"Capt. Amundsen has attained the geographical south pole, the long-sought spot, and that finishes the record-breaking, as far as the

ends of the earth are concerned. "I am assuming that the latitude of Amundsen's winter quarters was 74 degrees 44 minutes, that is, only 676 geographical miles from the south pole. This place was named Bay of Whales by me on my expedition, and was formerly known as Balloon Bight. If Amundsen spatch from Christiania stated that a cipher message had been received there from a private individual aboard the Fram. to the effect that Amundsen had reached the south pole, but right on top of this came another message from the Norwegian capital, declaring that a message had been received by a private person there from the control of the south pole about the beginning of October.

FOUND NEW POUTE

FOUND NEW ROUTE. "There is no indication in the cable whether Amundsen followed the route of my expedition in reaching the mountains that guard the approach to the pole. It may be possible that he found a new route, and an easier one, up to the plateau which lies about 9000 to 11,000 feet above sea level. He may have had good weather.

"The words of the cablegram: 'Pole attained, Dec. 14 to 17,' evidently mean that on reaching the geographical pole, so that no uncertainty should exist as to his exact position, he waited three days, taking noon observations so as accurately to determine his position. "The advantage of taking three days of continuous observations at the pole are as follows:

VALUE OF OBSERVATIONS.

"Assuming that an explorer took a noon observation of the altitude of the sun, and found that he was at the pole, a degree of uncertainty would still exist, because of the slow movement of the sun, which completes the circle with hardly any perceptible rise or fall. If an observation is taken for the second day at the same spot, and the difference of declination of the sun in its north or south path corresponds with this observation of the day before, and it does this for the third day, he may safely assume that his position is accurate.

"A flying snapshot is not as reliable as a continuous series of observations. If he were using a theodolite, undoubtedly the most accurate instrument, there is no doubt that he could ascertain the position of the pole to one mile.

There is now before the house committee on military affairs in Washington a bill, introduced by Representative Bartholdt of Missouri, to restore the canteen at army posts.

The canteen was abolished in 1901 following a vigorous campaign by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the whiskey trust, the one acting from a desire to get the liquor trade out of the army, the other from a desire to get it into their saloons in the neighborhood of army posts.

That the questions at issue are of grave importance will be realized by any one who reads the subjoint opinions for and against the proposal of Representative Bartholdt, which is in effect that American soldiers shall have the opportunity of purchasing wholesome peer at the army posts.

Dr. Forbes Godfrey of West York will introduce a bill into the legislature empowering the government to make regulations concerning apartment or tenement houses. It is his intention to have it considered as part of and to be read with the Public Health Act.

The proposed measure is most comprehensive in its nature and provides that the lieutenant-governor in council shall have power from time to time to make regulations with reference to the erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair and use of tenement houses, as may be deemed necessary, advisable or convenient to ensure the health and safety of the occupants and

of the public generally.

Dr. Godfrey would have the bill apply to cities of 10,000 population and over, and to any other city or town where the council passes a bylaw proding for the bill to apply to that mu-
