WESTERN FARMERS NOT UNIT FOR RECIPROCIITY. Borden Closes His Tour and Will Return to Ottawa—Some Good-Humored Heckling.

WINNIPEG, July 9.—(Special).—R. L. Borden closed his tour of the three prairie provinces on Saturday evening at Somerset and is now on his way back to Ottawa, where he is due to arrive early on Tuesday morning.

On the last day of his tour Mr. Borden is accompanied on his return trip by all the eastern members of parliament, who have been touring the west. Clark, M.L.A. for Centre Bruce, remains over, and will continue the anti-reciprocity campaign in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Two unusual incidents occurred at Borden. The first was the refusal of the mayor to read the civic address. Mr. Borden, who is a Liberal, was unable, thru a local misunderstanding, to read the address to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and as a consequence of that he declined to read it to the Conservative leader this year.

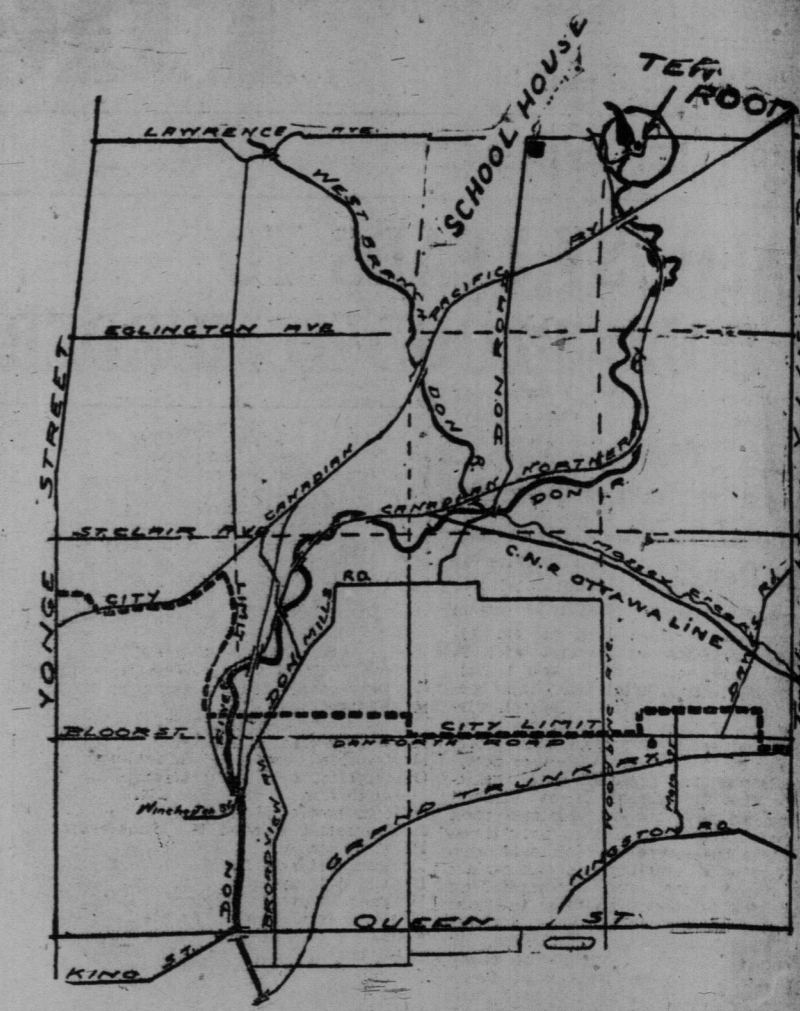

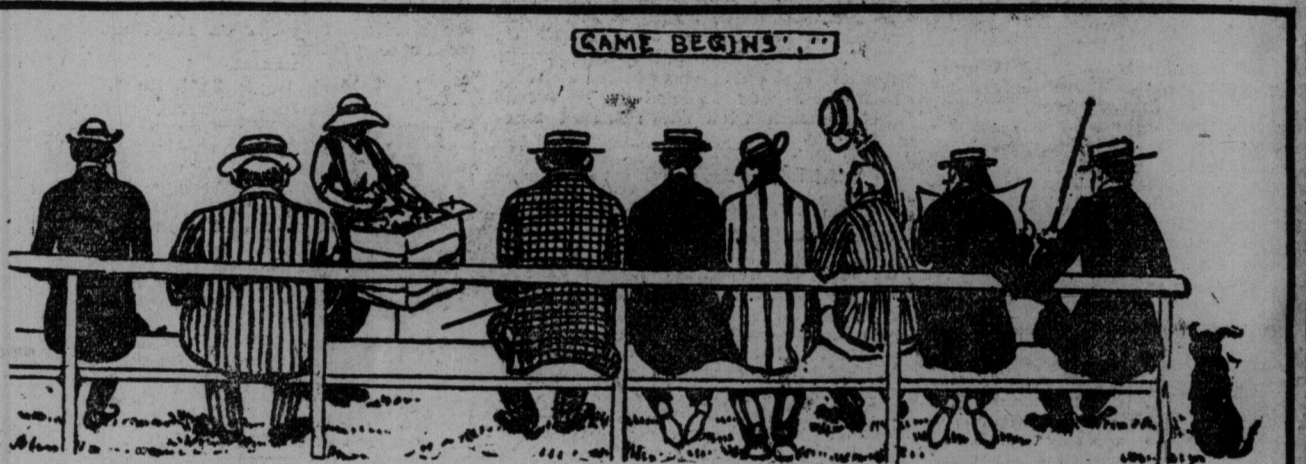
