GARRISON CHURCH PARADE.
Toronto's Crack Regiments Will Attend Devine Service at Massey Music Hall To-morrow Afternoon.
If to-morrow is a fine day the garrison church parade to Massey Hall promises to be the largest ever held in the city. The several corps that will parade at the Armories ready to move off at 2.45 p.m. are: Queen's Own Rifles, Royal Grenadiers, 48th Highlanders, Governor-General's Body Guard, Toronto Field Battery, Royal Canadian Dragoons, No. 2 Company, R.C.C.I., and probably the Upper Canada Police cadets.
The brigade staff will be: Col. Otter, D.A.G., No. 2 M.D.; Lieut.-Col. Buchanan, R.C.C.I., staff officer; Lieut. Crooks, Q.O. R.; Lieut. Cosby, 48th, and Lieut. Willie, M.I.G., orderly officers. 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
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
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
