

MR. GREENWAY IS WANTED

SIR DONALD IS ANXIOUS THAT HE SHOULD GO TO OTTAWA.

It is said the Cabinet yesterday considered the advisability of sending for the Premier, Mr. Greenway, to Ottawa. Mr. Martin is said to have written Mr. Greenway asking him to go to Ottawa, but he will say nothing yet. It is understood that the Legislature here will conclude the business within two weeks.

The Cabinet was in session all forenoon, and none of the Ministers were seen to attend the meetings of the different committees. It is said they were considering the advisability of sending for Premier Greenway and some other members of his Cabinet, so as to have a conference regarding the Remedial Bill. This view has been strongly impressed upon the Government by Sir Donald Smith.

There were about a dozen speakers in the Remedial debate to-day—Mr. Moncrieff from Lambton and Mr. Martin from Winnipeg. From the standpoint of the Government, Mr. Moncrieff made an excellent speech. Mr. Martin was as emphatic as any speaker, and with great vigor pressed the point that this bill was unconstitutional and ultra vires.

On the second reading of the bill Major Hughes will move for the repeal of section 93 of the B.N.A. Act, and section 94 of the Manitoba Act, and substitute therefor the following: "In and for the Dominion there shall be one system of national education, embracing (1) the intellectual branches, including mathematics, history, geography, English and French, (2) the principles of morality, and (3) political and sanitary science, and (4) manual and industrial training."

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The meeting of the Remedial Committee this morning was characterized by some lively proceedings. Hugh Sutherland's familiar address as the first order taken up, and after some discussion was ordered to be reported. The object of the bill is to give the time for constructing the road. The next measure considered was a scheme for opening up navigation from Winnipeg to Hudson Bay by a series of canals and utilizing the Hudson River. Mr. Martin strongly opposed the bill. During the course of the discussion Mr. Martin and Mr. Cochrane fell out and some high words passed between them. Mr. Martin said "War," and had to apologize. Mr. Martin had to take back an imputation against him that he was making the question a political one.

It is said to be the intention of the Government to amend the Act respecting the Supreme and Exchequer Court. The first clause gives the Chief Justice of Canada the title of Chief Justice of Canada. The second clause enables four Judges of the Supreme Court to hear a case by the consent of the Chief Justice. The present quorum necessary before a case can be heard is five. The Premier is expected to introduce the revision of the statutes which enables the Governor-General-in-Council to appoint three Justices of the Peace and to revise the statutes since the last consolidation and revision in 1885. Bill was dropped.

The Country's Revenue. The revenue for the past month shows the gratifying increase of \$30,000, compared with February, 1895. A quarter of a million of this is due to customs and \$50,000 to excise. The total revenue for the eight months of the year is exactly two millions ahead of the same period last year, while the expenditure is one million less, a net increase of three millions in the eight months. Correspondingly, the expenditure on capital account has decreased \$300,000, less than for the same period last year. The net debt in February, decreased \$870,000.

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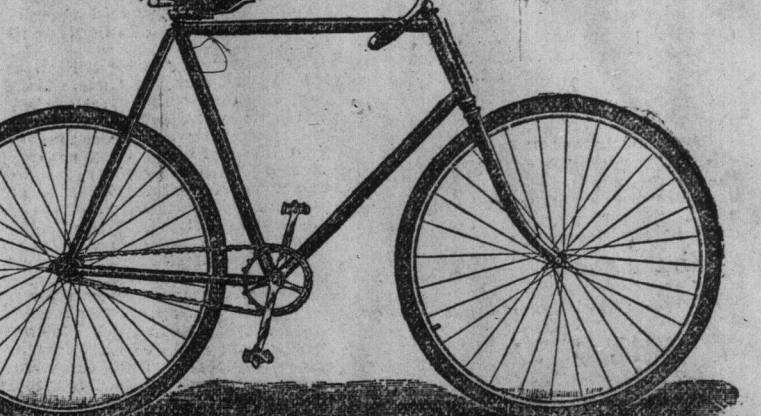

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TESTIMONY OF THE AGES.

CANON DUMOULIN ON THE INFLUENCES OF UNBELIEF.

Highly interesting of the National Evil of Athetism—Elogy of the Triumphs of Faith—Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries Contrasted—Lessons for Canada.

Despite the unpleasant weather, St. James' Cathedral was yesterday crowded at the 20 minutes' noon service. The Canon said: "It is very hard to persuade humanity on dangerous issues in unbelief. It was Pope who wrote: 'For forms of faith let graceless zealots fight: His can't be wrong whose life is in the right.' But this is a fallacy. As a general rule a man's life cannot be wrong whose faith is in the right. There may be inconsistencies and shortcomings, but the great law for humanity is that as a man believes so will he act."

How faith believes in the right, the preacher illustrated by indicating what his hearers would do if the church were reformed on fire, or how they would demean themselves in case of serious disease.

The same in Politics and Morals. In politics, I am a Conservative, I act according to my political faith in one way, if I act in a different way in another way. So it is in the region of morals. If I believe that theft is not wrong, if I believe it to be a despicable evil, I shall not become a thief. It is the same with money. The man who believes in the moral code. The believers in Bacchus worshipers, the followers of Jehovah I will seek to worship Him. I will try with all my might to live soberly and uprightly in his present world. You see how true it is that in the ways and walks of life, according as a man believes so he acts.

On this point the Canon quoted stanzas of the poet Cowper. Two centuries. He continued: There have been two centuries in the world's history which are notoriously atheistic, unbelieving and destitute of faith. The first was the beginning of the Christian era—the first century of Christianity. Paganism, with its doctrines of polytheism, bad as it was, was undermined and abandoned in this first century. The gods were given up, their worship neglected, their temples closed, their priests were abandoned, and instead of all this, which had a certain influence upon the people, Neroism was set up—the worship of the Emperor—which was followed by the worship of the Emperor as a deity. It was a fearful as to be absolutely indescribable.

It has been written by two witnesses, one by a contemporary of all these evil things, by one who lived in that day and saw these things with his own eyes, the great Apostle Paul, who has delineated them in the first chapter of his Epistle to the Romans. Another witness of these things was Gibbon, who was not restrained by any ideas of modesty in describing the sensual ecstasies of the day. He says: "The man who in which Christianity came to battle with this evil state of things."

The Atheistic Eighteenth Century. The other atheistic century was the 18th. All over the continent of Europe, with common consent, was devoted to the worship of the material. English society was tainted by the spirit of that age. The universities were corrupted, the religion was shameful in their lives. Society was corrupted to the heart's core. The novels, the pictures of Hogarth give an idea of the immorality of those days. It is a pity that the relief and corruption, and wickedness followed as a natural consequence. You have only to turn to the history which may read with this glorious Victorian age, that you may see the difference between a nation which believes and one which leaves faith aside.

A Warning to Canada. So it would be in this Dominion of ours were we to throw up our hands in adopt unbelief, if we were to close our churches and turn them into infidel lecture halls, abjure faith in our God, blaspheme Christ and close our Sunday Schools and say: "We are only bodies. The best of life is in eating, drinking and merrymaking, and there is nothing after life. Death is the end of all."

In the 18th century France plainly and positively renounced religion and faith, blasphemed God, cast out the name of Jehovah and set up the god of Reason to be worshipped. France declared that death was an eternal sleep. France abolished the Sabbath and instituted a decimal day of licentiousness, liberty, pleasure and ease.

Every school boy knows the deluge of judgment which overpassed that land, the horrors of the revolution, the reign of terror, how the Seine ran red with blood, how the whole land groaned under the enormity of the crimes, the suffering, and how from those dark, terrible days down to the present that most beautiful of islands, the country of Europe has never recovered from the shock of that abandonment of Christian faith.

Our Privileges. You and I have been brought up in a pure and Christian faith. We have been taught to believe in the God, in His Blessed Son and Holy Spirit, to refrain from taking His name in vain and to reverence His name, to honor our father and mother, to abjure and abhor the terrible crime of murder, to hate and abhor adultery, and to be unclean, to regard theft as a heinous and inexcusable and a wrong to be pronounced upon by the judges. We have been taught to regard sin as a monster to confess when we have committed it, to turn away from it, to resist it with all our might, to seek pardon for it and to turn away from its wiles.

Suppose that this had not been so, suppose that we had been brought up in blank unbelief, without any faith, assistance and instruction, and then let each one ask, "What would I be today?"

With all the Christian civilization of which we are inheritors, what are we? Poor, frail and feeble, often falling into transgression and committing sin. With all these multiplied advantages we are only poor struggling militant Christians. We are not what we have had we grown up under such conditions as were prevalent at the close of the eighteenth century in infidel France?

The Blessings of Faith. Faith is to you what the Atlantic cable is to the man of commerce. It is the bond of connection between two worlds. Faith joins earth to heaven, just as that great sub-marine cable joins two continents, bears our prayers to God as it sends its cablegrams to the earth, and carries the great and true messages over the great and true ether.

Faith is to you just what a rope let down from a ship is to the man sinking in the water—his only hope of life. Faith is to you the life-boat which is going out over the stormy waves, rescuing those sinking people who are clinging to its sides and finding safety in it. If you cut the cable, if you sever the rope, if you sink the life-boat, then there is nothing else for it—those who are in danger will go down. The connection will be broken off. The man in the life-boat will sink beneath the waves.

uplift my nature, that can dignify my manhood, has been done by faith.

The Canon next recited the glorious achievements of the men of faith, as recited in Hebrews 11. "Who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, and fought to fight the armies of the aliens."

This is, said the preacher, faith in her heroic deeds, the faith which the devil and the powers of darkness. Here are her victories, the emulation of which she has bequeathed to us, her loving sons and daughters.

Take away this faith and give me in its stead cold, blank unbelief, and you take away every incentive to noble and transcendent life. You take away from me the love that conquers difficulties, that overcomes every obstacle, that draws me to the throne of God. You take away from me the hatred, which is my shield in the battle with evil. You take from me the hope which is my stimulant in the face of the terrors of eternal judgment, that hold me back when on the verge of evil. "Without faith it is impossible to please God."

Therefore, continued the Canon, beware of the man, the false friend, the hypocrite, the man who, whatever he does, which would lessen your faith in God and Christianity. Faith, once turned from your heart, will never return. There is an awful responsibility on the man who, by his talents, his influence, and the power of his pen, strikes from beneath a man the only firm footing, the only thing that can carry him to heaven or hell.

Paraphrased Shakespeare. I close by paraphrasing a familiar line from Shakespeare. You know what the great dramatist said, "Who steals my purse steals trash. 'Tis something, 'Tis nothing, 'Tis mine, 'Tis his, and he has been a slave to thousands, but he that filches from me my 'faith' robs me of that which neither heaven nor hell makes me poor, indeed." "The best friend of humanity uttered five words of immortal truth when he said, 'Stand fast in the faith.' There will be no service to-day. The series will be resumed on Monday next, and will continue till Easter."

The association endeavored to have a new price list, whereby carloads of sheep would be charged for on a general basis of 25,000 pounds instead of by the individual animal. All efforts to come to a result with the companies have only resulted in increased freight charges, however, and it was decided to appoint Messrs. Ald. Dunn, R. Bickerton, Thos. Crawford, M.L.A., and Con Coughlin a committee to try and secure redress from the Dominion Government.

The minority recommended the passage of the bill by Phelps, which passed the Senate, and which provides that no cigarettes shall be manufactured or sold in the State. A motion to adopt the minority report passed by a vote of 53 to 24.

Paterson as the party candidate at the recent convention was irregular, inasmuch as the meeting was not called for the selection of a candidate, and could not form itself into a convention for that purpose.

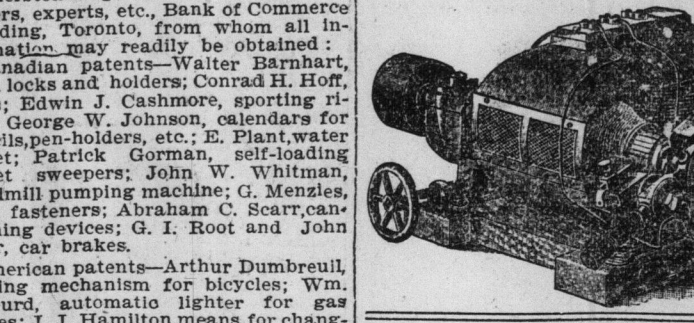

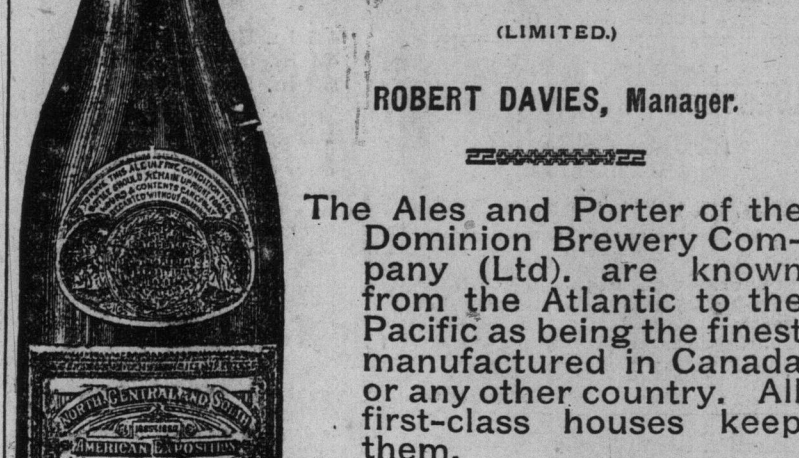
