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John King Fired Two Shots From a Revolver, Hitting William Graner in the Face.

WHEN ARRESTED HE HAD A RIFLE BY HIS SIDE—THE PRISONER IS SEVENTY-ONE.

Two young men, William Graner of 112 Vermont-avenue and George French of 117 Vermont-avenue, while on their way home last evening held pistol shots and, after looking around in the direction of the sounds, Graner received the full contents of a cartridge in the face.

The Man Behind the Gun.
The revolver was in the hands of an old man named John C. King, whom the two young men knew and had spoken to as they passed by.

Graner and his companion hurried to the former's home and told what had happened. In looking into a mirror to see what the wound looked like, Graner pressed the skin around the cuts and immediately three small bullets fell out.

After he had rested for a while he was taken to the Ouellet-avenue Police Station and there he repeated his story.

Shooting With Intent.
The result was that a warrant charging King with shooting with intent was issued and he was taken into custody.

Graner says the prisoner took deliberate aim and then fired. The weapon which was used was a 32-calibre revolver, and only one chamber was empty when it came into the possession of the police.

Graner and his friend French say there were four shots fired, but the prisoner only admits discharging the pistol twice.

Reciprocity Treaty Signed.
Between France and the United States. The Dingley Law.

Washington, July 24.—The reciprocity treaty negotiations between the United States and France were brought to a successful conclusion at the State Department late this afternoon, when Ambassador Cambon and Secretary of State Root signed the treaty.

The treaty is the most important reciprocity treaty concluded under the Dingley law, and the only one affecting the trade with a large commercial nation.

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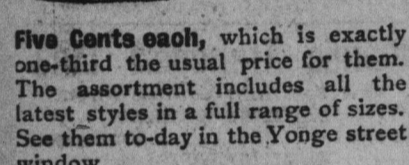

INTER-IMPERIAL TRADE. A matter that ought to engage the attention of British statesmen more than almost any other question is the development of trade between the British Empire and the rest of the world. It is true that British statesmen have little to fear from the aggressive trade policy of foreign rivals if they would only waken up to the immense possibilities of her own colonies. Even without any artificial attempt to subsidize the trade of Great Britain's surplus products, while they supply one-fifth of the material which developed in the rest of the world, take many years for this one-fifth and one-fifth to amount to 100 per cent, that is, to make the trade with the colonies equal to its present total trade with the world. If the present total trade with the world is \$5,000,000,000, the colonies alone will supply \$1,000,000,000 of it. It is not insignificant to what it might become by the adoption of an imperial tariff. A recently published statement by the British Board of Trade Journal, showing Britain's trade with her colonies, gives these interesting statistics of interest: Great Britain's exports to her colonies, total domestic exports in 1897, which amounted to \$234,220,000 in value, \$80,375,000, or 34.4 per cent, went to her colonies, and the percentage of her exports which the colonies take appears to be gaining. Of the total exports of British produce and manufactures from the United Kingdom in 1898, 35 per cent went to the British colonies in 1898, 38 per cent in 1899 and 34.4 per cent in 1900. The other part of the total exports of Great Britain annually purchases from her colonies about \$450,000,000 of their products, the imports from the British colonies into the United Kingdom in 1895 being \$35,000,000, in 1896 \$38,208,000 and in 1897 \$34,019,000. Naturally the bulk of her imports from the colonies is articles of food and raw materials for use in manufacturing. Food products in 1897 were \$24,711,000 of the \$34,019,000 of imports from the colonies into Great Britain, while raw materials for the manufacturing industry imported from the colonies amounted to \$26,068,000, other raw materials to \$25,314,000, while manufactures imported from the British colonies were only \$7,896,000. Thus the people of the United Kingdom are buying \$45,000,000 of food products and material for manufactures for which they are compelled to send money abroad, are now able to expend over \$400,000,000 annually among their own people in other parts of the empire, which represent British blood and British capital for it is asserted on high authority that probably \$2,000,000,000 of British capital is invested in various ways in the colonies, and the products of the land and the mines of the United Kingdom thus contribute to the prosperity of her own citizens whose money is there invested.

The following table shows the value of imports into the United Kingdom from her colonies in 1897 by great classes:

Food products of all kinds: includes cereals and farinaceous substances, and other foodstuffs (not for food), meat, fish, poultry, eggs, dairy products, fruits and vegetables, coffee, cocoa, tea, and other foodstuffs, etc. \$24,711,000

Raw materials for manufactures: includes raw wool, cotton, hemp, etc. \$25,314,000

Other raw materials: includes hides, skins, bones, and other animal products, and other raw materials, etc. \$25,314,000

Manufactures: includes leather, paper and other manufactured goods and articles, etc. \$7,896,000

Total \$45,000,000

INCREASED INDEBTEDNESS.

Parkdale Presbyterians Require \$6000 for the Erection of a New School-room. A special meeting of Toronto Presbyterians was held yesterday in Knox Church to consider an application from Parkdale Presbyterians to add \$6000 to their mortgage on the site of the new school-house. The cause of the increase is the building of a new school-room. Decision on the application was adjourned till Friday next in order to give an opportunity to see all the parties specially concerned in the mortgage. It is expected the application will then be granted.

TWENTY-ONE MEN DISCHARGED.

No Evidence to Show That They Had Been Implicated in the Dynamite Explosion. New York, July 24.—The examination of 21 men, charged with being implicated in the dynamite plot and explosion at 56th-street, New York, on Monday, Wednesday morning last, took place today in the Adams-street Police Court before Magistrate W. J. Maguire. Magistrate Bruner discharged the 21 men, finding no evidence to show that they had been implicated in the dynamite explosion.

SPEAKER EDGAR'S HEALTH.

A Successful Operation Performed and Sir James is Mending. Sir James Edgar, Speaker of the House of Commons, is progressing as favorably as possible, after the operation that was performed upon him on Thursday last, to remove a stone from the bladder. Dr. Forster, the London medical authority, who assisted by Drs. Macell and Scadding, performed the operation, which was highly successful and gave much relief. For some time Sir James will be confined to his room. He was resting easily at an early hour this morning.

The result of the election was a narrow one, with Mr. McLean being elected. The opposition party claimed that the election was fraudulent, but the House of Commons ruled in favor of Mr. McLean.

General Booth at Home

The private life of that very public man, General Booth, who has just returned from visiting the Australian contingent of the Salvation Army is carefully protected from the popular gaze. It is doubtful whether, out of the thousands of his soldiers, a score could name his place of residence. He lives, on the rare occasions when he is not travelling, at Hadley Wood, near Barnet, in a red brick villa that is close to the station, and distinguished from others in the road by the poverty of its window curtains. A young man with the blue sergeant's uniform and brass collar letters of the Salvation Army is the chief articles of furniture in the sitting-room.

The general works in a back room, and sleeps above in an old-fashioned four-poster. He takes no exercise, except on the platform. Then he speaks with every muscle of his body. At home he rises at six, prepares and drinks his morning tea, and sits down to his table and reads the papers. He has no desk, and writes with a quill pen, and a small, rapid hand. No change or fresh venture in the religious body of which he is the head can proceed without his consent. He is aided in his deliberations by his eldest son and certain trusted officers. As he is ever planning new schemes and extensions, and enters into the most trifling details of matters that concern him, and is in constant communication with persons interested in the Salvation Army all over the world, the amount of labor he has to do is considerable.

At eight o'clock he breakfasts. Sometimes one of his grandchildren (his son lives near by) is admitted to share the meal with him, but he usually eats in solitude. Before this hour, the early train has brought one or several officers with papers for his signature or requests for instructions. Immediately after breakfast, which lasts about fifteen minutes, the general begins a rapid entry—the scanty household, consisting of his secretary and housekeeper, is summoned to prayers. Work is resumed and lasts till the mid-day dinner, which is as simple as the and-egg breakfast. William Booth is vegetative and exists almost entirely on vegetable fare. He never has a second course, allows himself fifteen minutes for the meal, and reads whilst a visitor or a visitor is present. After dinner he takes a short nap, continuing his writing, dictating and reading of orders till ten o'clock at night. Then he has a bath and goes to bed. His secretary's duties are not over. After their marriage, William Booth, stimulated by his enthusiastic wife, threw aside a ministerial livelihood and in the chance of a promotion, to preach in the byways and corners of London. Mrs. Booth's first attempt at public speaking astonished her husband, and began an epoch of platform work. She began as a chorister. Her first sermon was in the "Christians' Mission" in an old tent in the "Quaker Bazaar Ground," East London. The movement grew by persecution. Frequently in his life was in danger from the mob, and "persecution" in the open air, and his great height and striking face at once identified him as "the leader," and brought a storm of sticks and stones. One day he ran for his life in Mile-end Road from an infuriated crowd who resented his plain, unadorned and the title of "leader." His portraits do not convey a good idea of the man. He is very tall, with a deep-set gray eye, slight with vitality and vigor, a nose shaped like the "Iron Duke" model, a long, firm, well-shaped mouth, and a pair of eyes that seem to gaze and burn under a straggling beard and moustache. His hair is dark and covered with fine white hair. His hands are beautiful, long, of good color, and expressive. On the left little finger, he wears a small plain band—his wedding ring. The whole man is stately, kind, and more distinguished than his pictures paint him.

A Rational Antisocialist. The Salvation Army adores him. Part of his power over the working men and women is due to the fact that he never bends to riches. He becomes a millionaire as freely about his "son" as a dustman. The general Booth is a religious man, a man with genius for leadership, an excess of common sense and an excess of enthusiasm. "The people must be saved," he says, "and he means to lead them the same way as he would lead them to form the same opinion for themselves." He has no money. A very small legacy left him a few years ago enables him to live. He draws no salary from the Salvation Army. He wears one suit of clothes, a whole year and his waistcoat is a red jersey. The tall, unpolished hat forms his sole insignia. "The General," when he has finished with it to rag, is not worth a penny.
