, towards our new church. From my parishioners I have received every token of sympathy and good will, and much substantial help, for all of which I am very thankful to Almighty God, and I pray that His blessing may ever rest upon them and me in our united work for His honor and glory.

ST. STEPHEN (CHRIST CHURCH)—REV. THEODORE
E. DOWLING.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to report contributions to the amount of \$221.29 from this Parish.

The Board of Home Missions asked for \$200 for General Purposes. A response to that request is \$210.72. In addition to this amount \$10.57 was given to the Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund, making a total of \$221.29.

The offerings from Christ Church this year are the largest ever contributed from this town.

It has been a pleasure to me to assist our Home Mission work, and I deeply regret, after spending the whole of my ministry—twenty-seven years—in the Diocese of Fredericton, to be compelled to leave it.

WATERFORD AND ST. MARK—REV. J. R. DeW.
COWIE.

The work of the Church in these Parishes has gone on steadily; but the harder one works the more does the work seem to increase. Services are being held in six different places, but I can only serve three of these places on each Sunday, as my drives are long, being from twenty to twenty-five miles. Within the limits of these Parishes we have many needs for the better carrying on of the work, and we are all doing our utmost to supply these needs. To some minds we are using questionable means for obtaining funds, because we are selling card bricks at 10 cents each, and have thought good to offer a prize to the one who sells the greatest number of bricks. We cannot here discuss the advisability of adopting this means, but we sincerely believe that the Master will be no more ready to disapprove of this method to supply our temporal wants, than He would be to disapprove of Sunday-school prizes and treats, which, to my mind, are very questionable means for inducing children to do their simple duty.

The works which we are now trying to accomplish are the erection of a small Chapel of Ease at Jeffries, in the Parish of St. Mark; the payment of a debt of \$500 on a Mission Room in the same Parish, and the building of a rectory at Waterford. Towards the first, we have collected among ourselves, \$350; for the Mission Room we have collected, and spent in repairs \$200; and for a rectory we have purchased a beautiful site, containing two acres, for \$150; a neat fence has been put around the lot at a cost of \$40, and we have now on hand towards the erection of a building, nearly \$300. Of the \$500 on behalf of our rectory fund, we have collected nearly \$400 within ourselves.

The condition of the Parishes of Waterford and St. Mark is that of a naked Mission in the midst of a spiritual field which is not even white for the harvest.

The terrible sin of intemperance causes much poverty and suffering, and is my great opponent in the work at every turn. And in order to battle with this enemy, to all that is even manly, let alone the higher spiritual life, I have established in the Parish a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, which already, under the Holy Spirit's blessing, has drawn in many, among whom are some who have been addicted to the sin of drunkenness.

The people are pleased with the new scheme presented by the Board of Home Missions, and sincerely trust that it will be adopted by the General Committee. Feeling confident that such a sensible scheme must be adopted, they have made no collections for the D. C. S., but should the scheme not be accepted by the General Committee, I feel confident that they will contribute as usual, about \$60.00.

WELDFORD—REV. E. B. HOOPER.

I was appointed to this Mission some twelve months ago, the Mission having been vacant for some three months after the departure of my predecessor, the Rev. Henry Holloway. My Sunday duty is never very arduous, there being only two churches in the Mission, St. Paul's, the Parish church, twelve miles distant from the rectory, and St. Matthew's, close to the rectory, at Weldford Station. Services are held in both these churches on Sunday, and nowhere else. During the week days I hold classes for instruction at four different school-

houses. Every four or five weeks a service is held at Kent Junction. There is no Sunday-school in the Parish as yet, it being impossible to find any persons capable or willing to teach. I trust that during the coming year I may be able to train a few teachers, so that this great want may be supplied. In the meantime I have a Saturday school at the rectory every week, at which the attendance is very fair. Our thanks are due to the Sunday-school Committee for their grant.

The instruction classes, held on week days in the school-houses, are much appreciated by the people; the average attendance numbering about 40—adults and children; as they thus obtain sound Church teaching, these classes may be looked upon as fair substitutes for Sunday-schools, which are, as yet, impracticable.

Services are held in St. Matthew's, Weldford Station, every Friday evening, and, in addition, the Saints' days are duly observed. During the winter the attendance at the services in St. Paul's is small, owing to the fact that the men are nearly all away in the woods with their horses; but in the summer the congregations are very large, oftentimes larger than the church can easily accommodate. The number of communicants at this church has greatly increased during the year, the number last Sunday being 37. At St. Matthew's, Weldford Station, the congregations have increased, the average number being now double what it was a year ago. The communicants have nearly trebled. I must give a word of praise to this congregation, which, though small, yet has shown commendable zeal and earnestness, which may well be looked upon as a good example for others. During the year they have purchased a new organ for the church, they have laid matting up the aisles, also a beautiful carpet in the chancel; and last, but not least, they have had the church nicely painted, inside and out. This speaks well for a poor congregation numbering in all only ten or twelve families. The St. Paul congregation also hope this summer to get an organ for that church; up to this time they have had none.

Of course there are many discouragements in the work, as I suppose there are in every mission. The people are very, very poor, numbers of them being quite unable to give anything of their substance for the work of the church. However, more might be done. I trust more will be done as time goes on.

I see that my predecessor gives 808 as the church popula-

tion of the mission, and when the paper of statistical questions was sent over a couple of minutes after my entering in the charge of the mission, I quoted Mr. Holloway's figures. Since then I find them to be misleading, for I do not think that there are more than half that number. It seems unreasonable to call a man a churchman, simply because he was baptized years ago by a clergyman, when he never goes to church and never contributes to her support; and it seems that fully half of the 808 so-called church people are of that description. Our people can do little more at present than they are doing.

There have been 29 baptisms, 6 burials; 33 persons confirmed by His Lordship the Metropolitan on June 16th and 17th. This visit of His Lordship was a great blessing to the Parish, and helped, I earnestly trust, to deepen the spiritual life in many.

KINGSTON—REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT.

For two years no reports from this parish have figured in the Annual Report of the Society. These were written and forwarded to the secretary, but too late apparently for the printer. May a happier fate attend this. I will begin by pouring into the ever sympathetic ear of the Society a tale of disappointment, which, if it does not procure any beneficial result in the future, will at least explain the cause why so little for the past two years has been raised in this parish for the general purposes of the Society. When our new church at Clifton was consecrated, Nov. 3rd, 1885, a necessity arose, and a request made for more frequent services than had formerly obtained in that part of the parish. I did not see how, single handed, I could manage this without closing one or other of the three remaining churches in the parish. I did not feel disposed to close the parish church, wherein the bulk of our living church people worship; who, to enjoy this privilege, have to drive three, four, five and six miles over roads both hilly and rough. Never had the doors of this church been closed by premeditation, on a Sunday before, and I felt that to do so now would not be beneficial to the best interests of the parish. Further, the people were opposed to such a proceeding. I knew not what to do, since the invention of man has not as yet found a way by which a single body can be in two or more places at one and the same time. Finally the Metropolitan was consulted. Pleased with the active zeal of the people in so speedily rearing such a beautiful temple as All Saints, His Lordship thought that their wishes should not be slighted, that their energy and work of love should be rewarded in the manner sought for. But how to gratify them, and yet do justice by the other churches? Here was the difficulty. At last a solution was found. By having an assistant who should be responsible for one service every Sunday, the question was settled. The Bishop thought that a small grant would be made by the B. H. M. which, coupled

with what the parish would raise, would give us the extra service. Thinking that the Society would not refuse our modest request, we secured the assistance of the Rev. D. I. Wetmore, who had been enrolled as a missionary (of the Society, I presume) at Clifton for many years, but who had done no regular duty in the parish, from the time that I became rector (excepting only when, during my absence, he acted for six months as *locum tenens*.) A petition was sent in to the Society asking for a moderate grant. And encouraged by the good will of our Bishop, we, though struggling with financial difficulties, launched out boldly into the work. On the ninety-sixth page of fifty-first Report is recorded in terse terms the fate of our humble petition. Now all I have to say about this is we would not have undertaken this new work had we not relied upon the advocacy of the Bishop prevailing over the stony heart of the B. H. M. Being thus abandoned by the B. H. M. we have had to make the best we could of a bad bargain. We could not go back on the work, so it was agreed that all that could be raised in that portion of the parish lying below Moss Glen, including Long Island, should be devoted to that work. This made the burden of the main support fall the more heavily upon the other parts of the parish. To add to this burden an additional assessment of \$30 was laid upon us. This little grievance will account for the small amount raised last year for the general purposes. You cannot get more than \$5 out of a \$5 bill. I mean to say that our people are doing all they can—and within the past two years we have suffered much by emigration, in some instances families and in other instances individuals have left the parish. Now this is a loss to any parish in whatever light we view it. But, thank God, we are not in despair. And so now let us turn to the other and bright side of the shield. Activity and zeal are displayed in all the churches. The attendance at public worship and at the Lord's table, is above the average. At Trinity the ladies have a fund on hand for necessary repairs to the building when required. Also, there is another small amount towards erecting a new fence around "God's acre," and the wheezy old organ having undergone a thorough renovation, is back again in its place much improved and enlarged at a cost of \$150 of which \$100 have been paid.

St. James has had a new fence around its burial ground and iron gates have been given by a former parishioner now resi-

dent in Montreal. These with six new sashes to replace the weather-worn old ones, are ready for being placed in position, as soon as our men, few but willing, can find time for this work. Thanks are mainly due to the ladies of St. James for so much of the work so far as it has gone. Sundry improvements have been made at St. Paul's, involving a large outlay, a new spire has been erected and the sides of the building are being reshingled preparatory to painting.

At All Saint's a sweet toned bell now summons God's people to the "House of Prayer," and the ladies have reduced the debt incurred in its erection to a very insignificant figure. Nor must I forget to say a word about the good work done by the All Saint's guild, which undertakes through its members, to have the church swept and cared for and made ready for service both summer and winter, the year through, and this gratuitous work has been and continues to be done in a laudable and painstaking manner. Though we have no other "guilds" regularly constituted at the other churches, yet everything that can be so done is done voluntarily. The firewood is given, hauled, cut, stored and fires kindled and attended to—the churches opened, cleansed, and made comfortable for the worshippers—by willing bands of workers, by whose well appreciated labors the necessary expenses attending the four churches are reduced to the smallest fraction possible.

We, then, though thrown almost entirely upon our own slender resources, may yet be thankful that our financial difficulties have called forth this labor of love by which the interest and attention of our young people are secured, strengthened and enlarged.

CONCLUSION.

From the foregoing reports there may be gathered matter of deepest interest, fitted to encourage renewed and extended aid to this Society. This is especially to be noticed in the case where new work has lately been taken up. How much more of this is waiting! The members of the Society should never fail in their regard for the hard and self-denying work of those engaged in their Master's cause. It is no small task to keep on, week by week, or more frequently, in parochial

visiting and public services in those distant fields. In trying weather, and in the cold, stormy winter months, the clergy laboring in these missions should always be remembered by those living at comparative "ease in Zion."

This year the Society meets under peculiar circumstances. That most important meeting of the Lambeth Conference has deprived the Society of the valued presence of both the Lord Bishop and the Coadjutor. Only once before in the history of this Society has His Lordship the Bishop been absent from the annual meetings. The able, kind, and courteous way in which he always presided will be lovingly remembered. Earnest prayers will be offered for his prosperous journey, for a blessing on those counsels in which he will take a prominent share, and for continued health and strength to be with him day by day during his absence, and to continue with him at the warm welcome which will greet him on his return.

The Society will not be unmindful of the earnest zeal manifested by His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor in all its proceedings and its objects. Change and relaxation afforded by a visit to his many friends in England will, it is hoped, afford renewed strength to go on with the very important work in this Diocese to which he has been called.

On motion of the Secretary, it was resolved that the said Reports be received as a part of the Report to be presented at the Anniversary Meeting, and that they be printed in the Annual Report.

On motion the committee adjourned to meet at 3 p. m.

The Committee met at 3 p. m.

Rev. A. Lowndes, from the Committee to Interest Sunday Schools in the Work of Home Missions, presented a report, and on his motion, the same was received to be printed in the Annual Report.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis, from the Committee on the Amalgamation of the Society with the Synod presented a report; and on his motion, it was resolved that the same be received and printed in the Annual Report.

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions presented a report; and on his motion the same was received and adopted, and the schedule annexed was referred to the Board to be elected this evening.

The Committee adjourned till 8 p. m.

The Committee met agreeably to adjournment at 8 p. m.

The Secretary reported the following members of the Board of Home Missions elected by the Deaneries:

On motion of the Rev. Canon Brigstocke, it was resolved that the Board of Home Missions be directed to appoint a Special Committee, as last year, to take such steps as they may deem necessary to bring the needs of the whole Diocese before the several parishes.

On motion of Mr. Schofield, the following rules and regulations were adopted:

On motion of the Rev. A. Lowndes, it was resolved that the following paragraph be substituted for the last paragraph in the agreement, as given on page 22 of the report of 1887:

“The present agreement to continue till revised by the Society, at any meeting of the General Committee.”

On motion of the Rev. A. Lowndes, it was resolved, that the schedule each year be sent by the Board of Home Missions to each Deanery for it to revise, and report upon the amount required from each parish, provided that there be no reduction in the total amount expected from the Deanery,—before the schedule is finally adopted by the Board.

It was moved by the Rev. A. Lowndes, seconded by the Rev. J. Roy Campbell, that each Rural Dean, through the Rural Deanery, be asked to present yearly to the Society, a complete report of the work done in their Deaneries, with a statement showing the work undone, and how it could be carried out, together with an estimate of the amount of money required to enable each parish to be reached and effectually worked.

This motion on being put to the meeting was decided in the negative.

On motion of the Rev. H. Montgomery, it was resolved that the words in Sec. 1 of the rules and regulations of the Board of Home Missions be amended by the substitution of the words, “General Purposes of the Society,” for the words “Missionary Stipend.”

On motion of Mr. Schofield, the Committee proceeded to elect the Board of Home Missions by nomination and ballot.

Whereas, the proposed Schedule submitted by the Board of Home Missions makes no provision for filling up Missions now vacant, nor for the opening up of new Missions; and

Whereas, the need of further Missionary work is urgent; therefore

Resolved, that the Board of Home Missions be instructed to make provision for the filling up of vacant Missions as soon as possible and for the advance in Missionary work, and that any deficiency in funds for the purpose of this resolution, be supplied by drawing on the available invested funds of the Society.

The Honorable Sir Leonard Tilley left the chair, and at his request the Honorable the Chief Justice took the same.

After discussion on the foregoing motion, it was decided by the Chair to be out of order, as conflicting with a resolution of the General Committee.

The Committee adjourned to meet to-morrow evening at 8 p. m.

The Finance Committee were requested to report to this committee as to the desirableness of writing off the item "Hazen trust principal, etc., 1868."

Mr. Jarvis presented a report from the Finance Committee, which was entered upon the minutes.

The several sections 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 were considered and adopted.

It was resolved, that the Finance Committee be authorized, from time to time, to call for and assent to such changes in the sureties given by the Treasurer as that Committee may think proper, and be further authorized, if they should deem it expedient, to accept a bond from a guarantee company approved by the Committee, and to pay the premium therefor from the funds of the Society.

A special report from Mr. C. A. Macdonald, as to the glebes in the Parish of Dumfries, was received and referred to the Glebe Land Committee. Mr. Macdonald's bill of \$20.40 was ordered to be paid.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS

For the Year ending 30th June, 1888.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

The Board of Home Missions submit the following report.

During the past year the following alterations have been made in the schedule adopted by the General Committee last July:

BRIGHT.—The assessment has been reduced \$40, and the grant increased the same amount.

DERBY.—The assessment has been reduced \$10, and the grant increased \$30.

GAGETOWN.—The grant has been reduced \$200, and the assessment increased \$80. The Board have not as yet been able to put even this reduced grant in force for want of funds. It is, however, recommended in the schedule for next year.

LANCASTER.—The assessment was increased \$100.

MONCTON.—The assessment was reduced \$95, and the same amount was added to the grant.

PRINCE WILLIAM.—The assessment was reduced \$60, and the grant was increased the same amount.

STANLEY.—The assessment was reduced \$16, and the grant was increased the same amount.

WOODSTOCK AND WAKEFIELD.—The grant was increased \$66, and the assessment was increased \$274. This made the assessment \$400, and the grant of \$200—total stipend \$600.

The change was made to enable the Mission to obtain the services of an Assistant in Holy Orders, instead of a Divinity Student, as heretofore.

SPECIAL GRANT.—The Board placed \$60 at the disposal of His Lordship the Bishop to pay the travelling expenses of a Missionary to Ludlow.

DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIP FUND.—A payment of \$30 has been made out of this Fund to Percy Chandler, which, however, has been returned by him, together with \$60 previously paid to him. The Lord Bishop has also given \$75 to the capital of this Fund, being a sum returned to His Lordship by a former Divinity Student.

TRAVELLING OUTFIT.—The Board have authorized the Treasurer to advance the following sums “for the purchase of necessary travelling outfits,” subject to the regulations of the General Committee, viz.:

DEPUTATIONS.—In accordance with the wish expressed at the meeting of the General Committee last July, a deputation from the Board visited the Mission of Norton before a decision was reached about the grant. As the deputation could not recommend any change it was allowed to remain as it passed the General Committee.

A deputation also visited the Mission of Prince William, and recommended the alteration in the assessment already mentioned.

CLAIM OF REV. A. LOWNDES.—The General Committee having referred to the Board the claim of the Rev. A. Lowndes for \$60, arrears of stipend, with power to order payment of the same if they deemed it right so to do, the Board, after consideration of the claim, ordered the Treasurer to pay the amount.

COMMITTEE ON NEEDS OF THE DIOCESE.—The General Committee having recommended the Board to appoint a committee to take such steps as they might deem advisable to place before the Diocese its various needs, the Board appointed a committee to attend to that duty. That committee drew up a paper ("No. I.") on the needs of the Diocese, north of Woodstock, which was approved by His Lordship the Bishop, and the Board, and was authorized for use in the Diocese.

The committee endeavored to arrange for meetings in each Deanery, but so far as is known they have only been held in the deaneries of Chatham, Shediac, and Woodstock, and in the city of Fredericton. The Board hope that many more such meetings will be held during the coming year, and recommend the General Committee to appoint a special committee to attend to the matter. If well worked up, these meetings should be the means of conveying a great deal of information as to the work of the Diocese to many who have only a very imperfect idea of what is going on outside of the missions in which they reside.

SPECIAL WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.—A grant of \$100 from this fund has been made to the widow of the late Rev. A. V. Wiggins, all the rules of the fund having been complied with and His Lordship the Bishop approving.

STATEMENT FOR S. P. G.—The Board submit herewith a copy of the statistical report sent to the venerable Society in February last, and again express regret that the failure of several missions to send in returns has seriously affected the value of the statement; as, for example, the number of communicants, which appears to be 243 less than last year.

Seventeen missions receiving aid from the venerable Society failed to forward the annual collection required by its rules.

STATISTICAL REPORTS FOR D. C. S. AND S. P. G.—Many of the clergy having complained of the confusion that arises from the present system of making these statements, the Board appointed a committee to report on the matter, and

they now recommend the General Committee to separate the two returns, and at the same time to make some alterations in the form used for the D. C. S..

A copy of the amendments recommended is submitted herewith. There are at least three important respects in which this change will improve the D. C. S. return:

1st. It will cover the same period as the financial statements of the Society.

2nd. It will always come soon after Easter, to which date almost all parochial statements are made up.

3rd. It will contain the names of the Church Wardens and Lay Delegates for the current year.

SCHEDULE FOR NEXT YEAR.—In the report made by the Board last July (see p. 112) it was stated that there would be a deficiency of \$2,000 for the schedule of July 1888, if the schedule of 1886 was again adopted. In view of that statement the General Committee added about 5 per cent to the assessments, reducing the grants about \$700. This, however, proved to be no real gain to the Society, as the voluntary contributions fell short of the estimate about the same amount. As the grants last July were made for five quarters—to 1st October—the deficiency of available funds for next year, according to this estimate, should be \$2,500. It was found to be really about \$3,000, partly because Campobello and Richmond, which were vacant and not included in the estimate last year, have been filled, and partly because the pension list has been increased.

In view of this very large deficit, which, under the old system, would require an addition of over 20 per cent to the assessments, the Board appointed a committee to consider and report upon the whole matter.

After long and careful consideration of various suggestions, the Board finally accepted a plan by which what has heretofore been called the voluntary contributions of aided parishes are added to what has been termed their assessment. Upon

that basis, taking the average for the last five years, an estimate has been made of the total amount each aided Mission should give this year to the general funds of the Society; this amounts to \$17,222. An estimate was then made of the amount of voluntary contributions that might be expected from each self-sustaining Parish or Mission; this amounts to \$5,762.

The other net income of the Society for the year is estimated at \$5,795. This makes a total net income from all sources of \$28,779. The Society then undertakes the payment of the total stipend amounting to \$29,656 by the Schedule submitted herewith. This will leave a deficit in July, 1889, of \$877 if all the grants are used. This plan was then submitted to each of the Rural Deaneries and they were asked to revise the items and readjust the same in any way they might think best so that the total sum required was made up.

The schedule now submitted has been so revised by the Deaneries of Chatham, Fredericton, Kingston, Shediac, St. John and Woodstock, except two grants in the Deanery of Chatham. No reply has been received from the Deanery of St. Andrews.

The Board feel that as the plan has been so fully considered in every part of the Diocese it is not necessary to say much more about it here, further than to point out a few advantages which it possesses over the ordinary plan.

1st. It provides against the increased assessment (so called) being taken out of the voluntary contributions by the Missions. It is quite evident that there was no avoiding a threatened deficit if the reduction in the Society's grants was met by a corresponding reduction in its income from voluntary contributions.

2nd. It removes many of the difficulties heretofore felt by the Missionary about collecting for the assessment. All the contributions from the Mission, whether by subscription lists,

mission boxes, collections in church or any other methods that may be adopted, will hereafter be for the Society, and the Society will pay the whole stipend subject to the present regulations.

3rd. It will throw upon the Deaneries more of the responsibility of fixing the amounts to be contributed by the several parishes therein.

4th. It puts down an estimate of the amount that the Society may reasonably hope to receive from each self-supporting parish.

For these and other reasons the Board strongly recommend the General Committee to adopt the proposed plan and schedule.

The Board also recommend the adoption for the future of the plan pursued this year in sending the schedule to each Deanery to revise and report upon the contributions expected from each parish without reducing the total amount expected from the Deanery. They also recommend that such alterations be made in the regulations as will continue in force the agreement between each Mission and the Society so long as its terms remain unchanged.

The estimate of income and expenditure for next year, the schedule of grants recommended and the returns, correspondence and minutes of business transacted by the Board during the past year accompany this report.

REPORT

FROM THE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY
ON INTERESTING SUNDAY-SCHOOLS IN HOME
MISSIONS AND ON THE PROMOTION OF
SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

*To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop, and the General
Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.*

The Committee on "Interesting Sunday-schools in Home Missions and on the Promotion of Sunday-schools" beg leave to report as follows:

Your Committee could not but notice with regret the continuous falling off in the Diocese of the contributions through the Mission Boxes, and therefore considered it their first duty to ascertain the cause of this decrease, and if possible remedy them. A circular on the subject was issued by the Right Reverend the Chairman to the clergy of the Diocese. Nearly all the clergy (three only excepted) sent prompt and full answers. The circular with a summary of the answers received is appended. The information received was considered so valuable, that your Committee decided to place at once a portion of it in the hands of the Clergy and Superintendents of each Sunday-school.

A few inaccuracies and mis-prints have been corrected in the copy annexed herewith.

It has been pointed out to the Committee that by taking only the average attendance of the scholars a pessimist view is presented of the state of the Sunday-schools in the Diocese; and that it would have been fairer to have given the total number of scholars as found on the roll call of each Sunday-school. Before issuing the circular of questions your Committee considered this matter very carefully and the reason why the numbers on the roll call were not asked for, was that from information received your Committee felt they could have no guarantee that the numbers on the roll call actually represented the scholars in regular attendance. Unless a roll call is being checked every three months, scholars will remain on the list who have attended only once during the year.

It is remarkable that while the returns of your Committee have been thought by some to be a great deal lower than the total number of scholars, yet the total number of scholars as given in last year's report of the D. C. S. is 4,437, or 70 less than the total average attendance of 4,507 as furnished by your Committee's returns. Therefore the fact still remains which your Committee have brought forward, that over nine thousand persons of an age to attend Sunday-school do not do so with any regularity. The number of boxes now out in circulation is 596 being 425 in excess of the number out last July.

The result of this year's work cannot be felt in this year's returns. The expenses have been about the same as when the boxes were yielding more substantial returns than they have done in the past few years. A certain amount of outlay is necessary to secure any returns. The Committee hope that the coming year will show a further increase in the contributions through the mission boxes.

In accordance with the power given them your Committee elected Mr. Alfred Street as an additional member.

Your Committee bearing in mind the special instructions given them last year that they should endeavor to maintain

and promote Sunday-schools, arranged the means whereby schools could exchange libraries among themselves and also endeavored to ascertain the localities where there were no Sunday-schools, or where Sunday-schools might with a little fostering care be established.

Already ten parishes have availed themselves of the opportunity of exchanging Sunday-school books, doubtless when the means for such exchange are more widely known they will be more used.

The Committee have through their chairman communicated with the Rural Deans, urging upon them to bring before their Deaneries the necessity of establishing Sunday-school Teachers' Unions where not already in existence.

A grant of \$50 was applied for by your Committee to the Executive Committee for the purpose of supplying Bibles, Prayer Books, Catechisms and books of instruction on the S. P. U. K. catalogue to needy schools, but the Executive Committee did not consider they had the power to vote the appropriation. Your Committee received this decision with regret as they knew of thirty-seven localities where Sunday-schools were pressing needed.

Your Committee anxious to do all they could to arouse interest in scholars in the work of the Church, authorized their Secretary to make the following offer to such of the clergy as were not contributing to the funds of your Society through your Committee:

"We shall be happy to furnish you with correct information respecting any part of the work of the Church in this Diocese, or to endeavor to procure, if you wish it, persons to address your schools during the coming Lent."

This offer was made in January, but your Committee regret to report that not a single application was made in response to it.

Your Committee would make the following recommendation: That it have power out of the funds it raises to supply schools with Bibles, Prayer Books, or other necessary books;

APPENDIX.

COMMITTEE ON INTERESTING SUNDAY-SCHOOLS IN HOME MISSIONS AND ON THE PROMOTION OF SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

FREDERICTON, N. B., *September 1, 1888.*

MY DEAR SIR:

At a meeting of the Committee it was resolved that a circular letter should be issued by myself, as Chairman, to the Clergy, in connection with the objects of the Committee.

The great and continuous falling off throughout the Diocese of the subscriptions through the Mission Boxes is a matter of considerable anxiety, as betokening a steadily diminishing interest of teachers and children in the Home Missionary work of the Church.

The Committee will be very thankful to you if you will frankly give your own reasons, and request your principal teachers to give theirs, for this sad lack of interest, together with any suggestions as to how interest in the work of the

Church can be aroused and maintained. An answer from every Parish, and, if possible, from teachers in each important School in each Parish, is particularly desired, in order that the Committee may have information from a wide enough area to enable them to devise such measures as will be generally effective. The Committee are aware that one reason why there have been fewer Boxes in circulation is that there has been no stock kept on hand to supply such demand as there was. A fresh stock will be ordered as soon as answers have been received showing the number required. There are many Parishes not having any Mission Boxes at all, owing to new incumbencies since the Boxes were issued, and from other causes; and there is not a single Parish where the number of Boxes could not be easily increased. Surely one child at least of each family sending children to school ought to be furnished with a box, and thus be taught from the very beginning to give something towards the maintenance of its religious privileges.

It has been represented to the Committee that there are doubtless many localities in remote parts of Parishes, and outside of served Parishes, where Sunday-Schools could be established and maintained, and thus form the nucleus for a subsequent Church and congregation. The Committee will feel grateful to have such localities pointed out to them.

The Committee have also taken into consideration the number of books which must have been read over and over again in each library, and which are therefore practically useless; and they have thought that each School might be benefitted by exchanging these books for similar ones in other libraries. To effect this it is necessary that the Secretary should have a list of the books in each library with those marked which it is desired to exchange. By comparing lists the Secretary could judge which parishes could best exchange, and would accordingly put them in communication with one another.

More than one copy of this letter is sent you in the hope that you will distribute it freely among your teachers, in order that the Committee may have the opinion of those on whom falls the chief burden of the work of Sunday-schools as well as that of the Clergy.

Finally, the Committee are very anxious to do their share of the work in interesting all those connected with Sunday-schools in the work of the Church in the Diocese, and will

REPORT FROM THE COMMITTEE ON OBJECT III. OF THE D. C. S.

*To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop, President, and the
Members of the Diocesan Church Society.*

The Committee on Object III. of the Diocesan Church Society beg leave to submit the following report:

The third object of the Diocesan Church Society, which your Committee were appointed to further, reads as follows:

“Aid to Sunday and other schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of school masters and catechists.”

The small funds at the disposal of your Committee renders it a matter of earnest consideration how best to carry out this object of the Society.

After mature deliberation your Committee felt that they were bound to limit themselves at first to aiding Sunday-schools. They felt that there must of necessity be, in a Diocese like that of Fredericton, many localities where Sunday-schools might be established if a helping hand were held out, or where schools already in existence might be quickened to further exertions by receiving tokens that they were not forgotten by the Diocese in a work so often arduous and discouraging.

Accordingly, a paper of questions to be answered by a clergyman or teacher in charge of a Sunday-school desirous of

obtaining aid for the establishment of a new Sunday-school, or for the maintenance of an existing one, was issued, to enable the Committee to come to a decision as to which schools were in the most pressing need of help or encouragement.

The amount of money received is \$54.40, and small as that sum is the Committee are glad to be able to report that they have been enabled to make grants to nine Sunday-schools, which have been received with warm expressions of thanks.

Your Committee would earnestly impress upon all the members of the Society the claims of Object III. upon their liberality. In many places throughout the Province there are not enough church people to warrant the building of a church, and many localities are too isolated, or distant from a resident clergyman for any services to be held. In both these cases a Sunday-school acts as a rallying point for the scattered sheep of the Church of Christ, and forms a nucleus around which may grow a congregation.

In such districts the Sunday-school should be considered as the forerunner of the Church:

A grant to a small knot of church people to enable them to start a Sunday-school, or to a school struggling for its existence, means much more than the few dollars given. It means sympathy. It means encouragement. It means that the few fighting for the faith are neither unobserved or forgotten by the Diocese. Ultimately, no doubt, the expenditure involved is repaid a thousandfold, when the Sunday-school gives place to the settled congregation, worshipping in a consecrated church, served by an authorized minister.

Your Committee must express its deep regret that, solely from lack of means, it was unable to accede to the numerous requests for help that it received, or extend any help to the many localities brought to its consideration where a Sunday-school ought to be established. While, therefore, the schools aided were, in the opinion of the Committee, those which stood in the most urgent need of help, they would impress

upon all the members of the Society that they were not the only ones needing aid, and that the work of your Committee stands crippled for want of funds.

With regard to Sunday-schools your Committee would recommend that the action of the Executive Committee in placing the funds paid in to the credit of Object III. at the entire disposal of your Committee be confirmed; and further, that each Clergyman be requested to devote one offering from each Sunday-school under his care to this part of the work of your Committee.

With regard to schools, other than Sunday-schools, your Committee, as already stated, felt that they were forced to consider the claims of Sunday-schools only for the simple reason that they had the scanty sum of \$54.40 at their disposal; but they cannot omit stating that the matter of education is one of the most important questions affecting the welfare of the Diocese, and of the Province.

The question of education has often been brought before the Church in this Diocese, but unfortunately no practical result has ensued.

In the year 1874 a memorial was presented to the Synod by the Parish of St. Paul's, Portland, pointing out the great evils arising from what they term, "the system of a non-religious public education adopted in this province," and recommended the establishment and endowment of Church schools.

A Committee on Education was thereupon appointed by the Synod, who reported the following year (1875.) See Appendix c. p. 17 of journal of that year.

In accordance with the recommendation of this Committee a Standing Committee was appointed. Nothing, however, seems to have resulted. In 1876 in consequence of representations that certain persons were ready to contribute towards the foundation of one educational institution in connection with the Church of England a Committee was appointed to confer with the proposed contributors. No contributions

appear to have been paid and in 1877 the Committee on Educational Institutions was re-appointed, but nothing practical appears to have resulted.

Your Committee while not prepared to recommend any definite scheme would nevertheless draw the serious attention of Church people in the Province once more to the urgent needs of a school for the education of the young in church principles. All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE

For the Year Ending 1st June, 1888.

*To the Right Reverend The Lord Bishop, and the General
Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:*

The Book Depository Committee of The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge beg to submit their fourteenth annual report:

The sales of publications for the year ending on April 30th, 1888, amounted to \$855.37; for the year ending on April 30th, 1887, \$946.72—showing a decrease of \$91.35.

Twenty-two importations of publications have been made during the year.

The circulation of the "Dawn of Day," a sixteen paged illustrated monthly magazine, has increased from 636 copies per month in 1887, to 1,063 copies per month in 1888. This very useful periodical is now supplied at the rate of seventy-five cents per hundred copies.

Your Committee would draw the attention of the clergy and others, to the advantages which this Depository affords for supplying or replenishing Sunday-school libraries, with the best and newest kinds of publications, at the same price as charged by the Society in England. Particular care has been taken to keep a full line of this class of books on hand, and the ready sales in the past, warrant your Committee in keeping a good stock of this class of literature on the shelves of the Depository. A large list of books suitable for Sunday-

school libraries has been ordered, and your Committee hope that they will arrive in time for the annual meeting in July next.

Any publications on the catalogues of the S. P. C. K. that may be required will be procured, on an order being sent to the Secretary of this Committee.

We regret to report that the Rev. Theodore E. Dowling, the very efficient Secretary of this Committee, and who has acted in that capacity since the foundation of the Depository, has been compelled to resign his office, and we feel that this Committee and also the church at large will sustain a serious loss by his removal from the Diocese.

During Mr. Dowling's absence, and since his resignation, his duties as Secretary has been performed by T. B. Robinson, the Treasurer of the Committee.

ABSTRACT OF REPORT MADE BY THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

During the Year 1887-1888.

October 5th, 1887.

1. That the Committee had elected Mr. William M. Jarvis, Chairman, and Mr. H. W. Frith, Secretary of the Committee.

2. That the following investments had been made, viz:

Of the Chipman Trust Funds, \$5,000 in 4½ per cent Debentures of the Province of New Brunswick, at one per cent premium.

Of the General Funds—in the same,	\$5,000 00
In a Pettingell 6 per cent Debenture at 17¼ prem.,	800 00
In a Carleton Street 6 per cent Debenture,	500 00
In a City Debt do. do.	500 00
And in another City do. do.	1,000 00

Making a total of \$7,800 00

The last three debentures were bought at a price to yield five per cent interest.

3. That \$500 had been paid off on the Davidson mortgage.

4. The Committee, having had an application from the Treasurer for leave to change one of the sureties to his bond, recommended that power be given them to call for an assent to such changes in the Treasurer's bond, as the law might from time to time deem expedient.

5. That a change had been assented to in a mortgage security given to the Society by Mr. E. I. Simonds. [As this matter was subsequently re-arranged it is unnecessary to give details of this arrangement.]

6. That with regard to a resolution of the Rev. C. H. Hatheway, Rector of St. James' Church, Cambridge, referred to the Finance Committee to the effect "that the sum of \$55.71 be transferred from the General Funds of the Society to meet special deficiency in the Scovil Trust Fund," the Committee found the actual amount short of the \$24 provided by the will for repair of St. James' Church was on three years \$53.79, and, in consideration of surpluses received by the Society in former years from the trust fund, the Committee recommended payment of that amount from the General Funds to the Rector and Church Wardens of St. James'.

January 9th, 1888.

That the Treasurer had received from T. W. Daniel, Esq., as Executor of the will of the late Miss Thomson, the sum of \$223.21, being the residue of her estate bequeathed to the Society.

March 6th, 1888.

With regard to certain matters referred to the Committee.

1. The desirableness of writing off the item "\$1,868 Hazen Trust Principal, etc.," from the assets of the Society.

That the Committee had examined the whole statement of the assets of the Society as it appears at page 180 of the 52nd Report of the Society, and recommended as follows:

That the valuation of the Hazen Trust Estate be reduced from \$15,000 to \$12,500.

That the item of \$1,868 above alluded to as an asset, which was balance of costs of litigation concerning Miss Hazen's will, paid out of the General Fund, be removed from the list of assets, and a foot note added, stating that the said amount was simply the indebtedness of the Hazen Trust Fund to the General Fund, arising as above stated.

Also that the valuation of the Scovil Trust Fund be reduced from \$8,000 to \$6,000.

That these reductions would amount to \$6,368—and would reduce the total valuation of the assets to \$113,993.42.

2. That the following resolution of the Executive Committee, viz.: "That the Finance Committee be authorized from time to time to call for and assent to such changes in the sureties given by the Treasurer, as that Committee should think proper, and be further authorized, if they deem it expedient, to accept a bond from a guarantee company, approved by that Committee, and to pay the premium therefor from the funds of the Society," had had the consideration of the Committee, and that in accordance with this resolution, the Treasurer, wishing to have one of his sureties changed, a new bond had been taken from Mr. Fairweather by the Committee, substituting Dr. Silas Alward, Barrister, for Mr. Gilbert Murdoch; and further, that the conditions attached to a guarantee bond were such as the Committee were of opinion could not be complied with; especially a stipulation that all checks drawn by the Treasurer must be countersigned by some other officer of the Society.

3. That the mortgage held by the Society from Mr. E. I. Simonds, for \$10,000, having matured on 15th December last, had been extended by the Committee for the same amount for two years from that date.

4. That the Scovil Trust property on the North Market Wharf, St. John, had been rented to Messrs. Slipp & Harding for one year from 1st May, 1888, at \$500.

5. That the Treasurer had received from the Rev. Edwin Gilpin, of Halifax, as executor of the estate of the Rev. Alfred Gilpin, deceased, the sum of \$349.52, a bequest from the latter.

June 5th, 1888.

That under proceedings in ejectment against the late Mary Nice, possession of a lot in the City of St. John belonging to the Miss Hazen Trust had been obtained, and that a new

lease of the property for fourteen years from the 1st May last had been given to Stanley Kierstead at an annual rent of \$28 with usual covenants for renewal or payments for improvements. Also that Mr. Keirstead had bought the improvements on the property as recovered from Mrs. Rice for \$60.

With this amount Mr. Fairweather had settled the costs of suit, the water rates due, and the advertising bills, the auctioneer, Mr. Hanington, having given his services free. The arrears of rent were \$123—which amount was lost.

Proceedings had also been ordered against Mr. Murray P. Trueman for \$36, arrears of ground rent, and the matter had been compromised by accepting \$25.

BILL.

AN ACT IN ADDITION TO AND AMENDMENT OF AN ACT INTITULED "AN ACT TO CONSOLIDATE AND AMEND VARIOUS ACTS OF ASSEMBLY RELATING TO THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN NEW BRUNSWICK."

Whereas, it is deemed expedient to unite the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick with the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, and to vest in the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton the funds and property heretofore held and administered by the said Diocesan Church Society, and otherwise to amend an Act passed in the 48th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to Consolidate and Amend various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England in New Brunswick."

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, as follows:

1. From and after the first day of July, A. D. 1891, the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick shall be united with and merged in the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, and shall cease to exist as a separate body or by a separate corporate name.

2. It shall be lawful for the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, by any amendment of its Constitution hereafter to be made, to provide for the election and appointment by the said Synod of lay Representatives, to sit in the Synod as Representatives of the Diocese at large; provided that not more than eight such lay Representatives of the Diocese at large shall be entitled to sit in the said Synod at any one time; and provided also that every such lay Representative of the Diocese at large shall be a male communicant of the Church of England of the age of 21 years and reside within the Diocese, but he shall not be required to be a resident of any particular parish, or a stated attendant at any particular Church or Chapel therein; and the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton may in like manner make provision for the removal of any such lay Representative of the Diocese at large, and the election and appointment of another in his place, as the said Synod shall direct, and such lay Representatives of the Diocese at large shall have all such and the like rights, privileges and immu-

And it shall be lawful for the said Synod to provide for the election and appointment of such lay Representatives of the Diocese at large, either together at any one time, or separately, from time to time, and in such manner in all respects as its Constitution, so amended, may provide; provided that no lay Representative of the Diocese at large, unless re-elected as one of such lay Representatives, or elected as a lay Representative for some Parish or Cure, shall be permitted to sit or vote in the said Synod for a period exceeding beyond the close of the fourth annual session of the Synod after that at which he shall be elected or re-elected to be such lay Representative of the Diocese at large.

3. The property, both real and personal, moneys, funds, securities and assets of every description of, or now or hereafter held in trust by or vested in the said Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, including all Glebe lands vested in the said Society by Act of Assembly or otherwise, and whether in possession, remainder, reversion, or expectancy, shall, from and after the first day of July, A. D. 1891, be transferred to and absolutely vested in the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton for the like objects and purposes, and no other, for which the same shall, at such time, be held by the Diocesan Church Society aforesaid; and by the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, or its several boards, committees, officers, or agents, shall be administered, appropriated and applied to and for the objects and purposes aforesaid; and shall and may from time to time be sued for and recovered by or in the name of the said Synod, to and for the uses and purposes aforesaid. And the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton shall have full power and authority to receive, hold and administer the said funds, or any other funds or property at any time vested in the said Synod, and to carry on any religious or charitable work or agency whatever connected with or relating to the Church of England in New Brunswick, and approved or directed by the said Synod, and to make, alter or repeal Canons, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations for the management of the same.

4. The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton shall be and they are hereby authorized to demise and lease for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable, and to sell and convey in fee simple, subject to such

limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable, all and every or any the lands, tenements and hereditaments which now are or hereafter from time to time may be or become vested in the said Synod, and the lease or conveyance of such lands, tenements and hereditaments, under the seal of the said Synod, and by and with the approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, signified by the same being executed under his hand, shall be valid and effectual for leasing or conveying the said lands, tenements and hereditaments, or any part thereof, free and discharged from the trusts upon which the same may be held, any law, usage or custom to the contrary notwithstanding.

5. Every such lease, sale and conveyance shall be made and effected in such manner as shall be directed by the said Synod, or by any Board or Committee of such Synod, or Committee or sub-Committee of such Board or Committee, which may be authorized by the said Synod to make and effect the same, and to use and affix the seal of the Synod to conveyances or other instruments made under its authority.

6. The proceeds of such sales shall be invested by the said Synod, under the direction of such Board, Committee, or sub-Committee, either in the purchase of other real estate, or upon good and sufficient landed security, or in securities of the Dominion of Canada, or in provincial debentures of any province of Canada, or in public or municipal debentures or securities issued under the authority of any Act of the Parliament of Canada, or of any province within the said Dominion of Canada.

7. The annual income, rents, interest or dividends arising from the said lands so leased as aforesaid, or from the proceeds of the sale of such lands and property, as the same may be disposed of, shall be received and applied by the said Synod to and for the same uses, trusts and purposes for which the said lands or property so leased or sold may have been originally vested in and held by the said Diocesan Church Society, or by the said Synod; provided that whenever any such lands or property may be held by the said Society or Synod upon trust for any parish or district where no rector or missionary shall be appointed, or for the use of the rector or minister of the Church of England in any parish or district whenever a Church corporation shall be established therein, such annual income, receipts and interest shall and may, during the vacancy of such parish or district, or until the organization

or establishment of a Church corporation within such parish or district, be either held for the benefit of the said parish or district, or applied to the general purposes of the Church in the Diocese, as the Synod may from time to time determine.

8. All gifts, donations, devises, legacies and bequests whatsoever, which have been made, or may hereafter be made, or purport to be made, or take effect to or in the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, or which would have vested in or passed to the said Society had it continued to exist, shall from and after the first day of July, A. D. 1891, be held to have been made to, and shall vest in the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton for the uses and purposes and upon the trusts for which the same shall have been made or given to the said Diocesan Church Society, and for no other.

9. The several funds and all estate and property, real and personal, and of whatsoever kind, held or administered by the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick shall, from and after the said first day of July, A. D. 1891, be held and administered by the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton under the Rules and Regulations of the said Society then in force, so far as the same shall be applicable, until such time as the said Synod shall, by Canon or otherwise, provide and adopt other Rules and Regulations for the administration and management of the same; and the several boards, committees and sub-committees of the said Diocesan Church Society shall continue to act and to control and administer the said funds and property in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the said Synod, or of the said Society, if the said Synod shall not yet have adopted such Rules and Regulations, until their successors, or other Boards, Committees, or sub-Committees shall be appointed to take their places.

10. The copy of Record or entry of the investment of the proceeds of the sale of Church or Glebe lands required by the 54th section of the said Act, intituled "An Act to Consolidate and Amend various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England in New Brunswick" to be furnished, shall from and after the first day of July, A. D. 1891, be sent and furnished to the Treasurer of the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton; and the said Synod may and shall have, possess and exercise, by itself, or its Boards or Committees, all such rights, powers and authorities as are vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, or in the said Society, by the 55th section of the said Act; and all legal proceedings taken

in pursuance thereof may, from and after the said date, be taken in the name of the said Diocesan Synod of Fredericton; and all property or moneys recovered, after payment therefrom of all costs and charges of or connected with the recovery of the same, shall from thenceforth be vested in and held by the said Synod upon special trust to be invested, and the income thereof shall be paid and applied to the purposes for which the same may have been originally held.

11. Sections 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 of the said Act intituled "An Act to Consolidate and Amend various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England in New Brunswick," and all other parts of the said Act, and Acts or parts of Acts of the General Assembly of New Brunswick, inconsistent with this Act are hereby repealed: provided that such repeal shall not take effect until the said Diocesan Church Society shall have become united with and merged in the said Diocesan Synod on the first day of July, A. D. 1891, as aforesaid, and that such repeal shall not extend to any rights acquired, or to any act, matter or thing done under or by virtue of the said Act or Acts, and the same may, if in part done only, be prosecuted to completion, as if such Acts or parts of Acts had not been repealed.

OF COMMITTEE TO ASCERTAIN AMOUNT OF INVESTED FUNDS
AT THE DISPOSAL OF THE SOCIETY.

To the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Committee appointed in July, 1887, "to ascertain what amount of invested funds, if any, are at the disposal of the Society, and to report at the next meeting of the General Committee," beg now to report as follows:

The Committee have secured extracts from the wills of all those who have made bequests to the Society, except in the cases of Mr. John Inch and Mr. B. Dowling. The result they have embodied in the schedule hereunto annexed. Where the bequest, as in many cases, was simply a bequest to the Society without limitation of any kind, the Committee have not thought it necessary to quote from the will; but where any limitation existed, it will be found quoted either in full, or in substance, at the foot of the schedule. In the few cases, in which the donors to the Society are alive, their wishes have been ascertained, and are also stated by the Committee.

The Committee feel it to be their duty to call attention to the following resolution passed previously to the year 1876, though at what date your Committee have been unable to ascertain, namely: "That all bequests made to the Society be funded *as heretofore*, and the interest only applied to the

general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed." This resolution is still in force, and it may be a question how far the bequests made since it was adopted were made with the knowledge of its existence, and with the idea that they would be received and held by the Society subject to its terms.

The Committee recommend that this report and schedule be printed in the Society's Reports annually, with such further additions as may from time to time be necessary.

a. CHIEF JUSTICE PARKER.—Extract from will: "I have already set apart and assigned certain Bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John of over \$400, towards the Endowment Fund proposed to be raised for the support of the clergy of the Church of England in New Brunswick—subject to conditions, and if such conditions are not complied with, I still devote this part of my personal estate for the benefit of the said Missions as my executors may deem best. And should they make no provision, I give the same Bonds to the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, for the object of Missions in the poorer parishes on such terms as the Society may direct."

b. FROM MISS PARKER'S WILL:—"Six shares in the Bank of New Brunswick, I give and bequeath to the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, to be held or otherwise invested by the Society, and the dividends, increase or interest thereof applied annually to the general use and purposes of the said Society."

c. This gift consists of a brick building and lot on the North Market Wharf, St. John, valued as above. By Mr. Scovil's will the net annual proceeds of the property were to be disposed of as follows:

\$400 to the Rector of St. James' Church, Cambridge.

\$24 to the repair of the same church.

The remainder to the general purposes of the Society.

d. Subject to certain legacies and annuities, all of which have been paid or have terminated. Miss Hazen left "all the rest residue and remainder" of her real estate, valued as above, to the Society, "for the general purposes of the Society."

e. FROM MR. ROBINSON'S WILL:—"To the Eighth Object of the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, namely, the creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, one thousand dollars."

f. FROM CHIEF JUSTICE CHIPMAN'S WILL:—"To the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, * * * ten

thousand pounds to be laid out and invested in real estate, Government securities, or real securities, and the annual income and produce thereof to be expended and applied in the support and promotion of the Missionary objects of the Society.

g. Mrs. DeWolfe devised "all the rest" of her real estate to the Bishop of the Diocese, subject to the life interest of her husband, in trust to sell the same, and "to pay one-fourth of the net proceeds of such sale to the funds of the Diocesan Church Society of this Province." The amount above stated is what has been paid in by His Lordship to this date. There will probably be some further receipts as the lands are disposed of.

h. The nature of this gift appears in the minutes of the proceedings of the General Committee, pages 87 and 90, of the Report for 1886. The fund, \$2,600, was appropriated by his Lordship as follows:

j. Mrs. Gordon's gift was, by her desire, divided between the "*General Purposes Fund*" and the "*Incapacitated Clergy Fund*," the interest only to be used, and the principal kept invested.

APPENDIX.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

As one means of increasing the contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable.

The Weekly Offerings upon the Envelope System have been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this being done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope, at the services on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan the following objects are sought to be accomplished.

1. That not only heads of families, but *all in the Parish*, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute *according to their ability* to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible, at the appointed time, *bring their pledged Weekly Offerings to Church*, instead of paying them at the call of the collector.

[NOTE.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A FORTNIGHT, or at any other stated period within the Quarter.]

3. That the parish revenue may not fall into arrears and debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be *materially increased*, so that mainly from this source sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be generally adopted.
